1. DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

The following description of the Sojitz Group 401(k) Plan (Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan established on January 1, 1994, as the NIAC Group Savings Plan. In 2004, it merged with the Nichimen America 401(k) Plan and changed its name to Sojitz Group 401(k) Plan. The Plan is sponsored by Sojitz Corporation of America (the Company, Employer, or Plan Sponsor), and covers eligible employees of the Company and participating employers that have adopted the Plan with the consent of the Company. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA). Fidelity Management Trust Company (FMTTC) is the trustee of the Plan and Fidelity Workplace Services LLC (FWS) is the recordkeeper of the Plan. The Pension and 401(k) Committee (Committee) determines the appropriateness of the Plan's investment offerings, monitors investment performance, and reports to the Plan Sponsor's Board of Directors.

The Plan is in operational compliance with the requirements of current laws and regulations. Formal amendments will be adopted by the prescribed deadlines.

Eligibility

Employees are eligible to make contributions to the Plan upon attainment of age twenty-one and after completion of three months of service.

Contributions

Deferred Contributions

Each year, participants may contribute from 1% to 100% of their eligible pre-tax compensation, up to the maximum limit established by the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). Participants may choose between two types of deferral options: traditional (pre-tax) 401(k) deferrals and Roth (after-tax) 401(k) deferrals. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans (rollover).

Catch-up Contributions

Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the plan year may contribute an additional percentage of eligible compensation as catch-up contributions (up to the annual federal dollar limit for these contributions). Catch-up contributions are eligible for Company matching contributions.

Discretionary Matching Contributions

The Company may make discretionary contributions to match employee contributions to the Plan. For 2024, the Company contributed 75% of the first 6% of each participant's compensation contributed to the Plan.

Discretionary Nonelective Contributions

The Company may also make a discretionary nonelective contribution on behalf of eligible participants. Participants must have completed 1,000 hours of service during the plan year and be employed on the last day of the plan year to receive the discretionary nonelective contribution. No discretionary nonelective contributions were made during 2024.

Contributions are subject to certain Internal Revenue Service (IRS) limitations.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and Company matching contributions, as well as allocations of the Company's discretionary nonelective contributions, and Plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific transactions, as defined in the Plan agreement. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting

Participants are vested immediately in their contributions, plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in the Company contribution portion of their accounts is determined as follows:

Regardless of the vesting schedule, participants become fully vested upon death, total and permanent disability, reaching early retirement age of 55 and completing five years of service, or reaching normal retirement age of 62.

Forfeited Accounts

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited non-vested amounts totaled \$58,980 and \$61,237, respectively. Forfeitures are first used to pay Plan administrative expenses, if so directed by the Company, and then to reduce future Company contributions. During the year ended December 31, 2024, Plan administrative expenses and Company contributions were reduced by \$25,343 and \$44,002, respectively, from forfeited non-vested accounts.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance reduced by the highest outstanding note balance in the participant's account during the prior twelve-month period. Participants may only apply for one note each calendar year and may only have two notes outstanding at any given time. The notes are secured by the vested balance in the participant's account. Generally, notes must be repaid within five years but may extend to 25 years for the purchase of a primary residence. The term may not extend beyond the participant's employment with the participating employer. Notes shall bear a reasonable rate of interest as determined by the Plan Administrator based on the prevailing interest rates charged by persons in the business of lending money for notes that would be made under similar circumstances. The interest rate is set at the beginning of the note and remains fixed for the entire term of the note. Interest rates on outstanding notes as of December 31, 2024, ranged from 3.25% to 8.50%.

Payment of Benefits

Upon termination of employment, a participant may elect to receive a lump-sum amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account, a partial withdrawal, or annual installments over a period determined by the Plan's provisions. Certain exceptions exist as defined in the Plan agreement. In addition, provisions are available to allow withdrawals of benefits prior to termination of employment as defined in the Plan agreement and in compliance with the IRC.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Committee determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisors and trustee. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation in fair value of investments includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year, and indirect investment expenses.

Contributions

Contributions from Plan participants and the matching contributions from the Company are recorded in the year in which the employee contributions are withheld from compensation. Company discretionary nonelective contributions, if any, are recorded when the related participant compensation is paid.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are charged directly to the borrowing participant's account and are included in administrative expenses when incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 or 2023. If a participant does not make loan repayments and the Plan Administrator deems the participant loan to be in default, and a distributable event has occurred, the participant loan balance is reduced, and a benefit payment is recorded.

Excess Contributions Payable

Amounts payable to participants for contributions in excess of amounts allowed by the IRS are recorded as a liability, with a corresponding reduction to participant contributions. The Plan distributed the 2023 excess contributions to the applicable participants during the following year.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Administrative Expenses

Certain expenses of the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Company. Expenses that are paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the

administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment-related expenses are included in net appreciation in fair value of investments.

Subsequent Events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 10, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued. See Note 12.

3. INVESTMENTS

FMTC holds and administers the funds for the Plan and FWS maintains an individual account for each participant. Contributions made on a participant's behalf under the Plan are directly allocated to that participant's account and are invested, based on the participant's direction, in various mutual and money market funds.

4. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under Financial Accounting Standards Board Accounting Standards Codification 820, *Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures*, are described as follows:

Level 3 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual and money market funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual and money market funds held by the Plan are open-end funds that are registered with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual and money market funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Common collective trust: A commingled pool that invests in benefit responsive investment contracts issued by insurance companies and other financial institutions, fixed income securities, and money market funds that is valued at the NAV of units of the commingled pool. The NAV is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. This practical expedient would not be used if it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different from the reported NAV.

The pre-approved plan received an opinion letter dated June 30, 2020, in which the IRS stated that the pre-approved plan, as then designed, was in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. In addition, the opinion letter stated that an employer who adopts this pre-approved plan may rely on the opinion letter with respect to the qualification of its own plan under the IRC. Although the Plan has been amended since the pre-

approved plan received the opinion letter, the Plan Administrator believes that the Plan is designed and is currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and, therefore, believes that the Plan is qualified, and the related trust is tax-exempt.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

7. RELATED PARTY AND PARTY IN INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

A related party is any party who can control or significantly influence Plan management or operating policies. Parties in interest are defined under Department of Labor regulations as any employees of the Plan, fiduciaries of the Plan, service providers to the Plan, the employer whose employees are covered by the Plan, and certain significant owners of the employer and their relatives. Service providers may include, but are not limited to, the custodian, trustee, third-party administrator (TPA), investment managers, investments advisors, legal counsel, and Plan auditor.

During the year ended December 31, 2024, the Plan made direct payments of \$108,725 to certain parties in interest for trust, recordkeeping, and other administrative services, as allowed by ERISA. The Plan Sponsor pays directly any other fees related to the operation of the Plan.

The Plan issues loans to participants, which are secured by the participants' account balances. These transactions qualify as party in interest transactions.

Certain administrative functions of the Plan are performed by officers or employees of the Company. No such officer or employee receives compensation from the Plan.

8. PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in the Company contribution portion of their account.

9. RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment

securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances, and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

10. NONEXEMPT TRANSACTIONS

As required by ERISA Section 2510.3-102, the Plan Sponsor is required to segregate employee contributions to the Plan from its general assets as soon as practicable. The Plan had contributions totaling \$104,470 (\$70,732 corrected and \$33,738 uncorrected) from 2024 and 2023, all of which represent employee salary deferrals, that were not remitted timely. These contributions are considered prohibited transactions. The late remittances are reported on the Form 5500 (see supplemental Schedule H, Line 4a – Schedule of Delinquent Participant Contributions). There were no other prohibited transactions during the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023. The Company will calculate lost investment earnings on the uncorrected contributions and file Form 5330, as applicable, and expects to compensate the Plan for the lost earnings in 2025.

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed audits of the financial statements of Sojitz Group 401(k) Plan (the Plan), an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) (ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit). 1. DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

The following description of the Sojitz Group 401(k) Plan (Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan established on January 1, 1994, as the NIAC Group Savings Plan. In 2004, it merged with the Nichimen America 401(k) Plan and changed its name to Sojitz Group 401(k) Plan. The Plan is sponsored by Sojitz Corporation of America (the Company, Employer, or Plan Sponsor), and covers eligible employees of the Company and participating employers that have adopted the Plan with the consent of the Company. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA). Fidelity Management Trust Company (FMTTC) is the trustee of the Plan and Fidelity Workplace Services LLC (FWS) is the recordkeeper of the Plan. The Pension and 401(k) Committee (Committee) determines the appropriateness of the Plan's investment offerings, monitors investment performance, and reports to the Plan Sponsor's Board of Directors.

The Plan is in operational compliance with the requirements of current laws and regulations. Formal amendments will be adopted by the prescribed deadlines.

Eligibility

Employees are eligible to make contributions to the Plan upon attainment of age twenty-one and after completion of three months of service.

Contributions

Deferred Contributions

Each year, participants may contribute from 1% to 100% of their eligible pre-tax compensation, up to the maximum limit established by the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). Participants may choose between two types of deferral options: traditional (pre-tax) 401(k) deferrals and Roth (after-tax) 401(k) deferrals. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans (rollover).

Catch-up Contributions

Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the plan year may contribute an additional percentage of eligible compensation as catch-up contributions (up to the annual federal dollar limit for these contributions). Catch-up contributions are eligible for Company matching contributions.

Discretionary Matching Contributions

The Company may make discretionary contributions to match employee contributions to the Plan. For 2024, the Company contributed 75% of the first 6% of each participant's compensation contributed to the Plan.

Discretionary Nonelective Contributions

The Company may also make a discretionary nonelective contribution on behalf of eligible participants. Participants must have completed 1,000 hours of service during the plan year and be employed on the last day of the plan year to receive the discretionary nonelective contribution. No discretionary nonelective contributions were made during 2024.

Contributions are subject to certain Internal Revenue Service (IRS) limitations.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and Company matching contributions, as well as allocations of the Company's discretionary nonelective contributions, and Plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific transactions, as defined in the Plan agreement. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting

Participants are vested immediately in their contributions, plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in the Company contribution portion of their accounts is determined as follows:

Regardless of the vesting schedule, participants become fully vested upon death, total and permanent disability, reaching early retirement age of 55 and completing five years of service, or reaching normal retirement age of 62.

Forfeited Accounts

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited non-vested amounts totaled \$58,980 and \$61,237, respectively. Forfeitures are first used to pay Plan administrative expenses, if so directed by the Company, and then to reduce future Company contributions. During the year ended December 31, 2024, Plan administrative expenses and Company contributions were reduced by \$25,343 and \$44,002, respectively, from forfeited non-vested accounts.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance reduced by the highest outstanding note balance in the participant's account during the prior twelve-month period. Participants may only apply for one note each calendar year and may only have two notes outstanding at any given time. The notes are secured by the vested balance in the participant's account. Generally, notes must be repaid within five years but may extend to 25 years for the purchase of a primary residence. The term may not extend beyond the participant's employment with the participating employer. Notes shall bear a reasonable rate of interest as determined by the Plan Administrator based on the prevailing interest rates charged by persons in the business of lending money for notes that would be made under similar circumstances. The interest rate is set at the beginning of the note and remains fixed for the entire term of the note. Interest rates on outstanding notes as of December 31, 2024, ranged from 3.25% to 8.50%.

Payment of Benefits

Upon termination of employment, a participant may elect to receive a lump-sum amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account, a partial withdrawal, or annual installments over a period determined by the Plan's provisions. Certain exceptions exist as defined in the Plan agreement. In addition, provisions are available to allow withdrawals of benefits prior to termination of employment as defined in the Plan agreement and in compliance with the IRC.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Committee determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisors and trustee. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation in fair value of investments includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year, and indirect investment expenses.

Contributions

Contributions from Plan participants and the matching contributions from the Company are recorded in the year in which the employee contributions are withheld from compensation. Company discretionary nonelective contributions, if any, are recorded when the related participant compensation is paid.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are charged directly to the borrowing participant's account and are included in administrative expenses when incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 or 2023. If a participant does not make loan repayments and the Plan Administrator deems the participant loan to be in default, and a distributable event has occurred, the participant loan balance is reduced, and a benefit payment is recorded.

Excess Contributions Payable

Amounts payable to participants for contributions in excess of amounts allowed by the IRS are recorded as a liability, with a corresponding reduction to participant contributions. The Plan distributed the 2023 excess contributions to the applicable participants during the following year.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Administrative Expenses

Certain expenses of the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Company. Expenses that are paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the

administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment-related expenses are included in net appreciation in fair value of investments.

Subsequent Events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 10, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued. See Note 12.

3. INVESTMENTS

FMTC holds and administers the funds for the Plan and FWS maintains an individual account for each participant. Contributions made on a participant's behalf under the Plan are directly allocated to that participant's account and are invested, based on the participant's direction, in various mutual and money market funds.

4. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under Financial Accounting Standards Board Accounting Standards Codification 820, *Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures*, are described as follows:

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual and money market funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual and money market funds held by the Plan are open-end funds that are registered with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual and money market funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Common collective trust: A commingled pool that invests in benefit responsive investment contracts issued by insurance companies and other financial institutions, fixed income securities, and money market funds that is valued at the NAV of units of the commingled pool. The NAV is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. This practical expedient would not be used if it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different from the reported NAV.

6. TAX STATUS

The Company has adopted a pre-approved plan provided by FMR, LLC. The pre-approved plan received an opinion letter dated June 30, 2020, in which the IRS stated that the pre-approved plan, as then designed, was in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. In addition, the opinion letter stated that an employer who adopts this pre-approved plan may rely on the opinion letter with respect to the qualification of its own plan under the IRC. Although the Plan has been amended since the pre-

approved plan received the opinion letter, the Plan Administrator believes that the Plan is designed and is currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and, therefore, believes that the Plan is qualified, and the related trust is tax-exempt.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

7. RELATED PARTY AND PARTY IN INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

A related party is any party who can control or significantly influence Plan management or operating policies. Parties in interest are defined under Department of Labor regulations as any employees of the Plan, fiduciaries of the Plan, service providers to the Plan, the employer whose employees are covered by the Plan, and certain significant owners of the employer and their relatives. Service providers may include, but are not limited to, the custodian, trustee, third-party administrator (TPA), investment managers, investments advisors, legal counsel, and Plan auditor.

During the year ended December 31, 2024, the Plan made direct payments of \$108,725 to certain parties in interest for trust, recordkeeping, and other administrative services, as allowed by ERISA. The Plan Sponsor pays directly any other fees related to the operation of the Plan.

The Plan issues loans to participants, which are secured by the participants' account balances. These transactions qualify as party in interest transactions.

Certain administrative functions of the Plan are performed by officers or employees of the Company. No such officer or employee receives compensation from the Plan.

8. PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in the Company contribution portion of their account.

9. RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment

securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances, and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

10. NONEXEMPT TRANSACTIONS

As required by ERISA Section 2510.3-102, the Plan Sponsor is required to segregate employee contributions to the Plan from its general assets as soon as practicable. The Plan had contributions totaling \$104,470 (\$70,732 corrected and \$33,738 uncorrected) from 2024 and 2023, all of which represent employee salary deferrals, that were not remitted timely. These contributions are considered prohibited transactions. The late remittances are reported on the Form 5500 (see supplemental Schedule H, Line 4a – Schedule of Delinquent Participant Contributions). There were no other prohibited transactions during the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023. The Company will calculate lost investment earnings on the uncorrected contributions and file Form 5330, as applicable, and expects to compensate the Plan for the lost earnings in 2025.
