NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. Description of Plan

The following description of the Mauser Packaging Solutions 401(k) Plan (the “Plan”) is provided for general information purposes only. Participants should refer to the plan document for more complete information.

- A. *General.* The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering substantially all full-time employees of Mauser Packaging Solutions (the “Company” or “Plan Sponsor”). The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (“ERISA”), as amended.

Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act. The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (“CARES Act”) was signed into law on March 27, 2020. The CARES Act allowed retirement plans to provide participants who were impacted by the coronavirus (as defined in the CARES Act) with greater access to their savings. The ability to utilize the provisions of the CARES Act ceased as of December 31, 2020. Management has until December 31, 2026 to amend the Plan document for the provisions it adopted.

SECURE 2.0 Act. The Securing a Strong Retirement Act (SECURE 2.0 Act) was signed into law on December 29, 2022, and includes mandatory and optional provisions with varying effective dates in 2023 and later. In 2024, the Plan Sponsor adopted the following provisions, and the Plan document was amended accordingly.

- Effective May 20, 2024, the Plan permits qualified disaster recovery distributions.
- Effective October 2, 2024, the Plan Sponsor adopted the auto-portability provision.
- Effective October 2, 2024, the automatic cash-out threshold was increased to \$7,000.

The Plan Sponsor will determine other optional provisions to elect and amend the Plan document accordingly.

- B. *Contributions.* The Plan is open to employees upon commencement of service and allows participants to make pretax and after-tax deferral contributions to the Plan. If an election is not made participants are auto enrolled at 2% of compensation. For participants auto enrolling prior to 2019, their deferral rate auto escalated to 4% of compensation after one year of service, unless the participant elected otherwise. For participants auto enrolling in 2019 and later, their deferral rates auto escalate by 1% of compensation with each additional year of service until 6% of compensation is reached, unless the participant elects otherwise. The participant may elect not to be automatically enrolled at the beginning of their service.

The Company matches 100% of the first 4% contributed by a participant after the first year of service. The total matching contributions for a participant under this Plan cannot exceed 4% of the participant’s compensation for the Plan year. Matching contributions totaled \$10,446,733 for the year ended December 31, 2024. The plan agreement allows the Company to contribute an additional, discretionary amount as determined by its Board of Directors as a profit-sharing contribution. No discretionary contribution was made for the year ended December 31, 2024.

- C. *Related Plan Transfers.* Related plan transfers are transfers of participant balances resulting from employee changes in job classification within the Company. There was \$139,716 of transfers into the Plan and \$72,615 of transfers out of the Plan during the year ended December 31, 2024.

- D. *Investments*. Participants direct the investment of their contributions and company contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan.
- E. *Participants' Accounts*. Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution and the Company's matching and discretionary contributions and plan earnings and charged with any withdrawals or distributions and plan losses. Profit-sharing contributions are allocated to the participants' accounts based on a ratio of the participant's compensation to total compensation for the plan year.
- F. *Vesting*. All participants in the Plan are fully vested in their employee and matching contributions, plus the earnings thereon. A participant whose employment is terminated for any reason other than retirement, death, or disability generally shall have a vested and nonforfeitable right in the Company's discretionary profit-sharing contributions and any earnings thereon as follows:

- G. *Notes Receivable from Participants*. Participants may borrow from their accounts for up to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of the vested amounts credited to their individual accounts. Loans are generally required to be repaid within five to fifteen years from the date on which the loan is made and bear a rate of interest which is commensurate with the prevailing interest charged by professional lenders for similarly secured personal loans. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account.
- H. *Distributions*. Upon written request and approval, participants may withdraw from the Plan some or all of the 401(k) deferral amounts in their employee savings account if the withdrawal is necessary due to hardship. In addition, a participant may be permitted to withdraw from the Plan upon attaining the age of 59-1/2.

A participant's contributions, the employer matching contribution, and the vested portion of the Company's discretionary profit-sharing contributions plus any earnings may be withdrawn upon retirement, disability, termination of employment, or death.

- I. *Forfeited Accounts*. As of December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts, including returned uncashed distribution checks, totaled \$151,994 and \$435,729, respectively. Forfeited nonvested accounts are available to reduce future employer contributions, to pay plan expenses, and, for portions attributable to returned uncashed distribution checks, to pay claims for such payments by former participants. In 2024, \$385,004 of forfeitures were used to reduce employer's contributions and \$23,353 was used to reissue uncashed distribution checks.

J. *Plan Amendments.* On May 21, 2024, the Plan was amended to allow Roth elective deferrals and rollovers, and in-plan Roth rollovers and transfers, effective January 1, 2024 and January 30, 2024 respectively.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

A. *Basis of Accounting.* The accompanying financial statements of the Plan have been prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

B. *Investment Valuation and Income Recognition.* The Plan's investments are stated at fair value. The fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Plan's Investment Committee determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by its investment advisers and plan trustee (See Note 4). Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade date basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Realized and unrealized investment gains and losses are included in net appreciation in fair value of investments in the accompanying financial statements.

C. *Notes Receivable from Participants.* Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Delinquent notes are reclassified as distributions based on the terms of the plan document. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 or 2023.

D. *Payment of Benefits.* Benefit payments to participants are recorded upon distribution.

E. *Administrative Expenses.* Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid directly by the Company and are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in loan balances. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation of fair value of investments.

F. *Use of Estimates.* The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires the plan administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates.

3. Information Certified by the Plan's Trustee

The plan administrator has elected to have the audit of Mauser Packaging Solutions 401(k) Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Accordingly, Vanguard Fiduciary Trust Company, the trustee of the Plan, has certified to the completeness and accuracy of all investments and the notes receivable from participants reflected on the accompanying statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, the related investment activity and interest from notes receivable from participants reflected in the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the investments and notes receivable from participants on the schedule of assets (held at end of year).

4. Fair Value Measurements

FASB ASC 820, *Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures*, establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described below:

Basis of Fair Value Measurement:

- Level 1 Unadjusted quoted prices in active markets that are accessible at the measurement date for identical, unrestricted assets or liabilities;
- Level 2 Quoted prices in markets that are not considered to be active or financial instruments for which all significant inputs are observable, either directly or indirectly;
- Level 3 Prices or valuations that require inputs that are both significant to the fair value measurement and unobservable.

A financial instrument's level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement.

The following discussion describes the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value on a recurring basis. The techniques utilized in estimating the fair values of financial instruments are reliant on the assumptions used. Care should be exercised in deriving conclusions based on the fair value information of financial instruments presented below.

Fair value estimates are made as of a specific point in time, based on available market information and judgments about the financial instrument. Such estimates do not consider the tax impact of the realization of unrealized gains or losses. In addition, the disclosed fair values may not be realized in the immediate settlement of the financial instrument. We did not make any significant changes to our valuation process during 2024.

Mutual Funds – The mutual funds are held as individual plan assets. The mutual funds have publicly available prices that are quoted daily in active markets.

Collective Investment Trusts – The Plan uses net asset value (NAV) per unit to value the collective trust fund. The NAV, as provided by the trustees, is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. The NAV is based on the fair value of the underlying investments held by the fund less its liabilities divided by the number of units outstanding. This practical expedient is not used when it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different than the reported NAV.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

5. Related-Party Transactions and Party in Interest Transactions

A related party is any party who can control or significantly influence Plan management or operating policies. Parties-in-interest are defined under DOL regulations as any employees of the Plan, fiduciaries of the Plan, service providers to the Plan, the employer whose employees are covered by the Plan, and certain significant owners of the employer and their relatives. Service providers may include, but are not limited to, the custodian, trustee, third-party administrator (TPA), investment managers, investment advisors, legal counsel, and Plan auditor.

The Plan invests in shares of funds managed by an affiliate of Vanguard Fiduciary Trust Company, the trustee of the Plan. Therefore, transactions in such investments qualify as party in interest transactions.

Fees incurred by the Plan for the investment management services are included in the net appreciation in fair value of investments, as they are paid using investment earnings, rather than direct payment. During 2024, administrative expenses of \$632,535, including investment advisory fees, professional fees, and recordkeeping services, were paid by the Plan and are exempt party in interest transactions. Certain other administrative expenses of the Plan are absorbed by the Plan's sponsor; therefore, these administrative expenses are not reflected in these statements.

6. Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intention to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan, subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants will become fully vested in their accounts.

7. Tax Status

The IRS has determined and informed the Plan sponsor by a letter dated March 27, 2018, that the Plan and related trust are designed in accordance with applicable sections of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). Although the Plan has been amended since receiving the determination letter, the Plan administrator and the Plan's tax counsel believe that the Plan is designed, and is currently being operated, in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and, therefore, believe that the Plan is qualified, and the related trust is tax-exempt.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the Internal Revenue Service. The plan administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and concluded that as of December 31, 2024, there were no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

8. Risk and Uncertainties

The Plan provides various investment options. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risks associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will

10. Delinquent Participant Contributions

As required by ERISA Section 2510.3-102, the Plan sponsor is required to segregate employee contributions and loan repayments to the Plan from its general assets as soon as practicable. The Plan has contribution totaling \$12,922, all of which represented employee salary deferrals and loan repayments, that were not remitted timely. These contributions are considered prohibited transaction.

The Company will calculate lost investment earnings and file Form 5330, as applicable, and expects to compensate the Plan for the lost earnings in 2025.

11. Subsequent Events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 10, 2025, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued; no material events were identified which require disclosure in or adjustment to the financial statements.
