Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

Except as described in the Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit section of our report, our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with GAAS, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.

Our audits did not extend to the certified investment information, except for obtaining and reading the certification, comparing the certified investment information with the related information presented and disclosed in the financial statements, and reading the disclosures relating to the certified investment information to assess whether they are in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements of accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Other Matter - Supplemental Schedules Required by ERISA

The supplemental schedules of Schedule H, Line 4a - Schedule of Delinquent Participant Contributions as of and for the year ended December 31, 2024, and Schedule H, Line 4i - Schedule of Assets (Held at End of Year) as of December 31, 2024 are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the financial statements but are supplementary information required by the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information included in the supplemental schedules, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audits of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with GAAS. For information included in the supplemental schedules that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, we compared such information to the related certified investment information.

In forming our opinion on the supplemental schedules, we evaluated whether the supplemental schedules, other than the information agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, including their form and content, are presented in conformity with the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF PLAN

The following description of SFS Group USA 401(k) Plan (the “Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan’s provisions.

General

The Plan is a safe harbor nonelective contribution plan covering substantially all employees of SFS Group USA (the “Company”) who have completed one month of service, and are age 18 or older, except union employees whose employment is governed by a collective bargaining agreement and nonresident aliens who have no earned income from sources within the United States. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (“ERISA”). The plan administrator is responsible for the oversight of the Plan, the appropriateness of the Plan’s investment offerings, and monitors investment performance.

Contributions

Each year participants may contribute up to 100% of annual compensation on a pretax or after-tax basis in accordance with the Roth provision, as defined in the Plan. Participants who have attained the age of 50 before the end of the plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans (rollover). Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan. The Plan includes an auto-enrollment provision whereby all newly eligible employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan unless they affirmatively elect not to participate in the Plan. Automatically enrolled participants have their deferral rate set at 5% of eligible compensation and their contributions are invested in a designated balanced fund until changed by the participant. The Company makes safe harbor matching contributions equal to 3% of eligible compensation. The Company may make discretionary matching and discretionary nonelective contributions for each active participant based on a percentage of the employee’s eligible compensation. The Company limits the discretionary matching contributions up to 4% of an employee’s eligible compensation. In order to participate in the Company discretionary nonelective contributions, an employee must be employed on the last day of the plan year and have completed at least one year of service based upon the elapsed time method. However, exceptions to these qualifications for Company discretionary contributions are death, disability, and retirement. For each of the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, the Company did not make any discretionary contributions to the Plan. Additionally, the Company may also make qualified nonelective contributions and accept contributions from predecessor plans under adopted Plan mergers. Contributions are subject to certain Internal Revenue Service (“IRS”) limitations.

Participant Accounts

Each participant’s account is credited with the participant’s contribution and an allocation of the Company’s contributions and plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant’s vested account.

NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF PLAN - CONTINUED

Vesting

Participants are vested immediately in their contributions, the Company's safe harbor nonelective contributions, the Company's discretionary matching contributions, and any qualified nonelective contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in the discretionary nonelective contribution is based on years of continuous service. A participant is 100% vested after four years of credited service. Participants that merged in the Plan from the Triangle Fastener Corporation Retirement Plan who did not work an hour of service on or after January 1, 2020 will become fully vested after six years of credited service. Participants that merged in the Plan from the Truelove & Maclean, Inc. Retirement Savings Plan who did not work an hour of service on or after December 1, 2021 will become fully vested after six years of credited service. Participants that merged in the Plan from the Tegra Medical 401(k) Retirement Plan who did not work an hour of service on or after March 15, 2022 will become fully vested after four years of credited service.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account. The loan interest rate is set at 1% above the federal prime rate, as defined. Principal and interest are paid ratably through bi-weekly payroll deductions.

Payment of Benefits

On termination of service for any reason, a participant may elect to receive an amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account in a lump-sum amount, a direct rollover distribution, as an installment payment of partial withdraw. In addition, the Plan allows for hardship distributions if certain criteria are met.

Forfeited Accounts

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$7,104 and \$389, respectively. These accounts will be used first to pay administrative expenses and any remaining amounts will be used to reduce future employer contributions. Also, in 2024, administrative expenses were reduced by \$4,320 from forfeited nonvested accounts.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The plan administrator determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisers and trustee. See Note 3 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are reported on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Contributions

Contributions from Plan participants are recorded in the year in which participant deferrals are withheld. Safe harbor contributions, discretionary match contributions, and discretionary nonelective contributions from the Company are recorded in the year in which service is rendered.

Investment Concentration

The Plan holds certain investments that represent 10% or more of the Plan's total investments at December 31:

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - CONTINUED

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 or 2023. If a participant ceases to make loan repayments and the plan administrator deems the loan to be in default, the participant loan balance is reduced and a benefit payment is recorded.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Administrative Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Company. Expenses that are paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation of fair value of investments.

Subsequent Events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 10, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Effective June 1, 2025, management of the Plan approved an amendment to absorb the assets of The Pro Fastening Systems, Inc. Salary Reduction Profit Sharing and Savings Plan. An aggregate of \$8,814,919 was transferred into the Plan on June 9, 2025.

NOTE 3 - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described as follows:

Level 1: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2: Inputs to the valuation methodology include

- quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Money market fund: Valued at a stable \$1.00 per share which approximates fair value. The money market fund held by the Plan is deemed to be actively traded.

Mutual funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities Exchange Commission. The mutual funds are required to publish their daily net asset value ("NAV") and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Stable value collective trust fund: Valued at the NAV of participation units held by the Plan at year end. The value of these units is determined by the trustee based on the current market value of the underlying assets of the collective trust fund as based on information reported by the investment adviser using the audited financial statements of the collective trust fund at year end and is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value.

NOTE 4 - RELATED-PARTY TRANSACTIONS AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Certain plan investments are managed by Fidelity Management Trust Company. Fidelity Management Trust Company is the trustee and recordkeeper for the Plan and, therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. All other transactions, which may be considered related-party transactions or parties-in-interest transactions, relate to normal plan management, administrative services, and the related payment of fees.

NOTE 5 - PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their employer contributions.

NOTE 6 - TAX STATUS

The Company has adopted a prototype non-standardized pre-approved profit-sharing plan with CODA sponsored by FMR LLC. The prototype non-standardized pre-approved profit-sharing plan has received an opinion letter from the IRS dated June 30, 2020, as to the prototype non-standardized profit-sharing plan's qualified status. Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the opinion letter, the plan administrator believes that the Plan is designed and is currently being operated in compliance with the applicable provisions of the Internal Revenue Code and, therefore, believes that the Plan is qualified, and the related trust is tax exempt.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

NOTE 7 - RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near-term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

NOTE 8 - CERTIFIED INVESTMENTS

Certain information in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedules, related to investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation in fair value of investments, interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company (the trustee of the Plan).

NOTE 9 - DELINQUENT PARTICIPANT CONTRIBUTIONS

The Company did not remit certain participant contributions and loan repayments to the Plan totaling \$144,858 during 2024, \$255,369 during 2023 and \$15,909 during 2022 on a timely basis as defined by the Department of Labor. The delinquent participant contributions result in a prohibited transaction totaling \$416,136, which is separately reported on Schedule H, Line 4a – Schedule of Delinquent Contributions. The Company has corrected \$42,604 of the delinquent participant contributions by remitting participants' contributions and loan repayments and has calculated and contributed lost earnings to the Plan during 2024. The Company will remit participants' contributions and will calculate and contribute lost earnings on the remaining delinquent participant contributions during 2025.

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed audits of the financial statements of SFS Group USA 401(k) Plan, an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) (ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of SFS Group USA 401(k) Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audits need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the plan (investment information) by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA (qualified institution).

Management has obtained certifications from a qualified institution as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the year ended December 31, 2024, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note 8 to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Opinion

In our opinion, based on our audits and on the procedures performed as described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section:

- the amounts and disclosures in the accompanying financial statements, other than those agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.
- the information in the accompanying financial statements related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of SFS Group USA 401(k) Plan and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. Management's election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit does not affect management's responsibility for the financial statements.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about SFS Group USA 401(k) Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for one year after the date the financial statements are available to be issued.

NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF PLAN

The following description of SFS Group USA 401(k) Plan (the “Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan’s provisions.

General

The Plan is a safe harbor nonelective contribution plan covering substantially all employees of SFS Group USA (the “Company”) who have completed one month of service, and are age 18 or older, except union employees whose employment is governed by a collective bargaining agreement and nonresident aliens who have no earned income from sources within the United States. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (“ERISA”). The plan administrator is responsible for the oversight of the Plan, the appropriateness of the Plan’s investment offerings, and monitors investment performance.

Contributions

Each year participants may contribute up to 100% of annual compensation on a pretax or after-tax basis in accordance with the Roth provision, as defined in the Plan. Participants who have attained the age of 50 before the end of the plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans (rollover). Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan. The Plan includes an auto-enrollment provision whereby all newly eligible employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan unless they affirmatively elect not to participate in the Plan. Automatically enrolled participants have their deferral rate set at 5% of eligible compensation and their contributions are invested in a designated balanced fund until changed by the participant. The Company makes safe harbor matching contributions equal to 3% of eligible compensation. The Company may make discretionary matching and discretionary nonelective contributions for each active participant based on a percentage of the employee’s eligible compensation. The Company limits the discretionary matching contributions up to 4% of an employee’s eligible compensation. In order to participate in the Company discretionary nonelective contributions, an employee must be employed on the last day of the plan year and have completed at least one year of service based upon the elapsed time method. However, exceptions to these qualifications for Company discretionary contributions are death, disability, and retirement. For each of the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, the Company did not make any discretionary contributions to the Plan. Additionally, the Company may also make qualified nonelective contributions and accept contributions from predecessor plans under adopted Plan mergers. Contributions are subject to certain Internal Revenue Service (“IRS”) limitations.

Participant Accounts

Each participant’s account is credited with the participant’s contribution and an allocation of the Company’s contributions and plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant’s vested account.

NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF PLAN - CONTINUED

Vesting

Participants are vested immediately in their contributions, the Company's safe harbor nonelective contributions, the Company's discretionary matching contributions, and any qualified nonelective contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in the discretionary nonelective contribution is based on years of continuous service. A participant is 100% vested after four years of credited service. Participants that merged in the Plan from the Triangle Fastener Corporation Retirement Plan who did not work an hour of service on or after January 1, 2020 will become fully vested after six years of credited service. Participants that merged in the Plan from the Truelove & Maclean, Inc. Retirement Savings Plan who did not work an hour of service on or after December 1, 2021 will become fully vested after six years of credited service. Participants that merged in the Plan from the Tegra Medical 401(k) Retirement Plan who did not work an hour of service on or after March 15, 2022 will become fully vested after four years of credited service.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account. The loan interest rate is set at 1% above the federal prime rate, as defined. Principal and interest are paid ratably through bi-weekly payroll deductions.

Payment of Benefits

On termination of service for any reason, a participant may elect to receive an amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account in a lump-sum amount, a direct rollover distribution, as an installment payment of partial withdraw. In addition, the Plan allows for hardship distributions if certain criteria are met.

Forfeited Accounts

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$7,104 and \$389, respectively. These accounts will be used first to pay administrative expenses and any remaining amounts will be used to reduce future employer contributions. Also, in 2024, administrative expenses were reduced by \$4,320 from forfeited nonvested accounts.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The plan administrator determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisers and trustee. See Note 3 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are reported on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Contributions

Contributions from Plan participants are recorded in the year in which participant deferrals are withheld. Safe harbor contributions, discretionary match contributions, and discretionary nonelective contributions from the Company are recorded in the year in which service is rendered.

Investment Concentration

The Plan holds certain investments that represent 10% or more of the Plan's total investments at December 31:

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - CONTINUED

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 or 2023. If a participant ceases to make loan repayments and the plan administrator deems the loan to be in default, the participant loan balance is reduced and a benefit payment is recorded.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Administrative Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Company. Expenses that are paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation of fair value of investments.

Subsequent Events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 10, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Effective June 1, 2025, management of the Plan approved an amendment to absorb the assets of The Pro Fastening Systems, Inc. Salary Reduction Profit Sharing and Savings Plan. An aggregate of \$8,814,919 was transferred into the Plan on June 9, 2025.

NOTE 3 - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described as follows:

Level 1: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2: Inputs to the valuation methodology include

- quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Money market fund: Valued at a stable \$1.00 per share which approximates fair value. The money market fund held by the Plan is deemed to be actively traded.

Mutual funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities Exchange Commission. The mutual funds are required to publish their daily net asset value ("NAV") and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Stable value collective trust fund: Valued at the NAV of participation units held by the Plan at year end. The value of these units is determined by the trustee based on the current market value of the underlying assets of the collective trust fund as based on information reported by the investment adviser using the audited financial statements of the collective trust fund at year end and is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value.

NOTE 4 - RELATED-PARTY TRANSACTIONS AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Certain plan investments are managed by Fidelity Management Trust Company. Fidelity Management Trust Company is the trustee and recordkeeper for the Plan and, therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. All other transactions, which may be considered related-party transactions or parties-in-interest transactions, relate to normal plan management, administrative services, and the related payment of fees.

NOTE 5 - PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their employer contributions.

NOTE 6 - TAX STATUS

The Company has adopted a prototype non-standardized pre-approved profit-sharing plan with CODA sponsored by FMR LLC. The prototype non-standardized pre-approved profit-sharing plan has received an opinion letter from the IRS dated June 30, 2020, as to the prototype non-standardized profit-sharing plan's qualified status. Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the opinion letter, the plan administrator believes that the Plan is designed and is currently being operated in compliance with the applicable provisions of the Internal Revenue Code and, therefore, believes that the Plan is qualified, and the related trust is tax exempt.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

NOTE 7 - RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near-term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

NOTE 8 - CERTIFIED INVESTMENTS

Certain information in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedules, related to investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation in fair value of investments, interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company (the trustee of the Plan).

NOTE 9 - DELINQUENT PARTICIPANT CONTRIBUTIONS

The Company did not remit certain participant contributions and loan repayments to the Plan totaling \$144,858 during 2024, \$255,369 during 2023 and \$15,909 during 2022 on a timely basis as defined by the Department of Labor. The delinquent participant contributions result in a prohibited transaction totaling \$416,136, which is separately reported on Schedule H, Line 4a – Schedule of Delinquent Contributions. The Company has corrected \$42,604 of the delinquent participant contributions by remitting participants' contributions and loan repayments and has calculated and contributed lost earnings to the Plan during 2024. The Company will remit participants' contributions and will calculate and contribute lost earnings on the remaining delinquent participant contributions during 2025.

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed audits of the financial statements of SFS Group USA 401(k) Plan, an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) (ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of SFS Group USA 401(k) Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audits need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the plan (investment information) by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA (qualified institution).

Management has obtained certifications from a qualified institution as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the year ended December 31, 2024, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note 8 to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Opinion

In our opinion, based on our audits and on the procedures performed as described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section:

- the amounts and disclosures in the accompanying financial statements, other than those agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.
- the information in the accompanying financial statements related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS). NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF PLAN

The following description of SFS Group USA 401(k) Plan (the “Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan’s provisions.

General

The Plan is a safe harbor nonelective contribution plan covering substantially all employees of SFS Group USA (the “Company”) who have completed one month of service, and are age 18 or older, except union employees whose employment is governed by a collective bargaining agreement and nonresident aliens who have no earned income from sources within the United States. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (“ERISA”). The plan administrator is responsible for the oversight of the Plan, the appropriateness of the Plan’s investment offerings, and monitors investment performance.

Contributions

Each year participants may contribute up to 100% of annual compensation on a pretax or after-tax basis in accordance with the Roth provision, as defined in the Plan. Participants who have attained the age of 50 before the end of the plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans (rollover). Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan. The Plan includes an auto-enrollment provision whereby all newly eligible employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan unless they affirmatively elect not to participate in the Plan. Automatically enrolled participants have their deferral rate set at 5% of eligible compensation and their contributions are invested in a designated balanced fund until changed by the participant. The Company makes safe harbor matching contributions equal to 3% of eligible compensation. The Company may make discretionary matching and discretionary nonelective contributions for each active participant based on a percentage of the employee’s eligible compensation. The Company limits the discretionary matching contributions up to 4% of an employee’s eligible compensation. In order to participate in the Company discretionary nonelective contributions, an employee must be employed on the last day of the plan year and have completed at least one year of service based upon the elapsed time method. However, exceptions to these qualifications for Company discretionary contributions are death, disability, and retirement. For each of the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, the Company did not make any discretionary contributions to the Plan. Additionally, the Company may also make qualified nonelective contributions and accept contributions from predecessor plans under adopted Plan mergers. Contributions are subject to certain Internal Revenue Service (“IRS”) limitations.

Participant Accounts

Each participant’s account is credited with the participant’s contribution and an allocation of the Company’s contributions and plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant’s vested account.

NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF PLAN - CONTINUED

Vesting

Participants are vested immediately in their contributions, the Company's safe harbor nonelective contributions, the Company's discretionary matching contributions, and any qualified nonelective contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in the discretionary nonelective contribution is based on years of continuous service. A participant is 100% vested after four years of credited service. Participants that merged in the Plan from the Triangle Fastener Corporation Retirement Plan who did not work an hour of service on or after January 1, 2020 will become fully vested after six years of credited service. Participants that merged in the Plan from the Truelove & Maclean, Inc. Retirement Savings Plan who did not work an hour of service on or after December 1, 2021 will become fully vested after six years of credited service. Participants that merged in the Plan from the Tegra Medical 401(k) Retirement Plan who did not work an hour of service on or after March 15, 2022 will become fully vested after four years of credited service.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account. The loan interest rate is set at 1% above the federal prime rate, as defined. Principal and interest are paid ratably through bi-weekly payroll deductions.

Payment of Benefits

On termination of service for any reason, a participant may elect to receive an amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account in a lump-sum amount, a direct rollover distribution, as an installment payment of partial withdraw. In addition, the Plan allows for hardship distributions if certain criteria are met.

Forfeited Accounts

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$7,104 and \$389, respectively. These accounts will be used first to pay administrative expenses and any remaining amounts will be used to reduce future employer contributions. Also, in 2024, administrative expenses were reduced by \$4,320 from forfeited nonvested accounts.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The plan administrator determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisers and trustee. See Note 3 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are reported on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Contributions

Contributions from Plan participants are recorded in the year in which participant deferrals are withheld. Safe harbor contributions, discretionary match contributions, and discretionary nonelective contributions from the Company are recorded in the year in which service is rendered.

Investment Concentration

The Plan holds certain investments that represent 10% or more of the Plan's total investments at December 31:

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - CONTINUED

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 or 2023. If a participant ceases to make loan repayments and the plan administrator deems the loan to be in default, the participant loan balance is reduced and a benefit payment is recorded.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Administrative Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Company. Expenses that are paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation of fair value of investments.

Subsequent Events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 10, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Effective June 1, 2025, management of the Plan approved an amendment to absorb the assets of The Pro Fastening Systems, Inc. Salary Reduction Profit Sharing and Savings Plan. An aggregate of \$8,814,919 was transferred into the Plan on June 9, 2025.

NOTE 3 - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described as follows:

Level 1: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2: Inputs to the valuation methodology include

- quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Money market fund: Valued at a stable \$1.00 per share which approximates fair value. The money market fund held by the Plan is deemed to be actively traded.

Mutual funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities Exchange Commission. The mutual funds are required to publish their daily net asset value ("NAV") and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Stable value collective trust fund: Valued at the NAV of participation units held by the Plan at year end. The value of these units is determined by the trustee based on the current market value of the underlying assets of the collective trust fund as based on information reported by the investment adviser using the audited financial statements of the collective trust fund at year end and is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value.

NOTE 4 - RELATED-PARTY TRANSACTIONS AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Certain plan investments are managed by Fidelity Management Trust Company. Fidelity Management Trust Company is the trustee and recordkeeper for the Plan and, therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. All other transactions, which may be considered related-party transactions or parties-in-interest transactions, relate to normal plan management, administrative services, and the related payment of fees.

NOTE 5 - PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their employer contributions.

NOTE 6 - TAX STATUS

The Company has adopted a prototype non-standardized pre-approved profit-sharing plan with CODA sponsored by FMR LLC. The prototype non-standardized pre-approved profit-sharing plan has received an opinion letter from the IRS dated June 30, 2020, as to the prototype non-standardized profit-sharing plan's qualified status. Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the opinion letter, the plan administrator believes that the Plan is designed and is currently being operated in compliance with the applicable provisions of the Internal Revenue Code and, therefore, believes that the Plan is qualified, and the related trust is tax exempt.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

NOTE 7 - RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near-term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

NOTE 8 - CERTIFIED INVESTMENTS

Certain information in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedules, related to investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation in fair value of investments, interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company (the trustee of the Plan).

NOTE 9 - DELINQUENT PARTICIPANT CONTRIBUTIONS

The Company did not remit certain participant contributions and loan repayments to the Plan totaling \$144,858 during 2024, \$255,369 during 2023 and \$15,909 during 2022 on a timely basis as defined by the Department of Labor. The delinquent participant contributions result in a prohibited transaction totaling \$416,136, which is separately reported on Schedule H, Line 4a – Schedule of Delinquent Contributions. The Company has corrected \$42,604 of the delinquent participant contributions by remitting participants' contributions and loan repayments and has calculated and contributed lost earnings to the Plan during 2024. The Company will remit participants' contributions and will calculate and contribute lost earnings on the remaining delinquent participant contributions during 2025.
