Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Rescue Agency Public Benefit Employee Stock Ownership Plan (the "Plan"), an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), which comprise the statement of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

NOTE A - DESCRIPTION OF PLAN

The following description of Rescue Agency Public Benefit Employee Stock Ownership Plan (the "Plan") provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

Rescue Holdings, Inc. (the "Company") established the Plan effective on January 1, 2023. The Plan purchased common shares of the Company through a "purchase money" borrowing secured by Stock Pledge Escrow Agreement, and holds the stock in a trust established under the Plan. The borrowing is to be repaid over a period of thirty years. As the Plan makes each payment of principal and interest, an appropriate percentage of stock will be allocated to eligible employees' accounts in accordance with applicable regulations under the Internal Revenue Code (the "Code"). Allocated shares begin vesting according to the vesting policy of the Plan described in Note A-4.

The borrowing is collateralized by the unallocated shares of common stock. The lender has no rights against shares once they are allocated under the provisions of the ESOP. Accordingly, the financial statements of the Plan as of December 31, 2024, and for the Plan year ended December 31, 2024 present separately the assets and liabilities and changes therein pertaining to:

1. The accounts of employees with vested rights in allocated common stock (Allocated) and
2. Common stock not yet allocated to employees (Unallocated).

The Plan invests primarily in Company stock and is designed to comply with Internal Revenue Code Section 4975(e)(7) and the regulations thereunder of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) of 1986, as amended and is also subject to the applicable provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974, as amended ("ERISA").

1. Eligibility

Employees of the Company are generally eligible to participate in the Plan following completion of one year of service providing they worked at least 1,000 hours by the end of their first twelve consecutive months of employment. Participants who are not employed on the last day of the Plan year or who have not worked at least 1,000 hours of service during the Plan year are generally not eligible for an allocation of Company contributions or a reallocation of forfeitures for such year.

2. Contributions

The Company is obligated to make contributions in cash to the Plan which, when aggregated with the Plan's dividends and interest earnings, equal the amount necessary to enable the Plan to make its regularly scheduled payments of principal and interest due on its term loans. Employees are not permitted to make contributions.

3. Participant accounts

The Plan is a defined contribution plan under which a separate individual account is established for each participant. Each participant's account is credited as of the last day of each Plan year with an allocation of shares of the Company's common stock released by the Trustee from the unallocated account and forfeitures of terminated participants' non vested accounts. Only those participants who are eligible employees of the Company as of the last day of the Plan year will receive an allocation. Allocations are based on a participant's eligible compensation, relative to total eligible compensation. Plan earnings are allocated to each participant's account based on the ratio of the participant's beginning of the year account balance to all participants' beginning of the year account balances.

4. Vesting

A participant begins to vest after their second year of service (20%) and will be fully vested after six years of service. A year of service is earned when a participant works more than 1,000 hours in a calendar year starting January 1, 2023. Additionally prior to January 1, 2023 a participant will be credited with one year of service for each of the two years in which they were credited with at least 1,000 hours of service.

5. Payments of benefits

In the event of a participant's normal retirement, disability or death, the participant is considered 100% vested and distribution of his or her Plan benefit will commence during the Plan year following the Plan year in which his or her normal retirement, disability, or death occurs. If a participant terminates service for any other reason, the participant will be entitled to receive only the vested percentage of his or her account balance and the remainder will be forfeited. The distribution will begin no later than the sixth Plan year following the Plan year in which his or her service terminates.

Payment of a participant's nonforfeitable benefits shall be paid under one, or any combination, of the following methods:

- a. A lump sum amount equal to the value of his or her account,
- b. Direct rollover into a individual retirement arrangement (IRA) or another eligible employer plan,
- c. Automatic rollover into an IRA,
- d. Substantially equal annual installments over a five year period,
- e. Distribution of company stock, or
- f. Any combination of the above.

5. Payments of benefits (continued)

In the case of any distributable event, if the participant's vested balance in his or her account does not exceed \$7,000, the vested balance will automatically be paid out in the form of a lump sum distribution. Additionally if the participant's account exceeds \$1,000 but does not exceed \$7,000 and they fail to elect option "a" or "b", the Trustee will transfer their benefit in the form of a direct rollover to an IRA that is maintained and established on their behalf ("Automatic rollover into an IRA").

Under the provisions of the Plan, the Company is obligated to repurchase participant shares which have been distributed under the terms of the Plan as long as the shares are not publicly traded or if the shares are subject to trading limitations. During 2024, there were no shares repurchased by the Company from participants.

6. Forfeitures

Employer contributions and Plan forfeitures are allocated to each participant's account based upon the relation of the participant's compensation to total compensation for the Plan year. There were no unallocated forfeitures as of December 31, 2024.

7. Diversification

Diversification is offered to participants close to retirement so they may have the opportunity to move part of the value of their investment in Company stock into investments which are more diversified. Participants who are at least age 55 with at least 10 years of participation in the Plan may elect to diversify a portion of their account. Diversification is offered to each eligible participant over a six year period. In each of the first five years, a participant may diversify up to 25% of the number of post-1986 shares allocated to his or her account, less any shares previously diversified. In the sixth year, the percentage changes to 50%. Terminated participants who elect to diversify will receive a cash distribution. Participants eligible to diversify make their election after year-end based on the number of shares of employer's stock held in their account at year-end. Active participants will be able to elect to diversify through cash distribution or rollover into the participant's account in the Company's 401(k) plan.

8. Voting rights

Each participant is entitled to exercise voting rights attributable to the shares allocated to his or her account and is notified by the Trustee prior to the time that such rights are to be exercised. The Trustee is not permitted to vote any allocated share for which instructions have not been given by a participant. The Trustee is required, however, to vote any unallocated shares on behalf of the collective best interest of Plan participants and beneficiaries.

9. Put option

Under federal income tax regulations, the employer stock that is held by the Plan and its participants and is not readily tradable on an established market, or is subject to trading limitations, includes a put option. The put option is a right to demand that the Company buy any shares of its stock distributed to participants for which there is no market. The put price is representative of the current appraised value of the stock. The Company can pay for the purchase over a period not to exceed five years. The purpose of the put option is to ensure that the participant has the ability to ultimately obtain cash.

NOTE B - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1. Basis of accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared under the accrual method of accounting.

2. Valuation of investments and income recognition

The common stock of the Company is valued by independent appraisals on an annual basis. The fair value at December 31, 2024 was \$1.24 per share. For purposes of determining basis for realized and unrealized gains and losses, fair value at the beginning of the period is used. See fair value measurements disclosure.

Dividend income is accrued on the ex-dividend date.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Realized gains and losses from security transactions are reported on the average cost method. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

3. Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles in the United States of America requires management and the Plan administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

4. Payments of benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

5. Administrative expenses

Administrative expenses are absorbed primarily by the Plan sponsor.

6. Allocations

The financial statement of the Plan present separately the assets and liabilities and changes therein pertaining to (a) the accounts of employees with rights in allocated stock ("Allocated") and (b) stock not yet allocated to employees ("Unallocated"), including shares that are committed to be released. Shares are released from collateral and become allocated generally in the period in which debt service is actually paid.

NOTE C - INCOME TAX STATUS

The Company has filed an application with the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) for a determination letter regarding the qualified status of the Plan and related trust under the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). Although the Company has not yet received the determination letter, similar plans have received favorable determination letters from the IRS. The Plan administrator believes the Plan is designed and is currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. Therefore, they believe that the Plan was qualified and the related trust was tax-exempt as of the financial statement date.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require the Plan administrator to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability for any uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by tax authorities; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

NOTE D - ADMINISTRATION OF PLAN ASSETS

The Plan's assets, which consist principally of the Company's common shares, are held by the Trustee of the Plan.

Company contributions are held and managed by the Trustee, which invests cash received, interest and dividend income and makes distributions to participants. The Trustee also administers the payment of interest and principal on the loan, which is reimbursed to the Trustee through contributions as determined by the Company.

Certain administrative functions are performed by officers or employees of the Company. No such officer or employee receives compensation from the Plan. Administrative expenses for the Trustee's fees are paid directly by the Company.

During the year ended December 31, 2024, there were no stock transactions. Effective December 31, 2023, the Plan acquired 1,000,000 shares of stock in the Company for \$30,914,223.

NOTE F - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The fair value measurement accounting literature establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. This hierarchy consists of three broad levels: Level 1 inputs consist of unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets and have the highest priority. Level 2 inputs consist of observable inputs other than quoted prices for identical assets (Level 1). Level 3 inputs are unobservable and have the lowest priority. The Plan uses appropriate valuation techniques based on the available inputs to measure the fair value of its investments. When available, the Plan measures fair value using Level 1 inputs because they generally provide the most reliable evidence of fair value. Level 2 inputs are used for investments for which Level 1 inputs were not available. Level 3 inputs would only be used if Level 1 or Level 2 inputs were not available.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value.

Sponsor Company Common Stock: The fair value of the sponsor company common stock is determined by an annual valuation performed by an independent appraiser. These valuations were based on a combination of the market and income valuation approaches consistent with prior years. The appraiser took into account historical and projected cash flow and net earnings, weighted average cost of capital, market comparables, and applicable discounts and premiums.

The Trustee determines the fair value measurement policies and procedures in consultation with the Company's chief financial officer. Those policies and procedures are reassessed at least annually to determine if the current valuation techniques are still appropriate. At that time, the unobservable inputs used in the fair value measurements are evaluated and adjusted, as necessary, based on current market conditions and other third-party information.

NOTE G - LOAN PAYABLE

On December 31, 2023, the Plan entered into a \$30,914,223 term loan agreement with a related party. The proceeds of the loan were used to purchase the Plan Sponsor Company's common stock. The loan is payable in annual installments of approximately \$1,894,251 including interest at 5.03% per annum through December 31, 2053.

Unallocated shares are collateral for the loan. Shares are released from collateral and allocated to participants when principal and interest payments are made. The number of shares released in any year is the number of shares held as collateral, multiplied by the ratio of the current year payments, divided by the total of this year's payments, plus all future years' principal and interest payments. For the Plan year ended December 31, 2024, 64,516 were released and allocated to participants.

NOTE H - PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their accounts and the interest of each participant in the trust fund will be distributed to such participant or his/her beneficiary at the time prescribed by the Plan terms and the IRC. Upon termination of the Plan, the Trustees will pay all liabilities and expenses of the trust fund and to sell shares of financed stock held in the loan suspense account to the extent it determines such sale to be necessary in order to repay the loan.

NOTE I - RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan's investments consist primarily of the Company's common stock, which is exposed to various risks such as interest rates, market and credit risks, as well as valuation assumptions based on earnings and cash flows. Due to the level of risk associated with investment in common stock and to uncertainties inherent in the estimations and assumptions process, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the value of the common stock will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

NOTE J - RELATED PARTY AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

The Plan invests in Company common stock and has indebtedness guaranteed by the Company. These are related party and party-in-interest transactions. As described in Note B, the Company pays the expenses of the Plan. The Plan has a number of service providers. Such parties are parties-in-interest under ERISA.

Opinion

NOTE A - DESCRIPTION OF PLAN

The following description of Rescue Agency Public Benefit Employee Stock Ownership Plan (the "Plan") provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

Rescue Holdings, Inc. (the "Company") established the Plan effective on January 1, 2023. The Plan purchased common shares of the Company through a "purchase money" borrowing secured by Stock Pledge Escrow Agreement, and holds the stock in a trust established under the Plan. The borrowing is to be repaid over a period of thirty years. As the Plan makes each payment of principal and interest, an appropriate percentage of stock will be allocated to eligible employees' accounts in accordance with applicable regulations under the Internal Revenue Code (the "Code"). Allocated shares begin vesting according to the vesting policy of the Plan described in Note A-4.

The borrowing is collateralized by the unallocated shares of common stock. The lender has no rights against shares once they are allocated under the provisions of the ESOP. Accordingly, the financial statements of the Plan as of December 31, 2024, and for the Plan year ended December 31, 2024 present separately the assets and liabilities and changes therein pertaining to:

1. The accounts of employees with vested rights in allocated common stock (Allocated) and
2. Common stock not yet allocated to employees (Unallocated).

The Plan invests primarily in Company stock and is designed to comply with Internal Revenue Code Section 4975(e)(7) and the regulations thereunder of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) of 1986, as amended and is also subject to the applicable provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974, as amended ("ERISA").

1. Eligibility

Employees of the Company are generally eligible to participate in the Plan following completion of one year of service providing they worked at least 1,000 hours by the end of their first twelve consecutive months of employment. Participants who are not employed on the last day of the Plan year or who have not worked at least 1,000 hours of service during the Plan year are generally not eligible for an allocation of Company contributions or a reallocation of forfeitures for such year.

2. Contributions

The Company is obligated to make contributions in cash to the Plan which, when aggregated with the Plan's dividends and interest earnings, equal the amount necessary to enable the Plan to make its regularly scheduled payments of principal and interest due on its term loans. Employees are not permitted to make contributions.

3. Participant accounts

The Plan is a defined contribution plan under which a separate individual account is established for each participant. Each participant's account is credited as of the last day of each Plan year with an allocation of shares of the Company's common stock released by the Trustee from the unallocated account and forfeitures of terminated participants' non vested accounts. Only those participants who are eligible employees of the Company as of the last day of the Plan year will receive an allocation. Allocations are based on a participant's eligible compensation, relative to total eligible compensation. Plan earnings are allocated to each participant's account based on the ratio of the participant's beginning of the year account balance to all participants' beginning of the year account balances.

4. Vesting

A participant begins to vest after their second year of service (20%) and will be fully vested after six years of service. A year of service is earned when a participant works more than 1,000 hours in a calendar year starting January 1, 2023. Additionally prior to January 1, 2023 a participant will be credited with one year of service for each of the two years in which they were credited with at least 1,000 hours of service.

5. Payments of benefits

In the event of a participant's normal retirement, disability or death, the participant is considered 100% vested and distribution of his or her Plan benefit will commence during the Plan year following the Plan year in which his or her normal retirement, disability, or death occurs. If a participant terminates service for any other reason, the participant will be entitled to receive only the vested percentage of his or her account balance and the remainder will be forfeited. The distribution will begin no later than the sixth Plan year following the Plan year in which his or her service terminates.

Payment of a participant's nonforfeitable benefits shall be paid under one, or any combination, of the following methods:

- a. A lump sum amount equal to the value of his or her account,
- b. Direct rollover into a individual retirement arrangement (IRA) or another eligible employer plan,
- c. Automatic rollover into an IRA,
- d. Substantially equal annual installments over a five year period,
- e. Distribution of company stock, or
- f. Any combination of the above.

5. Payments of benefits (continued)

In the case of any distributable event, if the participant's vested balance in his or her account does not exceed \$7,000, the vested balance will automatically be paid out in the form of a lump sum distribution. Additionally if the participant's account exceeds \$1,000 but does not exceed \$7,000 and they fail to elect option "a" or "b", the Trustee will transfer their benefit in the form of a direct rollover to an IRA that is maintained and established on their behalf ("Automatic rollover into an IRA").

Under the provisions of the Plan, the Company is obligated to repurchase participant shares which have been distributed under the terms of the Plan as long as the shares are not publicly traded or if the shares are subject to trading limitations. During 2024, there were no shares repurchased by the Company from participants.

6. Forfeitures

Employer contributions and Plan forfeitures are allocated to each participant's account based upon the relation of the participant's compensation to total compensation for the Plan year. There were no unallocated forfeitures as of December 31, 2024.

7. Diversification

Diversification is offered to participants close to retirement so they may have the opportunity to move part of the value of their investment in Company stock into investments which are more diversified. Participants who are at least age 55 with at least 10 years of participation in the Plan may elect to diversify a portion of their account. Diversification is offered to each eligible participant over a six year period. In each of the first five years, a participant may diversify up to 25% of the number of post-1986 shares allocated to his or her account, less any shares previously diversified. In the sixth year, the percentage changes to 50%. Terminated participants who elect to diversify will receive a cash distribution. Participants eligible to diversify make their election after year-end based on the number of shares of employer's stock held in their account at year-end. Active participants will be able to elect to diversify through cash distribution or rollover into the participant's account in the Company's 401(k) plan.

8. Voting rights

Each participant is entitled to exercise voting rights attributable to the shares allocated to his or her account and is notified by the Trustee prior to the time that such rights are to be exercised. The Trustee is not permitted to vote any allocated share for which instructions have not been given by a participant. The Trustee is required, however, to vote any unallocated shares on behalf of the collective best interest of Plan participants and beneficiaries.

9. Put option

Under federal income tax regulations, the employer stock that is held by the Plan and its participants and is not readily tradable on an established market, or is subject to trading limitations, includes a put option. The put option is a right to demand that the Company buy any shares of its stock distributed to participants for which there is no market. The put price is representative of the current appraised value of the stock. The Company can pay for the purchase over a period not to exceed five years. The purpose of the put option is to ensure that the participant has the ability to ultimately obtain cash.

NOTE B - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1. Basis of accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared under the accrual method of accounting.

2. Valuation of investments and income recognition

The common stock of the Company is valued by independent appraisals on an annual basis. The fair value at December 31, 2024 was \$1.24 per share. For purposes of determining basis for realized and unrealized gains and losses, fair value at the beginning of the period is used. See fair value measurements disclosure.

Dividend income is accrued on the ex-dividend date.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Realized gains and losses from security transactions are reported on the average cost method. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

3. Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles in the United States of America requires management and the Plan administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

4. Payments of benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

5. Administrative expenses

Administrative expenses are absorbed primarily by the Plan sponsor.

6. Allocations

The financial statement of the Plan present separately the assets and liabilities and changes therein pertaining to (a) the accounts of employees with rights in allocated stock ("Allocated") and (b) stock not yet allocated to employees ("Unallocated"), including shares that are committed to be released. Shares are released from collateral and become allocated generally in the period in which debt service is actually paid.

NOTE C - INCOME TAX STATUS

The Company has filed an application with the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) for a determination letter regarding the qualified status of the Plan and related trust under the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). Although the Company has not yet received the determination letter, similar plans have received favorable determination letters from the IRS. The Plan administrator believes the Plan is designed and is currently being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. Therefore, they believe that the Plan was qualified and the related trust was tax-exempt as of the financial statement date.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require the Plan administrator to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability for any uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by tax authorities; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

NOTE D - ADMINISTRATION OF PLAN ASSETS

The Plan's assets, which consist principally of the Company's common shares, are held by the Trustee of the Plan.

Company contributions are held and managed by the Trustee, which invests cash received, interest and dividend income and makes distributions to participants. The Trustee also administers the payment of interest and principal on the loan, which is reimbursed to the Trustee through contributions as determined by the Company.

Certain administrative functions are performed by officers or employees of the Company. No such officer or employee receives compensation from the Plan. Administrative expenses for the Trustee's fees are paid directly by the Company.

During the year ended December 31, 2024, there were no stock transactions. Effective December 31, 2023, the Plan acquired 1,000,000 shares of stock in the Company for \$30,914,223.

NOTE F - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The fair value measurement accounting literature establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. This hierarchy consists of three broad levels: Level 1 inputs consist of unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets and have the highest priority. Level 2 inputs consist of observable inputs other than quoted prices for identical assets (Level 1). Level 3 inputs are unobservable and have the lowest priority. The Plan uses appropriate valuation techniques based on the available inputs to measure the fair value of its investments. When available, the Plan measures fair value using Level 1 inputs because they generally provide the most reliable evidence of fair value. Level 2 inputs are used for investments for which Level 1 inputs were not available. Level 3 inputs would only be used if Level 1 or Level 2 inputs were not available.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value.

Sponsor Company Common Stock: The fair value of the sponsor company common stock is determined by an annual valuation performed by an independent appraiser. These valuations were based on a combination of the market and income valuation approaches consistent with prior years. The appraiser took into account historical and projected cash flow and net earnings, weighted average cost of capital, market comparables, and applicable discounts and premiums.

The Trustee determines the fair value measurement policies and procedures in consultation with the Company's chief financial officer. Those policies and procedures are reassessed at least annually to determine if the current valuation techniques are still appropriate. At that time, the unobservable inputs used in the fair value measurements are evaluated and adjusted, as necessary, based on current market conditions and other third-party information.

NOTE G - LOAN PAYABLE

On December 31, 2023, the Plan entered into a \$30,914,223 term loan agreement with a related party. The proceeds of the loan were used to purchase the Plan Sponsor Company's common stock. The loan is payable in annual installments of approximately \$1,894,251 including interest at 5.03% per annum through December 31, 2053.

Unallocated shares are collateral for the loan. Shares are released from collateral and allocated to participants when principal and interest payments are made. The number of shares released in any year is the number of shares held as collateral, multiplied by the ratio of the current year payments, divided by the total of this year's payments, plus all future years' principal and interest payments. For the Plan year ended December 31, 2024, 64,516 were released and allocated to participants.

NOTE H - PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in their accounts and the interest of each participant in the trust fund will be distributed to such participant or his/her beneficiary at the time prescribed by the Plan terms and the IRC. Upon termination of the Plan, the Trustees will pay all liabilities and expenses of the trust fund and to sell shares of financed stock held in the loan suspense account to the extent it determines such sale to be necessary in order to repay the loan.

NOTE I - RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan's investments consist primarily of the Company's common stock, which is exposed to various risks such as interest rates, market and credit risks, as well as valuation assumptions based on earnings and cash flows. Due to the level of risk associated with investment in common stock and to uncertainties inherent in the estimations and assumptions process, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the value of the common stock will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

NOTE J - RELATED PARTY AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

The Plan invests in Company common stock and has indebtedness guaranteed by the Company. These are related party and party-in-interest transactions. As described in Note B, the Company pays the expenses of the Plan. The Plan has a number of service providers. Such parties are parties-in-interest under ERISA.
