INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed an audit of the accompanying financial statements of Wake Emergency Physicians, P.A. 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan, an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) [ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit]. The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audit of Wake Emergency Physicians, P.A. 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audit need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the plan (investment information) by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA (qualified institution).

Management has obtained a certification from a qualified institution as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the year ended December 31, 2024, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note 3 to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Opinion

Note 1: DESCRIPTION OF PLAN

The following description of the Wake Emergency Physicians, P.A. 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan (the “Plan”) provides only general information. Refer to Plan documents for a more complete description of Plan provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all employees, with the exception of certain classes of employees as defined by the Plan document, of Wake Emergency Physicians, P.A. (the “Company”, “Sponsor”, “Employer”, or “Plan Administrator”). The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Department of Labor’s (DOL’s) Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA). The Board of Directors is responsible for oversight of the Plan. The Plan’s 401(k) Committee determines the appropriateness of the Plan’s investment offerings, monitors investment performance and reports to the Plan’s Board of Directors.

Some administrative functions are performed by employees of the Company. No compensation is remitted to the Company for these services.

Plan assets are held and managed by Fidelity Management Trust Company, the trustee or custodian and the qualified institution for the Plan, which invests contributions and Plan earnings, makes investment transactions as directed by individual participants and provides certain recordkeeping services. Fidelity Workplace Services LLC acts as the third-party administrator for the Plan, which performs certain plan administration and annual ERISA compliance testing.

Eligibility

Employees may become a participant of the Plan when they have reached one hour of service and are age twenty one or older. An eligible employees may enter the Plan immediately upon meeting all entry requirements.

Contributions

Each year, participants may contribute up to the Internal Revenue Service (“IRS”) contribution limit. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or contribution plans (i.e. rollover contributions). Participants direct their employer safe harbor contributions and employer profit-sharing amounts into the various investment options offered by the Plan.

The Plan currently offers various mutual funds, a money market fund, a Common Collective Trust (CCT) and self-directed brokerage accounts. The Company contributes a safe harbor contribution to all eligible employees at a rate of 3% of eligible compensation for the Plan year. During the year ended December 31, 2024, the Company made \$1,934,834 in safe harbor contributions and \$280 in top heavy corrective contributions to the Plan.

In addition, the Company may also make a profit-sharing contribution to eligible employees who have completed two consecutive years of service, are age 21 or older, and have completed 750 hours of service or were employed on the last day of the year. During the year ended December 31, 2024 the Company made a \$5,029,180 profit sharing contribution to the Plan. Contributions are subject to certain Internal Revenue Service (IRS) limitations.

Wake Emergency Physicians, P.A. 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan Notes to Financial Statements

Note 1: DESCRIPTION OF PLAN (Continued)

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and the Company's safe harbor contributions, as well as allocations of the Company's profit sharing contributions and Plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative service fees that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting

Participants are vested immediately in their voluntary contributions, the Company's safe harbor contributions, and the Company's profit sharing contribution, plus actual earnings thereon.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account. The loan interest rate will be set at 1% above the prime rate. The interest rate will remain fixed over the loan term. Principal and interest is paid ratably through monthly payroll deductions. Loan balances must be repaid within five years, provided however, that any loan used to acquire any dwelling unit which is to be used as the principal residence of the participant must be repaid within a reasonable period of time, not to extend beyond thirty years.

Benefit Payments

On termination of service due to death, disability, or retirement, a participant with a vested balance greater than \$5,000 may elect to receive an amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his account in either a lump sum amount or substantially equal installments. On termination of service due to other reasons, a participant may receive the value of the vested interest in his or her account as a lump-sum distribution. Withdrawals can be made by a participant that has not separated from service as permitted by the Plan agreement and regulations under the Internal Revenue Code. As of January 1, 2024, the minimum balance necessary for an inactive participant to stay in the Plan increased from \$5,000 to \$7,000.

The Plan adopted various SECURE 2.0 Act withdrawal provisions with an effective date of November 12, 2024 regarding distributions for specific life situations.

Forfeitures

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$121 and \$11, respectively. These accounts will be used to reduce future profit-sharing contributions and the Company's safe harbor contributions. In 2024, employer contributions were reduced by \$117 from forfeited accounts.

Hardship Withdrawals

As permitted by the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) and in accordance with the plan agreement, a participant may request a financial hardship withdrawal if they experience a severe financial hardship. The financial hardship withdrawal may not exceed the amount of the financial hardship or the value of the vested portion of the participant's balance, whichever is less.

Note 2: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP). The Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) provides authoritative guidance regarding U.S. GAAP through the Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) and related Accounting Standards Updates (ASUs).

Use of Estimates

The preparation of U.S. GAAP financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments generally are reported at fair value, but may also be reported at contract value or net asset value (NAV). Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements. The Plan's 401(k) Committee determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisors and custodian of the Plan.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation (depreciation) includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred.

Payment of Benefits

Distributions to participants are recorded when paid.

Administrative Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid directly by the Company and are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the administration of benefit payments and notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses and administrative expense for management of the Fidelity Participant Recordkeeping System ("FPRS"; synonymous with self-directed brokerage accounts or BrokerageLink) are charged directly to the participant's self-directed brokerage account and are included in net appreciation of fair value of investments.

Note 2: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities, in general, are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, credit and overall market volatility. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is reasonably possible that changes in value of investment securities will occur in the near term and that these changes could materially affect amounts reported in the Plan's financial statements.

Subsequent Events

Management has evaluated subsequent events through the date that the financial statements were available to be issued, October 10, 2025. See Note 9 for relevant disclosures. No subsequent events occurring after this date have been evaluated for inclusion in these financial statements.

Note 3: INFORMATION CERTIFIED BY QUALIFIED INSTITUTION

The Plan Administrator has elected the method of compliance, as permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. The following financial information included in the Plan's financial statements was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company, the qualified institution:

- a) Total investments, at fair value, included in the statements of net assets available for benefits at December 31, 2024 and 2023.
- b) Notes receivable from participants, included in the statements of net assets available for benefits at December 31, 2024 and 2023.
- c) Investment income and interest income from notes receivable information included in the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024.
- d) All amounts included in Note 4, *Fair Value Measurements*.
- e) All information included in the supplemental schedule of assets (held at end of year) as of December 31, 2024.

Note 4: FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Fair value is the exchange price that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date. There are three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair values:

Level 1: Quoted prices (unadjusted) for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the entity has the ability to access as of the measurement date.

Level 2: Significant other observable inputs other than Level 1 prices, such as:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs, other than quoted prices, that are:
 - observable; or
 - can be corroborated by observable market data.

Note 4: FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS (Continued)

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the SEC. These funds are required to publish their daily NAV and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Money market – interest-bearing cash: Valued based on fair value of the dollar.

Self-directed brokerage accounts: Accounts primarily consist of mutual funds, money market accounts, common stocks, certificates of deposit, preferred stocks, and unit investment trusts. Mutual funds and money market accounts are valued as stated above. Common and preferred stocks are valued at the closing price reported on the active market on which the individual securities are traded. Unit investment trusts are valued at NAV calculated as of close of the exchange each day.

Common collective trust ("CCT"): The Plan's CCT is valued based on NAV per share of unit as a practical expedient as reported by the fund manager, multiplied by the number of shares or units held as of the measurement date. Accordingly, these NAV based investments have been excluded from the fair value hierarchy.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan Administrator believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine fair value of certain financial instruments could result in different fair value measurements at the reporting date.

Note 5: TAX STATUS

The Plan utilizes Fidelity Management Trust Company's (the Plan's Trustee) Pre-Approved Defined Contribution Plan. The prototype plan received an opinion letter dated June 30, 2020. Although the Plan has been amended since the date of the opinion letter, the Plan Administrator and the Plan's tax counsel believe that the Plan is designed, and is currently being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and, therefore, believe that the Plan is qualified, and the related trust is tax-exempt.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Note 6: RELATED-PARTY TRANSACTIONS AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Certain plan investments are shares of mutual funds managed by Fidelity Management Trust Company. Fidelity Management Trust Company is the trustee as defined by the Plan, and therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Investments qualifying as party-in-interest transactions were \$49,794,967 and \$39,035,890 as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively. Fees incurred by the Plan for investment management services are included in net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of the investment, as they are paid through revenue sharing, rather than a direct payment. In order to participate in the Fidelity Personal Recordkeeping System / BrokerageLink Account (the self-directed brokerage account), the third party administrator requires an annual maintenance fee and commission on security trades within the FPRS.

Note 7: PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their employer contributions.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed an audit of the accompanying financial statements of Wake Emergency Physicians, P.A. 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan, an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) [ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit]. The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audit of Wake Emergency Physicians, P.A. 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Note 1: DESCRIPTION OF PLAN

The following description of the Wake Emergency Physicians, P.A. 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan (the "Plan") provides only general information. Refer to Plan documents for a more complete description of Plan provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all employees, with the exception of certain classes of employees as defined by the Plan document, of Wake Emergency Physicians, P.A. (the "Company", "Sponsor", "Employer", or "Plan Administrator"). The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Department of Labor's (DOL's) Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA). The Board of Directors is responsible for oversight of the Plan. The Plan's 401(k) Committee determines the appropriateness of the Plan's investment offerings, monitors investment performance and reports to the Plan's Board of Directors.

Some administrative functions are performed by employees of the Company. No compensation is remitted to the Company for these services.

Plan assets are held and managed by Fidelity Management Trust Company, the trustee or custodian and the qualified institution for the Plan, which invests contributions and Plan earnings, makes investment transactions as directed by individual participants and provides certain recordkeeping services. Fidelity Workplace Services LLC acts as the third-party administrator for the Plan, which performs certain plan administration and annual ERISA compliance testing.

Eligibility

Employees may become a participant of the Plan when they have reached one hour of service and are age twenty one or older. An eligible employees may enter the Plan immediately upon meeting all entry requirements.

Contributions

Each year, participants may contribute up to the Internal Revenue Service ("IRS") contribution limit. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or contribution plans (i.e. rollover contributions). Participants direct their employer safe harbor contributions and employer profit-sharing amounts into the various investment options offered by the Plan.

The Plan currently offers various mutual funds, a money market fund, a Common Collective Trust (CCT) and self-directed brokerage accounts. The Company contributes a safe harbor contribution to all eligible employees at a rate of 3% of eligible compensation for the Plan year. During the year ended December 31, 2024, the Company made \$1,934,834 in safe harbor contributions and \$280 in top heavy corrective contributions to the Plan.

In addition, the Company may also make a profit-sharing contribution to eligible employees who have completed two consecutive years of service, are age 21 or older, and have completed 750 hours of service or were employed on the last day of the year. During the year ended December 31, 2024 the Company made a \$5,029,180 profit sharing contribution to the Plan. Contributions are subject to certain Internal Revenue Service (IRS) limitations.

Note 1: DESCRIPTION OF PLAN (Continued)

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and the Company's safe harbor contributions, as well as allocations of the Company's profit sharing contributions and Plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative service fees that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting

Participants are vested immediately in their voluntary contributions, the Company's safe harbor contributions, and the Company's profit sharing contribution, plus actual earnings thereon.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account. The loan interest rate will be set at 1% above the prime rate. The interest rate will remain fixed over the loan term. Principal and interest is paid ratably through monthly payroll deductions. Loan balances must be repaid within five years, provided however, that any loan used to acquire any dwelling unit which is to be used as the principal residence of the participant must be repaid within a reasonable period of time, not to extend beyond thirty years.

Benefit Payments

On termination of service due to death, disability, or retirement, a participant with a vested balance greater than \$5,000 may elect to receive an amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his account in either a lump sum amount or substantially equal installments. On termination of service due to other reasons, a participant may receive the value of the vested interest in his or her account as a lump-sum distribution. Withdrawals can be made by a participant that has not separated from service as permitted by the Plan agreement and regulations under the Internal Revenue Code. As of January 1, 2024, the minimum balance necessary for an inactive participant to stay in the Plan increased from \$5,000 to \$7,000.

The Plan adopted various SECURE 2.0 Act withdrawal provisions with an effective date of November 12, 2024 regarding distributions for specific life situations.

Forfeitures

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$121 and \$11, respectively. These accounts will be used to reduce future profit-sharing contributions and the Company's safe harbor contributions. In 2024, employer contributions were reduced by \$117 from forfeited accounts.

Hardship Withdrawals

As permitted by the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) and in accordance with the plan agreement, a participant may request a financial hardship withdrawal if they experience a severe financial hardship. The financial hardship withdrawal may not exceed the amount of the financial hardship or the value of the vested portion of the participant's balance, whichever is less.

Note 2: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP). The Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) provides authoritative guidance regarding U.S. GAAP through the Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) and related Accounting Standards Updates (ASUs).

Use of Estimates

The preparation of U.S. GAAP financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments generally are reported at fair value, but may also be reported at contract value or net asset value (NAV). Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements. The Plan's 401(k) Committee determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisors and custodian of the Plan.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation (depreciation) includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred.

Payment of Benefits

Distributions to participants are recorded when paid.

Administrative Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid directly by the Company and are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the administration of benefit payments and notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses and administrative expense for management of the Fidelity Participant Recordkeeping System ("FPRS"; synonymous with self-directed brokerage accounts or BrokerageLink) are charged directly to the participant's self-directed brokerage account and are included in net appreciation of fair value of investments.

Note 2: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities, in general, are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, credit and overall market volatility. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is reasonably possible that changes in value of investment securities will occur in the near term and that these changes could materially affect amounts reported in the Plan's financial statements.

Subsequent Events

Management has evaluated subsequent events through the date that the financial statements were available to be issued, October 10, 2025. See Note 9 for relevant disclosures. No subsequent events occurring after this date have been evaluated for inclusion in these financial statements.

Note 3: INFORMATION CERTIFIED BY QUALIFIED INSTITUTION

The Plan Administrator has elected the method of compliance, as permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. The following financial information included in the Plan's financial statements was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company, the qualified institution:

- a) Total investments, at fair value, included in the statements of net assets available for benefits at December 31, 2024 and 2023.
- b) Notes receivable from participants, included in the statements of net assets available for benefits at December 31, 2024 and 2023.
- c) Investment income and interest income from notes receivable information included in the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024.
- d) All amounts included in Note 4, *Fair Value Measurements*.
- e) All information included in the supplemental schedule of assets (held at end of year) as of December 31, 2024.

Note 4: FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Fair value is the exchange price that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date. There are three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair values:

Level 1: Quoted prices (unadjusted) for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the entity has the ability to access as of the measurement date.

Level 2: Significant other observable inputs other than Level 1 prices, such as:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs, other than quoted prices, that are:
 - observable; or
 - can be corroborated by observable market data.

Note 4: FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS (Continued)

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the SEC. These funds are required to publish their daily NAV and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Money market – interest-bearing cash: Valued based on fair value of the dollar.

Self-directed brokerage accounts: Accounts primarily consist of mutual funds, money market accounts, common stocks, certificates of deposit, preferred stocks, and unit investment trusts. Mutual funds and money market accounts are valued as stated above. Common and preferred stocks are valued at the closing price reported on the active market on which the individual securities are traded. Unit investment trusts are valued at NAV calculated as of close of the exchange each day.

Common collective trust ("CCT"): The Plan's CCT is valued based on NAV per share of unit as a practical expedient as reported by the fund manager, multiplied by the number of shares or units held as of the measurement date. Accordingly, these NAV based investments have been excluded from the fair value hierarchy.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan Administrator believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine fair value of certain financial instruments could result in different fair value measurements at the reporting date.

Note 5: TAX STATUS

The Plan utilizes Fidelity Management Trust Company's (the Plan's Trustee) Pre-Approved Defined Contribution Plan. The prototype plan received an opinion letter dated June 30, 2020. Although the Plan has been amended since the date of the opinion letter, the Plan Administrator and the Plan's tax counsel believe that the Plan is designed, and is currently being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and, therefore, believe that the Plan is qualified, and the related trust is tax-exempt.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Note 6: RELATED-PARTY TRANSACTIONS AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Certain plan investments are shares of mutual funds managed by Fidelity Management Trust Company. Fidelity Management Trust Company is the trustee as defined by the Plan, and therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Investments qualifying as party-in-interest transactions were \$49,794,967 and \$39,035,890 as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively. Fees incurred by the Plan for investment management services are included in net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of the investment, as they are paid through revenue sharing, rather than a direct payment. In order to participate in the Fidelity Personal Recordkeeping System / BrokerageLink Account (the self-directed brokerage account), the third party administrator requires an annual maintenance fee and commission on security trades within the FPRS.

Note 7: PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their employer contributions.
