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NOTE A - DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

The following description of the Upstaging, Inc. 401(k) Savings Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Interested parties should refer to the plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

1. General

The Plan is a defined contribution and 401(k) plan covering eligible employees of Upstaging, Inc. (the Company). Non-excluded employees are eligible to participate upon completion of one month of service and attaining age 18. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

2. Contributions

The Plan is funded by voluntary contributions of participants and discretionary matching contributions of the Company. Participants may contribute to the Plan, through regular payroll deductions, and participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also roll over amounts representing distributions from other qualified employee benefit plans. The Company accrued discretionary matching contributions of \$1,292,277 to the Plan for the year ended December 31, 2024. Contributions are subject to certain IRS limitations.

3. Investment Options

Participants must direct their salary deferral contributions and the Company's contributions into a variety of investment funds made available and determined by the Plan Administrator. Participants may change their investment options at any time.

4. Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution, an allocation of the Company's discretionary matching contributions, and an allocation of plan earnings. The Company's discretionary matching contribution is allocated based on a percentage of the participant's contribution. Plan earnings are allocated to participants' accounts in direct proportion to their respective account balances, based on the performance of participants' investment selections. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account balance.

5. Vesting

Participants are immediately fully vested in participant and rollover contributions plus the actual earnings thereon. The portion of the participants' accounts attributable to the Company's contributions becomes 33% vested after one year of service, 66% vested after two years of service, and 100% vested after three years of service. Effective January 1, 2023, the Plan was amended to allow participants to be 100% vested in future discretionary employer matching contributions. In the event of death, disability, or retirement at designated ages, participants become fully vested.

6. Payment of Benefits

On termination of service, a participant may elect to receive a single, lump-sum payment equal to the value of his or her vested account balance or a direct rollover distribution. In-service withdrawals are permitted upon attainment of age 59 1/2. Hardship withdrawals are also permitted by the Plan.

7. Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Participants are permitted to take loans from the Plan up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balances. The loans are collateralized by the borrowers' respective vested account balances and bear interest at rates ranging from 4.25% to 9.50%. Principal and interest are paid through payroll deductions over a period not to exceed five years, unless for the purchase of a primary residence.

8. Administrative Expenses

Certain expenses incurred maintaining the Plan are paid directly by the Company and are excluded from these financial statements. Investment-related expenses are included in net appreciation in value of investments.

9. Forfeitures

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, unallocated plan assets resulting from forfeited nonvested and revenue sharing accounts totaled \$231 and \$252,695, respectively. These accounts will be used to reduce future discretionary Company contributions, pay the Plan's administrative expenses, or allocate among participants. During 2024, the Company used forfeitures of \$149,748 to allocate among participants, and used forfeitures of \$136,001 to reduce the 2023 discretionary matching contributions.

NOTE B - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1. Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting. The Plan recognizes employee contributions and the related employer matching contributions in the period the employee contribution is withheld.

2. Fair Value Measurements

Current accounting standards establish a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below:

Level 1            Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted market prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2            Inputs to the valuation methodology include the following:

- \* Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- \* Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- \* Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- \* Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3            Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

2. Fair Value Measurements (Continued)

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for the Plan's investments measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

*Mutual funds:* Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

*Stable value collective trust fund:* A stable value fund that is composed primarily of bonds backed by the U.S. government, its agencies, instrumentalities and enterprises backed by investment contracts that is valued at the NAV of units of the collective trust. The NAV is used as practical expedient to estimate fair value. This practical expedient would not be used if it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different from the reported NAV. Participant transactions (purchases and sales) may occur daily. If the plan initiates a full redemption of the collective trust, the issuer reserves the right to require 12 months' notification in order to ensure that securities liquidations will be carried out in an orderly business manner.

3. Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Plan's 401(k) Committee determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the trustee. See Note B-2 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments purchased and sold as well as held during the year.

4. Use of Estimates

In preparing the Plan's financial statements, management is required to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of changes in net assets during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

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NOTE D - TAX STATUS

The Plan adopted a nonstandardized pre-approved profit sharing plan sponsored by Merrill Lynch, Pierce, Fenner & Smith Inc. The pre-approved plan has received an opinion letter from the Internal Revenue Service as to the pre-approved plan's qualified status. The pre-approved plan opinion letter has been relied upon by this Plan. The Plan Administrator believes that the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable provisions of the Internal Revenue Code.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not, would not be sustained upon examination by the Internal Revenue Service. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

NOTE E - PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of plan termination, participants become fully vested in their respective account balances.

NOTE F - RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Because of the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

NOTE G - RELATED PARTY AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Plan investments are managed by the Trustee; therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Fees paid by the Plan for investment management services were included as a reduction of the return earned on each investment.

The Plan issues loans to participants, which are secured by the vested balance in the participant's accounts and certain administrative fees related to the administration of the Plan were paid by the Plan or by the Company. These transactions qualify as party-in-interest. Employees of the Company provide administrative services to the Plan for which no fees are charged.

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NOTE A - DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

The following description of the Upstaging, Inc. 401(k) Savings Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Interested parties should refer to the plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

1. General

The Plan is a defined contribution and 401(k) plan covering eligible employees of Upstaging, Inc. (the Company). Non-excluded employees are eligible to participate upon completion of one month of service and attaining age 18. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

2. Contributions

The Plan is funded by voluntary contributions of participants and discretionary matching contributions of the Company. Participants may contribute to the Plan, through regular payroll deductions, and participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also roll over amounts representing distributions from other qualified employee benefit plans. The Company accrued discretionary matching contributions of \$1,292,277 to the Plan for the year ended December 31, 2024. Contributions are subject to certain IRS limitations.

3. Investment Options

Participants must direct their salary deferral contributions and the Company's contributions into a variety of investment funds made available and determined by the Plan Administrator. Participants may change their investment options at any time.

4. Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution, an allocation of the Company's discretionary matching contributions, and an allocation of plan earnings. The Company's discretionary matching contribution is allocated based on a percentage of the participant's contribution. Plan earnings are allocated to participants' accounts in direct proportion to their respective account balances, based on the performance of participants' investment selections. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account balance.

5. Vesting

Participants are immediately fully vested in participant and rollover contributions plus the actual earnings thereon. The portion of the participants' accounts attributable to the Company's contributions becomes 33% vested after one year of service, 66% vested after two years of service, and 100% vested after three years of service. Effective January 1, 2023, the Plan was amended to allow participants to be 100% vested in future discretionary employer matching contributions. In the event of death, disability, or retirement at designated ages, participants become fully vested.

6. Payment of Benefits

On termination of service, a participant may elect to receive a single, lump-sum payment equal to the value of his or her vested account balance or a direct rollover distribution. In-service withdrawals are permitted upon attainment of age 59 1/2. Hardship withdrawals are also permitted by the Plan.

7. Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Participants are permitted to take loans from the Plan up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balances. The loans are collateralized by the borrowers' respective vested account balances and bear interest at rates ranging from 4.25% to 9.50%. Principal and interest are paid through payroll deductions over a period not to exceed five years, unless for the purchase of a primary residence.

8. Administrative Expenses

Certain expenses incurred maintaining the Plan are paid directly by the Company and are excluded from these financial statements. Investment-related expenses are included in net appreciation in value of investments.

9. Forfeitures

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, unallocated plan assets resulting from forfeited nonvested and revenue sharing accounts totaled \$231 and \$252,695, respectively. These accounts will be used to reduce future discretionary Company contributions, pay the Plan's administrative expenses, or allocate among participants. During 2024, the Company used forfeitures of \$149,748 to allocate among participants, and used forfeitures of \$136,001 to reduce the 2023 discretionary matching contributions.

NOTE B - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1. Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting. The Plan recognizes employee contributions and the related employer matching contributions in the period the employee contribution is withheld.

2. Fair Value Measurements

Current accounting standards establish a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below:

Level 1            Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted market prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2            Inputs to the valuation methodology include the following:

- \* Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- \* Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- \* Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- \* Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3            Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

2. Fair Value Measurements (Continued)

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for the Plan's investments measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

*Mutual funds:* Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

*Stable value collective trust fund:* A stable value fund that is composed primarily of bonds backed by the U.S. government, its agencies, instrumentalities and enterprises backed by investment contracts that is valued at the NAV of units of the collective trust. The NAV is used as practical expedient to estimate fair value. This practical expedient would not be used if it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different from the reported NAV. Participant transactions (purchases and sales) may occur daily. If the plan initiates a full redemption of the collective trust, the issuer reserves the right to require 12 months' notification in order to ensure that securities liquidations will be carried out in an orderly business manner.

3. Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Plan's 401(k) Committee determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the trustee. See Note B-2 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments purchased and sold as well as held during the year.

4. Use of Estimates

In preparing the Plan's financial statements, management is required to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of changes in net assets during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

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NOTE D - TAX STATUS

The Plan adopted a nonstandardized pre-approved profit sharing plan sponsored by Merrill Lynch, Pierce, Fenner & Smith Inc. The pre-approved plan has received an opinion letter from the Internal Revenue Service as to the pre-approved plan's qualified status. The pre-approved plan opinion letter has been relied upon by this Plan. The Plan Administrator believes that the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable provisions of the Internal Revenue Code.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not, would not be sustained upon examination by the Internal Revenue Service. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

NOTE E - PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of plan termination, participants become fully vested in their respective account balances.

NOTE F - RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Because of the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

NOTE G - RELATED PARTY AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Plan investments are managed by the Trustee; therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Fees paid by the Plan for investment management services were included as a reduction of the return earned on each investment.

The Plan issues loans to participants, which are secured by the vested balance in the participant's accounts and certain administrative fees related to the administration of the Plan were paid by the Plan or by the Company. These transactions qualify as party-in-interest. Employees of the Company provide administrative services to the Plan for which no fees are charged.
