Notes to Financial Statements

Note 1: Plan Description

The following description of American Financing Corporation 401(k) Plan (the “Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan’s provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all non-union employees of American Financing Corporation and American Realty Corp. d/b/a American Home Agents Corp. (collectively referred to as the “Company”), who have met certain eligibility requirements, as defined in the plan document. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as amended.

The Company is the plan administrator and is responsible for oversight of the Plan, and Country Trust Bank serves as the custodian and recordkeeper. Plan management determines the appropriateness of the Plan’s investment offerings and monitors investment performance.

Eligibility

The Plan covers all employees who are 18 years of age and older. There is a three month service requirement and the entry date is the first day of the month after becoming eligible. Employees covered by a collective bargaining agreement are excluded from the Plan.

Contributions

Each year, participants may contribute up to the amount allowed by law of annual compensation, as defined in the Plan, on a pretax or after-tax basis. Deferral contributions and after-tax Roth contributions shall not exceed certain limits set forth by the Internal Revenue Service (“IRS”). Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions (up to \$7,500 in 2024). Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or contribution plan (rollovers). The Company may make discretionary matching contributions equal to a percentage of each participant’s contributions. For the year ended December 31, 2024, the Company did not make a discretionary matching contribution. Contributions are subject to certain limitations.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant’s contributions, Company contributions, allocations of plan earnings and losses, and charged with an allocation of administrative expenses. Allocations are based on participant earnings and losses, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant’s vested account.

Notes to Financial Statements

Note 1: Plan Description (Continued)

Vesting

Participants are vested in their voluntary contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in the Company's matching contribution portion of their accounts, plus actual earnings thereon, is based on years of continuous service. A year of service is credited for which 1,000 hours or more are worked in a plan year. A participant is 100% vested after five years of credited service.

Investment Options

Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan. The Plan currently offers investments in money market and mutual funds as investment options for participants. Participants may change their investment options at any time.

Notes Receivable From Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000, up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50 percent of their vested account balance. Loan terms range from one to five years. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at the Wall Street Journal Prime Rate plus 2%. A loan will carry the same rate of interest throughout its term.

Payment of Benefits

Upon termination of service due to death, disability, or retirement, a participant may elect to receive either a lump-sum amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account, or annual installments as required by minimum distribution rules. For termination of service due to other reasons, a participant may receive the value of the vested interest in his or her account as a lump-sum distribution.

Hardship withdrawals are available if the participant meets certain criteria. Effective January 1, 2019, the Plan adopted the new hardship withdrawal provisions of the Bipartisan Budget Act of 2018 (the "Act"). The Act lifted several restrictions relating to hardship withdrawals, including the elimination of the suspension period for making contributions to the Plan after a hardship withdrawal was taken, elimination of the requirement to exhaust plan loans available before taking a hardship withdrawal, and the inclusion of earnings accrued on elective deferrals when determining the allowable amount of the hardship withdrawal. The plan was formally amended on July 25, 2022.

Forfeited Accounts

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, the balance of the forfeited accounts totaled \$40,467 and \$43,595, respectively. These accounts may be used to pay administrative expenses or to reduce future Company contributions. During the year ended December 31, 2024, forfeitures of \$18,509 were used to pay plan expenses.

SECURE 2.0

The SECURE 2.0 Act of 2022 (“SECURE 2.0”), signed into law on December 29, 2022, makes significant changes to existing law for retirement plans by building upon provisions in the SECURE Act of 2019. SECURE 2.0 introduces new requirements and considerations for plan sponsors that are intended to expand coverage, increase savings, preserve income, and simplify plan rules and administrative procedures. The effective date of the provisions of SECURE 2.0 vary from becoming effective immediately through 2028. Those provisions include both required and optional elements. Management has evaluated those provisions and determined there is no material impact on the Plan. Plan management will determine the optional provisions to elect in the future.

Note 2: Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP).

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The plan administrator determines the Plan’s valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisors and the custodian. See Note 3 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation in the fair value of investments includes the Plan’s gains and losses on investments bought and sold, as well as held, during the year.

Notes Receivable From Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 and 2023. Delinquent participant notes receivable are recorded as benefit payments on the basis of the terms of the plan document.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Administrative Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid directly by the Company and are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants and benefits paid to participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Certain investment-related expenses are included in net change in fair value of investments.

Subsequent Events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 13, 2025, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued. Plan management has not identified any material subsequent events that require reporting or disclosure.

Note 3: Fair Value Measurements

GAAP establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. This hierarchy consists of three broad levels: Level 1 inputs consist of unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets and have the highest priority level; Level 2 inputs consist of observable inputs other than quoted prices for identical assets (Level 1); and Level 3 inputs are unobservable and have the lowest priority. The Plan uses appropriate valuation techniques based on the available inputs to measure the fair value of its investments. When available, the Plan measures fair value using Level 1 inputs because they generally provide the most reliable evidence of fair value. Level 2 inputs are used for investments for which Level 1 inputs were not available. Level 3 inputs would only be used if Level 1 or Level 2 inputs were not available.

The following is a description of the valuation methodology used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodology used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual Funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. The funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily Net Asset Value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Money Market Fund: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. The money market fund is valued at \$1.00 per share.

The preceding methods may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Certain information disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and supplemental schedule, including investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net change in fair value of investments, interest and dividends and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained or derived from information supplied to the plan administrator and certified as complete and accurate by Country Trust Bank, the custodian.

Note 5: Related Party and Party-in-Interest Transactions

Country Trust Bank is the custodian. Newport Group, Inc. was the recordkeeper of the Plan from January 1, 2024 through November 14, 2024. Newport Group Inc. was then acquired by Ascensus, which became the recordkeeper of the plan from November 14, 2024 to December 31, 2024. Transactions with the custodian and recordkeeper qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Wipfli LLP prepares the audit of the plan and is considered a party-in-interest. Fees incurred by the Plan for the investment management services are included in net change in fair value of investments as they are paid through revenue sharing rather than a direct payment. For the year ended December 31, 2024, the Plan made direct payments of \$52,423 to the custodian which were not covered by revenue sharing. The plan sponsor pays directly any other fees related to the Plan's operations.

Notes receivable from participants also qualify as party-in-interest transactions which are exempt from the prohibited transaction rules of ERISA.

Note 6: Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their Company contributions.

Note 7: Tax Status

The Plan utilizes a prototype plan which obtained a favorable opinion letter from the IRS dated November 30, 2020, stating that the prototype plan is qualified under the applicable sections of the Internal Revenue Code. Accordingly, no provision for income taxes has been included in the Plan's financial statements.

GAAP requires plan management to evaluate the tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The plan administrator has analyzed the tax position taken by the Plan and has concluded as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in-progress.

Note 8: Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Because of the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the Statements of Net Assets Available for Benefits.

Note 1: Plan Description

The following description of American Financing Corporation 401(k) Plan (the “Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan’s provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all non-union employees of American Financing Corporation and American Realty Corp. d/b/a American Home Agents Corp. (collectively referred to as the “Company”), who have met certain eligibility requirements, as defined in the plan document. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as amended.

The Company is the plan administrator and is responsible for oversight of the Plan, and Country Trust Bank serves as the custodian and recordkeeper. Plan management determines the appropriateness of the Plan’s investment offerings and monitors investment performance.

Eligibility

The Plan covers all employees who are 18 years of age and older. There is a three month service requirement and the entry date is the first day of the month after becoming eligible. Employees covered by a collective bargaining agreement are excluded from the Plan.

Contributions

Each year, participants may contribute up to the amount allowed by law of annual compensation, as defined in the Plan, on a pretax or after-tax basis. Deferral contributions and after-tax Roth contributions shall not exceed certain limits set forth by the Internal Revenue Service (“IRS”). Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions (up to \$7,500 in 2024). Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or contribution plan (rollovers). The Company may make discretionary matching contributions equal to a percentage of each participant’s contributions. For the year ended December 31, 2024, the Company did not make a discretionary matching contribution. Contributions are subject to certain limitations.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant’s contributions, Company contributions, allocations of plan earnings and losses, and charged with an allocation of administrative expenses. Allocations are based on participant earnings and losses, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant’s vested account.

Vesting

Participants are vested in their voluntary contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in the Company's matching contribution portion of their accounts, plus actual earnings thereon, is based on years of continuous service. A year of service is credited for which 1,000 hours or more are worked in a plan year. A participant is 100% vested after five years of credited service.

Investment Options

Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan. The Plan currently offers investments in money market and mutual funds as investment options for participants. Participants may change their investment options at any time.

Notes Receivable From Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000, up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50 percent of their vested account balance. Loan terms range from one to five years. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at the Wall Street Journal Prime Rate plus 2%. A loan will carry the same rate of interest throughout its term.

Payment of Benefits

Upon termination of service due to death, disability, or retirement, a participant may elect to receive either a lump-sum amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account, or annual installments as required by minimum distribution rules. For termination of service due to other reasons, a participant may receive the value of the vested interest in his or her account as a lump-sum distribution.

Hardship withdrawals are available if the participant meets certain criteria. Effective January 1, 2019, the Plan adopted the new hardship withdrawal provisions of the Bipartisan Budget Act of 2018 (the "Act"). The SECURE 2.0 Act of 2022 (“SECURE 2.0”), signed into law on December 29, 2022, makes significant changes to existing law for retirement plans by building upon provisions in the SECURE Act of 2019. SECURE 2.0 introduces new requirements and considerations for plan sponsors that are intended to expand coverage, increase savings, preserve income, and simplify plan rules and administrative procedures. The effective date of the provisions of SECURE 2.0 vary from becoming effective immediately through 2028. Those provisions include both required and optional elements. Management has evaluated those provisions and determined there is no material impact on the Plan. Plan management will determine the optional provisions to elect in the future.

Note 2: Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP).

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The plan administrator determines the Plan’s valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisors and the custodian. See Note 3 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation in the fair value of investments includes the Plan’s gains and losses on investments bought and sold, as well as held, during the year.

Notes Receivable From Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 and 2023. Delinquent participant notes receivable are recorded as benefit payments on the basis of the terms of the plan document.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Administrative Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid directly by the Company and are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants and benefits paid to participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Certain investment-related expenses are included in net change in fair value of investments.

Subsequent Events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 13, 2025, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued. Plan management has not identified any material subsequent events that require reporting or disclosure.

Note 3: Fair Value Measurements

GAAP establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. This hierarchy consists of three broad levels: Level 1 inputs consist of unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets and have the highest priority level; Level 2 inputs consist of observable inputs other than quoted prices for identical assets (Level 1); and Level 3 inputs are unobservable and have the lowest priority. The Plan uses appropriate valuation techniques based on the available inputs to measure the fair value of its investments. When available, the Plan measures fair value using Level 1 inputs because they generally provide the most reliable evidence of fair value. Level 2 inputs are used for investments for which Level 1 inputs were not available. Level 3 inputs would only be used if Level 1 or Level 2 inputs were not available.

The following is a description of the valuation methodology used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodology used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual Funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. The funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily Net Asset Value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Money Market Fund: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. The money market fund is valued at \$1.00 per share.

Note 3: Fair Value Measurements (Continued)

The preceding methods may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Note 4: Information Prepared and Certified by the Custodian (unaudited)

The plan administrator has elected the method of compliance permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Certain information disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and supplemental schedule, including investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net change in fair value of investments, interest and dividends and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained or derived from information supplied to the plan administrator and certified as complete and accurate by Country Trust Bank, the custodian.

Note 5: Related Party and Party-in-Interest Transactions

Country Trust Bank is the custodian. Newport Group, Inc. was the recordkeeper of the Plan from January 1, 2024 through November 14, 2024. Newport Group Inc. was then acquired by Ascensus, which became the recordkeeper of the plan from November 14, 2024 to December 31, 2024. Transactions with the custodian and recordkeeper qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Wipfli LLP prepares the audit of the plan and is considered a party-in-interest. Fees incurred by the Plan for the investment management services are included in net change in fair value of investments as they are paid through revenue sharing rather than a direct payment. For the year ended December 31, 2024, the Plan made direct payments of \$52,423 to the custodian which were not covered by revenue sharing. The plan sponsor pays directly any other fees related to the Plan's operations.

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Note 7: Tax Status

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GAAP requires plan management to evaluate the tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The plan administrator has analyzed the tax position taken by the Plan and has concluded as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in-progress.

Note 8: Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Because of the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the Statements of Net Assets Available for Benefits.
