We were engaged to perform an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit of those financial statements as permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under the ERISA. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audit did not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the Plan (investment information) by Fidelity Management Trust Company that prepared and certified the statements or information regarding assets so held in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5. Our audit also did not include a consideration of internal control relating to the investment information.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the Plan's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the two paragraphs above and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified. As indicated in the attached addendum, we identified a matter for consideration that is an opportunity for strengthening internal controls and operating efficiency.

Addendum to Report on Internal Control Related Matters

**Matter for Consideration that is an Opportunity for Strengthening Internal Controls
and Operating Efficiency**

A. Timely Deposit of Participant Contributions

During our audit, we noted instances where participants' contributions were not remitted to the Plan in a timely manner. The Department of Labor ("DOL") requires that participant contributions and loan repayments be remitted to the Plan on the earliest date on which they can be reasonably segregated from the plan sponsor's general assets but no later than the 15th business day following the end of the month in which the amounts are contributed by employees or withheld from their wages. Failure to remit participant contributions and loan repayments to the Plan in a timely manner results in a prohibited transaction which must be separately reported to the DOL and may result in penalties to the plan sponsor.

Recommendation

We recommend that the plan sponsor review the procedures currently in place involving the remittance of participant contributions and loan repayments to the Plan and institute the necessary controls to ensure that participant contributions and loan repayments are remitted in a timely manner.

Auditors' Communication with Those Charged with Governance

We have audited the financial statements of **The Vita Coco Company, Inc. 401(k) Plan** (the "Plan"), an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 ("ERISA"), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) as of and for the year ended December 31, 2024, and we issued our report thereon dated October 9, 2025. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audit did not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the Plan (investment information) by Fidelity Management Trust Company which is a bank or similar institutions or insurance carriers that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, that prepared and certified the statements or information regarding assets so held in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5. Our audit did not extend to the certified investment information, except for obtaining and reading the certification, comparing the certified investment information with the related information presented and disclosed in the financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedules, and reading the disclosures relating to the certified investment information to assess whether they are in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements of accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("U.S. GAAP"). Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with U.S. GAAP. Professional standards require that we provide you with information about our responsibilities under generally accepted auditing standards, as well as certain information related to the planned scope and timing of our audit. We have communicated such information in our letter to you dated January 9, 2024. Professional standards also require that we communicate to you the following information related to our audit.

Qualitative aspects of significant accounting practices

Significant accounting policies

Plan management is responsible for the selection and use of appropriate accounting policies. The significant accounting policies used by the Plan are described in Note 2 to the financial statements. No new accounting policies were adopted and the application of existing policies was not changed during the year. We noted no transactions entered into by the Plan during the year for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus. All significant transactions have been recognized in the financial statements in the proper period.

Significant accounting estimates

Accounting estimates made by the Plan's management are an integral part of the financial statements and are based on Plan management's knowledge and experience about past and current events and assumptions about future events.

Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statements and their susceptibility to change. Management believes that the estimates used and assumptions made are adequate based on the information currently available. We evaluated the key factors and assumptions used to develop the estimates in relation to the value of the Plan's investments in determining that they are reasonable in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

Financial statement disclosures

The financial statement disclosures are consistent and clear.

Going concern

We concur with management's assessment that the Plan will continue as a going concern for one year from the auditors' report date.

Significant risks

We have identified the following significant risks in connection with our audit:

- Revenue recognition; and
- Plan management override of controls.

Form 5500 procedures

We are required to obtain and read a substantially completed draft of Form 5500 prior to dating our auditors' report. The purpose of this procedure is to identify any material inconsistencies between the draft Form 5500 and the Plan's financial statements. We identified no material inconsistencies in performing and completing our audit.

Difficulties encountered during the audit

We encountered no significant difficulties in performing and completing our audit.

Corrected and uncorrected misstatements

Professional standards require us to accumulate all known and likely misstatements identified during the audit, other than those that we believe are trivial, and communicate them to the appropriate level of management. No misstatements were identified during our audit.

Disagreements with management

For purposes of this letter, a disagreement with management is a disagreement on a financial accounting, reporting, or auditing matter, whether or not resolved to our satisfaction, that could be significant to the financial statements or the auditors' report. We are pleased to report that no such disagreements arose during the course of our audit.

Representations requested from Plan management

We have requested certain written representations from the Plan's management in a separate letter dated October 9, 2025.

Management consultations with other independent accountants

In some cases, management may decide to consult with other accountants about auditing and accounting matters, similar to obtaining a “second opinion” on certain situations. If a consultation involves application of an accounting principle to the Plan’s financial statements or a determination of the type of auditors’ opinion that may be expressed on those statements, our professional standards require the consulting accountant to check with us to determine that the consultant has all the relevant facts. To our knowledge, there were no such consultations with other accountants.

Other matters discussed with Plan management

We generally discuss with the Plan’s management a variety of matters, including the application of accounting principles and auditing standards, business conditions affecting the Plan, and future plans and strategies that may affect the risks of material misstatement. None of the matters discussed and our responses thereto were a condition to our retention as auditors.

Other matters supplemental schedules

Our responsibility for the ERISA-required supplemental schedules accompanying the financial statements is to perform adequate procedures to evaluate whether the form and content of the ERISA-required supplemental schedules, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, is presented in compliance with the DOL’s Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA, and whether the information in the supplemental schedules related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

1. Description of the Plan

The following description of The Vita Coco Company, Inc. 401(k) Plan (the “Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan document for more detailed information.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all eligible employees of The Vita Coco Company, Inc. (the “Company” or “Employer”) who have attained the age of 21 and completed three consecutive months of service. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (“ERISA”).

Contributions

Eligible participants may elect to contribute up to 100% of their eligible compensation, as defined by the Plan, up to the maximum allowed under the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (“IRC”). Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also elect to make Roth after-tax contributions to the Plan. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans (rollover).

Effective 03/15/2021 employees are automatically enrolled at 3% pre-tax contribution. All Employees are eligible to contribute after three months of service unless they elect to opt out. The automatic deferrals begin as soon as administratively possible after completion of three months of service. Participants can actively change their election percentage at any time and have the opportunity to opt-out each year.

The Company may make discretionary matching contributions. For the year ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, the discretionary matching contribution was equal to 100% of the participant’s elective deferral amount, not to exceed 3% of the Participant’s Compensation.

Participant Accounts

Each participant’s account is credited with the participant’s contribution and allocations of (a) Employer contributions and (b) Plan earnings (losses) thereon. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant’s vested account.

Vesting

Participants are fully vested in that portion of their account which represents their contributions and the income earned thereon. A participant vests in the discretionary employer contribution plus earnings thereon at a rate of 50% vested after one year of credited service and 100% after two years of eligible service. Participants become 100% vested in all contributions and earnings thereon upon death, total and permanent disability, or attainment of normal retirement age.

1. Description of the Plan (*continued*)

Payment of Benefits

The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account. Benefits may be distributed to participants upon termination of employment by reason of retirement, disability, death or other separation from service. Participants may elect a lump sum distribution.

A participant may also request a withdrawal upon attainment of age 59 ½ or upon demonstration by the participant to the plan administrator that the participant is suffering from a hardship.

Notes Receivable from Participants

A participant may borrow an aggregate amount up to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of the participant's vested account balance, subject to plan limitations. The minimum loan allowed is \$1,000. Loans must bear a reasonable rate of interest commensurate with local prevailing interest rates, as determined by the plan administrator. Loans are collateralized by the participant's nonforfeitable interest in the Plan and are supported by a promissory note. Loans must be repaid over a period not to exceed five years unless the loan proceeds are used for the purchase of a primary residence, in which case a longer repayment period may not extend beyond ten years. A participant may only have two outstanding loan at any given time. Principal and interest is generally paid ratably through payroll deductions each pay period.

Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Company and are excluded from these financial statements. Administrative fees incurred in connection with loans and participant activity charges are borne by the individual and deducted from their respective Plan assets. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation in fair value of investments.

Forfeitures

When certain terminations of participation in the Plan occur, the non-vested portion of a participant's account represents a forfeiture, as defined by the Plan. Forfeited balances are first used to restore re-employed participants' accounts. Any remaining forfeitures may be used to pay Plan expenses or reduce future Employer contributions. At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited non-vested accounts totaled \$5,596 and \$627. During 2024 and 2023, \$46,781 and \$17,698 of forfeitures were used to reduce Employer contributions.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting and Use of Estimates

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual method of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("U.S. GAAP"). The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Fair Value Measurements

The Plan follows U.S. GAAP guidance on Fair Value Measurements which defines fair value and establishes a fair value hierarchy organized into three levels based upon the input assumptions used in pricing assets. Level 1 inputs have the highest reliability and are related to assets with unadjusted quoted prices in active markets. Level 2 inputs relate to assets with other than quoted prices in active markets which may include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities or other inputs which can be corroborated by observable market data. Level 3 inputs are unobservable and are used to the extent that observable inputs do not exist. At December 31, 2024 and 2023, all of the Plan's investments, were valued using level 1 inputs under the fair value hierarchy.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

The Plan's investments are stated at fair value. The mutual funds and money market fund are valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. These funds held by the Plan are open-end funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily NAV and to transact at that price.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation in fair value of investments includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold, as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Delinquent notes receivable from participants are recorded as a distribution based upon the terms of the Plan document.

Benefit Payments

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Subsequent Events Evaluation by Management

Management has evaluated subsequent events for disclosure and/or recognition in the financial statements through the date that the financial statements were available to be issued, which date is October 9, 2025.

3. Information Certified (Unaudited)

Certain information related to investments and notes receivable from participants disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required Schedule H, Part IV, Line 4i – Schedule of Assets (Held at End of Year) including investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and interest and dividends, net appreciation in fair value of investments, and interest on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company, a qualified institution.

4. Exempt Party-in-Interest Transactions

Certain investments are managed by Fidelity Management Trust Company, the trustee of the Plan. Therefore, these transactions qualify as exempt party-in-interest transactions under ERISA.

Participants who are active employees may borrow from their accounts and such loans qualify as exempt party-in-interest transactions under ERISA. These loans are recorded as notes receivable from participants in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

Certain administrative functions are performed by officers or employees of the Company. No such officer or employee receives compensation from the Plan.

5. Non-Exempt Party-in-Interest Transactions

During 2024, certain participants' contributions totaling \$64,388 were remitted by the Employer to the Plan later than required by Department of Labor Regulation 2510.3-102. The employer is in the process of making the necessary corrections to satisfy both the Department of Labor and IRS guide for the 2024 delinquent contributions.

6. Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of a Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their Employer contributions.

7. Tax Status

The Internal Revenue Service (“IRS”) issued an opinion letter to the prototype plan document preparer, FMR LLC, dated June 30, 2020, which states that the form of the prototype plan qualifies under the applicable provisions of the IRC. The plan administrator believes that the Plan is designed and is currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC.

U.S. GAAP requires plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine examinations by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no examinations for any tax periods in progress.

8. Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants’ account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

Except as described in the Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit section of our report, our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditors' report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and, therefore, is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. - Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

Our audits did not extend to the certified investment information, except for obtaining and reading the certification, comparing the certified investment information with the related information presented and disclosed in the financial statements, and reading the disclosures relating to the certified investment information to assess whether they are in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements of accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Supplemental Schedules Required by ERISA

The information included in the supplemental schedules, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the

financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards.

For information included in the supplemental schedules that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, we compared such information to the related certified investment information.

In forming our opinion on the supplemental schedules, we evaluated whether the supplemental schedules, other than the information agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, including its form and content, is presented in conformity with the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

1. Description of the Plan

The following description of The Vita Coco Company, Inc. 401(k) Plan (the “Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan document for more detailed information.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all eligible employees of The Vita Coco Company, Inc. (the “Company” or “Employer”) who have attained the age of 21 and completed three consecutive months of service. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (“ERISA”).

Contributions

Eligible participants may elect to contribute up to 100% of their eligible compensation, as defined by the Plan, up to the maximum allowed under the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (“IRC”). Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also elect to make Roth after-tax contributions to the Plan. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans (rollover).

Effective 03/15/2021 employees are automatically enrolled at 3% pre-tax contribution. All Employees are eligible to contribute after three months of service unless they elect to opt out. The automatic deferrals begin as soon as administratively possible after completion of three months of service. Participants can actively change their election percentage at any time and have the opportunity to opt-out each year.

The Company may make discretionary matching contributions. For the year ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, the discretionary matching contribution was equal to 100% of the participant’s elective deferral amount, not to exceed 3% of the Participant’s Compensation.

Participant Accounts

Each participant’s account is credited with the participant’s contribution and allocations of (a) Employer contributions and (b) Plan earnings (losses) thereon. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant’s vested account.

Vesting

Participants are fully vested in that portion of their account which represents their contributions and the income earned thereon. A participant vests in the discretionary employer contribution plus earnings thereon at a rate of 50% vested after one year of credited service and 100% after two years of eligible service. Participants become 100% vested in all contributions and earnings thereon upon death, total and permanent disability, or attainment of normal retirement age.

1. Description of the Plan (*continued*)

Payment of Benefits

The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account. Benefits may be distributed to participants upon termination of employment by reason of retirement, disability, death or other separation from service. Participants may elect a lump sum distribution.

A participant may also request a withdrawal upon attainment of age 59 ½ or upon demonstration by the participant to the plan administrator that the participant is suffering from a hardship.

Notes Receivable from Participants

A participant may borrow an aggregate amount up to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of the participant's vested account balance, subject to plan limitations. The minimum loan allowed is \$1,000. Loans must bear a reasonable rate of interest commensurate with local prevailing interest rates, as determined by the plan administrator. Loans are collateralized by the participant's nonforfeitable interest in the Plan and are supported by a promissory note. Loans must be repaid over a period not to exceed five years unless the loan proceeds are used for the purchase of a primary residence, in which case a longer repayment period may not extend beyond ten years. A participant may only have two outstanding loan at any given time. Principal and interest is generally paid ratably through payroll deductions each pay period.

Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Company and are excluded from these financial statements. Administrative fees incurred in connection with loans and participant activity charges are borne by the individual and deducted from their respective Plan assets. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation in fair value of investments.

Forfeitures

When certain terminations of participation in the Plan occur, the non-vested portion of a participant's account represents a forfeiture, as defined by the Plan. Forfeited balances are first used to restore re-employed participants' accounts. Any remaining forfeitures may be used to pay Plan expenses or reduce future Employer contributions. At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited non-vested accounts totaled \$5,596 and \$627. During 2024 and 2023, \$46,781 and \$17,698 of forfeitures were used to reduce Employer contributions.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting and Use of Estimates

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual method of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (“U.S. GAAP”). The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Fair Value Measurements

The Plan follows U.S. GAAP guidance on Fair Value Measurements which defines fair value and establishes a fair value hierarchy organized into three levels based upon the input assumptions used in pricing assets. Level 1 inputs have the highest reliability and are related to assets with unadjusted quoted prices in active markets. Level 2 inputs relate to assets with other than quoted prices in active markets which may include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities or other inputs which can be corroborated by observable market data. Level 3 inputs are unobservable and are used to the extent that observable inputs do not exist. At December 31, 2024 and 2023, all of the Plan’s investments, were valued using level 1 inputs under the fair value hierarchy.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

The Plan’s investments are stated at fair value. The mutual funds and money market fund are valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. These funds held by the Plan are open-end funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily NAV and to transact at that price.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation in fair value of investments includes the Plan’s gains and losses on investments bought and sold, as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Delinquent notes receivable from participants are recorded as a distribution based upon the terms of the Plan document.

Benefit Payments

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Subsequent Events Evaluation by Management

Management has evaluated subsequent events for disclosure and/or recognition in the financial statements through the date that the financial statements were available to be issued, which date is October 9, 2025.

3. Information Certified (Unaudited)

Certain information related to investments and notes receivable from participants disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required Schedule H, Part IV, Line 4i – Schedule of Assets (Held at End of Year) including investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and interest and dividends, net appreciation in fair value of investments, and interest on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company, a qualified institution.

4. Exempt Party-in-Interest Transactions

Certain investments are managed by Fidelity Management Trust Company, the trustee of the Plan. Therefore, these transactions qualify as exempt party-in-interest transactions under ERISA.

Participants who are active employees may borrow from their accounts and such loans qualify as exempt party-in-interest transactions under ERISA. These loans are recorded as notes receivable from participants in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

Certain administrative functions are performed by officers or employees of the Company. No such officer or employee receives compensation from the Plan.

5. Non-Exempt Party-in-Interest Transactions

During 2024, certain participants' contributions totaling \$64,388 were remitted by the Employer to the Plan later than required by Department of Labor Regulation 2510.3-102. The employer is in the process of making the necessary corrections to satisfy both the Department of Labor and IRS guide for the 2024 delinquent contributions.

6. Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of a Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their Employer contributions.

7. Tax Status

The Internal Revenue Service (“IRS”) issued an opinion letter to the prototype plan document preparer, FMR LLC, dated June 30, 2020, which states that the form of the prototype plan qualifies under the applicable provisions of the IRC. The plan administrator believes that the Plan is designed and is currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC.

U.S. GAAP requires plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine examinations by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no examinations for any tax periods in progress.

8. Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants’ account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.
