The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits (modified cash basis) as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits (modified cash basis) for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of DCCA Retirement Savings Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Note 1. Description of Plan

The following description of the DCCA Retirement Savings Plan (the “Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan’s provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering substantially all employees of Data Computer Corporation of America (the “Company”), who are 21 years of age or older. The Board of Directors of the Company controls and manages the operation and administration of the Plan. Fidelity Management Trust Company (“FMTC”) serves as the trustee of the Plan (“Trustee”). The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (“ERISA”).

Contributions

Each year, participants may contribute up to 60% of annual compensation, as defined in the Plan document, subject to Internal Revenue Code (“IRC”) limitations. Participant salary deferrals may be traditional 401(k) (pre-tax) or Roth 401(k) (after-tax). Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified plans and certain individual retirement accounts. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. The Company provides a discretionary match of 50% of the employee contributions, up to 6% of annual compensation. Profit-sharing contributions, if any, are determined at the discretion of the Company. The Company did not make any discretionary profit-sharing contributions during 2024. Contributions are subject to certain limitations.

Investment Options

Participants direct the investment of their accounts into various investment options offered by the Plan. The Plan currently offers mutual funds and a stable value fund as investment options for participants.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's elective contributions and allocations of the Company's contributions and plan earnings (losses) and charged with benefit payments and transaction fees related to notes receivable from participants and distributions. Allocations are based on participant earnings or account balances, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting

Participants are vested immediately in all contributions plus actual earnings thereon.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. The loans are secured by the participant’s balance in the Plan and bear interest at rates which are commensurate with local prevailing rates as determined by the plan administrator. At December 31, 2024, outstanding loans bore interest rates from 4.25% to 9.50%. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Payment of Benefits

On termination of service, a participant may elect to receive the value of the vested interest in his or her account as a lump sum distribution. Hardship distributions are permitted upon demonstration of financial hardship, with limitations as defined in the Plan. In-service distributions are available from all vested contribution sources once a participant reaches age 59½.

Forfeitures

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$1,163 and \$993, respectively. These accounts are applied first to reduce expenses related to the administration of the Plan and then to reduce the Company's contributions. Forfeitures in the amount of \$75 were used to reduce Company contributions during 2024.

Note 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAP"). That basis differs from GAAP in that additions are recorded when received rather than when earned and certain deductions are recorded when paid rather than when an obligation is incurred. Modifications to the cash basis of accounting include recording investments at fair value.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with the modified cash basis of accounting may require management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of net assets available for benefits and changes therein. Actual results could differ from those estimates and assumptions.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Plan management determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the trustee. See Note 3 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest and dividend income is recorded when received. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance. Delinquent participant loans are reclassified or distributed based upon the terms of the Plan document.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when distributed.

Administrative Expenses

The Plan's administrative expenses are paid by either the Plan or the Company, as provided by the Plan document. Certain administrative functions are performed by employees of the Company. No such employee receives compensation from the Plan. Expenses relating to specific participant transactions (notes receivable from participants and distributions) are charged directly to the participant's account.

Subsequent Events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 6, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 3. Fair Value Measurements

Fair value is an exit price, representing the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. There is a three-tier fair value hierarchy, which prioritizes the inputs used in measuring fair value. These tiers include:

- Level 1** Observable inputs such as quoted prices in active markets.
- Level 2** Inputs other than quoted prices in active markets that are either directly or indirectly observable.
- Level 3** Unobservable inputs about which little or no market data exists, therefore requiring an entity to develop its own assumptions.

Assets and liabilities are classified in their entirety based on the lowest level of input that is significant to the fair value measurement. The Plan's assessment of the significance of a particular input to the fair value measurement requires judgment and may affect the valuation of fair value assets and liabilities and their placement within the fair value hierarchy levels.

There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023. Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value.

Mutual Funds

Mutual funds are publicly traded investments and are valued daily at the closing price reported on the active market on which the funds are traded.

Money Market Fund

Valued at amortized cost, which approximates fair value.

Stable Value Fund

The Plan invests in a stable value fund for which quoted prices are not available in active markets for identical instruments. The Plan utilizes the net asset value (NAV) per share provided by the Trustee as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. This practical expedient would not be used if it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different from the reported NAV. Participant transactions (purchases and sales) may occur daily. If the Plan initiates a full redemption of the collective trust fund, the issuer reserves the right to require 12-months' notification in order to ensure that securities liquidations will be carried out in an orderly business manner. The collective trust fund is not required to be classified within a level on the fair value hierarchy.

Note 4. Certification of Plan Trustee

The Plan Administrator has elected the method of annual reporting compliance permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Accordingly, Fidelity Management Trust Company, a qualified institution, has certified the following investment information included in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedule is complete and accurate:

- Investments and notes receivable from participants as shown in the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023
- Investment income and interest income from notes receivable from participants as shown in the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024
- Investment information and notes receivable from participants included in the accompanying schedule of assets (held at end of year) as of December 31, 2024

The Plan's independent auditors did not perform auditing procedures with respect to this certified investment information, except for comparing such certified investment information to the related investment information included in the financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedule.

Note 5. Exempt Party-in-Interest Transactions

Certain Plan investments are shares of mutual funds managed by Fidelity Investments, an affiliate of FMTC, and a stable value collective trust managed by FMTC. FMTC is the trustee as defined by the Plan and, therefore, these transactions qualify as exempt party-in-interest transactions. Fees paid by the Plan for investment management services were included as a reduction of the return earned on each fund. Fees paid to the trustee or its affiliates by the Plan for administrative services and participant-initiated transactions were \$1,500 for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Note 6. Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of plan termination, participants would become fully vested in their accounts.

Note 7. Tax Status

The Plan has not obtained a determination letter from the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) stating that the Plan was in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. The Plan is relying on the IRS approval of the non-standardized prototype plan document that it is utilizing. The IRS had determined and informed the document sponsor by a letter dated June 30, 2020, that the non-standardized prototype plan document was designed in accordance with applicable sections of the IRC. The plan administrator believes that the plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. Therefore, the plan administrator believes that the Plan was qualified and the related trust was tax-exempt as of the financial statements date.

The modified cash basis, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, requires Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Note 8. Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities, in general, are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, credit and overall market volatility. Due to the level of the risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

Note 9. Non-Exempt Party-in-Interest Transaction

During the 2024 Plan year, there were delays by the Company in submitting participant contributions in the amount of \$261,554 to the trustee. These delinquent contributions constitute prohibited transactions. Prior to 2024, there were \$2,521,944 of participant contributions that were considered delinquent. The Company has not remitted lost earnings to fully correct the prohibited transactions.

The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits (modified cash basis) as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits (modified cash basis) for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Note 1. Description of Plan

The following description of the DCCA Retirement Savings Plan (the “Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan’s provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering substantially all employees of Data Computer Corporation of America (the “Company”), who are 21 years of age or older. The Board of Directors of the Company controls and manages the operation and administration of the Plan. Fidelity Management Trust Company (“FMTC”) serves as the trustee of the Plan (“Trustee”). The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (“ERISA”).

Contributions

Each year, participants may contribute up to 60% of annual compensation, as defined in the Plan document, subject to Internal Revenue Code (“IRC”) limitations. Participant salary deferrals may be traditional 401(k) (pre-tax) or Roth 401(k) (after-tax). Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified plans and certain individual retirement accounts. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. The Company provides a discretionary match of 50% of the employee contributions, up to 6% of annual compensation. Profit-sharing contributions, if any, are determined at the discretion of the Company. The Company did not make any discretionary profit-sharing contributions during 2024. Contributions are subject to certain limitations.

Investment Options

Participants direct the investment of their accounts into various investment options offered by the Plan. The Plan currently offers mutual funds and a stable value fund as investment options for participants.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's elective contributions and allocations of the Company's contributions and plan earnings (losses) and charged with benefit payments and transaction fees related to notes receivable from participants and distributions. Allocations are based on participant earnings or account balances, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting

Participants are vested immediately in all contributions plus actual earnings thereon.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. The loans are secured by the participant’s balance in the Plan and bear interest at rates which are commensurate with local prevailing rates as determined by the plan administrator. At December 31, 2024, outstanding loans bore interest rates from 4.25% to 9.50%. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Payment of Benefits

On termination of service, a participant may elect to receive the value of the vested interest in his or her account as a lump sum distribution. Hardship distributions are permitted upon demonstration of financial hardship, with limitations as defined in the Plan. In-service distributions are available from all vested contribution sources once a participant reaches age 59½.

Forfeitures

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$1,163 and \$993, respectively. These accounts are applied first to reduce expenses related to the administration of the Plan and then to reduce the Company's contributions. Forfeitures in the amount of \$75 were used to reduce Company contributions during 2024.

Note 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAP"). That basis differs from GAAP in that additions are recorded when received rather than when earned and certain deductions are recorded when paid rather than when an obligation is incurred. Modifications to the cash basis of accounting include recording investments at fair value.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with the modified cash basis of accounting may require management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of net assets available for benefits and changes therein. Actual results could differ from those estimates and assumptions.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Plan management determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the trustee. See Note 3 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest and dividend income is recorded when received. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance. Delinquent participant loans are reclassified or distributed based upon the terms of the Plan document.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when distributed.

Administrative Expenses

The Plan's administrative expenses are paid by either the Plan or the Company, as provided by the Plan document. Certain administrative functions are performed by employees of the Company. No such employee receives compensation from the Plan. Expenses relating to specific participant transactions (notes receivable from participants and distributions) are charged directly to the participant's account.

Subsequent Events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 6, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 3. Fair Value Measurements

Fair value is an exit price, representing the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. There is a three-tier fair value hierarchy, which prioritizes the inputs used in measuring fair value. These tiers include:

- Level 1** Observable inputs such as quoted prices in active markets.
- Level 2** Inputs other than quoted prices in active markets that are either directly or indirectly observable.
- Level 3** Unobservable inputs about which little or no market data exists, therefore requiring an entity to develop its own assumptions.

Assets and liabilities are classified in their entirety based on the lowest level of input that is significant to the fair value measurement. The Plan's assessment of the significance of a particular input to the fair value measurement requires judgment and may affect the valuation of fair value assets and liabilities and their placement within the fair value hierarchy levels.

There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023. Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value.

Mutual Funds

Mutual funds are publicly traded investments and are valued daily at the closing price reported on the active market on which the funds are traded.

Money Market Fund

Valued at amortized cost, which approximates fair value.

Stable Value Fund

The Plan invests in a stable value fund for which quoted prices are not available in active markets for identical instruments. The Plan utilizes the net asset value (NAV) per share provided by the Trustee as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. This practical expedient would not be used if it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different from the reported NAV. Participant transactions (purchases and sales) may occur daily. If the Plan initiates a full redemption of the collective trust fund, the issuer reserves the right to require 12-months' notification in order to ensure that securities liquidations will be carried out in an orderly business manner. The collective trust fund is not required to be classified within a level on the fair value hierarchy.

Note 4. Certification of Plan Trustee

The Plan Administrator has elected the method of annual reporting compliance permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Accordingly, Fidelity Management Trust Company, a qualified institution, has certified the following investment information included in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedule is complete and accurate:

- Investments and notes receivable from participants as shown in the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023
- Investment income and interest income from notes receivable from participants as shown in the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024
- Investment information and notes receivable from participants included in the accompanying schedule of assets (held at end of year) as of December 31, 2024

The Plan's independent auditors did not perform auditing procedures with respect to this certified investment information, except for comparing such certified investment information to the related investment information included in the financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedule.

Note 5. Exempt Party-in-Interest Transactions

Certain Plan investments are shares of mutual funds managed by Fidelity Investments, an affiliate of FMTC, and a stable value collective trust managed by FMTC. FMTC is the trustee as defined by the Plan and, therefore, these transactions qualify as exempt party-in-interest transactions. Fees paid by the Plan for investment management services were included as a reduction of the return earned on each fund. Fees paid to the trustee or its affiliates by the Plan for administrative services and participant-initiated transactions were \$1,500 for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Note 6. Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of plan termination, participants would become fully vested in their accounts.

Note 7. Tax Status

The Plan has not obtained a determination letter from the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) stating that the Plan was in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. The Plan is relying on the IRS approval of the non-standardized prototype plan document that it is utilizing. The IRS had determined and informed the document sponsor by a letter dated June 30, 2020, that the non-standardized prototype plan document was designed in accordance with applicable sections of the IRC. The plan administrator believes that the plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. Therefore, the plan administrator believes that the Plan was qualified and the related trust was tax-exempt as of the financial statements date.

The modified cash basis, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, requires Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Note 8. Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities, in general, are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, credit and overall market volatility. Due to the level of the risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

Note 9. Non-Exempt Party-in-Interest Transaction

During the 2024 Plan year, there were delays by the Company in submitting participant contributions in the amount of \$261,554 to the trustee. These delinquent contributions constitute prohibited transactions. Prior to 2024, there were \$2,521,944 of participant contributions that were considered delinquent. The Company has not remitted lost earnings to fully correct the prohibited transactions.

Note 1. Description of Plan

The following description of the DCCA Retirement Savings Plan (the “Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan’s provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering substantially all employees of Data Computer Corporation of America (the “Company”), who are 21 years of age or older. The Board of Directors of the Company controls and manages the operation and administration of the Plan. Fidelity Management Trust Company (“FMTC”) serves as the trustee of the Plan (“Trustee”). The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (“ERISA”).

Contributions

Each year, participants may contribute up to 60% of annual compensation, as defined in the Plan document, subject to Internal Revenue Code (“IRC”) limitations. Participant salary deferrals may be traditional 401(k) (pre-tax) or Roth 401(k) (after-tax). Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified plans and certain individual retirement accounts. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. The Company provides a discretionary match of 50% of the employee contributions, up to 6% of annual compensation. Profit-sharing contributions, if any, are determined at the discretion of the Company. The Company did not make any discretionary profit-sharing contributions during 2024. Contributions are subject to certain limitations.

Investment Options

Participants direct the investment of their accounts into various investment options offered by the Plan. The Plan currently offers mutual funds and a stable value fund as investment options for participants.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's elective contributions and allocations of the Company's contributions and plan earnings (losses) and charged with benefit payments and transaction fees related to notes receivable from participants and distributions. Allocations are based on participant earnings or account balances, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting

Participants are vested immediately in all contributions plus actual earnings thereon.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. The loans are secured by the participant’s balance in the Plan and bear interest at rates which are commensurate with local prevailing rates as determined by the plan administrator. At December 31, 2024, outstanding loans bore interest rates from 4.25% to 9.50%. Principal and interest are paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Payment of Benefits

On termination of service, a participant may elect to receive the value of the vested interest in his or her account as a lump sum distribution. Hardship distributions are permitted upon demonstration of financial hardship, with limitations as defined in the Plan. In-service distributions are available from all vested contribution sources once a participant reaches age 59½.

Forfeitures

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$1,163 and \$993, respectively. These accounts are applied first to reduce expenses related to the administration of the Plan and then to reduce the Company's contributions. Forfeitures in the amount of \$75 were used to reduce Company contributions during 2024.

Note 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAP"). That basis differs from GAAP in that additions are recorded when received rather than when earned and certain deductions are recorded when paid rather than when an obligation is incurred. Modifications to the cash basis of accounting include recording investments at fair value.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with the modified cash basis of accounting may require management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of net assets available for benefits and changes therein. Actual results could differ from those estimates and assumptions.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Plan management determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the trustee. See Note 3 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest and dividend income is recorded when received. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance. Delinquent participant loans are reclassified or distributed based upon the terms of the Plan document.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when distributed.

Administrative Expenses

The Plan's administrative expenses are paid by either the Plan or the Company, as provided by the Plan document. Certain administrative functions are performed by employees of the Company. No such employee receives compensation from the Plan. Expenses relating to specific participant transactions (notes receivable from participants and distributions) are charged directly to the participant's account.

Subsequent Events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 6, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 3. Fair Value Measurements

Fair value is an exit price, representing the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. There is a three-tier fair value hierarchy, which prioritizes the inputs used in measuring fair value. These tiers include:

- Level 1** Observable inputs such as quoted prices in active markets.
- Level 2** Inputs other than quoted prices in active markets that are either directly or indirectly observable.
- Level 3** Unobservable inputs about which little or no market data exists, therefore requiring an entity to develop its own assumptions.

Assets and liabilities are classified in their entirety based on the lowest level of input that is significant to the fair value measurement. The Plan's assessment of the significance of a particular input to the fair value measurement requires judgment and may affect the valuation of fair value assets and liabilities and their placement within the fair value hierarchy levels.

There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023. Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value.

Mutual Funds

Mutual funds are publicly traded investments and are valued daily at the closing price reported on the active market on which the funds are traded.

Money Market Fund

Valued at amortized cost, which approximates fair value.

Stable Value Fund

The Plan invests in a stable value fund for which quoted prices are not available in active markets for identical instruments. The Plan utilizes the net asset value (NAV) per share provided by the Trustee as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. This practical expedient would not be used if it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different from the reported NAV. Participant transactions (purchases and sales) may occur daily. If the Plan initiates a full redemption of the collective trust fund, the issuer reserves the right to require 12-months' notification in order to ensure that securities liquidations will be carried out in an orderly business manner. The collective trust fund is not required to be classified within a level on the fair value hierarchy.

Note 4. Certification of Plan Trustee

The Plan Administrator has elected the method of annual reporting compliance permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Accordingly, Fidelity Management Trust Company, a qualified institution, has certified the following investment information included in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedule is complete and accurate:

- Investments and notes receivable from participants as shown in the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023
- Investment income and interest income from notes receivable from participants as shown in the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024
- Investment information and notes receivable from participants included in the accompanying schedule of assets (held at end of year) as of December 31, 2024

The Plan's independent auditors did not perform auditing procedures with respect to this certified investment information, except for comparing such certified investment information to the related investment information included in the financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedule.

Note 5. Exempt Party-in-Interest Transactions

Certain Plan investments are shares of mutual funds managed by Fidelity Investments, an affiliate of FMTC, and a stable value collective trust managed by FMTC. FMTC is the trustee as defined by the Plan and, therefore, these transactions qualify as exempt party-in-interest transactions. Fees paid by the Plan for investment management services were included as a reduction of the return earned on each fund. Fees paid to the trustee or its affiliates by the Plan for administrative services and participant-initiated transactions were \$1,500 for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Note 6. Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of plan termination, participants would become fully vested in their accounts.

Note 7. Tax Status

The Plan has not obtained a determination letter from the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) stating that the Plan was in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. The Plan is relying on the IRS approval of the non-standardized prototype plan document that it is utilizing. The IRS had determined and informed the document sponsor by a letter dated June 30, 2020, that the non-standardized prototype plan document was designed in accordance with applicable sections of the IRC. The plan administrator believes that the plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. Therefore, the plan administrator believes that the Plan was qualified and the related trust was tax-exempt as of the financial statements date.

The modified cash basis, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, requires Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Note 8. Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities, in general, are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, credit and overall market volatility. Due to the level of the risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

Note 9. Non-Exempt Party-in-Interest Transaction

During the 2024 Plan year, there were delays by the Company in submitting participant contributions in the amount of \$261,554 to the trustee. These delinquent contributions constitute prohibited transactions. Prior to 2024, there were \$2,521,944 of participant contributions that were considered delinquent. The Company has not remitted lost earnings to fully correct the prohibited transactions.
