NOTE A - PLAN DESCRIPTION

The following description of the Micro Focus US 401(k) Plan (the Plan) provides general information only. Participants should refer to the plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan under the provisions of Section 401(a) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) covering all eligible employees of Micro Focus US Inc. and participating affiliates (collectively referred to as the Company). Employees become eligible to participate in the Plan upon commencing employment. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as amended.

During 2023, Open Text Corporation acquired Micro Focus International plc. In connection with the acquisition, Open Text, Inc. became the sponsor of the Plan. Effective January 1, 2024, Micro Focus employees became eligible to participate in the Open Text, Inc. 401(k) Plan (Open Text Plan) and contributions to the Plan ceased. During the year ended December 31, 2024, eligible participants could take distributions and loans from the Plan. The sponsor successfully merged the Plan assets into the Open Text Plan on December 31, 2024.

Fidelity Management Trust Company (Fidelity) is the trustee and Fidelity Workplace Services LLC provides recordkeeping services.

Contributions

Through December 31, 2023, participants were able to defer up to 75% of their eligible compensation as pre-tax or Roth contributions. Participants were also able to defer up to 30% of their eligible compensation as after-tax contributions. The Company also made discretionary employer matching and profit sharing contributions. For the year ended December 31, 2024, contributions to the Plan related to a true up for 2023 plan year end employer matching contributions.

During 2024, participants were able to contribute amounts representing distributions from other eligible retirement plans (rollover).

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and matching contributions, as well as allocations of the Company's profit sharing contributions (if any) and plan earnings.

Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account. Participants direct the investment of their account into various investment options offered by the Plan.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their salary deferral contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in the Company's matching and profit sharing contributions is based on years of continuous service. A participant is 100% vested after three years of credited service.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their vested fund account balance a minimum of \$1,000, up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. Loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear a fixed interest rate based on the prevailing interest rates charged by persons in the business of lending money. The interest rate for loans outstanding at December 31, 2023 ranged from 4.25% - 10.50%. The period of repayment cannot exceed five years for a general-purpose loan or 10 years for a primary residence loan. Principal and interest are paid ratably through regular payroll deductions for actively employed participants. Participants may not have more than one loan outstanding.

Payment of Benefits

Upon termination of service, retirement, death, or disability, a participant or beneficiary may elect to receive a lump-sum distribution equal to the value of their vested account or installment payments. Annuities are available for participants with assets transferred from another plan that was subject to the minimum funding requirements under IRC Section 412. Participants who have attained age 59 ½ may also elect to receive a distribution of all or any portion of their account balance prior to termination of employment (in-service withdrawals). The Plan allows for hardship withdrawals in accordance with provisions specified in the plan document. Participants may also elect to receive in-service withdrawals from balances rolled into the Plan. Minimum required distributions for participants who have reached age 73 also apply per Internal Revenue Service ("IRS") regulations.

Forfeited Accounts

Forfeitures may be used to reduce future Company contributions or pay administrative expenses of the Plan. The Company used \$463,334 and \$126,576 in forfeitures to reduce Company contributions and pay Plan expenses, respectively, for the year ended December 31, 2024. At December 31, 2024 unallocated forfeitures were transferred to the Open Text Plan. At December 31, 2023, there were \$651,757 in unallocated forfeitures.

NOTE B - SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP).

Use of Estimates

U.S. GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

The Plan's investments are stated at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Plan management determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the Plan's trustee. See also Note D for discussion of fair value measurements and investment valuation.

Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Net appreciation (depreciation) includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recognized when paid.

Administrative Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Company. Expenses that are paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements.

Transaction based fees for notes receivable from participants and distributions are charged directly to participant accounts. Certain investment related expenses are charged directly against the fund's investment performance and, therefore, are not separately disclosed in the accompanying financial statements.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance. Accrued but unpaid interest, if any, would not have a material impact on the Plan's financial statements. If a participant ceases to make loan repayments and the Plan administrator deems the participant loan to be in default, the participant loan balance is reduced and a benefit payment is recorded.

NOTE C - INVESTMENTS AND INFORMATION CERTIFIED BY THE PLAN'S TRUSTEE

The Plan administrator has elected the method of annual reporting compliance permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's (DOL) Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Accordingly, Fidelity, the Trustee of the Plan, has certified that the following information included in the accompanying financial statements and supplemental schedule is complete and accurate:

- Investments, at fair value, and notes receivable from participants, as shown in the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.
- Net investment income and interest income from notes receivable from participants, as shown in the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024.

NOTE D - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Financial Accounting Standards Board Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 820, *Fair Value Measurements*, provides the framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under ASC 820 are described as follows:

Level 1 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 - Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;

- quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based upon the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual Funds - Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Collective Trust Funds - Valued using the NAV provided by the funds' trustees. The funds calculate NAV in a manner consistent with the measurement principles applicable to investment companies under U.S. GAAP. NAV is used as a practical expedient to measure fair value.

Self-Directed Brokerage Accounts - Accounts primarily consist of common stocks, exchange traded funds, and mutual funds. Common stocks are valued at the closing price reported on the active market on which the individual securities are traded. Exchange-traded funds are valued at their last sale or official closing price on the exchange on which they are principally traded. Mutual funds are valued as described above.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

The Plan invested in funds managed by Fidelity and its affiliates. Transactions in such investments are party-in-interest transactions. The Plan pays certain expenses related to plan operations to various service providers and also issues loans to participants. These transactions are party-in-interest transactions.

NOTE F - PLAN MERGER

Effective December 31, 2024, the Plan was merged into the Open Text Plan and assets totaling \$826,083,388, including approximately \$3 million in notes receivable from participants, were transferred. Participants' accounts were mapped from existing fund options to the investment lineup of the Open Text Plan in accordance with participant notices and instructions.

NOTE G - TAX STATUS

The Company adopted an FMR LLC pre-approved plan document. FMR LLC received an approval letter from the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) dated June 30, 2020, which states that the form of the plan document satisfies the applicable provisions of the IRC. The Plan has been amended since receiving the approval letter. The Plan itself has not received a determination letter from the IRS; however, the Plan's management believes that the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC.

U.S. GAAP requires Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain tax position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan Administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and has concluded that as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, there are no uncertain tax positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subjected to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

NOTE H - PROHIBITED TRANSACTIONS

During 2024, the Plan sponsor had \$50,170 in delinquent loan repayments. The late remittances are pending correction through the IRS's Voluntary Fiduciary Correction Program.

NOTE A - PLAN DESCRIPTION

The following description of the Micro Focus US 401(k) Plan (the Plan) provides general information only. Participants should refer to the plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan under the provisions of Section 401(a) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) covering all eligible employees of Micro Focus US Inc. and participating affiliates (collectively referred to as the Company). Employees become eligible to participate in the Plan upon commencing employment. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as amended.

During 2023, Open Text Corporation acquired Micro Focus International plc. In connection with the acquisition, Open Text, Inc. became the sponsor of the Plan. Effective January 1, 2024, Micro Focus employees became eligible to participate in the Open Text, Inc. 401(k) Plan (Open Text Plan) and contributions to the Plan ceased. During the year ended December 31, 2024, eligible participants could take distributions and loans from the Plan. The sponsor successfully merged the Plan assets into the Open Text Plan on December 31, 2024.

Fidelity Management Trust Company (Fidelity) is the trustee and Fidelity Workplace Services LLC provides recordkeeping services.

Contributions

Through December 31, 2023, participants were able to defer up to 75% of their eligible compensation as pre-tax or Roth contributions. Participants were also able to defer up to 30% of their eligible compensation as after-tax contributions. The Company also made discretionary employer matching and profit sharing contributions. For the year ended December 31, 2024, contributions to the Plan related to a true up for 2023 plan year end employer matching contributions.

During 2024, participants were able to contribute amounts representing distributions from other eligible retirement plans (rollover).

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and matching contributions, as well as allocations of the Company's profit sharing contributions (if any) and plan earnings.

Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account. Participants direct the investment of their account into various investment options offered by the Plan.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their salary deferral contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Vesting in the Company's matching and profit sharing contributions is based on years of continuous service. A participant is 100% vested after three years of credited service.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their vested fund account balance a minimum of \$1,000, up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. Loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and bear a fixed interest rate based on the prevailing interest rates charged by persons in the business of lending money. The interest rate for loans outstanding at December 31, 2023 ranged from 4.25% - 10.50%. The period of repayment cannot exceed five years for a general-purpose loan or 10 years for a primary residence loan. Principal and interest are paid ratably through regular payroll deductions for actively employed participants. Participants may not have more than one loan outstanding.

Payment of Benefits

Upon termination of service, retirement, death, or disability, a participant or beneficiary may elect to receive a lump-sum distribution equal to the value of their vested account or installment payments. Annuities are available for participants with assets transferred from another plan that was subject to the minimum funding requirements under IRC Section 412. Participants who have attained age 59 ½ may also elect to receive a distribution of all or any portion of their account balance prior to termination of employment (in-service withdrawals). The Plan allows for hardship withdrawals in accordance with provisions specified in the plan document. Participants may also elect to receive in-service withdrawals from balances rolled into the Plan. Minimum required distributions for participants who have reached age 73 also apply per Internal Revenue Service ("IRS") regulations.

Forfeited Accounts

Forfeitures may be used to reduce future Company contributions or pay administrative expenses of the Plan. The Company used \$463,334 and \$126,576 in forfeitures to reduce Company contributions and pay Plan expenses, respectively, for the year ended December 31, 2024. At December 31, 2024 unallocated forfeitures were transferred to the Open Text Plan. At December 31, 2023, there were \$651,757 in unallocated forfeitures.

NOTE B - SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP).

Use of Estimates

U.S. GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

The Plan's investments are stated at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Plan management determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the Plan's trustee. See also Note D for discussion of fair value measurements and investment valuation.

Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Net appreciation (depreciation) includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recognized when paid.

Administrative Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Company. Expenses that are paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements.

Transaction based fees for notes receivable from participants and distributions are charged directly to participant accounts. Certain investment related expenses are charged directly against the fund's investment performance and, therefore, are not separately disclosed in the accompanying financial statements.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance. Accrued but unpaid interest, if any, would not have a material impact on the Plan's financial statements. If a participant ceases to make loan repayments and the Plan administrator deems the participant loan to be in default, the participant loan balance is reduced and a benefit payment is recorded.

NOTE C - INVESTMENTS AND INFORMATION CERTIFIED BY THE PLAN'S TRUSTEE

The Plan administrator has elected the method of annual reporting compliance permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's (DOL) Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Accordingly, Fidelity, the Trustee of the Plan, has certified that the following information included in the accompanying financial statements and supplemental schedule is complete and accurate:

- Investments, at fair value, and notes receivable from participants, as shown in the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.
- Net investment income and interest income from notes receivable from participants, as shown in the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024.

NOTE D - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Financial Accounting Standards Board Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 820, *Fair Value Measurements*, provides the framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under ASC 820 are described as follows:

Level 1 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 - Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;

- quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based upon the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual Funds - Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Collective Trust Funds - Valued using the NAV provided by the funds' trustees. The funds calculate NAV in a manner consistent with the measurement principles applicable to investment companies under U.S. GAAP. NAV is used as a practical expedient to measure fair value.

Self-Directed Brokerage Accounts - Accounts primarily consist of common stocks, exchange traded funds, and mutual funds. Common stocks are valued at the closing price reported on the active market on which the individual securities are traded. Exchange-traded funds are valued at their last sale or official closing price on the exchange on which they are principally traded. Mutual funds are valued as described above.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.
