Notes to Financial Statements

Note 1: Description of Plan

The following description of the BWI Group 401(k) Plan (the "Plan") provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

BWI North America, Inc. (the "Plan Sponsor") adopted a Section 401(k) profit-sharing plan. BWI Indiana, Inc. and BWI Chassis Dynamics (NA), Inc. are participating employers in the Plan. The Plan allows all salaried employees of these companies that are not leased employees, non-resident aliens, or employees covered by a collective bargaining agreement to participate. The Plan allows full-time, hourly production and maintenance employees at the Plan Sponsor's BWI Indiana, Inc. location to participate in the Plan. Employees may enter the Plan immediately upon their date of hire. Employees that do not make an election to participate or decline within 30 days of employment are automatically enrolled into the Plan at a 3% pre-tax contribution rate. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

Contributions

Participant Contributions

The Plan provides for employee salary deferrals up to the lesser of 60% of eligible compensation for pre-tax and after-tax contributions or the statutory limits. Roth contributions are also allowed. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or contribution plans.

Employer Contributions

Employer matching contributions are non-discretionary and participants become eligible for these contributions subsequent to completion of six months of service. The Plan matches 50% of the first 9% of eligible participant deferrals contributed to the Plan. During the year ended December 31, 2024, the Plan Sponsor made matching contributions of \$1,191,187.

Additionally, the Plan provides for nonelective employer contributions. Participants become eligible for these contributions on the first day of the first month subsequent to completion of six months of service. During the years ended December 31, 2024, the Plan Sponsor elected to contribute an amount equal to 4% of each eligible participant's compensation. Nonelective employer contributions were \$1,209,765 for year ended December 31, 2024.

No contributions shall be made on behalf of a participant to the extent that, when added to the participant's salary deferral contributions, it would cause the amounts allocated to exceed the limitations allowed by the Internal Revenue Service.

Note 1: Description of Plan (Continued)

Participant Accounts

Fidelity Management Trust Company (the "Trustee") is Trustee and Custodian of Plan investments. Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions, Plan Sponsor contributions, net earnings or losses, forfeitures, distributions, and withdrawals. Plan Sponsor contributions are allocated based on participants' compensation as defined by the Plan Agreement. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account. Each participant directs both separately, and distinctly, into which investment the participant contribution, employer match, and non-elective contributions are to be invested.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their voluntary contributions rollovers, and corresponding earnings. The following schedule will be used to determine vesting in the employer match, non-elective contributions and their earnings:

Notes Receivable From Participants

Participants may borrow from their account balance in any amount between \$1,000 and \$50,000, but not to exceed 50% of their vested account balance. Loan terms are for a period not exceeding five years. A term up to ten years may be approved by the Plan if proceeds are to be used for the purchase of a primary residence. Loans are secured by the balance in the participants' accounts. A participant may have up to three loans outstanding at any one time. The notes are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at rates ranging from 4.25% to 9.50%, which are commensurate with local prevailing rates as determined monthly by the Plan administrator. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Payment of Benefits

On termination of service due to death, disability, or retirement, a participant may elect to receive either a lump-sum or other form of payment equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account. For termination of service for other reasons, a participant may receive the value of the vested interest in his or her account as a lump-sum distribution. If the participant's account balance is \$1,000 or less, the Plan Administrator may elect to automatically distribute the balance to the participant in a single-sum payment. The Plan also allows for in-service withdrawals of all or a portion of a participant's vested employer or employee contributions. These withdrawals are allowed after the contributions have been held in the Plan for at least 24 months. Participants may elect to withdraw all or a portion of their rollover contributions at any time. In addition, participants may receive distributions of all vested amounts for qualified financial hardships.

Forfeitures

Forfeited balances of terminated participants' non-vested accounts are used to reduce future Plan Sponsor contributions and pay Plan expenses. Forfeitures in the amount of \$26,646 were used during the year ended December 31, 2024. Unallocated forfeitures at December 31, 2024 were \$328,834.

Investment Options

Upon enrollment in the Plan, a participant may direct contributions into investment options in increments of one percent. In addition, a self-directed brokerage account (BrokerageLink) is available to qualifying participants. Participants are eligible for BrokerageLink based on the balance in their individual accounts. BrokerageLink participants can elect to invest their Plan assets in individual securities. Participants may change their investment options and deferral percentages at any time via telephone or the internet.

Certain prior period amounts have been reclassified to conform to current year presentation. Such reclassifications within the accompanying financial statements had no effect on previously reported change in net assets available for benefits.

SECURE Act 2.0

The SECURE 2.0 Act of 2022 ("SECURE 2.0"), signed into law on December 29, 2022, makes significant changes to existing law for retirement plans by building upon provisions in the SECURE Act of 2019. SECURE 2.0 introduces new requirements and considerations for plan sponsors that are intended to expand coverage, increase savings, preserve income, and simplify plan rules and administrative procedures. The effective date of the provisions of SECURE 2.0 vary from becoming effective immediately through 2028. Those provisions include both required and optional elements. Management has evaluated those provisions and determined there is no material impact on the Plan.

Note 2: Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with GAAP.

Investments held by a defined contribution plan are required to be reported at fair value, except for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts. Contract value is the relevant measurement for the portion of the net assets available for benefits of a defined contribution plan attributable to fully benefit-responsive investment contracts because contract value is the amount participants would receive if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the Plan.

Note 2: Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Use of Estimates in Preparation of Financial Statements

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

The Plan's investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable From Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 and 2023. Delinquent participant notes receivable are recorded as deemed distributions on the basis of the terms of the Plan document.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Administrative Expenses

The Plan Sponsor pays certain administrative expenses of the Plan, and the Plan participants will bear the responsibility of the remaining expenses. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation in fair value of investments.

The Plan entered into a revenue credit agreement with the Trustee, in which the Trustee will pay the Plan \$10,000 per year, paid on a quarterly basis. These funds can be used to pay future Plan expenses or be allocated to eligible Plan participants on a pro rata basis based on eligible participant account balances, exclusive of outstanding loan balances. During December 31, 2024, the Plan did not pay any eligible Plan expenses. The Plan did not allocate back to participants during 2024. The balance is maintained in a separate account with the other investments of the Plan, and the current year credits have been recorded as other income in the financial statements. As of December 31, 2024, unallocated funds were \$34,886.

Subsequent Events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 3, 2025, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 3: Fair Value Measurements

GAAP establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. This hierarchy consists of three broad levels: Level 1 inputs consist of unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets and have the highest priority level. Level 2 inputs consist of observable inputs other than quoted prices for identical assets (Level 1). Level 3 inputs are unobservable and have the lowest priority. The Plan uses appropriate valuation techniques based on the available inputs to measure the fair value of its investments. When available, the Plan measures fair value using Level 1 inputs because they generally provide the most reliable evidence of fair value. Level 2 inputs are used for investments for which Level 1 inputs were not available. Level 3 inputs would only be used if Level 1 or Level 2 inputs were not available. The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used as of December 31, 2024.

Stable value fund: Fair value is estimated using the NAV per unit provided by the issuer of such fund after adjustments to reflect all fund investments at fair value, including direct and indirect interests in fully benefit responsive contracts. The objective of the fund is to maintain the safety of principal while generating a level of current income generally exceeding that of many money market funds. Investments in the stable value fund can be purchased or sold continuously. A notice of redemption is not required, and the Plan has no obligation to buy additional units.

Money market funds: Valued at the net asset value (NAV) of shares held by the Plan at year-end.

Certificates of deposit: Valued at cost plus interest earned, which approximates fair value.

Common stocks: Valued at the daily closing price of the stock.

Government bond funds: Valued at the quoted market prices in active markets.

Mutual funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Note 3: Fair Value Measurements (Continued)

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Note 4: Information Prepared and Certified by the Trustee

The Plan administrator has elected the method of compliance permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Certain information disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and supplemental schedules, including investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024, and net appreciation in fair value of investments, interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained or derived from information supplied to the Plan administrator and certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company, the Trustee of the Plan.

Note 5: Party-In-Interest Transactions

Certain Plan investments are managed by entities related to Fidelity Management Trust Company. Fidelity Management Trust Company is the Trustee, as defined by the Plan and, therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Fees for the investment management services during the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, were offset against earnings. Specific detail for management fees is not available from the Trustee. Notes receivable from participants also qualify as party-in-interest transactions, which are exempt from the prohibited transaction rules of ERISA.

Note 6: Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Plan Sponsor has the right under the Plan document to discontinue its contributions and to terminate or partially terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants will become 100% vested in their Plan Sponsor contributions.

Note 7: Tax Status

The Plan adopted a Non-Standardized Pre-Approved Profit Sharing Plan (Pre-Approved Plan) with an IRS determination letter dated June 30, 2020, which states the Pre-Approved Plan was in compliance with the applicable sections of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the determination letter, the Plan administrator and the Plan's tax counsel believe the Plan is designed, and is currently being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and, therefore, believe that the Plan is qualified and the related trust is tax-exempt.

Note 8: Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

Note 1: Description of Plan

The following description of the BWI Group 401(k) Plan (the "Plan") provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

BWI North America, Inc. (the "Plan Sponsor") adopted a Section 401(k) profit-sharing plan. BWI Indiana, Inc. and BWI Chassis Dynamics (NA), Inc. are participating employers in the Plan. The Plan allows all salaried employees of these companies that are not leased employees, non-resident aliens, or employees covered by a collective bargaining agreement to participate. The Plan allows full-time, hourly production and maintenance employees at the Plan Sponsor's BWI Indiana, Inc. location to participate in the Plan. Employees may enter the Plan immediately upon their date of hire. Employees that do not make an election to participate or decline within 30 days of employment are automatically enrolled into the Plan at a 3% pre-tax contribution rate. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

Contributions

Participant Contributions

The Plan provides for employee salary deferrals up to the lesser of 60% of eligible compensation for pre-tax and after-tax contributions or the statutory limits. Roth contributions are also allowed. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or contribution plans.

Employer Contributions

Employer matching contributions are non-discretionary and participants become eligible for these contributions subsequent to completion of six months of service. The Plan matches 50% of the first 9% of eligible participant deferrals contributed to the Plan. During the year ended December 31, 2024, the Plan Sponsor made matching contributions of \$1,191,187.

Additionally, the Plan provides for nonelective employer contributions. Participants become eligible for these contributions on the first day of the first month subsequent to completion of six months of service. During the years ended December 31, 2024, the Plan Sponsor elected to contribute an amount equal to 4% of each eligible participant's compensation. Nonelective employer contributions were \$1,209,765 for year ended December 31, 2024.

No contributions shall be made on behalf of a participant to the extent that, when added to the participant's salary deferral contributions, it would cause the amounts allocated to exceed the limitations allowed by the Internal Revenue Service.

Note 1: Description of Plan (Continued)

Participant Accounts

Fidelity Management Trust Company (the "Trustee") is Trustee and Custodian of Plan investments. Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions, Plan Sponsor contributions, net earnings or losses, forfeitures, distributions, and withdrawals. Plan Sponsor contributions are allocated based on participants' compensation as defined by the Plan Agreement. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account. Each participant directs both separately, and distinctly, into which investment the participant contribution, employer match, and non-elective contributions are to be invested.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their voluntary contributions rollovers, and corresponding earnings. The following schedule will be used to determine vesting in the employer match, non-elective contributions and their earnings:

Fewer than 3	0%
3 or more	100%

Notes Receivable From Participants

Participants may borrow from their account balance in any amount between \$1,000 and \$50,000, but not to exceed 50% of their vested account balance. Loan terms are for a period not exceeding five years. A term up to ten years may be approved by the Plan if proceeds are to be used for the purchase of a primary residence. Loans are secured by the balance in the participants' accounts. A participant may have up to three loans outstanding at any one time. The notes are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at rates ranging from 4.25% to 9.50%, which are commensurate with local prevailing rates as determined monthly by the Plan administrator. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Payment of Benefits

On termination of service due to death, disability, or retirement, a participant may elect to receive either a lump-sum or other form of payment equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account. For termination of service for other reasons, a participant may receive the value of the vested interest in his or her account as a lump-sum distribution. If the participant's account balance is \$1,000 or less, the Plan Administrator may elect to automatically distribute the balance to the participant in a single-sum payment. The Plan also allows for in-service withdrawals of all or a portion of a participant's vested employer or employee contributions. These withdrawals are allowed after the contributions have been held in the Plan for at least 24 months. Participants may elect to withdraw all or a portion of their rollover contributions at any time. In addition, participants may receive distributions of all vested amounts for qualified financial hardships.

Note 1: Description of Plan (Continued)

Forfeitures

Forfeited balances of terminated participants' non-vested accounts are used to reduce future Plan Sponsor contributions and pay Plan expenses. Forfeitures in the amount of \$26,646 were used during the year ended December 31, 2024. Unallocated forfeitures at December 31, 2024 were \$328,834.

Investment Options

Upon enrollment in the Plan, a participant may direct contributions into investment options in increments of one percent. In addition, a self-directed brokerage account (BrokerageLink) is available to qualifying participants. Participants are eligible for BrokerageLink based on the balance in their individual accounts. BrokerageLink participants can elect to invest their Plan assets in individual securities. Participants may change their investment options and deferral percentages at any time via telephone or the internet.

Reclassification

Certain prior period amounts have been reclassified to conform to current year presentation. Such reclassifications within the accompanying financial statements had no effect on previously reported change in net assets available for benefits.

SECURE Act 2.0

The SECURE 2.0 Act of 2022 ("SECURE 2.0"), signed into law on December 29, 2022, makes significant changes to existing law for retirement plans by building upon provisions in the SECURE Act of 2019. SECURE 2.0 introduces new requirements and considerations for plan sponsors that are intended to expand coverage, increase savings, preserve income, and simplify plan rules and administrative procedures. The effective date of the provisions of SECURE 2.0 vary from becoming effective immediately through 2028. Those provisions include both required and optional elements. Management has evaluated those provisions and determined there is no material impact on the Plan.

Note 2: Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with GAAP.

Investments held by a defined contribution plan are required to be reported at fair value, except for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts. Contract value is the relevant measurement for the portion of the net assets available for benefits of a defined contribution plan attributable to fully benefit-responsive investment contracts because contract value is the amount participants would receive if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the Plan.

Use of Estimates in Preparation of Financial Statements

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

The Plan's investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable From Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 and 2023. Delinquent participant notes receivable are recorded as deemed distributions on the basis of the terms of the Plan document.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Administrative Expenses

The Plan Sponsor pays certain administrative expenses of the Plan, and the Plan participants will bear the responsibility of the remaining expenses. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation in fair value of investments.

The Plan entered into a revenue credit agreement with the Trustee, in which the Trustee will pay the Plan \$10,000 per year, paid on a quarterly basis. These funds can be used to pay future Plan expenses or be allocated to eligible Plan participants on a pro rata basis based on eligible participant account balances, exclusive of outstanding loan balances. During December 31, 2024, the Plan did not pay any eligible Plan expenses. The Plan did not allocate back to participants during 2024. The balance is maintained in a separate account with the other investments of the Plan, and the current year credits have been recorded as other income in the financial statements. As of December 31, 2024, unallocated funds were \$34,886.

Subsequent Events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 3, 2025, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 3: Fair Value Measurements

GAAP establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. This hierarchy consists of three broad levels: Level 1 inputs consist of unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets and have the highest priority level. Level 2 inputs consist of observable inputs other than quoted prices for identical assets (Level 1). Level 3 inputs are unobservable and have the lowest priority. The Plan uses appropriate valuation techniques based on the available inputs to measure the fair value of its investments. When available, the Plan measures fair value using Level 1 inputs because they generally provide the most reliable evidence of fair value. Level 2 inputs are used for investments for which Level 1 inputs were not available. Level 3 inputs would only be used if Level 1 or Level 2 inputs were not available. The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used as of December 31, 2024.

Stable value fund: Fair value is estimated using the NAV per unit provided by the issuer of such fund after adjustments to reflect all fund investments at fair value, including direct and indirect interests in fully benefit responsive contracts. The objective of the fund is to maintain the safety of principal while generating a level of current income generally exceeding that of many money market funds. Investments in the stable value fund can be purchased or sold continuously. A notice of redemption is not required, and the Plan has no obligation to buy additional units.

Money market funds: Valued at the net asset value (NAV) of shares held by the Plan at year-end.

Certificates of deposit: Valued at cost plus interest earned, which approximates fair value.

Common stocks: Valued at the daily closing price of the stock.

Government bond funds: Valued at the quoted market prices in active markets.

Mutual funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Note 3: Fair Value Measurements (Continued)

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Note 4: Information Prepared and Certified by the Trustee

The Plan administrator has elected the method of compliance permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Certain information disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and supplemental schedules, including investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024, and net appreciation in fair value of investments, interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained or derived from information supplied to the Plan administrator and certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company, the Trustee of the Plan.

Note 5: Party-In-Interest Transactions

Certain Plan investments are managed by entities related to Fidelity Management Trust Company. Fidelity Management Trust Company is the Trustee, as defined by the Plan and, therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Fees for the investment management services during the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, were offset against earnings. Specific detail for management fees is not available from the Trustee. Notes receivable from participants also qualify as party-in-interest transactions, which are exempt from the prohibited transaction rules of ERISA.

Note 6: Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Plan Sponsor has the right under the Plan document to discontinue its contributions and to terminate or partially terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants will become 100% vested in their Plan Sponsor contributions.

Note 7: Tax Status

The Plan adopted a Non-Standardized Pre-Approved Profit Sharing Plan (Pre-Approved Plan) with an IRS determination letter dated June 30, 2020, which states the Pre-Approved Plan was in compliance with the applicable sections of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the determination letter, the Plan administrator and the Plan's tax counsel believe the Plan is designed, and is currently being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and, therefore, believe that the Plan is qualified and the related trust is tax-exempt.

Note 8: Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.
