NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

The following description of the Computing Technology Industry Association, Inc. 401(k) Plan ("Plan") provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General: The Plan is a defined contribution retirement plan covering eligible employees of Computing Technology Industry Association, Inc. and its participating subsidiaries (collectively, the Association). The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974, as amended ("ERISA").

Contributions: Each year, participants may contribute up to 75 percent of pre-tax annual compensation, as defined in the plan document, up to the maximum limits of the Internal Revenue Code ("IRC"). Participants may designate all or a portion of their deferral contributions as after-tax contributions into a Roth account. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans (rollover). The Plan includes an auto-enrollment provision whereby all newly eligible employees are automatically enrolled into the plan unless they affirmatively elect not to participate in the plan. Automatically enrolled participants have their deferral rate set at 3 percent of eligible compensation and their contributions invested in a designated balanced fund until changed by the participant.

The Association provided non-discretionary safe harbor matching contribution equal to 100 percent of the first 6 percent of eligible compensation that a participant contributes to the Plan. Plan management discontinued the non-discretionary safe harbor matching contribution effective April 27, 2020, due to the coronavirus impact as noted in Note 2. Plan management reinstated the non-discretionary safe harbor matching contribution effective January 1, 2021. In addition, the Association may contribute a discretionary non-elective employer contribution. No discretionary non-elective employer contribution was made during 2024 and 2023. Participants direct the investment of all contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan. Contributions are subject to certain Internal Revenue Service ("IRS") limitations.

Participant Accounts: Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and the Association's matching contribution, rollover contributions, as well as allocation of the Plan's earnings. Participants are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account. Participants are additionally allocated credits from the trustee based on daily investment balances in core funds, as established by the trustee. These credits are presented as a separate line item on the participant account statements.

Vesting: Participants are vested immediately in their salary reduction and rollover contributions plus earnings thereon. Participants are immediately vested in employer contributions, unless the participant was terminated prior to February 1, 2009, in which case they will be subject to the following vesting schedule:

Notes Receivable from Participants: Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000, up to a maximum of the lesser amount of 50% of their vested account balance or \$50,000, less the highest outstanding loan balance during the previous 12 months. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at a rate determined by the plan administrator based on prevailing market conditions. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions and cannot exceed five years unless the loan is for the purchase of a participant's primary residence.

Payment of Benefits: Upon termination of service due to death, disability, retirement, or other reasons, a participant may receive a lump-sum distribution equal to the value of the participant's vested interest on their account. In certain circumstances, participants may make "hardship withdrawals" as defined in the Plan. Active participants may also take distributions from the Plan upon attainment of age 59½.

Forfeited Accounts: As of December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited non-vested accounts totaled \$8,233 and \$9,664, respectively. These accounts may be used to reduce future Association contributions.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting: The accompanying financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates: The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("U.S. GAAP") requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures and actual results could differ from these estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition: The Plan's investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date in the Plan's principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability. See Note 3 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation (depreciation) includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Payment of Benefits: Benefits are recorded when paid.

Notes Receivable from Participants: Notes receivable from participants are reported at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest, with no allowance for credit losses, as repayments of principal and interest are received through payroll deductions and the notes are collateralized by the participants' account balances.

Risks and Uncertainties: The Plan holds various investments. Investments are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, liquidity and credit risks as well as the risks associated with the on-going Coronavirus pandemic. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investments, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the fair values of investments will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

NOTE 3 - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under authoritative guidance are described as follows:

Level 1 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted market prices for identical assets in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 - Inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly, such as:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observables and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The following presents the valuation methods and assumptions used by the Plan to estimate fair values of investments.

Mutual Funds and Money Market Mutual Fund: The fair values of mutual fund investments are determined by obtaining quoted prices on nationally recognized securities exchanges (Level 1 inputs).

The method described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Plan believes its valuation method is appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

NOTE 4 - PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Association has the right under the plan agreement to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of termination, participants would become 100% vested in their employer contributions and earnings thereon.

NOTE 5 - TAX STATUS

The Internal Revenue Service issued an opinion letter dated June 30, 2020 indicating that the prototype adopted by the Plan, as then designed, was in compliance with applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code. Although the Plan has been amended from the original prototype document, plan management believes that the Plan is currently being operated in accordance with the Internal Revenue Code. Therefore, the plan administrator believes that the Plan was qualified and that the related trust was tax-exempt as of the financial statement dates.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan. The plan administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan and has concluded that, as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. The plan administrator believes that it is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to 2021.

NOTE 6 - PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Parties-in-interest are defined under Department of Labor (“DOL”) regulations as any fiduciary of the Plan, any party rendering service to the Plan, the employer, and certain others. Certain administrative functions are performed by officers or employees of the Association. No such officer or employee receives compensation from the Plan. Some administrative expenses of the Plan are paid directly by the Association. The Plan’s investments include shares of mutual funds and money market fund managed by Fidelity Management Trust Company (Fidelity), the trustee of the Plan, or its affiliate. Therefore, these investments qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Fees paid to the trustee or affiliates of the trustee also qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Notes receivable from participants also reflect party-in-interest transactions. The trustee receives revenue from mutual fund service providers for services the trustee provides to the funds. The trustee in turn periodically funds the Plan with revenue credits. These revenue credits are used by the Plan to offset certain amounts owed to the trustee for its administrative services to the Plan. These transactions are considered party-in-interest transactions.

NOTE 7 - UNAUDITED INFORMATION – CERTIFIED INVESTMENTS AND NOTES RECEIVABLE FROM PARTICIPANTS

Certain information related to investments disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedule, including investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation in fair value of investments and interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by the Fidelity Management Trust Company.

Our audits did not extend to the certified investment information, except for obtaining and reading the certification, comparing the certified investment information with the related information presented and disclosed in the financial statements, and reading the disclosures relating to the certified investment information to assess whether they are in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements of accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Other Matter – Supplemental Schedules Required by ERISA

The supplemental schedule of Schedule H, Line 4(i), Schedule of Assets (Held at End of Year) as of December 31, 2024, is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements but is supplementary information required by the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information included in the supplemental schedule, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audits of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with GAAS. For information included in the supplemental schedule that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, we compared such information to the related certified investment information.

In forming our opinion on the supplemental schedule, we evaluated whether the supplemental schedule, other than the information agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, including its form and content, is presented in conformity with the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

The following description of the Computing Technology Industry Association, Inc. 401(k) Plan ("Plan") provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General: The Plan is a defined contribution retirement plan covering eligible employees of Computing Technology Industry Association, Inc. and its participating subsidiaries (collectively, the Association). The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974, as amended ("ERISA").

Contributions: Each year, participants may contribute up to 75 percent of pre-tax annual compensation, as defined in the plan document, up to the maximum limits of the Internal Revenue Code ("IRC"). Participants may designate all or a portion of their deferral contributions as after-tax contributions into a Roth account. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans (rollover). The Plan includes an auto-enrollment provision whereby all newly eligible employees are automatically enrolled into the plan unless they affirmatively elect not to participate in the plan. Automatically enrolled participants have their deferral rate set at 3 percent of eligible compensation and their contributions invested in a designated balanced fund until changed by the participant.

The Association provided non-discretionary safe harbor matching contribution equal to 100 percent of the first 6 percent of eligible compensation that a participant contributes to the Plan. Plan management discontinued the non-discretionary safe harbor matching contribution effective April 27, 2020, due to the coronavirus impact as noted in Note 2. Plan management reinstated the non-discretionary safe harbor matching contribution effective January 1, 2021. In addition, the Association may contribute a discretionary non-elective employer contribution. No discretionary non-elective employer contribution was made during 2024 and 2023. Participants direct the investment of all contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan. Contributions are subject to certain Internal Revenue Service ("IRS") limitations.

Participant Accounts: Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and the Association's matching contribution, rollover contributions, as well as allocation of the Plan's earnings. Participants are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account. Participants are additionally allocated credits from the trustee based on daily investment balances in core funds, as established by the trustee. These credits are presented as a separate line item on the participant account statements.

Vesting: Participants are vested immediately in their salary reduction and rollover contributions plus earnings thereon. Participants are immediately vested in employer contributions, unless the participant was terminated prior to February 1, 2009, in which case they will be subject to the following vesting schedule:

Notes Receivable from Participants: Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000, up to a maximum of the lesser amount of 50% of their vested account balance or \$50,000, less the highest outstanding loan balance during the previous 12 months. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at a rate determined by the plan administrator based on prevailing market conditions. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions and cannot exceed five years unless the loan is for the purchase of a participant's primary residence.

Payment of Benefits: Upon termination of service due to death, disability, retirement, or other reasons, a participant may receive a lump-sum distribution equal to the value of the participant's vested interest on their account. In certain circumstances, participants may make "hardship withdrawals" as defined in the Plan. Active participants may also take distributions from the Plan upon attainment of age 59½.

Forfeited Accounts: As of December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited non-vested accounts totaled \$8,233 and \$9,664, respectively. These accounts may be used to reduce future Association contributions.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting: The accompanying financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates: The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("U.S. GAAP") requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures and actual results could differ from these estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition: The Plan's investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date in the Plan's principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability. See Note 3 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation (depreciation) includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Payment of Benefits: Benefits are recorded when paid.

Notes Receivable from Participants: Notes receivable from participants are reported at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest, with no allowance for credit losses, as repayments of principal and interest are received through payroll deductions and the notes are collateralized by the participants' account balances.

Risks and Uncertainties: The Plan holds various investments. Investments are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, liquidity and credit risks as well as the risks associated with the on-going Coronavirus pandemic. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investments, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the fair values of investments will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

NOTE 3 - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under authoritative guidance are described as follows:

Level 1 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted market prices for identical assets in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 - Inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly, such as:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observables and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The following presents the valuation methods and assumptions used by the Plan to estimate fair values of investments.

Mutual Funds and Money Market Mutual Fund: The fair values of mutual fund investments are determined by obtaining quoted prices on nationally recognized securities exchanges (Level 1 inputs).

The method described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Plan believes its valuation method is appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

NOTE 4 - PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Association has the right under the plan agreement to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of termination, participants would become 100% vested in their employer contributions and earnings thereon.

NOTE 5 - TAX STATUS

The Internal Revenue Service issued an opinion letter dated June 30, 2020 indicating that the prototype adopted by the Plan, as then designed, was in compliance with applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code. Although the Plan has been amended from the original prototype document, plan management believes that the Plan is currently being operated in accordance with the Internal Revenue Code. Therefore, the plan administrator believes that the Plan was qualified and that the related trust was tax-exempt as of the financial statement dates.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan. The plan administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan and has concluded that, as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. The plan administrator believes that it is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to 2021.

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NOTE 6 - PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Parties-in-interest are defined under Department of Labor (“DOL”) regulations as any fiduciary of the Plan, any party rendering service to the Plan, the employer, and certain others. Certain administrative functions are performed by officers or employees of the Association. No such officer or employee receives compensation from the Plan. Some administrative expenses of the Plan are paid directly by the Association. The Plan’s investments include shares of mutual funds and money market fund managed by Fidelity Management Trust Company (Fidelity), the trustee of the Plan, or its affiliate. Therefore, these investments qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Fees paid to the trustee or affiliates of the trustee also qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Notes receivable from participants also reflect party-in-interest transactions. The trustee receives revenue from mutual fund service providers for services the trustee provides to the funds. The trustee in turn periodically funds the Plan with revenue credits. These revenue credits are used by the Plan to offset certain amounts owed to the trustee for its administrative services to the Plan. These transactions are considered party-in-interest transactions.

NOTE 7 - UNAUDITED INFORMATION – CERTIFIED INVESTMENTS AND NOTES RECEIVABLE FROM PARTICIPANTS

Certain information related to investments disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedule, including investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation in fair value of investments and interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by the Fidelity Management Trust Company.
