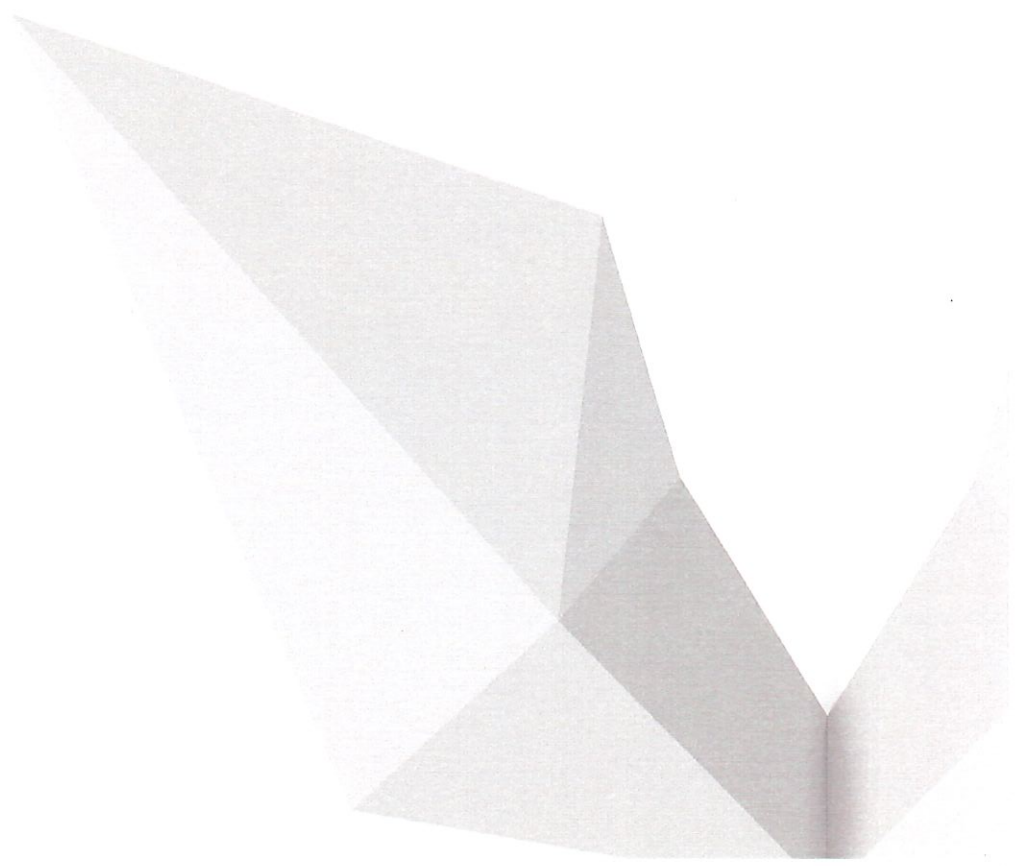

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

Notes to Financial Statements

Note 1: Description of Plan

The following description of the Palmer Johnson Incentive Savings Plan (the "Plan") provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering substantially all employees of Palmer Johnson Enterprises, Inc., Palmer Johnson Power Systems, LLC, Hamilton Engine, LLC, Trident Engineered Solutions, LLC, Alterra Power Systems, LLC, and Continental Engines, LLC (collectively the "Employer"), except employees covered by a collective bargaining agreement, leased employees, or nonresident aliens. Effective January 1, 2024, under SECURE Act 2.0, long-term part-time employees are now eligible to participate if achieving 500 service hours in the previous three consecutive years of service. Eligible employees are able to participate in the Plan immediately upon hire. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as amended.

Effective June 1, 2024, the Plan executed an amendment to allow employees of Continental Engines, LLC to begin participating in the Plan. The Plan completed a transfer of assets on October 1, 2024, from Questco Companies Retirement Plan, a multi-employer plan which Continental Engines, LLC was participating in. The total amount transferred was \$288,761.

Contributions

Participants are allowed to make pretax, after-tax, or a combination of pretax/after-tax contributions to the Plan ranging from 1% to 100% of eligible compensation as defined in the Plan. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. The Plan allows participants to rollover distributions from other qualified retirement plans (rollovers). Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan.

The Plan includes an auto-enrollment provision whereby all newly eligible employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan unless they affirmatively elect not to participate in the Plan. Automatically enrolled participants have their deferral rate set at 6% of eligible compensation. The deferral rate automatically increases by 1% each year up to 12% of eligible compensation.

The Employer may make a discretionary matching contribution based on participant contributions. During the year ended December 31, 2024, the Employer matched 50% of participant contributions up to 6% of eligible compensation. The Employer made discretionary matching contributions totaling \$380,105 during 2024. Rollover contributions are not matched. The Employer may also make a discretionary non-elective contribution to the Plan each year. No discretionary non-elective contribution was made during 2024.

Contributions are subject to certain Internal Revenue Service (IRS) limitations.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and Employer matching contributions, as well as allocations of the Employer's discretionary non-elective contributions and plan earnings (losses). Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting/Forfeitures

Participants are immediately and fully vested in their deferral contributions and rollover contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Participants vest 20% in the Employer's discretionary matching and discretionary non-elective contributions plus allocated earnings thereon after two years of service, with an additional 20% for each year of service thereafter. Full vesting also occurs upon early or normal retirement (as defined by the Plan), disability, and death. Plan forfeitures arise as a result of participants who terminate service with the Employer before becoming 100% vested in the Employer's contributions. All forfeitures are used to reduce Employer contributions or offset Plan expenses. The amount of unallocated forfeitures at December 31, 2024 and 2023 was \$3,359 and \$26, respectively. Forfeitures used to reduce Employer contributions during 2024 totaled \$57,340.

Payment of Benefits

Upon termination of service due to death, disability, or retirement, a participant may receive a single lump-sum payment or installment payments equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in their account. For termination of service for other reasons, a participant may receive the value of the vested interest in his or her account as a lump sum distribution. In addition, hardship distributions out of the participant's voluntary contribution account are permitted if certain criteria are met. The Plan also allows for in-service distributions upon attaining age 59 1/2.

Notes Receivable From Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their account balance. The notes are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at 4.25%-9.50%, which is commensurate with local prevailing rates as determined quarterly by the plan administrator. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Note 2: Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP).

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, and changes therein, and the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results may differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

The Plan's investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation in fair value of investments includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Administrative Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid directly by the Employer and are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the payment of benefits are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses are allocated proportionately to plan participants based on their respective account balances and are included in net appreciation in fair value of investments.

Notes Receivable From Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued, but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. Delinquent participant notes receivable are recorded as benefit payments on the basis of the terms of the plan document.

Subsequent Events

Subsequent events have been evaluated through October 14, 2025, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Effective January 1, 2025, the Plan Sponsor merged substantially all participating employers included in the Plan within Palmer Johnson Power Systems, LLC. No material changes to the operations of the Plan are expected as a result of the merger.

Note 3: Fair Value Measurements

GAAP establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. This hierarchy consists of three broad levels: Level 1 inputs consist of unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets and have the highest priority level; Level 2 inputs consist of observable inputs other than quoted prices for identical assets; Level 3 inputs are unobservable and have the lowest priority. The Plan uses appropriate valuation techniques based on the available inputs to measure the fair value of its investments. When available, the Plan measures fair value using Level 1 inputs because they generally provide the most reliable evidence of fair value. Level 2 inputs are used for investments for which Level 1 inputs were not available. Level 3 inputs would only be used if Level 1 or Level 2 inputs were not available. There are no plan assets requiring the use of Level 2 or 3 inputs for the periods presented.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual Funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Common Collective Trust: Valued at the NAV of units of an investment trust fund. The NAV, as provided by the custodian, is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value and is based on the fair value of the underlying assets and liabilities of the fund. Fund unit sales and repurchases occur on a daily basis at the NAV per share determined at the close of each business day. The Plan has no obligation to buy any additional units.

Note 4: Information Prepared and Certified by Trustee

The plan administrator has elected the method of annual reporting compliance permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974. Certain information disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and supplemental schedule, including investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation in fair value of investments, and interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained or derived from information supplied to the plan administrator and certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company, the Trustee of the Plan.

Note 5: Party-in-Interest Transactions

Certain Plan investments are managed by an affiliate of Fidelity Management Trust Company. Fidelity Management Trust Company is the Trustee as defined by the Plan; therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Fees incurred by the Plan for investment management services are included in net appreciation in fair value of investments as they are paid through revenue sharing rather than a direct payment. The Plan made direct payments to the Trustee of \$17,184 and \$56,090 to the investment advisor which were not covered by revenue sharing for the year ended December 31, 2024. The Employer pays directly any other fees related to the Plan's operations. Notes receivable from participants also qualify as party-in-interest transactions, which are exempt from the prohibited transaction rules of ERISA.

Note 6: Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Employer has the right under the Plan's provisions to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of plan termination, participants will become 100% vested in the Employer contribution portion of their account.

Note 7: Tax Status

The Employer has adopted a non-standardized pre-approved plan, which the IRS has determined to be qualified under Section 401(k) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). The Plan has been amended since receiving the opinion letter; however, the plan administrator believes the Plan is designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and has no income subject to unrelated business income tax. Therefore, no provision for income taxes has been included in the Plan's financial statements.

Note 8: Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

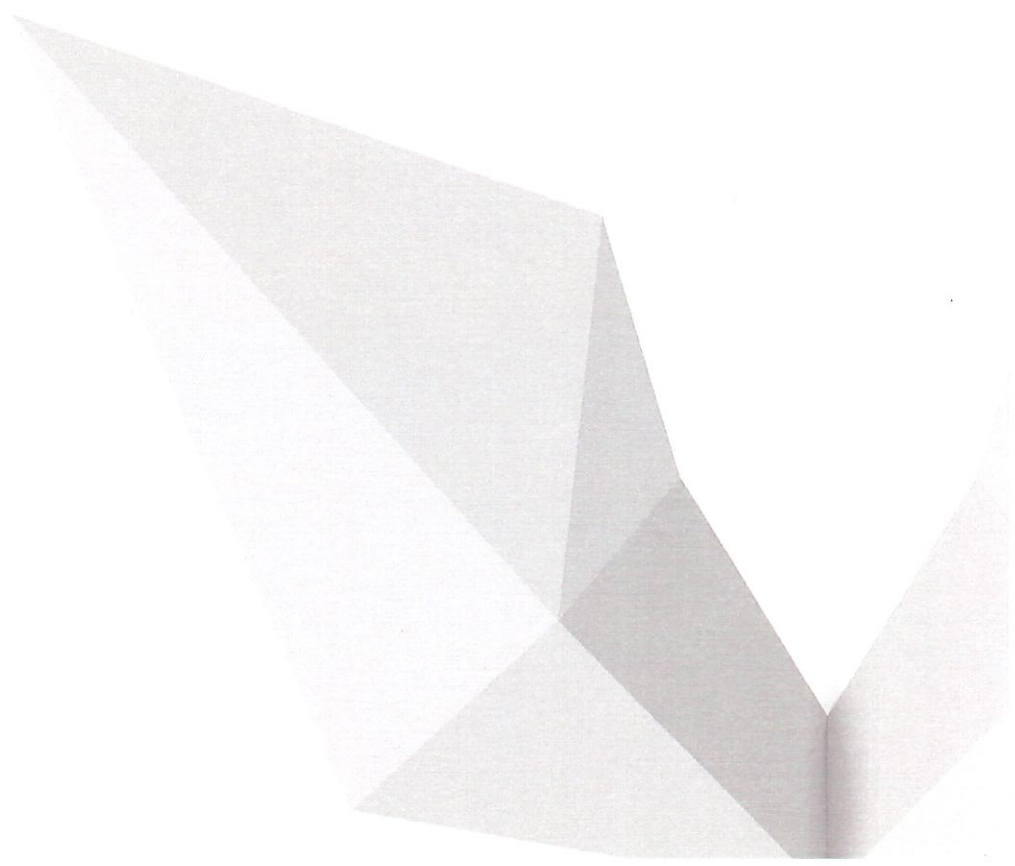

Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.

Notes to Financial Statements

Note 1: Description of Plan

The following description of the Palmer Johnson Incentive Savings Plan (the "Plan") provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering substantially all employees of Palmer Johnson Enterprises, Inc., Palmer Johnson Power Systems, LLC, Hamilton Engine, LLC, Trident Engineered Solutions, LLC, Alterra Power Systems, LLC, and Continental Engines, LLC (collectively the "Employer"), except employees covered by a collective bargaining agreement, leased employees, or nonresident aliens. Effective January 1, 2024, under SECURE Act 2.0, long-term part-time employees are now eligible to participate if achieving 500 service hours in the previous three consecutive years of service. Eligible employees are able to participate in the Plan immediately upon hire. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as amended.

Effective June 1, 2024, the Plan executed an amendment to allow employees of Continental Engines, LLC to begin participating in the Plan. The Plan completed a transfer of assets on October 1, 2024, from Questco Companies Retirement Plan, a multi-employer plan which Continental Engines, LLC was participating in. The total amount transferred was \$288,761.

Contributions

Participants are allowed to make pretax, after-tax, or a combination of pretax/after-tax contributions to the Plan ranging from 1% to 100% of eligible compensation as defined in the Plan. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. The Plan allows participants to rollover distributions from other qualified retirement plans (rollovers). Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan.

The Plan includes an auto-enrollment provision whereby all newly eligible employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan unless they affirmatively elect not to participate in the Plan. Automatically enrolled participants have their deferral rate set at 6% of eligible compensation. The deferral rate automatically increases by 1% each year up to 12% of eligible compensation.

The Employer may make a discretionary matching contribution based on participant contributions. During the year ended December 31, 2024, the Employer matched 50% of participant contributions up to 6% of eligible compensation. The Employer made discretionary matching contributions totaling \$380,105 during 2024. Rollover contributions are not matched. The Employer may also make a discretionary non-elective contribution to the Plan each year. No discretionary non-elective contribution was made during 2024.

Contributions are subject to certain Internal Revenue Service (IRS) limitations.

Note 1: Description of Plan (Continued)

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and Employer matching contributions, as well as allocations of the Employer's discretionary non-elective contributions and plan earnings (losses). Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting/Forfeitures

Participants are immediately and fully vested in their deferral contributions and rollover contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Participants vest 20% in the Employer's discretionary matching and discretionary non-elective contributions plus allocated earnings thereon after two years of service, with an additional 20% for each year of service thereafter. Full vesting also occurs upon early or normal retirement (as defined by the Plan), disability, and death. Plan forfeitures arise as a result of participants who terminate service with the Employer before becoming 100% vested in the Employer's contributions. All forfeitures are used to reduce Employer contributions or offset Plan expenses. The amount of unallocated forfeitures at December 31, 2024 and 2023 was \$3,359 and \$26, respectively. Forfeitures used to reduce Employer contributions during 2024 totaled \$57,340.

Payment of Benefits

Upon termination of service due to death, disability, or retirement, a participant may receive a single lump-sum payment or installment payments equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in their account. For termination of service for other reasons, a participant may receive the value of the vested interest in his or her account as a lump sum distribution. In addition, hardship distributions out of the participant's voluntary contribution account are permitted if certain criteria are met. The Plan also allows for in-service distributions upon attaining age 59 1/2.

Notes Receivable From Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their account balance. The notes are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at 4.25%-9.50%, which is commensurate with local prevailing rates as determined quarterly by the plan administrator. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Note 2: Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP).

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, and changes therein, and the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results may differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

The Plan's investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation in fair value of investments includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Administrative Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid directly by the Employer and are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the payment of benefits are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses are allocated proportionately to plan participants based on their respective account balances and are included in net appreciation in fair value of investments.

Notes Receivable From Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued, but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. Delinquent participant notes receivable are recorded as benefit payments on the basis of the terms of the plan document.

Note 2: Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Subsequent Events

Subsequent events have been evaluated through October 14, 2025, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Effective January 1, 2025, the Plan Sponsor merged substantially all participating employers included in the Plan within Palmer Johnson Power Systems, LLC. No material changes to the operations of the Plan are expected as a result of the merger.

Note 3: Fair Value Measurements

GAAP establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. This hierarchy consists of three broad levels: Level 1 inputs consist of unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets and have the highest priority level; Level 2 inputs consist of observable inputs other than quoted prices for identical assets; Level 3 inputs are unobservable and have the lowest priority. The Plan uses appropriate valuation techniques based on the available inputs to measure the fair value of its investments. When available, the Plan measures fair value using Level 1 inputs because they generally provide the most reliable evidence of fair value. Level 2 inputs are used for investments for which Level 1 inputs were not available. Level 3 inputs would only be used if Level 1 or Level 2 inputs were not available. There are no plan assets requiring the use of Level 2 or 3 inputs for the periods presented.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual Funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Common Collective Trust: Valued at the NAV of units of an investment trust fund. The NAV, as provided by the custodian, is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value and is based on the fair value of the underlying assets and liabilities of the fund. Fund unit sales and repurchases occur on a daily basis at the NAV per share determined at the close of each business day. The Plan has no obligation to buy any additional units.

Note 4: Information Prepared and Certified by Trustee

The plan administrator has elected the method of annual reporting compliance permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974. Certain information disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and supplemental schedule, including investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation in fair value of investments, and interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained or derived from information supplied to the plan administrator and certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company, the Trustee of the Plan.

Note 5: Party-in-Interest Transactions

Certain Plan investments are managed by an affiliate of Fidelity Management Trust Company. Fidelity Management Trust Company is the Trustee as defined by the Plan; therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Fees incurred by the Plan for investment management services are included in net appreciation in fair value of investments as they are paid through revenue sharing rather than a direct payment. The Plan made direct payments to the Trustee of \$17,184 and \$56,090 to the investment advisor which were not covered by revenue sharing for the year ended December 31, 2024. The Employer pays directly any other fees related to the Plan's operations. Notes receivable from participants also qualify as party-in-interest transactions, which are exempt from the prohibited transaction rules of ERISA.

Note 6: Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Employer has the right under the Plan's provisions to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of plan termination, participants will become 100% vested in the Employer contribution portion of their account.

Note 7: Tax Status

The Employer has adopted a non-standardized pre-approved plan, which the IRS has determined to be qualified under Section 401(k) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). The Plan has been amended since receiving the opinion letter; however, the plan administrator believes the Plan is designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and has no income subject to unrelated business income tax. Therefore, no provision for income taxes has been included in the Plan's financial statements.

Note 8: Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.
