Opinion

1. DESCRIPTION OF PLAN:

The following description of the MKSK Employee Stock Ownership Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

MKSK Employee Stock Ownership Plan was effective as of January 1, 2018, and covers employees of MKSK, Inc. (the Company or Employer). The Plan operates, in relevant part, as a leveraged employee stock ownership plan (ESOP) and is designed to comply with Section 4975(e)(7), and the regulations thereunder, of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). The Plan is subject to the applicable provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as amended.

The Plan purchased Company common shares using the proceeds of a note payable (see Note 7) and holds cash and the common stock in a trust established under the Plan. As the Plan makes debt payments, an appropriate percentage of stock will be allocated to eligible employees' accounts in accordance with applicable regulations under the IRC.

The note is collateralized by the unallocated shares of common stock. The lender has no rights against shares once they are allocated to participants in accordance with the terms of the Plan. Accordingly, the financial statements of the Plan as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, present separately the assets and liabilities and changes therein pertaining to:

- the accounts of employees with vested rights in allocated common stock (allocated) and
- common stock not yet allocated to employees (unallocated)

Eligibility

Employees of the Company are generally eligible to participate in the Plan once they are 21 years old and have completed one year of service, providing they worked at least 900 hours during such Plan Year. Participants who do not have at least 900 hours of service during such Plan Year or are not employed on the last working day of a Plan Year, are generally not eligible for an allocation of Company contributions for such year unless termination was due to death, disability or retirement.

Employees of the Company are generally eligible to receive a safe harbor contribution in the Plan once they are 21 years old and have completed three months of service.

Employer contributions

The Company is obligated to make, at a minimum, contributions in cash to the Plan which equal the amount necessary to enable the Plan to make its annually scheduled payments of principal and interest due on the note payable.

The Company may also make a safe harbor contribution to the Plan provided that the appropriate notice is provided to those employees who are eligible under the MKSK, Inc. 401(k) Savings and Profit Sharing Plan. The safe harbor contribution for 2024 and 2023 was equal to 3% of an eligible employees compensation.

Payment of benefits

Distributions on account of death, disability, or retirement which have a balance in excess of \$7,000 (\$5,000 prior to January 1, 2024) are paid in substantially equal annual installments over a period of five years. For those with a balance less than \$7,000 (\$5,000 prior to January 1, 2024) distributions shall be made in a lump sum. Distributions for other separations from service commence no later than the sixth plan year following the separation from service and shall be paid in substantially equal annual installments over a period of five years. The amount to be distributed is based on the account valuation date immediately preceding the distribution. Distributions are made in cash.

Under the provisions of the Plan, the Company is obligated to repurchase participant shares, which have been distributed under the terms of the Plan if the shares are not publicly traded or if the shares are subject to trading limitations.

Effective January 1, 2024 the Plan was amended to allow a special 2024 plan year lump sum distribution for any balances under \$60,000.

Vesting

Participants are always 100% vested in the Company safe harbor contribution. If a participant's employment with the Company ends for any reason other than retirement, permanent disability, or death, he or she will vest in the balances in his or her account based on total years of service with the Company. Participants become 20% vested after two years of service and vest an additional 20% per year until fully vested after six years of service in other Company contributions. The Plan also provides that a participant that reaches normal retirement age or becomes disabled or dies while employed by the Company will become 100% vested. Normal retirement age is upon attainment of age 65.

Forfeitures

Nonvested account balances shall be forfeited upon the earlier of (a) completion of five consecutive one-year breaks in service or (b) full distribution of any vested benefits. Forfeitures shall be reallocated to participants. When reallocated, forfeitures are allocated to each participant's account based upon the ratio of compensation of a participant eligible to receive an allocation relative to the total compensation of all plan participants eligible to receive an allocation. Forfeiture allocations totaled 1,062.52508 and 225.14389 shares of stock for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively.

Voting rights

The Plan Administrator shall have the right to direct the Trustee as to the voting of allocated and unallocated Company stock upon any matter which any other shares of the Company may be or have a right to be voted, except that each participant shall have the right to so direct the Trustee as to the voting of the stock allocated to his or her account with respect to certain matters including corporate merger, recapitalization, liquidations, dissolution or sale of substantially all assets of the Company. The Trustee shall not vote any allocated shares of Company stock as to which no valid written directive has been received from a participant or the Plan Administrator.

Participant accounts

The Plan is a defined contribution plan under which a separate individual account is established for each participant. Each participant's account is credited as of the last day of each plan year with an allocation of shares of the Company's common stock released by the Trustee from the unallocated account, forfeitures of terminated participant's nonvested accounts, and the safe harbor contribution made by the Company. Only those participants who are eligible employees of the Company as of the last day of the plan year will receive an allocation. Allocations to each participant's account are based upon the ratio of compensation of a participant eligible to receive an allocation relative to the total compensation of all plan participants eligible to receive an allocation. Trust income is allocated based on relative number of allocated shares, as defined.

Put option

Under federal income tax regulations, the MKSK, Inc. common stock that is held by the Plan and its participants and is not readily tradable on an established market or subject to trading limitations, includes a put option. The put option is a right to demand that the Company buy any shares of its stock distributed to participants for which there is no market. The put price is representative of the current value of the stock. The Company can pay for the purchase with interest over a period of five years. The purpose of the put option is to ensure that the participant has the ability to ultimately obtain cash.

Reshuffling

The Plan provides for stock accounts of a person who is no longer an active employee to be converted into other investment funds. The stock related to such accounts may then be reshuffled among other active participant accounts.

Diversification

Diversification is offered to participants close to retirement so that they may have the opportunity to move part of the value of their investment in Company stock into investments which are more diversified. Participants who are at least 55 with at least 10 years of participation in the Plan may elect to diversify a portion of their account. Diversification is offered to each eligible participant over a 6-year period. A participant may diversify up to 25% of the number of shares allocated to his or her account, less any shares previously diversified or distributed during the first five years. In the sixth year, the percentage increases to 50%. Participants who elect to diversify can (a) transfer the amount to another qualified plan maintained by the Company, if approved by the Plan Administrator, (b) elect a rollover distribution, or (c) elect a distribution of cash of such amount.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

The following accounting principles and practices of the Plan are set forth to facilitate the understanding of data presented in the financial statements:

Basis of accounting

The accompanying financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires the Plan administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results may differ from those estimates.

Investment valuation and income recognition

The shares of Company common stock are valued at fair value (see Note 6). Dividend income is accrued on the ex-dividend date. Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade date basis. Realized gains and losses are reported on the average cost method. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Payment of benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Administrative expenses

Certain administrative expenses are paid by the Company and are excluded from these financial statements. Other expenses are paid by the Plan as provided in the Plan agreement.

Subsequent events

Effective January 1, 2025 the Plan was amended to allow a special 2025 plan year lump sum distribution for any balances under \$42,000.

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 13, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

3. TAX STATUS:

The Plan has received a determination letter from the Internal Revenue Service dated May 22, 2020, stating that the Plan is qualified, under the IRC and, therefore, the related trust is exempt from taxation. Once qualified, the Plan is required to operate in conformity with the IRC to maintain its qualification. The Plan has been amended since receiving the determination letter. However, the Plan administrator believes that the Plan is currently designed, and being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. Therefore, they believe that the Plan was qualified, and the related trust was tax-exempt as of the financial statement date.

4. ADMINISTRATION OF PLAN ASSETS:

The Plan's assets, which consist principally of Company common stock, are held by the Trustee of the Plan. Company contributions are held and managed by the Trustee, which invests cash received, interest, and dividend income and makes distributions to participants. The Trustee also administers the payment of interest and principal on the note payable. Certain administrative functions are performed by officers or employees of the Company or its subsidiaries. No such officer or employee receives compensation from the Plan.

5. INVESTMENTS IN COMPANY STOCK:

6. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS:

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described as follows:

Level 1 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

The valuation process involves the Plan Trustee's selection of an independent appraiser. Plan management accumulates the data for the appraiser from the reviewed financial statements of the Company. The appraiser prepares a preliminary report which Plan management, along with the Plan Trustee, reviews in detail, discusses and approves the final report.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

7. NOTE PAYABLE:

In 2019, the Plan entered into a note payable agreement totaling \$13,000,000, with the Company. The proceeds of the note were used to purchase MKSK, Inc. common stock. Unallocated shares are collateral for the note. The agreement provides for the note to be repaid with installment payments over 30 years. The note bears interest at 4.00%. The note may be prepaid at any point in time and any Employer safe harbor contributions to the Plan will be included in principal payments for the year.

Shares are released from collateral and allocated to participants as payments of principal and interest are made. The number of shares released in any year is the number of shares held as collateral, times the ratio of the current year payments divided by the total of this year's payments, plus all future years' principal and interest payments. This resulted in 14,946 and 14,976 shares of common stock being released and allocated for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively.

8. RELATED PARTY AND PARTY IN INTEREST TRANSACTIONS:

The Plan invests in MKSK, Inc. common stock. This is a related party and party in interest transaction.

9. RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES:

The Plan's investments are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks, and the Company's common stock is exposed to valuation assumptions based on earnings, cash flows and/or other such techniques. Due to the level of risk associated with the investment in the common stock and to uncertainties inherent in the estimations and assumptions process, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the value of the common stock will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

10. PLAN TERMINATION:

The Company reserves the right to terminate the Plan at any time, subject to Plan provisions. Upon such termination of the Plan, participants would become vested in Company contributions and the interest of each participant in the trust fund will be distributed to such participant or his or her beneficiary at the time prescribed by the Plan terms and the IRC. Upon termination of the Plan, the Plan administrator shall direct the Trustee to pay all liabilities and expenses of the trust fund and to sell shares of financed common stock held in the note suspense account to the extent it determines such sale to be necessary in order to repay the notes payable.
