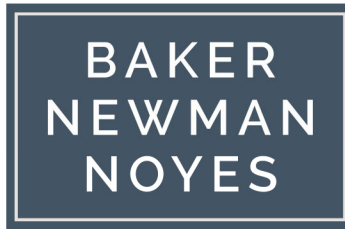

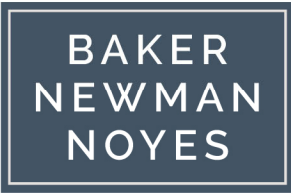

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

The Plan Administrator

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed audits of the financial statements of the Verrill Dana, LLP 401(k) Savings Plan (the Plan), an employee benefit plan subject to the *Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974* (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) (ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the related statements of changes in net assets available for benefits for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Plan's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are issued or available to be issued.

Management is also responsible for maintaining a current plan instrument, including all plan amendments, administering the Plan, and determining that the Plan's transactions that are presented and disclosed in the financial statements are in conformity with the Plan's provisions, including maintaining sufficient records with respect to each of the participants, to determine the benefits due or which may become due to such participants.

Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Except as described in the Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit section of our report, our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditors' report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with GAAS, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Plan's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.

- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

Our audits did not extend to the certified investment information, except for obtaining and reading the certification, comparing the certified investment information with the related information presented and disclosed in the financial statements, and reading the disclosures relating to the certified investment information to assess whether they are in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements of U.S. GAAP.

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with U.S. GAAP.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Other Matter – Supplemental Schedule Required by ERISA

The supplemental schedule of assets (held at end of year) as of December 31, 2024, is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements but is supplementary information required by the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information included in the supplemental schedule, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with GAAS. For information included in the supplemental schedule that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, we compared such information to the related certified investment information.

In forming our opinion on the supplemental schedule, we evaluated whether the supplemental schedule, other than the information agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, including its form and content, is presented in conformity with the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

In our opinion:

- The form and content of the supplemental schedule, other than the information in the supplemental schedule that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, are presented, in all material respects, in conformity with the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.
- The information in the supplemental schedule related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

1. Description of Plan

The following brief description of the Verrill Dana, LLP 401(k) Savings Plan (the Plan) is provided for general information purposes only. Participants should refer to the Plan documents for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all partners and eligible employees of Verrill Dana, LLP (the Firm). Employees are eligible to make contributions to the Plan if they have completed three months of service. Employees who meet this requirement are eligible as of the next enrollment date. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the *Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974* (ERISA).

The Plan was restated effective January 1, 2022 and most recently amended effective February 1, 2023. The amendment and restatement did not have a significant impact on Plan operations.

On December 29, 2022, the *Setting Every Community Up for Retirement Enhancement Act of 2022* (SECURE 2.0 Act) was signed into law. It includes mandatory and optional provisions impacting defined contribution plans. Applicable provisions outlined in the SECURE 2.0 Act will be adopted if elected and/or required. Plan amendments for these changes are not yet required.

Plan Administrative Expenses

The Plan pays for administrative expenses to the extent they are not paid by the Firm. In accordance with the fee agreement, certain fees incurred by the Plan for the investment management and certain administrative services are included in net appreciation in fair value of investments on the statements of changes in net assets available for benefits, as they are paid through revenue sharing, rather than direct payment. In 2019, the Plan began receiving a quarterly revenue credit from the trustee pursuant to a Service Agreement. Such amounts can be applied towards certain Plan expenses or reallocated to eligible participant accounts.

In 2022, the Plan adopted a per capita leveling fee arrangement for administrative fees not paid by the Firm. Under this arrangement, a fee is assessed against each participant's account, and each participant pays an equal amount toward administrative costs. If a participant is invested in a fund that includes revenue sharing, revenue sharing amounts are credited back to the participant's account.

Investment Options

The Plan is designed to satisfy the requirements of Section 404(c) of ERISA. The participants direct the investment of their account within any of the available options offered by the Plan. One of the available options is a brokerage account. In a brokerage account, participants have the option to manage their account with an investment advisor. Participants not electing a brokerage account have a choice of mutual fund options, a money market fund, and a stable value fund. Participants should refer to the respective prospectus for further information.

1. Description of Plan (Continued)

Contributions

Each year, participants may contribute up to 60% of their eligible compensation up to the maximum limit set by the Internal Revenue Service on a pre-tax basis. Effective January 1, 2022, post-tax Roth contributions were permitted by the Plan. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute rollovers from other qualified plans.

The Firm will match 100% of the first 3% of eligible participants' compensation contributed to the Plan and 50% of the next 2% of eligible participants' compensation contributed to the Plan.

The participants designate the allocation of their contributions among the available investment choices.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution, the employer's contribution and an allocation of the Plan's earnings and expenses. The Plan's earnings and expenses are allocated according to participants' relative account balances, as defined.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their voluntary contributions and employer contributions made on their behalf.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. No more than one note can be outstanding at any time. The note bears a reasonable rate of interest and is secured by the balance in the participant's account. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Distribution of Benefits

Upon termination of employment, disability, death, normal retirement age, or attainment of age 59 ½, a participant may elect from a variety of options to receive benefit payments. In certain hardship situations, participants may withdraw part of their account balances.

The SECURE 2.0 Act provisions required a change to the age at which required minimum distributions must commence from 72 to 73 for individuals who attain age 72 on or after January 1, 2023, and from age 73 to 75 for individuals who attain age 73 on or after January 1, 2033.

Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Firm has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA.

Trust Fund Management

Fidelity Management Trust Company is the custodian and trustee of the Plan's investments.

2. **Summary of Significant Accounting Policies**

Basis of Presentation

The accompanying financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

The Plan's investments are reported at fair value. Investments in the stable value fund are stated at fair value using the net asset value (NAV) per share practical expedient. NAV is determined based on the fair value of the fund's underlying net assets and the number of units outstanding. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements. Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Contributions

Participant contributions are recorded in the period in which payroll deductions are made. Employer matching contributions are recorded in the year to which they relate. Any such amounts that are not remitted to the Plan by year end are recorded as contributions receivable.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Delinquent participant notes are classified as distributions based upon the terms of the Plan's loan policy.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires the Plan Administrator to make estimates and assumptions that effect the reported amounts of net assets available for benefits at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of changes in net assets available for benefits during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan provides for various investment options which in turn invest in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Market risks include global events which could impact the value of investments securities, such as pandemics or international conflict. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

Subsequent Events

For the purposes of recognition and disclosure in these financial statements, management of the Plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 2, 2025, which is the date these financial statements were available to be issued.

3. **Tax Status**

A qualifying plan is one for which the employer may currently deduct contributions on its income tax return, the employee is not currently taxed on the contribution, and the plan income is not taxable. The Plan has adopted a volume submitter plan sponsored by Fidelity Management and Research Co. The IRS issued a favorable opinion letter dated June 30, 2020. The Plan has subsequently been amended. The Plan Administrator believes that the Plan has continued to operate in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Code upon which the favorable opinion was based.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by a plan and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination. Management evaluated the Plan's tax positions and concluded that the Plan has maintained its tax exempt status and has taken no uncertain tax positions that require adjustment to the financial statements. Therefore, no provision or liability for income taxes has been included in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

4. **Investments and Fair Value Measurements**

The Plan Administrator has elected the method of compliance as permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the United States Department of Labor's (DOL) Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Accordingly, as permitted under such election, the Plan instructed the Plan's independent auditors not to perform any auditing procedures with respect to the information certified by Fidelity Management Trust Company, the Plan's trustee, except for comparing such information certified by the trustee to information included in the Plan's financial statements and supplemental schedule. The Plan Administrator has determined that the trustee meets the requirements of a qualified institution defined by the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

The Plan's investments, notes receivable from participants, related income and transactions, including net appreciation in fair value of investments, were certified by Fidelity Management Trust Company as of and for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023.

The Plan's stable value fund is subject to certain events that could limit the ability of the Plan to transact at the reported NAV. Such events include the following: (1) total or partial plan termination; (2) mergers; (3) spin-offs; (4) lay-offs; (5) early retirement windows; (6) sales or closings of all or part of a participating plan sponsor's operations; or (7) changes in laws or regulations. The Plan Administrator does not believe that any of these events are probable of occurring.

Fair Value Measurements

The Plan has adopted a framework for measuring fair value under generally accepted accounting principles for all financial instruments that are being measured and reported on a fair value basis.

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. In determining fair value, the Plan uses various methods including market, income and cost approaches. Based on these approaches, the Plan often utilizes certain assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability, including assumptions about risk and the risks inherent in the inputs to the valuation technique. These inputs can be readily observable, market corroborated, or generally unobservable inputs. The Plan utilizes valuation techniques that maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. Based on the observability of the inputs used in the valuation techniques, the Plan is required to provide the following information according to the fair value hierarchy. The fair value hierarchy ranks the quality and reliability of the information used to determine fair values. Financial assets and liabilities carried at fair value will be classified and disclosed in one of the following three categories:

Level 1 – Valuations based on quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.

Level 2 – Valuations for assets and liabilities traded in less active dealer or broker markets. Valuations are obtained from third party pricing services for identical or similar assets or liabilities.

Level 3 – Valuations for assets and liabilities that are derived from other valuation methodologies, including option pricing models, discounted cash flow models and similar techniques, and not based on market exchange, dealer, or broker traded transactions. Level 3 valuations incorporate certain assumptions and projections in determining the fair value assigned to such assets or liabilities.

In determining the appropriate levels, the Plan performs an analysis of the assets and liabilities that are subject to fair value measurements. At each reporting period, all assets and liabilities for which the fair value measurement is based on significant unobservable inputs are classified as Level 3.

Corporate bonds, U.S. Government securities and certificates of deposit: Values are based on yields currently available on comparable securities of issuers with similar credit ratings. When quoted prices are not available for identical or similar instruments, the instrument is valued under a discounted cash flow approach that maximizes observable inputs such as current yields of similar instruments, but includes adjustments for certain risks that may not be observable, such as credit and liquidity risks.

The stable value fund objective is to seek preservation of principal and stable rate of return through investments in a diversified portfolio of contracts issued by creditworthy insurance companies (GICs), synthetic GICs, separate account GICs, variable rate GICs, repurchase agreements, and cash and cash equivalents, including money market instruments and certificates of deposit. The fund has no unfunded commitments and can be redeemed daily at NAV.

5. **Related Party Transactions and Administrative Expenses**

Certain plan investments are managed by affiliates of Fidelity Management Trust Company; therefore, transactions related to these investments qualify as party-in-interest. The Plan paid administrative expenses (net of rebates) in the amount of \$36,330 and \$21,943, respectively, for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, to Fidelity Investments Institutional Operations Company, LLC (an affiliate of Fidelity Management Trust Company) as well as investment advisory fees, and these transactions also qualify as party-in-interest. In addition, notes to participants qualify as party-in-interest.

6. **Reconciliation of Financial Statements to Form 5500**

There were no significant differences between the financial statements and Form 5500 as of and for the year ended December 31, 2024 and 2023. Notes receivable from participants are reflected as a receivable on the financial statements which is different from the Form 5500 presentation. On the Form 5500, notes receivable are classified as investments under the caption “participant loans.”

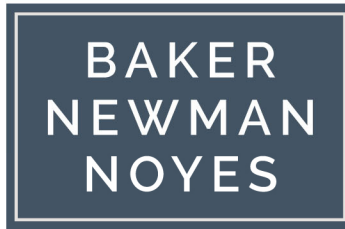

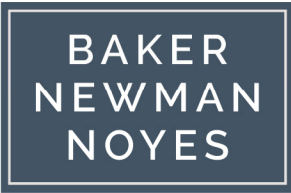

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed audits of the financial statements of the Verrill Dana, LLP 401(k) Savings Plan (the Plan), an employee benefit plan subject to the *Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974* (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) (ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the related statements of changes in net assets available for benefits for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of the Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the United States Department of Labor's (DOL) Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audits need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the Plan (investment information) by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA (qualified institution).

Management has obtained certifications from a qualified institution as of and for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note 4 to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Opinion

In our opinion, based on our audits and on the procedures performed as described in the Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section:

- The amounts and disclosures in the accompanying financial statements, other than those agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP).
- The information in the accompanying financial statements related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Plan and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with U.S. GAAP, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. Management's election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit does not affect management's responsibility for the financial statements.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Plan's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are issued or available to be issued.

Management is also responsible for maintaining a current plan instrument, including all plan amendments, administering the Plan, and determining that the Plan's transactions that are presented and disclosed in the financial statements are in conformity with the Plan's provisions, including maintaining sufficient records with respect to each of the participants, to determine the benefits due or which may become due to such participants.

Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Except as described in the Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit section of our report, our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditors' report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

Our audits did not extend to the certified investment information, except for obtaining and reading the certification, comparing the certified investment information with the related information presented and disclosed in the financial statements, and reading the disclosures relating to the certified investment information to assess whether they are in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements of U.S. GAAP.

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with U.S. GAAP.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Other Matter – Supplemental Schedule Required by ERISA

The supplemental schedule of assets (held at end of year) as of December 31, 2024, is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements but is supplementary information required by the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information included in the supplemental schedule, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with GAAS. For information included in the supplemental schedule that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, we compared such information to the related certified investment information.

In forming our opinion on the supplemental schedule, we evaluated whether the supplemental schedule, other than the information agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, including its form and content, is presented in conformity with the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

1. Description of Plan

The following brief description of the Verrill Dana, LLP 401(k) Savings Plan (the Plan) is provided for general information purposes only. Participants should refer to the Plan documents for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all partners and eligible employees of Verrill Dana, LLP (the Firm). Employees are eligible to make contributions to the Plan if they have completed three months of service. Employees who meet this requirement are eligible as of the next enrollment date. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the *Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974* (ERISA).

The Plan was restated effective January 1, 2022 and most recently amended effective February 1, 2023. The amendment and restatement did not have a significant impact on Plan operations.

On December 29, 2022, the *Setting Every Community Up for Retirement Enhancement Act of 2022* (SECURE 2.0 Act) was signed into law. It includes mandatory and optional provisions impacting defined contribution plans. Applicable provisions outlined in the SECURE 2.0 Act will be adopted if elected and/or required. Plan amendments for these changes are not yet required.

Plan Administrative Expenses

The Plan pays for administrative expenses to the extent they are not paid by the Firm. In accordance with the fee agreement, certain fees incurred by the Plan for the investment management and certain administrative services are included in net appreciation in fair value of investments on the statements of changes in net assets available for benefits, as they are paid through revenue sharing, rather than direct payment. In 2019, the Plan began receiving a quarterly revenue credit from the trustee pursuant to a Service Agreement. Such amounts can be applied towards certain Plan expenses or reallocated to eligible participant accounts.

In 2022, the Plan adopted a per capita leveling fee arrangement for administrative fees not paid by the Firm. Under this arrangement, a fee is assessed against each participant's account, and each participant pays an equal amount toward administrative costs. If a participant is invested in a fund that includes revenue sharing, revenue sharing amounts are credited back to the participant's account.

Investment Options

The Plan is designed to satisfy the requirements of Section 404(c) of ERISA. The participants direct the investment of their account within any of the available options offered by the Plan. One of the available options is a brokerage account. In a brokerage account, participants have the option to manage their account with an investment advisor. Participants not electing a brokerage account have a choice of mutual fund options, a money market fund, and a stable value fund. Participants should refer to the respective prospectus for further information.

Contributions

Each year, participants may contribute up to 60% of their eligible compensation up to the maximum limit set by the Internal Revenue Service on a pre-tax basis. Effective January 1, 2022, post-tax Roth contributions were permitted by the Plan. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute rollovers from other qualified plans.

The Firm will match 100% of the first 3% of eligible participants' compensation contributed to the Plan and 50% of the next 2% of eligible participants' compensation contributed to the Plan.

The participants designate the allocation of their contributions among the available investment choices.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution, the employer's contribution and an allocation of the Plan's earnings and expenses. The Plan's earnings and expenses are allocated according to participants' relative account balances, as defined.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their voluntary contributions and employer contributions made on their behalf.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. No more than one note can be outstanding at any time. The note bears a reasonable rate of interest and is secured by the balance in the participant's account. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Distribution of Benefits

Upon termination of employment, disability, death, normal retirement age, or attainment of age 59 ½, a participant may elect from a variety of options to receive benefit payments. In certain hardship situations, participants may withdraw part of their account balances.

The SECURE 2.0 Act provisions required a change to the age at which required minimum distributions must commence from 72 to 73 for individuals who attain age 72 on or after January 1, 2023, and from age 73 to 75 for individuals who attain age 73 on or after January 1, 2033.

Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Firm has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA.

Trust Fund Management

Fidelity Management Trust Company is the custodian and trustee of the Plan's investments.

2. **Summary of Significant Accounting Policies**

Basis of Presentation

The accompanying financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

The Plan's investments are reported at fair value. Investments in the stable value fund are stated at fair value using the net asset value (NAV) per share practical expedient. NAV is determined based on the fair value of the fund's underlying net assets and the number of units outstanding. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements. Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Contributions

Participant contributions are recorded in the period in which payroll deductions are made. Employer matching contributions are recorded in the year to which they relate. Any such amounts that are not remitted to the Plan by year end are recorded as contributions receivable.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Delinquent participant notes are classified as distributions based upon the terms of the Plan's loan policy.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires the Plan Administrator to make estimates and assumptions that effect the reported amounts of net assets available for benefits at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of changes in net assets available for benefits during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan provides for various investment options which in turn invest in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Market risks include global events which could impact the value of investments securities, such as pandemics or international conflict. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

Subsequent Events

For the purposes of recognition and disclosure in these financial statements, management of the Plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 2, 2025, which is the date these financial statements were available to be issued.

3. **Tax Status**

A qualifying plan is one for which the employer may currently deduct contributions on its income tax return, the employee is not currently taxed on the contribution, and the plan income is not taxable. The Plan has adopted a volume submitter plan sponsored by Fidelity Management and Research Co. The IRS issued a favorable opinion letter dated June 30, 2020. The Plan has subsequently been amended. The Plan Administrator believes that the Plan has continued to operate in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Code upon which the favorable opinion was based.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by a plan and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination. Management evaluated the Plan's tax positions and concluded that the Plan has maintained its tax exempt status and has taken no uncertain tax positions that require adjustment to the financial statements. Therefore, no provision or liability for income taxes has been included in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

4. **Investments and Fair Value Measurements**

The Plan Administrator has elected the method of compliance as permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the United States Department of Labor's (DOL) Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Accordingly, as permitted under such election, the Plan instructed the Plan's independent auditors not to perform any auditing procedures with respect to the information certified by Fidelity Management Trust Company, the Plan's trustee, except for comparing such information certified by the trustee to information included in the Plan's financial statements and supplemental schedule. The Plan Administrator has determined that the trustee meets the requirements of a qualified institution defined by the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

The Plan's investments, notes receivable from participants, related income and transactions, including net appreciation in fair value of investments, were certified by Fidelity Management Trust Company as of and for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023.

The Plan's stable value fund is subject to certain events that could limit the ability of the Plan to transact at the reported NAV. Such events include the following: (1) total or partial plan termination; (2) mergers; (3) spin-offs; (4) lay-offs; (5) early retirement windows; (6) sales or closings of all or part of a participating plan sponsor's operations; or (7) changes in laws or regulations. The Plan Administrator does not believe that any of these events are probable of occurring.

Fair Value Measurements

The Plan has adopted a framework for measuring fair value under generally accepted accounting principles for all financial instruments that are being measured and reported on a fair value basis.

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. In determining fair value, the Plan uses various methods including market, income and cost approaches. Based on these approaches, the Plan often utilizes certain assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability, including assumptions about risk and the risks inherent in the inputs to the valuation technique. These inputs can be readily observable, market corroborated, or generally unobservable inputs. The Plan utilizes valuation techniques that maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. Based on the observability of the inputs used in the valuation techniques, the Plan is required to provide the following information according to the fair value hierarchy. The fair value hierarchy ranks the quality and reliability of the information used to determine fair values. Financial assets and liabilities carried at fair value will be classified and disclosed in one of the following three categories:

Level 1 – Valuations based on quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.

Level 2 – Valuations for assets and liabilities traded in less active dealer or broker markets. Valuations are obtained from third party pricing services for identical or similar assets or liabilities.

Level 3 – Valuations for assets and liabilities that are derived from other valuation methodologies, including option pricing models, discounted cash flow models and similar techniques, and not based on market exchange, dealer, or broker traded transactions. Level 3 valuations incorporate certain assumptions and projections in determining the fair value assigned to such assets or liabilities.

In determining the appropriate levels, the Plan performs an analysis of the assets and liabilities that are subject to fair value measurements. At each reporting period, all assets and liabilities for which the fair value measurement is based on significant unobservable inputs are classified as Level 3.

Corporate bonds, U.S. Government securities and certificates of deposit: Values are based on yields currently available on comparable securities of issuers with similar credit ratings. When quoted prices are not available for identical or similar instruments, the instrument is valued under a discounted cash flow approach that maximizes observable inputs such as current yields of similar instruments, but includes adjustments for certain risks that may not be observable, such as credit and liquidity risks.

The stable value fund objective is to seek preservation of principal and stable rate of return through investments in a diversified portfolio of contracts issued by creditworthy insurance companies (GICs), synthetic GICs, separate account GICs, variable rate GICs, repurchase agreements, and cash and cash equivalents, including money market instruments and certificates of deposit. The fund has no unfunded commitments and can be redeemed daily at NAV.

5. **Related Party Transactions and Administrative Expenses**

Certain plan investments are managed by affiliates of Fidelity Management Trust Company; therefore, transactions related to these investments qualify as party-in-interest. The Plan paid administrative expenses (net of rebates) in the amount of \$36,330 and \$21,943, respectively, for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, to Fidelity Investments Institutional Operations Company, LLC (an affiliate of Fidelity Management Trust Company) as well as investment advisory fees, and these transactions also qualify as party-in-interest. In addition, notes to participants qualify as party-in-interest.
