INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Retirement Plan Committee
Atara Bio 401(k) Plan

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audits

We have performed audits of the accompanying financial statements of Atara Bio 401(k) Plan, an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) ("ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit"). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of Atara Bio 401(k) Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audits need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the plan (investment information) by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA (qualified institution).

Management has obtained certifications from a qualified institution as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the year ended December 31, 2024, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note 3 to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Opinion

In our opinion, based on our audits and on the procedures performed as described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audits of the Financial Statements section:

- the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements referred to above, other than those agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.
- the information in the financial statements referred to above related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audits of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of Atara Bio 401(k) Plan and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Emphasis of Matter - Substantial Doubt About the Entity's Ability to Continue as a Going Concern

We draw attention to Note 1 in the financial statements, which indicates that the Plan Sponsor, Atara Biotherapeutics, Inc., has experienced significant financial difficulties, including recurring losses and liquidity constraints. These conditions raise substantial doubt about the Company's ability to continue as a going concern, which may impact the continued operation of the Atara Bio 401(k) Plan. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. Management's election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audits does not affect management's responsibility for the financial statements.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Atara Bio 401(k) Plan's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

Management is also responsible for maintaining a current plan instrument, including all plan amendments, administering the plan, and determining that the plan's transactions that are presented and disclosed in the financial statements are in conformity with the plan's provisions, including maintaining sufficient records with respect to each of the participants, to determine the benefits due or which may become due to such participants.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audits of the Financial Statements

Except as described in the Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audits section of our report, our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing audits in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audits.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audits in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Atara Bio 401(k) Plan's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.

Our audits did not extend to the certified investment information, except for obtaining and reading the certification, comparing the certified investment information with the related information presented and disclosed in the financial statements, and reading the disclosures relating to the certified investment information to assess whether they are in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements of accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

1. DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

The following description of the Atara Bio 401(k) Plan (the "Plan") provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan documents for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan, a defined contribution savings plan sponsored by Atara Biotherapeutics, Inc. (the "Company", "Plan Sponsor" or "Employer"), pursuant to Section 401(a) and related provisions of the Internal Revenue Code ("IRC"), was established on January 1, 2015, and restated effective August 17, 2021. The Plan is designed to provide participants with a means to defer a portion of their compensation for retirement and to provide benefits in the event of disability, death, termination or financial hardship. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 ("ERISA") and subsequent amendments.

The Plan Sponsor has identified conditions and events that raise substantial doubt about its ability to continue as a going concern within one year from the date the financial statements are available to be issued. These conditions include recurring losses, liquidity constraints, and uncertainty regarding the Plan Sponsor's ability to obtain additional financing. The Plan relies on the Plan Sponsor for administrative support and Employer contributions. If the Plan Sponsor is unable to continue operations, the Plan may be impacted through the discontinuation of Employer contributions, potential termination of the Plan, subject to ERISA and Internal Revenue Service ("IRS") regulations or liquidation of the Plan assets. Management has developed plans intended to mitigate these conditions, including cost reductions, restructuring efforts, and negotiations for additional financing. However, the effectiveness of these plans remains uncertain. Accordingly, substantial doubt exists regarding the Plan Sponsor's ability to continue as a going concern, which may have a material adverse effect on the future operations of the Plan.

Effective March 27, 2020, the Plan administratively adopted the provisions of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security ("CARES") Act, related to participant loans and distributions. The Company has until December 31, 2026, to amend the Plan for changes allowed by the CARES Act. The Plan has not been formally amended to adopt these provisions as of the date the financial statements are available to be issued.

An expansion of Setting Every Community Up for Retirement Enhancement Act of 2019 ("SECURE 2.0") was signed into law on December 29, 2022, as part of the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023. The effective dates of provisions within SECURE 2.0 vary through 2026. The Company has until the end of the first Plan year beginning on or after January 1, 2026, to amend the Plan for the changes related to SECURE 2.0. The Plan has not been formally amended to adopt these provisions as of the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Plan administration

The Company is the administrator of the Plan and, as such, carries out the duties imposed by ERISA. The Company has delegated certain responsibilities for the operation and administration of the Plan. Fidelity Management Trust Company ("Fidelity" or the "Trustee") is the Trustee of the Plan and Fidelity Workplace Services, an affiliate of the Trustee, is the Plan's recordkeeper.

Eligibility

Most employees of the Company are eligible to participate in the Plan immediately upon hire. Excluded employees, are described as interns, part-time employees, temporary employees, residents of Puerto Rico, and independent contractors.

Participant contributions

The Plan allows eligible participants to elect to have the Company withhold up to 90% of their eligible compensation as pre-tax or after-tax (as Roth) contributions to the Plan up to the amounts allowable under the Plan and the IRC. Participants who have attained the age of 50 before the close of the Plan year are eligible to make additional catch-up contributions. Contributions withheld are invested in accordance with the participant's direction. Participants are also allowed to make rollover contributions received from other tax-qualified employer-sponsored retirement plans. Such contributions are deposited in the appropriate investment funds in accordance with the participant's direction and the Plan's provisions.

Unless affirmatively elected otherwise, newly eligible employees will be automatically enrolled into the Plan with an initial pre-tax contribution rate of 6%.

Employer contributions

The Company may make a discretionary matching or profit sharing contribution on behalf of each eligible participant who made salary deferral contributions during the year. The Company authorized a discretionary matching Employer contribution equal to 50% of participant elective deferrals up to 6% of eligible compensation up to a maximum of \$10,350. Participants must be employed on the last day of the Plan year to receive discretionary Employer profit sharing contributions. No discretionary Employer profit sharing contributions were made for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Participant accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions, rollover contributions, Employer contributions, if any, Plan earnings, and charged with Plan losses and an allocation of administrative expenses. Allocations are based on participant earnings or account balances, as defined in the plan document. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Forfeited accounts

Forfeitures may occur as a result of excess Employer contributions or forfeited non-vested Employer contributions. The Plan provides that forfeited accounts may be used to reduce future Employer contributions or to pay Plan administrative expenses. Total forfeited nonvested accounts as of December 31, 2024 and 2023 totaled \$4,412 and \$895, respectively. No forfeitures were used to reduce discretionary matching Employer contributions or to pay Plan administrative expenses for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their contributions and discretionary matching Employer contributions, plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in the Company's discretionary profit sharing contributions is based on years of service, as defined. In the event of retirement, disability or death, participants become fully vested in their entire account.

The vesting schedule for the Employer discretionary profit sharing contribution is as follows:

Notes receivable from participants

Under the terms of the Plan, participants may borrow from their accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50 percent of their vested account balance. The notes receivable from participants (or "participant loans") are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at a fixed rate equal to the prime rate, as reported by Thomson Reuters, effective the first day of the month in which the loan is approved, plus 1%. The repayment period of any participant loan shall be no more than five years, but may exceed five years if the purpose of the loan is to purchase a principal residence. A participant may have one loan outstanding at any given time. Principal and interest is paid ratably through monthly payroll deductions. Participant loans outstanding at December 31, 2024, bear interest at rates ranging from 3.25% to 9.50%, and mature at various dates through July 2051.

Payment of benefits

Distributions and withdrawals are payable to participants upon retirement, termination, attainment of age 59 ½, financial hardship, disability, qualified reservist being ordered to military active duty, or to a beneficiary upon a participant's death, as defined by the plan documents. If a participant's account balance is less than or equal to \$1,000 upon termination, the balance is distributed in a lump-sum cash payment unless a direct rollover into another qualified benefit plan is requested. Upon termination, balances greater than \$1,000 and less than or equal to \$5,000 will be rolled over to an individual retirement plan designated by the administrator if the participant has not requested a lump-sum cash payment or a direct rollover into another qualified benefit plan. If the account balance is over \$5,000 upon termination, the participant can consent to either a distribution paid in the form of a lump-sum cash payment, installment payments, partial payments, a direct rollover into another qualified plan, or postpone payment to a later date and remain in the Plan as described in the plan documents.

Upon attaining the age of 59 ½, the participant may, while still employed by the Company, request a withdrawal from their account balance. Hardship and qualified reservist distributions are permitted under limited circumstances as defined in the plan documents.

Administrative expenses

Certain administrative expenses of the Plan, including record-keeping and audit fees, were paid directly by the Company for the year ended December 31, 2024. The Plan is not required to reimburse the Company for such expenses paid by the Company on its behalf. Investment fees, which may vary according to the individual investment options selected, are paid out of the assets of the Plan.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting and financial statement presentation

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared under the accrual method of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("U.S. GAAP") and in accordance with provisions of ERISA.

Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. GAAP requires the plan administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates. Significant estimates and assumptions include the fair value of investments.

Risks and uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near-term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits and the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits.

Investment valuation and income recognition

The Plan's investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Contributions and contributions receivable

Contributions from participants are recorded based on the date the contributions have been separated from a participant's pay by the Company, which is the pay date. Employer matching and profit sharing contributions are recorded in the year they are earned. The Plan records receivables from contributions based upon the contributions recognized, less amounts received by the Plan as of the last day of the Plan year.

Rollover contributions from participants are recorded based on the date the rollover contributions have been received by the Trustee.

Notes receivable from participants

Participant loans are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income on notes receivable from participants is recorded when it is earned. If a participant ceases to make loan repayments and the participant loan is determined to be a distribution, the participant loan balance is reduced and a benefit payment is recorded.

Payment of benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Administrative expenses

Administrative expenses are recorded when incurred.

Subsequent events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 13, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued. No subsequent events have occurred that would have a material impact on the presentation of the Plan's financial statements.

3. INFORMATION PREPARED AND CERTIFIED BY THE TRUSTEE (UNAUDITED)

The plan administrator, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of the Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of ERISA. Accordingly, the Trustee, determined to be a qualified institution by the plan administrator, has certified to the completeness and accuracy of:

- Investments, and notes receivable from participants reflected on the accompanying statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023;
- Net appreciation in fair value of investments, interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants reflected on the accompanying statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024;
- Investments and notes receivable from participants reflected on the schedule of assets (held at end of year) as of December 31, 2024 ("supplemental schedule").

Accordingly, as requested by the Plan administrator, the Plan's auditor performed no audit procedures on the certified information other than to agree the certified information to the related information included in the financial statements and supplemental schedule.

4. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Accounting standards establish a framework for measuring fair value. That framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described as follows:

- *Level 1* - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.
- *Level 2* - Inputs to the valuation methodology include: quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets; quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets; inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; and other inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

- *Level 3* - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Stable value collective investment trust: A stable value fund that is composed primarily of fully benefit-responsive investment contracts that is valued at the NAV of units of the bank collective trust. The NAV is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value as reported by the fund issuer. This practical expedient would not be used if it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different from the reported NAV. Participant transactions (purchases and sales) may occur daily. If the Plan initiates a full redemption of the collective trust at the Plan level, the issuer reserves the right to require 12 months notification in order to ensure that securities liquidations will be carried out in an orderly business manner.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

5. TAX STATUS

The Plan adopted the Fidelity Volume Submitter Profit Sharing Plan Basic Plan Document No. 17 (the "volume submitter plan"). The IRS issued an opinion letter to the volume submitter plan dated June 30, 2020, stating that the volume submitter plan is designed in accordance with the applicable sections of the IRC and is appropriate for use by employers for the benefit of their employees. The Plan is required to operate in conformity with the IRC to maintain its tax preferred status. The Plan administrator believes that the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and therefore, believes that the Plan is qualified and is tax-exempt. Therefore, no provision for income taxes has been included in the Plan's financial statements.

6. PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. As a result of significant workforce reductions; the Plan underwent a partial plan termination. Affected participants became fully vested in all applicable contributions as a result of the partial plan termination.

7. RELATED PARTY AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

ERISA defines parties-in-interest similarly to a related party as defined under financial accounting standards, except that ERISA's definition is broader and includes all entities and individuals that provide services to the Plan; however, these entities may not necessarily be related parties. Plan management did not identify any related parties to the Plan that were not also considered to be parties-in-interest.

Party-in-interest transactions include those with fiduciaries or employees of the Plan, any person who provides services to the Plan, an employer whose employees are covered by the Plan, and an employee organization whose members are covered by the Plan, a person who owns 50 percent or more of such an employer or employee association or relatives of such persons.

The Company pays certain fees and expenses on behalf of the Plan. These transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. The Plan is not required to repay expenses paid by the Company on its behalf. The Plan has included in its investment fund options certain funds managed by the Trustee or one of its affiliates. Transactions in these funds are considered party-in-interest transactions under ERISA. Such transactions are permitted under provisions of the Plan and are specifically exempt from prohibition of party-in-interest transactions under ERISA.

The Trustee utilizes omnibus accounts at unaffiliated banks to facilitate transactions for the plans it services and commingles funds in transit to or from the Plan, including other funds similarly in transit to or from other plans. These omnibus account balances are invested in short-term investments with the aim of earning a rate approximating the Target Federal Funds Rate and/or money market rates. The Trustee uses these earnings to pay bank fees associated with the Plan's transactions and retains any float earnings that exceed such fees and adjustments as compensation for its services. The Trustee will pay any fees to the extent they exceed float earnings.

Certain fund level fees incurred by the funds in which the Plan invests for such services as investment management and shareholder services are paid through fund level revenue sharing arrangements. These fees reduce fund earnings, thereby impacting Plan revenue applied to participants' accounts.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Retirement Plan Committee
Atara Bio 401(k) Plan

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audits

We have performed audits of the accompanying financial statements of Atara Bio 401(k) Plan, an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) ("ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit"). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of Atara Bio 401(k) Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audits need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the plan (investment information) by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA (qualified institution).

Management has obtained certifications from a qualified institution as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the year ended December 31, 2024, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note 3 to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Opinion

In our opinion, based on our audits and on the procedures performed as described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audits of the Financial Statements section:

- the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements referred to above, other than those agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.
- the information in the financial statements referred to above related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audits of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of Atara Bio 401(k) Plan and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Emphasis of Matter - Substantial Doubt About the Entity's Ability to Continue as a Going Concern

We draw attention to Note 1 in the financial statements, which indicates that the Plan Sponsor, Atara Biotherapeutics, Inc., has experienced significant financial difficulties, including recurring losses and liquidity constraints. These conditions raise substantial doubt about the Company's ability to continue as a going concern, which may impact the continued operation of the Atara Bio 401(k) Plan. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. Management's election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audits does not affect management's responsibility for the financial statements.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Atara Bio 401(k) Plan's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

Management is also responsible for maintaining a current plan instrument, including all plan amendments, administering the plan, and determining that the plan's transactions that are presented and disclosed in the financial statements are in conformity with the plan's provisions, including maintaining sufficient records with respect to each of the participants, to determine the benefits due or which may become due to such participants.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audits of the Financial Statements

Except as described in the Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audits section of our report, our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing audits in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audits.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audits in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Atara Bio 401(k) Plan's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.

Our audits did not extend to the certified investment information, except for obtaining and reading the certification, comparing the certified investment information with the related information presented and disclosed in the financial statements, and reading the disclosures relating to the certified investment information to assess whether they are in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements of accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audits, significant audit findings, and certain internal control related matters that we identified during the audits.

Other Matter - Supplemental Schedules Required by ERISA

The supplemental schedules of delinquent participant contributions for the year ended December 31, 2024, and of assets (held at end of year) as of December 31, 2024, ("supplemental schedule") are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the financial statements but are supplementary information required by the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information included in the supplemental schedules, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audits of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. For information included in the supplemental schedules that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, we compared such information to the related certified investment information.

In forming our opinion on the supplemental schedules, we evaluated whether the supplemental schedules, other than the information agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, including their form and content, are presented in conformity with the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

In our opinion:

- the form and content of the supplemental schedules, other than the information in the supplemental schedules that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, are presented, in all material respects, in conformity with the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.
- the information in the supplemental schedules related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

1. DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

The following description of the Atara Bio 401(k) Plan (the "Plan") provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan documents for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan, a defined contribution savings plan sponsored by Atara Biotherapeutics, Inc. (the "Company", "Plan Sponsor" or "Employer"), pursuant to Section 401(a) and related provisions of the Internal Revenue Code ("IRC"), was established on January 1, 2015, and restated effective August 17, 2021. The Plan is designed to provide participants with a means to defer a portion of their compensation for retirement and to provide benefits in the event of disability, death, termination or financial hardship. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 ("ERISA") and subsequent amendments.

The Plan Sponsor has identified conditions and events that raise substantial doubt about its ability to continue as a going concern within one year from the date the financial statements are available to be issued. These conditions include recurring losses, liquidity constraints, and uncertainty regarding the Plan Sponsor's ability to obtain additional financing. The Plan relies on the Plan Sponsor for administrative support and Employer contributions. If the Plan Sponsor is unable to continue operations, the Plan may be impacted through the discontinuation of Employer contributions, potential termination of the Plan, subject to ERISA and Internal Revenue Service ("IRS") regulations or liquidation of the Plan assets. Management has developed plans intended to mitigate these conditions, including cost reductions, restructuring efforts, and negotiations for additional financing. However, the effectiveness of these plans remains uncertain. Accordingly, substantial doubt exists regarding the Plan Sponsor's ability to continue as a going concern, which may have a material adverse effect on the future operations of the Plan.

Effective March 27, 2020, the Plan administratively adopted the provisions of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security ("CARES") Act, related to participant loans and distributions. The Company has until December 31, 2026, to amend the Plan for changes allowed by the CARES Act. The Plan has not been formally amended to adopt these provisions as of the date the financial statements are available to be issued.

An expansion of Setting Every Community Up for Retirement Enhancement Act of 2019 ("SECURE 2.0") was signed into law on December 29, 2022, as part of the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023. The effective dates of provisions within SECURE 2.0 vary through 2026. The Company has until the end of the first Plan year beginning on or after January 1, 2026, to amend the Plan for the changes related to SECURE 2.0. The Plan has not been formally amended to adopt these provisions as of the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Plan administration

The Company is the administrator of the Plan and, as such, carries out the duties imposed by ERISA. The Company has delegated certain responsibilities for the operation and administration of the Plan. Fidelity Management Trust Company ("Fidelity" or the "Trustee") is the Trustee of the Plan and Fidelity Workplace Services, an affiliate of the Trustee, is the Plan's recordkeeper.

Eligibility

Most employees of the Company are eligible to participate in the Plan immediately upon hire. Excluded employees, are described as interns, part-time employees, temporary employees, residents of Puerto Rico, and independent contractors.

Participant contributions

The Plan allows eligible participants to elect to have the Company withhold up to 90% of their eligible compensation as pre-tax or after-tax (as Roth) contributions to the Plan up to the amounts allowable under the Plan and the IRC. Participants who have attained the age of 50 before the close of the Plan year are eligible to make additional catch-up contributions. Contributions withheld are invested in accordance with the participant's direction. Participants are also allowed to make rollover contributions received from other tax-qualified employer-sponsored retirement plans. Such contributions are deposited in the appropriate investment funds in accordance with the participant's direction and the Plan's provisions.

Unless affirmatively elected otherwise, newly eligible employees will be automatically enrolled into the Plan with an initial pre-tax contribution rate of 6%.

Employer contributions

The Company may make a discretionary matching or profit sharing contribution on behalf of each eligible participant who made salary deferral contributions during the year. The Company authorized a discretionary matching Employer contribution equal to 50% of participant elective deferrals up to 6% of eligible compensation up to a maximum of \$10,350. Participants must be employed on the last day of the Plan year to receive discretionary Employer profit sharing contributions. No discretionary Employer profit sharing contributions were made for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Participant accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions, rollover contributions, Employer contributions, if any, Plan earnings, and charged with Plan losses and an allocation of administrative expenses. Allocations are based on participant earnings or account balances, as defined in the plan document. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Forfeited accounts

Forfeitures may occur as a result of excess Employer contributions or forfeited non-vested Employer contributions. The Plan provides that forfeited accounts may be used to reduce future Employer contributions or to pay Plan administrative expenses. Total forfeited nonvested accounts as of December 31, 2024 and 2023 totaled \$4,412 and \$895, respectively. No forfeitures were used to reduce discretionary matching Employer contributions or to pay Plan administrative expenses for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their contributions and discretionary matching Employer contributions, plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in the Company's discretionary profit sharing contributions is based on years of service, as defined. In the event of retirement, disability or death, participants become fully vested in their entire account.

The vesting schedule for the Employer discretionary profit sharing contribution is as follows:

Notes receivable from participants

Under the terms of the Plan, participants may borrow from their accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50 percent of their vested account balance. The notes receivable from participants (or "participant loans") are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at a fixed rate equal to the prime rate, as reported by Thomson Reuters, effective the first day of the month in which the loan is approved, plus 1%. The repayment period of any participant loan shall be no more than five years, but may exceed five years if the purpose of the loan is to purchase a principal residence. A participant may have one loan outstanding at any given time. Principal and interest is paid ratably through monthly payroll deductions. Participant loans outstanding at December 31, 2024, bear interest at rates ranging from 3.25% to 9.50%, and mature at various dates through July 2051.

Payment of benefits

Distributions and withdrawals are payable to participants upon retirement, termination, attainment of age 59 ½, financial hardship, disability, qualified reservist being ordered to military active duty, or to a beneficiary upon a participant's death, as defined by the plan documents. If a participant's account balance is less than or equal to \$1,000 upon termination, the balance is distributed in a lump-sum cash payment unless a direct rollover into another qualified benefit plan is requested. Upon termination, balances greater than \$1,000 and less than or equal to \$5,000 will be rolled over to an individual retirement plan designated by the administrator if the participant has not requested a lump-sum cash payment or a direct rollover into another qualified benefit plan. If the account balance is over \$5,000 upon termination, the participant can consent to either a distribution paid in the form of a lump-sum cash payment, installment payments, partial payments, a direct rollover into another qualified plan, or postpone payment to a later date and remain in the Plan as described in the plan documents.

Upon attaining the age of 59 ½, the participant may, while still employed by the Company, request a withdrawal from their account balance. Hardship and qualified reservist distributions are permitted under limited circumstances as defined in the plan documents.

Administrative expenses

Certain administrative expenses of the Plan, including record-keeping and audit fees, were paid directly by the Company for the year ended December 31, 2024. The Plan is not required to reimburse the Company for such expenses paid by the Company on its behalf. Investment fees, which may vary according to the individual investment options selected, are paid out of the assets of the Plan.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting and financial statement presentation

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared under the accrual method of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("U.S. GAAP") and in accordance with provisions of ERISA.

Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. GAAP requires the plan administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates. Significant estimates and assumptions include the fair value of investments.

Risks and uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near-term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits and the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits.

Investment valuation and income recognition

The Plan's investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Contributions and contributions receivable

Contributions from participants are recorded based on the date the contributions have been separated from a participant's pay by the Company, which is the pay date. Employer matching and profit sharing contributions are recorded in the year they are earned. The Plan records receivables from contributions based upon the contributions recognized, less amounts received by the Plan as of the last day of the Plan year.

Rollover contributions from participants are recorded based on the date the rollover contributions have been received by the Trustee.

Notes receivable from participants

Participant loans are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income on notes receivable from participants is recorded when it is earned. If a participant ceases to make loan repayments and the participant loan is determined to be a distribution, the participant loan balance is reduced and a benefit payment is recorded.

Payment of benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Administrative expenses

Administrative expenses are recorded when incurred.

Subsequent events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 13, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued. No subsequent events have occurred that would have a material impact on the presentation of the Plan's financial statements.

3. INFORMATION PREPARED AND CERTIFIED BY THE TRUSTEE (UNAUDITED)

The plan administrator, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of the Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of ERISA. Accordingly, the Trustee, determined to be a qualified institution by the plan administrator, has certified to the completeness and accuracy of:

- Investments, and notes receivable from participants reflected on the accompanying statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023;
- Net appreciation in fair value of investments, interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants reflected on the accompanying statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024;
- Investments and notes receivable from participants reflected on the schedule of assets (held at end of year) as of December 31, 2024 ("supplemental schedule").

Accordingly, as requested by the Plan administrator, the Plan's auditor performed no audit procedures on the certified information other than to agree the certified information to the related information included in the financial statements and supplemental schedule.

4. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Accounting standards establish a framework for measuring fair value. That framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described as follows:

- *Level 1* - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.
- *Level 2* - Inputs to the valuation methodology include: quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets; quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets; inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability; and other inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

- *Level 3* - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Stable value collective investment trust: A stable value fund that is composed primarily of fully benefit-responsive investment contracts that is valued at the NAV of units of the bank collective trust. The NAV is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value as reported by the fund issuer. This practical expedient would not be used if it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different from the reported NAV. Participant transactions (purchases and sales) may occur daily. If the Plan initiates a full redemption of the collective trust at the Plan level, the issuer reserves the right to require 12 months notification in order to ensure that securities liquidations will be carried out in an orderly business manner.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

5. TAX STATUS

The Plan adopted the Fidelity Volume Submitter Profit Sharing Plan Basic Plan Document No. 17 (the "volume submitter plan"). The IRS issued an opinion letter to the volume submitter plan dated June 30, 2020, stating that the volume submitter plan is designed in accordance with the applicable sections of the IRC and is appropriate for use by employers for the benefit of their employees. The Plan is required to operate in conformity with the IRC to maintain its tax preferred status. The Plan administrator believes that the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and therefore, believes that the Plan is qualified and is tax-exempt. Therefore, no provision for income taxes has been included in the Plan's financial statements.

6. PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. As a result of significant workforce reductions; the Plan underwent a partial plan termination. Affected participants became fully vested in all applicable contributions as a result of the partial plan termination.

7. RELATED PARTY AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

ERISA defines parties-in-interest similarly to a related party as defined under financial accounting standards, except that ERISA's definition is broader and includes all entities and individuals that provide services to the Plan; however, these entities may not necessarily be related parties. Plan management did not identify any related parties to the Plan that were not also considered to be parties-in-interest.

Party-in-interest transactions include those with fiduciaries or employees of the Plan, any person who provides services to the Plan, an employer whose employees are covered by the Plan, and an employee organization whose members are covered by the Plan, a person who owns 50 percent or more of such an employer or employee association or relatives of such persons.

The Company pays certain fees and expenses on behalf of the Plan. These transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. The Plan is not required to repay expenses paid by the Company on its behalf. The Plan has included in its investment fund options certain funds managed by the Trustee or one of its affiliates. Transactions in these funds are considered party-in-interest transactions under ERISA. Such transactions are permitted under provisions of the Plan and are specifically exempt from prohibition of party-in-interest transactions under ERISA.

The Trustee utilizes omnibus accounts at unaffiliated banks to facilitate transactions for the plans it services and commingles funds in transit to or from the Plan, including other funds similarly in transit to or from other plans. These omnibus account balances are invested in short-term investments with the aim of earning a rate approximating the Target Federal Funds Rate and/or money market rates. The Trustee uses these earnings to pay bank fees associated with the Plan's transactions and retains any float earnings that exceed such fees and adjustments as compensation for its services. The Trustee will pay any fees to the extent they exceed float earnings.

Certain fund level fees incurred by the funds in which the Plan invests for such services as investment management and shareholder services are paid through fund level revenue sharing arrangements. These fees reduce fund earnings, thereby impacting Plan revenue applied to participants' accounts.
