Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed audits of the financial statements of Sauder Woodworking Co. Retirement and 401(k) Plan (the Plan), an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) (ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of the Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's (DOL) Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Management has obtained certifications from a qualified institution as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the year ended December 31, 2024, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note 3 to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Opinion

Basis for Opinion

Notes to Financial Statements

Note 1. Description of Plan

The following description of Sauder Woodworking Co. Retirement and 401(k) Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan Agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General: The Plan is sponsored and administered by Sauder Woodworking Co. and is governed by the Plan Agreement. The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering substantially all employees of Sauder Woodworking Co., Sauder Manufacturing Co., Progressive Furniture, Inc., Studio RTA, Inc. dba Sauder Global Sourcing and BSG Int'l, LLC (collectively, the Company) who meet certain service criteria making them eligible to participate in the Plan. The Plan was established on January 1, 1968, as a defined contribution plan. The Plan was completely amended and restated on January 1, 1999, at which time, a 401(k) provision was added. The Plan is subject to provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as amended.

Contributions: Each eligible employee (participant), as defined in the Plan, may elect to contribute up to 50% of pre-tax annual compensation, as defined in the Plan Agreement. Eligible employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan with an elective pre-tax deferral rate of 3% of compensation, increasing each year by 1%, until such elective deferral rate is 7% of compensation, unless the participant affirmatively elects out of the automatic deferral feature or elects a different deferral rate. Participants may increase or decrease their contribution amount at any time. Participants may also make Roth (after-tax) deferral contributions. Participants who meet certain age requirements are eligible to contribute additional catch-up contributions subject to certain dollar limits. In addition, participants may contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified plans. Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan and may contribute up to the annual maximum amount pursuant to the applicable section of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC).

Company discretionary matching contributions range between 2% to 3% of the participant's eligible compensation. In June 2023, the Board of Directors of the Plan Sponsor suspended Company discretionary matching contributions related to employees of Sauder Woodworking Co. and Sauder Global Sourcing. In February 2025, the Board of Directors of the Plan Sponsor reinstated Company discretionary matching contributions related to employees of Sauder Woodworking Co.

At the discretion of the Company's Board of Directors, the Company may make a discretionary profit sharing contribution up to 1% of the participant's eligible compensation, as well as a cash bonus that may be contributed partially, or in total, to the Plan at the option of the participant. Participants must be employed at the end of the plan year and have completed 1,000 hours of service to be eligible for the discretionary profit sharing contribution allocation. Contributions are subject to certain limitations. There were no discretionary profit sharing contributions made during 2024.

Funding policy: Participant contributions and the Company discretionary matching contributions are recognized when the participant contributions are withheld from the participant's earnings. The Company profit sharing contributions are recognized on an annual basis when declared by the Board of Directors.

Participants' accounts: Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution and allocations of (a) the Company's contributions and (b) Plan earnings and charged with an allocation of administrative expenses. Allocations are based on participant compensation or account balances, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Notes to Financial Statements

Note 1. Description of Plan (Continued)

Participant-directed accounts: Participants have the option to allocate their account balances among several investment options. All choices vary in types of investments, rates of return and investment risk. Participants may elect to have all or part of their account balances and future contributions invested in one fund, transferred to another fund, or in any combination. As provided in the Plan Agreement, the participant may change this election and/or elect to transfer any portion of the account balance from one fund to any other fund on a daily basis. All dividends, interest and other distributions received by any fund will be reinvested automatically in the same fund.

Vesting: Participants are immediately vested in their employee pre-tax and after-tax withholding accounts, rollover contributions, and Company discretionary matching contributions and any earnings thereon.

A participant's vested interest in the Company's discretionary profit sharing contributions, along with any earnings on those contributions, shall be determined in accordance with the following schedule:

Less than 1 year	0%
1 year	20%
2 years	40%
3 years	60%
4 years	80%
5 years	100%

Payment of benefits: On termination of service, a participant may elect to receive an amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account in either a lump sum or in an annuity.

Forfeited accounts: Forfeitures of nonvested Company contributions are first allocated among the accounts of participants otherwise eligible to receive an allocation of Company contributions. Any forfeitures remaining are then used to reduce administrative expenses under the Plan, if any. For the year ended December 31, 2024, \$10,277 was allocated to accounts of participants. There were \$44,057 and \$20,454 of unapplied forfeitures as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively. Accumulated forfeitures will be used in 2025.

Plan termination: Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company reserves the right to terminate the Plan at any time, subject to plan provisions. In the event of termination of the Plan, participants will become 100% vested in their accounts. The assets then remaining in the Plan will be allocated and distributed to participants in accordance with the terms and provisions of the Plan.

Notes receivable from participants: Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000, up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at varying rates from 4.25% to 9.50%, which are commensurate with local prevailing rates, as determined by the Company. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Note 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of accounting: The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Contributions: Contributions from Plan participants and all Company discretionary matching and profit sharing contributions are recorded in the year in which the employee contributions are withheld from compensation.

Investment valuation and income recognition: Investments are stated at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements. Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of investments includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold, as well as held, during the year.

Notes receivable from participants: Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance, plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Delinquent loans are treated as distributions based upon the terms of the Plan Agreement.

Administrative expenses: The Plan provides that administrative expenses of the Plan are to be paid by the Plan or by the Company, at the option of the Company.

Use of estimates: The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of net assets available for benefits and changes therein. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Benefit payments: Benefits are recorded when paid.

Subsequent events: The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 9, 2025, the date on which the financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 4. Fair Value Measurements

The Financial Accounting Standards Board establishes a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below:

Level 1: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2: Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodology used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodology used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Registered investment companies: Valued at quoted market prices which represent the net asset value (NAV) of the shares held by the Plan at year-end.

Common collective trust fund: A stable value fund that is composed primarily of fully benefit-responsive investment contracts that is valued at the NAV of units of the bank collective trust. The NAV is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. This practical expedient would not be used if it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different from the reported NAV.

Participant transactions (purchases and sales) may occur daily. If the Plan initiates a full redemption of the collective trust, the issuer reserves the right to require up to 12 months' notification in order to ensure that securities liquidations will be carried out in an orderly business manner.

The methods described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of a different methodology or assumption to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Note 5. Tax Status

The Plan has adopted a nonstandardized preapproved plan sponsored by Fidelity. The nonstandardized preapproved plan provider has received an opinion letter from the Internal Revenue Service as to the nonstandardized preapproved plan's qualified status. The nonstandardized preapproved plan opinion letter has been relied upon by the Plan. The Plan has been amended since the nonstandardized preapproved plan document provider received the opinion letter. The Plan Administrator believes the Plan is designed and is being operated in compliance with the applicable provisions of the IRC.

Note 6. Party-in-Interest Transactions

Certain plan investments are shares of registered investment companies and a common collective trust fund managed by affiliates of Fidelity Management Trust Company. Fidelity Management Trust Company is the trustee as defined by the Plan; therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. The administrative fees paid to the trustee and its affiliates amounted to \$26,907 for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Note 7. Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan holds various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

Note 1. Description of Plan

The following description of Sauder Woodworking Co. Retirement and 401(k) Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan Agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General: The Plan is sponsored and administered by Sauder Woodworking Co. and is governed by the Plan Agreement. The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering substantially all employees of Sauder Woodworking Co., Sauder Manufacturing Co., Progressive Furniture, Inc., Studio RTA, Inc. dba Sauder Global Sourcing and BSG Int'l, LLC (collectively, the Company) who meet certain service criteria making them eligible to participate in the Plan. The Plan was established on January 1, 1968, as a defined contribution plan. The Plan was completely amended and restated on January 1, 1999, at which time, a 401(k) provision was added. The Plan is subject to provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as amended.

Contributions: Each eligible employee (participant), as defined in the Plan, may elect to contribute up to 50% of pre-tax annual compensation, as defined in the Plan Agreement. Eligible employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan with an elective pre-tax deferral rate of 3% of compensation, increasing each year by 1%, until such elective deferral rate is 7% of compensation, unless the participant affirmatively elects out of the automatic deferral feature or elects a different deferral rate. Participants may increase or decrease their contribution amount at any time. Participants may also make Roth (after-tax) deferral contributions. Participants who meet certain age requirements are eligible to contribute additional catch-up contributions subject to certain dollar limits. In addition, participants may contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified plans. Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan and may contribute up to the annual maximum amount pursuant to the applicable section of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC).

Company discretionary matching contributions range between 2% to 3% of the participant's eligible compensation. In June 2023, the Board of Directors of the Plan Sponsor suspended Company discretionary matching contributions related to employees of Sauder Woodworking Co. and Sauder Global Sourcing. In February 2025, the Board of Directors of the Plan Sponsor reinstated Company discretionary matching contributions related to employees of Sauder Woodworking Co.

At the discretion of the Company's Board of Directors, the Company may make a discretionary profit sharing contribution up to 1% of the participant's eligible compensation, as well as a cash bonus that may be contributed partially, or in total, to the Plan at the option of the participant. Participants must be employed at the end of the plan year and have completed 1,000 hours of service to be eligible for the discretionary profit sharing contribution allocation. Contributions are subject to certain limitations. There were no discretionary profit sharing contributions made during 2024.

Funding policy: Participant contributions and the Company discretionary matching contributions are recognized when the participant contributions are withheld from the participant's earnings. The Company profit sharing contributions are recognized on an annual basis when declared by the Board of Directors.

Participants' accounts: Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution and allocations of (a) the Company's contributions and (b) Plan earnings and charged with an allocation of administrative expenses. Allocations are based on participant compensation or account balances, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Note 1. Description of Plan (Continued)

Participant-directed accounts: Participants have the option to allocate their account balances among several investment options. All choices vary in types of investments, rates of return and investment risk. Participants may elect to have all or part of their account balances and future contributions invested in one fund, transferred to another fund, or in any combination. As provided in the Plan Agreement, the participant may change this election and/or elect to transfer any portion of the account balance from one fund to any other fund on a daily basis. All dividends, interest and other distributions received by any fund will be reinvested automatically in the same fund.

Vesting: Participants are immediately vested in their employee pre-tax and after-tax withholding accounts, rollover contributions, and Company discretionary matching contributions and any earnings thereon.

A participant's vested interest in the Company's discretionary profit sharing contributions, along with any earnings on those contributions, shall be determined in accordance with the following schedule:

5 years	100%

Payment of benefits: On termination of service, a participant may elect to receive an amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account in either a lump sum or in an annuity.

Forfeited accounts: Forfeitures of nonvested Company contributions are first allocated among the accounts of participants otherwise eligible to receive an allocation of Company contributions. Any forfeitures remaining are then used to reduce administrative expenses under the Plan, if any. For the year ended December 31, 2024, \$10,277 was allocated to accounts of participants. There were \$44,057 and \$20,454 of unapplied forfeitures as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively. Accumulated forfeitures will be used in 2025.

Plan termination: Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company reserves the right to terminate the Plan at any time, subject to plan provisions. In the event of termination of the Plan, participants will become 100% vested in their accounts. The assets then remaining in the Plan will be allocated and distributed to participants in accordance with the terms and provisions of the Plan.

Notes receivable from participants: Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000, up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at varying rates from 4.25% to 9.50%, which are commensurate with local prevailing rates, as determined by the Company. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Note 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of accounting: The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Contributions: Contributions from Plan participants and all Company discretionary matching and profit sharing contributions are recorded in the year in which the employee contributions are withheld from compensation.

Investment valuation and income recognition: Investments are stated at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements. Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of investments includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold, as well as held, during the year.

Notes receivable from participants: Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance, plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Delinquent loans are treated as distributions based upon the terms of the Plan Agreement.

Administrative expenses: The Plan provides that administrative expenses of the Plan are to be paid by the Plan or by the Company, at the option of the Company.

Use of estimates: The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of net assets available for benefits and changes therein. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Benefit payments: Benefits are recorded when paid.

Subsequent events: The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 9, 2025, the date on which the financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 4. Fair Value Measurements

The Financial Accounting Standards Board establishes a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below:

Level 1: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2: Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodology used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodology used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Registered investment companies: Valued at quoted market prices which represent the net asset value (NAV) of the shares held by the Plan at year-end.

Note 4. Fair Value Measurements (Continued)

Common collective trust fund: A stable value fund that is composed primarily of fully benefit-responsive investment contracts that is valued at the NAV of units of the bank collective trust. The NAV is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. This practical expedient would not be used if it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different from the reported NAV.

Participant transactions (purchases and sales) may occur daily. If the Plan initiates a full redemption of the collective trust, the issuer reserves the right to require up to 12 months' notification in order to ensure that securities liquidations will be carried out in an orderly business manner.

The methods described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of a different methodology or assumption to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Note 5. Tax Status

The Plan has adopted a nonstandardized preapproved plan sponsored by Fidelity. The nonstandardized preapproved plan provider has received an opinion letter from the Internal Revenue Service as to the nonstandardized preapproved plan's qualified status. The nonstandardized preapproved plan opinion letter has been relied upon by the Plan. The Plan has been amended since the nonstandardized preapproved plan document provider received the opinion letter. The Plan Administrator believes the Plan is designed and is being operated in compliance with the applicable provisions of the IRC.

Note 6. Party-in-Interest Transactions

Certain plan investments are shares of registered investment companies and a common collective trust fund managed by affiliates of Fidelity Management Trust Company. Fidelity Management Trust Company is the trustee as defined by the Plan; therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. The administrative fees paid to the trustee and its affiliates amounted to \$26,907 for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Note 7. Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan holds various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.
