Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed audits of the financial statements of Stahl Sheaffer Engineering, LLC 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan (Plan), an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) (ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit). The financial statements comprise the statement of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of the financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Management has obtained a certification from a qualified institution as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the year ended December 31, 2024, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note C to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Opinion

A. Description of Plan

The following description of the Stahl Sheaffer Engineering, LLC 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan (Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan Agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

1. **General.** The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all employees of Stahl Sheaffer Engineering, LLC and F2S Infrastructure, Inc., (collectively, referred to as Employer or Plan Sponsor), who have completed six months of service and are age twenty-one or older, with certain exclusions. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA). The Administrative Committee is responsible for the oversight of the Plan and determines the appropriateness of the Plan's investment offerings, monitors investment performance and reports to the Plan's Board of Trustees.
2. **Contributions.** Each year, participants may contribute up to 75% annual compensation as pre-tax or after-tax Roth elective deferrals up to the maximum allowed by law or \$23,000 (in 2024; thereafter as adjusted by the U.S. Secretary of the Treasury) in a calendar year. Participants who have obtained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or contribution plans. Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan. The Plan currently offers various mutual funds, pooled separate investment accounts and one guaranteed investment contract as investment options for participants.

The Plan Sponsor may make discretionary matching contributions. Effective January 1, 2022, the Plan Sponsor elected to make a safe harbor matching contribution equal to 100% of elective deferrals up to 3% of eligible compensation plus 50% of elective deferrals between 3% and 5% of eligible compensation.

The Plan Sponsor may also make discretionary profit-sharing contributions, which are allocated to eligible employees in accordance with certain Plan provisions. There were no profit sharing contributions for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023.

3. **Participant Accounts.** Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and employer matching contributions, as well as allocations of any employer contributions and Plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.
4. **Vesting.** Participants are immediately vested in their salary deferrals and rollover contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Additionally, the safe harbor matching contribution is 100% vested. Vesting in profit sharing contributions and matching contributions prior to January 1, 2022, is based on years of continuous service as outlined in the table below. Participants are 100% vested in profit sharing contributions if they are employed on or after their normal retirement age, or on termination of employment due to death or disability.

5. Notes Receivable from Participants. The Plan allows for loans to participants. Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. Generally, the term of the loan may not exceed five years, unless the loan is for the purchase of the participant's principal residence. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at an interest rate equal to 2% above the prime rate.

6. Payment of Benefits. All distributions are made as lump sum distributions. On termination of service due to death, disability or normal retirement, participants (or their designated beneficiaries) who have a balance greater than \$5,000 may elect to receive the total vested balance in a lump sum distribution or may leave the balance in the Plan until the minimum distribution is required. On terminations for other reasons, a participant may elect to have their vested account balance distributed in a lump-sum amount as soon as administratively possible. A participant with a vested balance of less than \$5,000 will receive a mandatory lump sum distribution. A distribution of vested balances between \$1,000 to \$5,000 will be rolled over to an IRA unless the participant makes an affirmative election to either receive or roll over the distribution. Balances under \$1,000 will be paid as a lump sum distribution.

In-service distributions may be available to participants who reached age 59½. Hardship distributions are permitted under the Plan to participants who satisfy certain financial needs and meet specified conditions under the Plan.

7. Forfeited Accounts. At December 31, 2024 and 2023, there were no unallocated balances in the forfeited nonvested accounts. These accounts can be used to restore forfeitures, reduce the employer's contribution, or offset Plan expenses. For the year ended December 31, 2024, \$11,700 of employer contributions were funded from forfeited accounts. For the year ended December 31, 2024, no plan expenses were funded from forfeited accounts.

8. Plan Amendments.

SECURE 2.0 Act of 2022: The Plan Sponsor has implemented operational updates to comply with applicable provisions of the SECURE 2.0 Act, including the increase in the required minimum distribution age, expanded eligibility for long-term part-time employees, elimination of pre-death RMDs for Roth accounts, and Roth treatment of catch-up contributions for certain participants. Although the Plan has not yet been formally amended, the amendment is expected to be executed by December 31, 2026, in accordance with IRS guidance.

B. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting: The financial statements of the Plan are prepared under the accrual method of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Use of Estimates: The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires the Plan Administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition: Investments are reported at fair value (except for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts, which are reported at contract value). Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Plan's Administrative Committee determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisers and the custodian. See Note D Fair Value Measurements for a discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on an accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date.

Net appreciation (depreciation) includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year. Net investment returns reflect certain fees paid by the investment funds to their affiliated investment advisors, transfer agents, and others as further described in each fund prospectus or other published documents. These fees are deducted prior to allocation of the Plan's investment earnings activity and thus are not separately identifiable as an expense.

Contributions Receivable and Allowance for Expected Credit Losses: In June 2016, the FASB issued Accounting Standards Update (ASU) 2016-13, Financial Instruments – Credit Losses (ASC Topic 326) Measurement of Credit Losses on Financial Instruments. ASC Topic 326 significantly changed how entities will measure credit losses for most financial assets and certain other instruments that are not measured at fair value through net income. Under the standard, disclosures are required to provide users of the financial statements with useful information in analyzing an entity's exposure to credit risk and the measurement of credit losses. Financial assets held by the Company that are subject to the guidance in ASC Topic 326 are notes receivable from participants and contributions receivable. The Plan adopted the standard effective January 1, 2023. The impact of the adoption was not considered material to the Plan's financial statements and primarily resulted in new and enhanced disclosures only. No allowance for current expected credit losses was considered necessary at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Notes Receivable from Participants: Notes receivable are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on an accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 or 2023. Delinquent participant loans are reclassified as distributions based on the terms of the Plan document.

Corrective Contributions: Corrective contributions include qualified nonelective contributions or other plan corrections and are generally recorded in the year of the event as ‘other employer contributions’ in the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits. Any associated receivable is presented as ‘other employer contribution receivable’ as of the Plan’s year-end. For the year ended December 31, 2024, there were no corrective contributions other than those that are considered trivial.

Corrective Distributions: Corrective distributions include Plan corrections that are generally recorded in the Plan year deemed payable to participants. Corrective distributions may also be required in the event that employee contributions exceed the contribution limitations of the Plan. These amounts are netted against contributions in the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits and the associated liability is presented as ‘excess contributions payable’ as of the Plan’s year-end.

Payment of Benefits: Benefits are recorded when paid.

Expenses: The Plan’s administrative fees and expenses are paid by the Plan and allocated to participant accounts. The Plan’s individual account fees and expenses are charged directly to participant accounts. Investment-related expenses are included in net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of investments. Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan paid by the employer are excluded from these financial statements.

Subsequent Events: The Plan Administrator has evaluated subsequent events through October 10, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

C. Certified Investments

With the exception of self-directed brokerage accounts, certain information related to investments and notes receivable from participants disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedule, including investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation in fair value of investments, interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Principal Trust Company (the trustee of the Plan).

The investment information for the Plan’s self-directed brokerage accounts, as reported in the accompanying financial statements and the supplemental schedule, was not certified by the trustee of the Plan. The Plan’s self-directed brokerage accounts primarily consist of cash and cash equivalents, common stock and mutual funds.

D. Fair Value Measurements

Financial Accounting Standards Board Accounting Standards Codification Topic 820 (ASC Topic 820) establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements), and lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under ASC Topic 820 are described as follows:

Level 1 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 - Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets.
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets.
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability.
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.
- If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual Funds: Mutual funds, which are actively traded, are valued at quoted market prices on nationally recognized securities exchanges and represent the net asset value (NAV) of shares held by the Plan at year-end and are classified as Level 1 within the valuation hierarchy.

Self-Directed Brokerage Accounts: Common stock is valued at the closing price reported in the active market in which the individual securities are traded. Mutual funds and cash equivalents are valued at the net asset value (NAV) of shares held by the Plan at year end based on quoted market prices.

Pooled Separate Investment Accounts: Pooled separate accounts are valued at NAV or equivalent based on units of the pooled separate accounts. The NAV, as provided by the administrative services provider, is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. The NAV is based on the fair value of the underlying investments held by the pooled separate account less its liabilities. See note D.(a).

E. Guaranteed Option Contract

The Plan invests in the Principal Guaranteed Option, which is a guaranteed general account backed group annuity contract issued by Principal Life Insurance Company to Principal Trust Company, as custodian. The contract issuer is contractually obligated to repay the principal and interest at a specified interest rate that is guaranteed to the Plan. A composite crediting rate is contractually guaranteed by the contract issuer based on the established formula. The composite crediting rate is reset semi-annually on December 1st and June 1st and applied to account balances during the effective period. During 2024, the composite crediting rate ranged from 1.90% to 2.55%.

This contract meets the fully benefit-responsive investment contract criteria and, therefore, is reported at contract value. The contract value is the relevant measure for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts because this is the amount received by participants if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the Plan. Contract value represents contributions made under each contract, plus earnings, less participant withdrawals, and administrative expenses. The Plan is subject to certain termination charges and investment transfer restrictions. Thus, a surrender charge may apply to withdrawals or transfers from an unmatured guaranteed interest account. There are no restrictions or charges to investment transfers initiated by participants of the Plan.

Certain events limit the Plan's ability to transact at contract value with the issuer. For example, premature termination of the contracts by the plan, plant closings, layoffs, plan termination, bankruptcy, mergers, and early retirement incentives. Plan management believes that the occurrence of events that would cause the Plan to transact at less than contract value is not probable.

F. Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the employer has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan, subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their employer contributions.

G. Tax Status

The IRS has determined and informed the Plan Sponsor by a letter dated June 30, 2020, that the Plan and related trust are designed in accordance with applicable sections of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). Although the Plan has been amended since adopting the plan, the Plan Administrator and the Plan's tax counsel believe that the Plan is designed, and is currently being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and, therefore, continues to be exempt from income taxes. Therefore, no provision for income taxes has been included in the Plan's financial statements.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. The Plan Administrator believes it is no longer subject to income tax examinations for the years prior to 2021.

H. Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

I. Related Party Transactions and Party-In-Interest Transactions

During 2024 and 2023, Principal Trust Company was the trustee of the Plan and Principal Life Insurance Company provided recordkeeping and investment services to the Plan.

The financial statements include recordkeeping and trustee expenses and fees paid by the Plan. The Plan's fees and expenses paid during the year for professional services rendered by parties-in-interest were based on customary and reasonable rates for such services.

The Plan issues notes to its participants, which are secured by the participants' balances.

All of these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions which are exempt from the prohibited transaction rules of ERISA.
