Note 1. Plan Description

General

The following description of The Krumland Co., LLC 401(k) Plan (the "Plan") provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan document for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all employees of The Krumland Co., LLC and related participating employers (collectively, the "Company") who have completed one year of service and are age 21 or older. The Lincoln National Life Insurance Company ("Lincoln") serves as the custodian of the Plan. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 ("ERISA").

Contributions

Each year, participants may contribute compensation, as defined in the plan document, subject to Internal Revenue Code ("IRC") limitations. Participant salary deferrals may be traditional 401(k) (pretax). The Plan contains an auto-enrollment provision whereby all newly eligible employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan at a set rate of 1% unless they affirmatively elect not to participate. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or contribution plans. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. The Company matches employee contributions at 100% of the first 3% of salary deferrals plus 50% up to 5% of his or her eligible compensation. The employer match was \$611,808 for the year ended December 31, 2024. The Company made a qualified nonelective contribution of \$4,304 during 2024. The Company may also make additional discretionary contributions to the Plan. No additional discretionary contributions were made to the Plan in 2024. Contributions are subject to certain limitations.

Investment Options

Participants direct the investment of their accounts into various investment options offered by the Plan. The Plan currently offers pooled separate accounts and guaranteed interest accounts as investment options for participants.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution, the Company's contribution, an allocation of the Plan's earnings (losses), and charged with allocations of benefit payments, transaction fees related to distributions and administrative expenses. Allocations are based on participant earnings or account balances, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Vesting

Participants are vested immediately in their elective deferrals and the Company's matching portion plus actual earnings thereon. A six-year vesting schedule applies to employer contributions deemed to be discretionary. Participants' accounts will be 100% vested due to retirement, death, or disability regardless of years of service.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum equal to the lesser of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. Loan terms range from 1-5 years or up to 30 years for the purchase of a primary residence. The loans are secured by the vested balance in the participant's account and bear interest at a rate commensurate with local prevailing rates as determined by the plan administrator. At December 31, 2024, outstanding loans bore interest rates of 4.25% and 9.50%. Principal and interest are paid ratably through monthly payroll deductions.

Payment of Benefits

On termination of service due to death, disability, or retirement, a participant may elect to receive an amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account in either a lump-sum amount or various installment and annuity options as provided by the Plan. Hardship distributions are permitted upon demonstration of financial hardship. All fully vested balances are available for distribution after the participant reaches the age of 59.5 years.

Forfeitures

As of December 31, 2024 and 2023, there were no forfeited non-vested accounts. Any future forfeiture balances will be used to reduce future Company contributions, pay Plan expenses, or allocated to remaining participants in accordance with Plan provisions.

Note 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAP").

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts of assets, liabilities, and changes therein and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates and assumptions.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value, except for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts, which are reported at contract value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Plan management determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the custodian. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Investments in fully benefit-responsive investment contracts are reported at contract value. Contract value is the relevant measure for the portion of the net assets available for benefits of a defined contribution plan attributable to fully benefit-responsive investment contracts because contract value is the amount participants normally would receive if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the Plan.

Purchase and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on an accrual basis. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. Delinquent participant loans are reclassified as distributions based upon the terms of the plan document.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded upon distribution.

Administrative Expenses

The Plan's administrative expenses are paid by either the Plan or the Company, as provided by the plan document. Certain administrative functions are performed by employees of the Company. No such employee receives compensation from the Plan. Expenses relating to specific participant transactions (distributions) are charged directly to the participant's account.

Subsequent Events

The Company has evaluated the effects subsequent events would have on the financial statements through October 15, 2025, the date that the financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 3. Unaudited Investment Information Certified by Custodian

The Plan Administrator has elected the method of annual reporting compliance permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Accordingly, Lincoln, a qualified institution, has certified the following investment information included in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedule is complete and accurate:

- Investments and notes receivable from participants as shown in the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023
- Investment income and interest income from notes receivable from participants as shown in the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024
- Investment information and notes receivable from participants included in the accompanying schedule of assets (held at end of year) as of December 31, 2024

The Plan's independent auditors did not perform auditing procedures with respect to this certified investment information, except for comparing such certified investment information to the related investment information included in the financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedule.

Note 4. Fair Value Measurements

Fair value as defined under GAAP is an exit price, representing the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. GAAP establishes a three-tier fair value hierarchy, which prioritizes the inputs used in measuring fair value. These tiers include:

- Level 1.** Observable inputs such as quoted prices in active markets.
- Level 2.** Inputs other than quoted prices in active markets that are either directly or indirectly observable.
- Level 3.** Unobservable inputs about which little or no market data exists, therefore requiring an entity to develop its own assumptions.

Assets and liabilities are classified in their entirety based on the lowest level of input that is significant to the fair value measurement. The Plan's assessment of the significance of a particular input to the fair value measurement requires judgment and may affect the valuation of fair value assets and liabilities and their placement within the fair value hierarchy levels.

In accordance with GAAP, certain investments that were measured at net asset value ("NAV") per share (or its equivalent) have not been classified in the fair value hierarchy. The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. The Plan held no investments within the fair value hierarchy as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.

There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023. The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value.

Pooled Separate Accounts

The Plan invests in pooled separate accounts for which quoted prices are not available in active markets for identical instruments. The Plan utilizes the NAV of units, as determined by the custodian, as the estimated fair value. Because quoted prices in active markets for identical assets are not available, these prices are determined based on underlying investments which are traded on an active market.

The following table summarizes investments for which fair value is measured using the NAV per share practical expedient as of December 31, 2024 and 2023. There are no participant redemption restrictions for these investments; the redemption notice period is applicable only to the Plan.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Note 5. Guaranteed Interest Accounts

The Plan has fully benefit-responsive guaranteed interest accounts with Lincoln. These accounts are backed by assets held in the general account of Lincoln. The accounts are credited with earnings on the underlying investments and charged for participant withdrawals and administrative expenses. The following represents the contract value of investment contracts held by the Plan.

The guaranteed interest accounts held by the Plan are guaranteed investment contracts. The contract issuer is contractually obligated to repay the principal and interest at a specified interest rate that is guaranteed to the Plan. There are no reserves against contract value for credit risk of the contract issuers or otherwise. The crediting interest

rate is based on a formula agreed upon with the issuers, but it may not be less than 0%. Such interest rates are reviewed on a quarterly basis for resetting.

The Plan's ability to receive amounts due in accordance with a fully benefit-responsive investment contract is dependent on the third-party issuer's ability to meet its financial obligations. The issuer's ability to meet its contractual obligations may be affected by future economic and regulatory developments.

Certain events limit the ability of the Plan to transact at contract value with the issuer. Such events include the following: (1) amendments to the plan document (including complete or partial Plan termination or merger with another plan), (2) changes to the Plan's prohibition on competing investment options or deletion of equity wash provisions, (3) premature termination of the contracts (4) bankruptcy of the Plan sponsor or other Plan sponsor events (for example, divestitures or spin-offs of a subsidiary) that cause a significant withdrawal from the Plan, or (5) the failure of the trust to qualify for exemption from federal income taxes or any required prohibited transaction exemption under ERISA. The plan administrator does not believe that the occurrence of any such value event, which would limit the Plan's ability to transact at contract value with participants, is probable.

In addition, certain events allow the issuer to terminate the contracts with the Plan and settle at an amount different from contract value. Those events may be different under each contract. Examples of such events include the following: (1) an uncured violation of the Plan's investment guidelines, (2) a breach of material obligation under the contract, (3) a material representation or (4) a material amendment to the agreements without the consent of the issuer.

Note 6. Exempt Party-in-Interest Transactions

Certain Plan investments are shares of pooled separate accounts managed by Lincoln National Life Insurance Company. Lincoln is the custodian of the Plan and, therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Fees paid to the custodian by the Plan for administrative services and investment management services totaled \$8,030 and \$54,709 for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Note 7. Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants will become 100% vested in their accounts.

Note 8. Tax Status

The Plan has not obtained a determination letter from the Internal Revenue Service (the "IRS") stating that the Plan was in compliance with the applicable requirement of the IRC. The Plan is relying on the IRS approval of the standardized prototype plan that it is utilizing. The IRS has determined and informed the custodian by a letter dated June 30, 2020, that the prototype plan document was designed in accordance with applicable sections of the IRC. The plan administrator believes that the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. Therefore, the plan administrator believes that the Plan was qualified, and the related trust was tax-exempt as of the financial statement date.

GAAP requires Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Note 9. Risk and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, credit, and overall market volatility. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

Note 10. Non-Exempt Party-in-Interest Transaction

During the 2024 and 2023 plan years, there were unintentional delays by the Company in submitting participant contributions in the amount of \$51,085 and \$10,176, respectively, to the custodian. These delinquent contributions constitute prohibited transactions. The Company made contributions to the affected participants' accounts to compensate those participants for lost earnings related to the 2023 late remittances in February 2024.

Consideration of Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements of The Krumland Co., LLC 401(k) Plan (the Plan) as of and for the year ended December 31, 2024, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS), we considered the Plan's internal control over financial reporting (internal control).

This consideration served as a basis for designing our audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstance for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements.

However, this consideration was **not** for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Plan's internal control.

Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Plan's internal control.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the preceding paragraphs and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies and, therefore, material weaknesses or significant deficiencies may exist that were not identified.

Categorizing Deficiencies by Severity

Deficiency

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis.

Significant Deficiency

A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Material Weakness

A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that material misstatements of the Plan's financial statements will not be prevented or detected and corrected on a timely basis.



Identified Deficiencies

We identified certain deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be significant deficiencies:

Significant Deficiencies

- Late Remittance of Employee Contributions - We noted 2 payroll periods that were delayed in submitting participant contributions to the Plan. The DOL requires that participant contributions be remitted to the Plan on the earliest date on which the withholdings can be reasonably segregated from the Plan sponsor's general assets. Failure to remit participant contributions to the Plan in a timely manner results in a prohibited transaction which must be separately reported to the DOL and may result in penalties to the Plan sponsor. Please contact your TPA to determine appropriate correction.

We would like to point out that contributions should be remitted within consistent time frames. For example, we noted that most contributions were remitted within 5 days of the pay date, but 2 were remitted after 10 days. The timeliness of the remittances of participant contributions remains an enforcement initiative, and, if a plan is audited, the DOL will determine whether the plan sponsor had the ability to remit contributions more quickly.

- Incorrect Deferral Percentage Deductions - We noted that 1 participant's deferral deductions were withheld at 15%, however, the participant's election was 5%. We further note that this error was detected and corrected prior to the commencement of our audit.
- Census Data Differences - We were unable to fully reconcile the differences between the total number of employees and total contributions per the census data provided as compared to totals per Forms W-3. We recommend management routinely review the YTD payroll information and compare to the reports generated and provided to the third-party administrator for accuracy and completeness of information.
- Errors in Participant Allocations - During a self-audit, Management noted several instances in which the employee deferral and employer match as calculated was not correctly reported to the third-party recordkeeper. We recommend continuing to review the participant allocations periodically during the year to check for accuracy. It is our understanding that the third-party administrator is assisting with determination of appropriate corrections.
- Compliance tests - As of the date of our report, the Plan sponsor had not yet completed the testing to demonstrate compliance with Internal Revenue Code (IRC) requirements and Plan limits. These requirements must be satisfied for a Plan to retain its qualified tax status. We recommend that the IRC testing be performed and that the Plan sponsor take any action that may be required, based on the test results, prior to December 31, 2025.

Plan Design & Operations

6. We acknowledge our responsibility for administering the Plan and determining that the Plan's transactions that are presented and disclosed in the ERISA plan financial statements are in conformity with the Plan's provisions, including maintaining sufficient records with respect to each of the participants to determine the benefits due or which may become due to such participants.

7. The Plan and the trust established under the plan are qualified under the appropriate section of the Internal Revenue Code, and we intend to continue them as a qualified Plan and trust. We do not have any intention at present to terminate the Plan. Required nondiscrimination testing under appropriate Internal Revenue Code sections is in process and any necessary corrections will be made in accordance with regulations.
8. The Plan instrument has not been amended during the year.
9. The Plan has not obtained a determination letter from the Internal Revenue Service (the "IRS") stating that the Plan was in compliance with the applicable requirement of the IRC. The Plan is relying on the IRS approval of the standardized prototype plan that it is utilizing. The IRS has determined and informed the custodian by a letter dated June 30, 2020, that the prototype plan document was designed in accordance with applicable sections of the IRC. The plan administrator believes that the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. Therefore, the plan administrator believes that the Plan was qualified, and the related trust was tax-exempt as of the financial statement date.
10. The Plan has complied with the fidelity bonding requirements of ERISA.

12. We have reviewed the reports of all transactions processed by third-party servicers, and, based on our review, we believe the transactions shown in the reports are valid and in accordance with our instructions to the third-party processor. We also have had no communications from any of the Plan's service organizations regarding any fraud, noncompliance with laws and regulations, or uncorrected misstatements.
13. We have complied with the DOL's regulations concerning the timely remittance of participant contributions and loan repayments, with the exception of those disclosed in the financial statements.
14. As applicable, we have complied with the DOL's regulations concerning the services provider fee disclosures in accordance with Section 408(b)(2).
15. We understand the values of the assets and liabilities recorded in the financial statements could change rapidly, resulting in material future adjustments to investment values that could negatively impact the Plan. We acknowledge that you have no responsibility for future changes caused by the current economic environment and the resulting impact on the Plan's financial statements. Further, the Plan Sponsor is solely responsible for all aspects of managing the Plan, including questioning the quality and valuation of investments.
16. We have evaluated whether there are conditions or events known or reasonably knowable, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Plan's ability to continue as a going concern within one year of the date of this letter without consideration of potential mitigating effects of management's plans not yet fully implemented and concluded substantial doubt does not exist.
17. We have noted an operational issue related to late contribution remittances that require correction. We believe the issue is not material to the overall financial statements and do not believe it has an impact on the tax status of the Plan. We are not aware of any operational issues other than that mentioned above.

18. We have informed you of all current risks of a material amount that are not adequately prevented or detected by our procedures with respect to:
 - a. Misappropriation of assets.
 - b. Misrepresented or misstated assets or liabilities.

Neither the Plan nor the Plan Sponsor have sought or received attorney's services related to pending or threatened litigation or claims during or subsequent to the audit period. Also, we are not aware of any litigation or claims, pending or threatened, for which legal counsel should be sought.
25. We have no knowledge of communications, other than those specifically disclosed, from regulatory agencies, governmental representatives, employees, or others concerning investigations or allegations of noncompliance with laws and regulations, deficiencies in financial reporting practices, or other matters that could have a material adverse effect on the financial statements.
26. We have disclosed to you all known instances of violations or noncompliance or possible violations or suspected noncompliance with laws and regulations whose effects should be considered when preparing financial statements or as a basis for recording a loss contingency.
27. We have apprised you of all communications, written or oral, with regulatory agencies concerning the operation of the Plan.

Nonattest Services

28. You have provided nonattest services, including the following, during the period of this engagement:
 - Preparing a draft of the financial statements and related notes and supplemental schedules
 - Maintenance of certain account reconciliations
 - Preparing entries to convert cash basis accounting records to accrual basis accounting records
29. With respect to these services:
 - a. We have designated a qualified management-level individual to be responsible and accountable for overseeing the nonattest services.
 - b. We have established and monitored the performance of the nonattest services to ensure they meet our objectives.
 - c. We have made any and all decisions involving management functions with respect to the nonattest services and accept full responsibility for such decisions.
 - d. We have evaluated the adequacy of the services performed and any findings that resulted.
 - e. We have established and maintained internal controls, including monitoring ongoing activities.
 - f. When we receive final deliverables from you we will store those deliverables in information systems controlled by us. We have taken responsibility for maintaining internal control over these deliverables.

Financial Statements & Reports

30. We have reviewed and approved a draft of the financial statements and related notes referred to above, which you prepared in connection with your audit of our financial statements. We acknowledge that we are responsible for the fair presentation of the financial statements and related notes.
31. With regard to supplemental schedules:
 - a. We acknowledge our responsibility for the fair presentation of the supplemental schedules including their form and content in conformity with relevant regulatory requirements or other applicable criteria.
 - b. The methods of measurement and presentation of the supplemental schedules are unchanged from those used in the prior period, and we have disclosed to you any significant assumptions or interpretations underlying the measurement and presentation of the supplemental schedules.
 - c. We believe the significant assumptions or interpretations underlying the measurement and/or presentation of the supplemental schedules are reasonable and appropriate.
 - d. The supplemental schedules including their form and content, are presented in conformity with the DOL's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

Transactions, Records, & Adjustments

32. All transactions have been recorded in the accounting records and are reflected in the financial statements.
33. We have everything we need to keep our books and records.
34. We have disclosed any significant unusual transactions the Plan has entered into during the period, including the nature, terms, and business purpose of those transactions.
35. There are no uncorrected misstatements or omitted disclosures.

Accounting & Disclosure

36. We are not aware of any side agreements or other arrangements (either written or oral) that are in place.
37. Except as reflected in the financial statements, there are no:
 - a. Plans or intentions that may materially affect carrying values of assets, liabilities or net assets.
 - b. Material transactions omitted or improperly recorded in the financial records.
 - c. Material unasserted claims or assessments that are probable of assertion or other gain/loss contingencies requiring accrual or disclosure in accordance with Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) Topic 450, *Contingencies*, including those arising from environmental remediation obligations.
 - d. Events occurring subsequent to the date of the statement of net assets available for benefits through the date of this letter, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued, requiring adjustment or disclosure in the financial statements.

- e. Reportable transactions as defined in Section 103(b)(3)(H) of ERISA.
38. Except as disclosed in the financial statements, the Plan has:
- a. Satisfactory title to all recorded assets, and those assets are not subject to any liens, pledges, or other encumbrances.
 - b. Complied with all aspects of contractual agreements, for which noncompliance would materially affect the financial statements.

Receivables

39. Adequate allowances have been accrued for any material losses from uncollectible receivables.

Estimates

40. We have identified all accounting estimates that could be material to the financial statements, and we confirm the appropriateness of the methods and the consistency in their application, the accuracy and completeness of data, and the reasonableness of significant assumptions used by the Plan in making the accounting estimates, including those measured at fair value reported in the financial statements.
41. Significant estimates that may be subject to a material change in the near term have been properly disclosed in the financial statements. We understand that "near term" means the period within one year of the date of the financial statements. In addition, we have no knowledge of concentrations, which refer to volumes of loans, investments, or deposits, existing at the date of the financial statements that would make the Plan vulnerable to the risk of severe impact in the near term that have not been properly disclosed in the financial statements.

Fair Value

42. With respect to the fair value measurements of financial assets and liabilities, recognized in the financial statements or disclosed in the notes thereto:
- a. The underlying assumptions are reasonable and they appropriately reflect management's intent and ability to carry out its stated course of action.
 - b. The measurement methods and significant assumptions used in determining fair value are appropriate in the circumstances for financial statement measurement and disclosure purposes and have been consistently applied.
 - c. The significant assumptions appropriately reflect market participant assumptions.
 - d. The disclosures related to fair values are complete, adequate, and in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.
 - e. There are no subsequent events that require adjustments to the fair value measurements and disclosures included in the financial statements.

Investments


43. Investments are properly measured at fair value, except for fully benefit responsive investment contracts which are reported at contract value. Investments measured at fair value include:
- a. Investments with a readily determinable fair value that are reported at net asset value (NAV) per share/unit.
 - b. Investment values determined using NAV as a practical expedient.

44. Financial instruments with off-balance sheet risk and financial instruments with concentrations of credit risk have been properly recorded or disclosed in the financial statements.
