Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed audits of the financial statements of Bahwan CyberTek Inc. 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan and Trust (the “Plan”), an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (“ERISA”), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C). Notes to Financial Statements

1. Description of Plan

The following description of the Bahwan CyberTek Inc. 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan and Trust (the “Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan agreement for more complete information.

General

The Plan was adopted effective January 1, 2014, as a defined contribution 401(k) plan covering substantially all employees of Bahwan CyberTek, Inc., DT360, Inc. and BCT Consulting, Inc. (collectively the “Company”), excluding collectively bargained employees, non-residential aliens who receive no compensation from the employer which constitutes U.S. source income, or employees as a result of a transaction described in Internal Revenue Service (“IRS”) Code section 410(b)(6)(C). Employees who have attained age 21 are eligible to voluntarily participate in the Plan immediately after completing 3 consecutive months of eligibility service, beginning on the employee’s date of hire. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (“ERISA”).

Contributions

Each year, participants may elect to contribute up to 92% of their compensation, as defined by the Plan. Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans. The Company provides matching contributions of 100% of employee contributions up to 3% of employee compensation for eligible employees. Contributions are subject to certain Internal Revenue Code limitations.

Participant Accounts

Each participant’s account is credited with the participant’s contribution and allocations of (a) the Company’s contribution and (b) plan earnings, and charged with an allocation of administrative expenses. Allocations are based on participant earnings or account balances, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant’s vested account.

Vesting Service

Participants are vested immediately in their contributions plus actual earnings thereon. If a participant becomes permanently disabled or dies while they are a current employee at the Company, they become immediately vested in their company contributed portion of their account balance. Otherwise, vesting in the Company’s contributed portion of participant accounts is based on years of continuous service.

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their account balance. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at rates that range from 4.25% to 9.50%, which are commensurate with local prevailing rates as determined quarterly by the plan administrator. Principal and interest are paid ratably through monthly payroll deductions over a period of five years, unless the purpose of the loan is to acquire a principal residence, in which case the loan must be repaid within 10 years.

Payment of Benefits

Benefit payments will begin on or after the participant's normal retirement date if not employed by the plan sponsor. On termination or retirement, participants will be paid a single sum unless the balance in the vested account is \$5,000 or less. In this case, federal law requires the Plan automatically roll the vested account balance into an IRA in a direct rollover if the participant's vested balance is more than \$1,000, the participant has not reached 65 years of age, and the participant does not elect to have the vested balance paid in a single sum or rolled to another retirement plan or an IRA of their choice in a direct rollover. In-service distributions are available at the attainment of age 59½ and for hardships that satisfy safe-harbor rules. In the event a participant dies or becomes disabled, the vested account balance will be paid to a spouse or beneficiary in a lump sum.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the

reported amounts of assets and liabilities, and changes therein, and the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments held by a defined contribution plan are required to be reported at fair value, except for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts. Contract value is the relevant measure for the portion of the net assets available for benefits of a defined contribution plan attributable to fully benefit-responsive investment contracts because contract value is the amount participants normally would receive if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the Plan.

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Plan's Investment Committee determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisers, custodian, and insurance company. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation/depreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold, as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 and 2023. If a participant ceases to make loan repayments and the plan administrator deems the participant loan to be in default, the participant loan balance is reduced and a benefit payment is recorded.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid directly by the Company and are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation/depreciation in fair value of investments.

Subsequent Events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 14, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

3. Certified Investments

The plan administrator has elected the method of compliance permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(c) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Accordingly, Mid Atlantic Trust Company ("MATC") has certified to the completeness and accuracy of all the investments and notes receivable from participants reflected on the accompanying statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, the supplemental schedule Form 5500, Schedule H, Part IV, Line 4(i) – Schedule of Assets (Held at End of Year) as of December 31, 2024, and the related investment activity and interest income on notes receivable from participants reflected on the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024. The Plan's independent auditors did not perform auditing procedures with respect to this information, except for comparing such information to the related information included in the financial statements and supplemental schedule.

4. Fair Value Measurements

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under Financial Accounting Standards Board Accounting Standards Codification 820 are described as follows:

Level 1: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2: Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value:

Mutual Funds

Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily NAV and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

5. Related-Party Transactions and Party-in-Interest Transactions

Fees incurred by the Plan for the investment management services are included in net appreciation in fair value of the investments, as they are paid through revenue sharing, rather than a direct payment. During 2024, the Plan paid \$48,112 in operating expenses to Paychex Retirement Services ("Paychex"), the recordkeeper of the plan. Notes receivable from participants are also exempt party-in-interest transactions.

6. Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan, subject to the provisions of ERISA. In event of plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their employer contributions.

7. Tax Status

The Plan uses the Paychex volume submitter plan. The Internal Revenue Service has issued an opinion letter dated August 31, 2020, stating that the volume submitter plan is designed in accordance with applicable sections of the IRC. Although the Plan has been amended since the date of the letter, the plan administrator believes that the Plan is designed and is currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and that the Plan continues to be tax-exempt.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain tax position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

8. Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

1. Description of Plan

The following description of the Bahwan CyberTek Inc. 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan and Trust (the “Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan agreement for more complete information.

General

The Plan was adopted effective January 1, 2014, as a defined contribution 401(k) plan covering substantially all employees of Bahwan CyberTek, Inc., DT360, Inc. and BCT Consulting, Inc. (collectively the “Company”), excluding collectively bargained employees, non-residential aliens who receive no compensation from the employer which constitutes U.S. source income, or employees as a result of a transaction described in Internal Revenue Service (“IRS”) Code section 410(b)(6)(C). Employees who have attained age 21 are eligible to voluntarily participate in the Plan immediately after completing 3 consecutive months of eligibility service, beginning on the employee’s date of hire. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (“ERISA”).

Contributions

Each year, participants may elect to contribute up to 92% of their compensation, as defined by the Plan. Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans. The Company provides matching contributions of 100% of employee contributions up to 3% of employee compensation for eligible employees. Contributions are subject to certain Internal Revenue Code limitations.

Participant Accounts

Each participant’s account is credited with the participant’s contribution and allocations of (a) the Company’s contribution and (b) plan earnings, and charged with an allocation of administrative expenses. Allocations are based on participant earnings or account balances, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant’s vested account.

Vesting Service

Participants are vested immediately in their contributions plus actual earnings thereon. If a participant becomes permanently disabled or dies while they are a current employee at the Company, they become immediately vested in their company contributed portion of their account balance. Otherwise, vesting in the Company’s contributed portion of participant accounts is based on years of continuous service.

In the event of death, permanent disability, or retirement, a participant's employer contribution account becomes fully vested.

Notes Receivable from Participant

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their account balance. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear interest at rates that range from 4.25% to 9.50%, which are commensurate with local prevailing rates as determined quarterly by the plan administrator. Principal and interest are paid ratably through monthly payroll deductions over a period of five years, unless the purpose of the loan is to acquire a principal residence, in which case the loan must be repaid within 10 years.

Payment of Benefits

Benefit payments will begin on or after the participant's normal retirement date if not employed by the plan sponsor. On termination or retirement, participants will be paid a single sum unless the balance in the vested account is \$5,000 or less. In this case, federal law requires the Plan automatically roll the vested account balance into an IRA in a direct rollover if the participant's vested balance is more than \$1,000, the participant has not reached 65 years of age, and the participant does not elect to have the vested balance paid in a single sum or rolled to another retirement plan or an IRA of their choice in a direct rollover. In-service distributions are available at the attainment of age 59½ and for hardships that satisfy safe-harbor rules. In the event a participant dies or becomes disabled, the vested account balance will be paid to a spouse or beneficiary in a lump sum.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the

reported amounts of assets and liabilities, and changes therein, and the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments held by a defined contribution plan are required to be reported at fair value, except for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts. Contract value is the relevant measure for the portion of the net assets available for benefits of a defined contribution plan attributable to fully benefit-responsive investment contracts because contract value is the amount participants normally would receive if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the Plan.

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Plan's Investment Committee determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisers, custodian, and insurance company. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation/depreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold, as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 and 2023. If a participant ceases to make loan repayments and the plan administrator deems the participant loan to be in default, the participant loan balance is reduced and a benefit payment is recorded.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid directly by the Company and are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation/depreciation in fair value of investments.

Subsequent Events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through October 14, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

3. Certified Investments

The plan administrator has elected the method of compliance permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(c) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Accordingly, Mid Atlantic Trust Company ("MATC") has certified to the completeness and accuracy of all the investments and notes receivable from participants reflected on the accompanying statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, the supplemental schedule Form 5500, Schedule H, Part IV, Line 4(i) – Schedule of Assets (Held at End of Year) as of December 31, 2024, and the related investment activity and interest income on notes receivable from participants reflected on the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024. The Plan's independent auditors did not perform auditing procedures with respect to this information, except for comparing such information to the related information included in the financial statements and supplemental schedule.

4. Fair Value Measurements

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under Financial Accounting Standards Board Accounting Standards Codification 820 are described as follows:

Level 1: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2: Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques maximize the use of relevant observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value:

Mutual Funds

Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily NAV and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

5. Related-Party Transactions and Party-in-Interest Transactions

Fees incurred by the Plan for the investment management services are included in net appreciation in fair value of the investments, as they are paid through revenue sharing, rather than a direct payment. During 2024, the Plan paid \$48,112 in operating expenses to Paychex Retirement Services ("Paychex"), the recordkeeper of the plan. Notes receivable from participants are also exempt party-in-interest transactions.

6. Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan, subject to the provisions of ERISA. In event of plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their employer contributions.

7. Tax Status

The Plan uses the Paychex volume submitter plan. The Internal Revenue Service has issued an opinion letter dated August 31, 2020, stating that the volume submitter plan is designed in accordance with applicable sections of the IRC. Although the Plan has been amended since the date of the letter, the plan administrator believes that the Plan is designed and is currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and that the Plan continues to be tax-exempt.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain tax position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

8. Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.
