Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed an audit of the financial statements of Little Otter Health 401(k) Plan (“the Plan”), an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (“ERISA”), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C). The financial statements comprise the Statement of Net Assets Available for Plan Benefits as of December 31, 2024, and the related Statement of Changes in Net Assets Available for Plan Benefits for the year then ended, and the related Notes to Financial Statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audit of the Plan’s financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor’s Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audit need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the Plan (investment information) by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the Department of Labor’s Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA (qualified institution).

Management has obtained a certification from Matrix Trust Company (“Matrix”) as of and for the year ended December 31, 2024, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note 8 to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Opinion

In our opinion, based on our audit and on the procedures performed as described in the Auditors’ Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section,

NOTE 1 – DESCRIPTION OF PLAN AND BASIS OF PRESENTATION

Description of Plan

The following description of the Little Otter (“the Company”) Health 401(k) Plan (“the Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan’s agreement for a more complete description of the Plan’s provisions. The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all employees of the Company who have completed at least one hour of service, except for non-resident alien employees, union, leased, or other employees. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (“ERISA”). The significant costs of administering the Plan are absorbed by the Company.

Basis of Presentation

The Company presents its financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States (“GAAP”) as outlined in the Financial Accounting Standards Board’s (“the FASB”) Accounting Standards Codification (“the ASC”). The ASC is the single source of authoritative accounting principles applied by nongovernmental entities in the preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP.

Contributions

Each year, participants may defer a portion of their pretax compensation into the Plan and/or Roth contributions, not to exceed certain Internal Revenue Code (“IRC”) limitations or maximum deferral amounts described in the Plan’s agreement. Participants who have attained age fifty before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or contribution plans. Participants direct the investment of their contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan. According to the Plan’s agreement, employer matching or other employer contributions are not permitted under the Plan.

Participant Accounts

Each participant’s account is credited with the participant’s contribution. Participant accounts are further credited or charged with an allocation of earnings or losses and any fees or expenses paid from the Plan. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant’s vested account.

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their contributions plus actual earnings thereon. The Plan does not provide for employer contributions; therefore, no vesting schedule applies.

Payment of Benefits

According to the Plan's agreement, participants are offered different benefit payment options depending on the type of termination. If employment is terminated for any reason other than death, participants are entitled to receive the value of their vested account balance. Distributions are generally made in a lump sum as soon as administratively feasible following termination. For termination of service due to disability, a participant will become fully vested regardless of progress within the vesting schedule and payment will be made to the participant as if they had retired. If the vested account balance does not exceed \$5,000 at termination and no election is made by the participant, the account will be distributed in cash or rolled to an IRA in the participant's name, as required by the Plan's automatic rollover and force-out provisions.

For termination of service due to retirement, a participant must reach the normal retirement age of 59 ½. Upon reaching retirement age, participants will become fully vested in their balance, though payment generally does not begin until employment has been terminated. In such event, at the election of the participant, a distribution will be made, unless the participant remains employed past their normal retirement age in which case, then the participant may defer payment of benefits.

For termination of service due to death, the participant's vested account balance will be paid to the chosen beneficiary. If death occurs prior to participant receiving payment of benefits, the vested account is payable to the participant's designated beneficiary in accordance with the distribution provisions of the Plan.

Notes Receivable from Participants

A participant may borrow against their vested deferral (participant directed) account balances, including cumulative earnings thereon. The minimum amount that a participant may borrow is \$500. The maximum amount that a participant may borrow is \$50,000, reduced by the excess, if any, of the highest outstanding balance of loans to the participant from all plans maintained by the Company. Only one loan may be outstanding at a time. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account and loan interest rates adjust as the prime rate changes, which is commensurate with local prevailing rates as determined quarterly by the Plan's administrator. As of December 31, 2024, the loans bear interest at 9.50%. Principal and interest are paid through direct payroll deductions.

NOTE 2 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The Plan's records are kept on the accrual basis of accounting. All significant assets, liabilities, income, and expenses are recorded when an event or obligation occurs rather than when cash is received or disbursed.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires the Plan's administrator and the Company to make estimates that affect certain reported amounts of net assets available for plan benefits and changes therein and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Subsequent Events

The Company has evaluated subsequent events through October 15, 2025, the date of this report, and determined that there have not been any significant events that have occurred through that date.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

The Plan's investments are stated at fair value. Shares of registered investment companies are valued at quoted market prices which represent the net asset value of shares held by the Plan at year-end. Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis.

Net depreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year. Dividend income is recorded on the cash basis.

Management fees and operating expenses charged to the Plan for investments in mutual funds are deducted from income earned on a daily basis and are not separately reflected. Consequently, management fees and operating expenses are reflected as a reduction of investment return for such investments.

Excess Contributions Payable

The Plan is required to return contributions received during the Plan year in excess of the IRC limits. As of December 31, 2024, there were no excess contributions payable.

Employer Contributions

As of December 31, 2024, there were no employer contributions due to the Plan.

Employee Contributions

As of December 31, 2024, employee contributions due to the Plan were \$21,401.

Administrative Fees

Certain administrative fees of the Plan (primarily audit fees) are paid by the Company. The Plan permits the payment of plan expenses to be made from the Plan's assets. Administrative fees incurred as a direct result of a participant's activities under the Plan are deducted from the participant's account.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Delinquent participant loans are reclassified as distributions based on the terms of the Plan document.

Transfer of Assets

The Company established the Plan, effective January 1, 2024. Assets totaling \$1,055,802 were transferred from Sequoia One 401(k), a multiple employer plan (“MEP”), into the Plan. The transfer included \$1,035,847 in investments and \$19,955 in notes receivable from participants, representing the account balances of participants that transitioned from the MEP to the Plan. The assets were recorded at their fair value as of the transfer date.

NOTE 3 – OPTIONAL PLAN TERMINATION

Although the Company has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of plan termination, participants will become 100% vested in their accounts.

NOTE 4 – INVESTMENT RISKS

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants’ account balances and the amounts reported in the Statement of Net Assets Available for Plan Benefits.

NOTE 5 – INCOME TAX STATUS

The Plan is designed upon a prototype plan document written by the trustee for its retirement plan customers. The prototype plan has received a favorable opinion letter from the Internal Revenue Service (“IRS”) dated June 30, 2020, qualifying for exemption from income taxes based upon Section 401(a) of the IRC. The Plan’s administrator has not requested a separate determination letter for the Plan; however, the Plan’s administrator believes that the Plan is designed in accordance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. The Plan has been amended since the date of the prototype plan opinion letter. However, the Plan’s administrator believes the Plan, as amended, remains in accordance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and has no income subject to unrelated business income tax and, therefore, the Plan and related trust continue to be tax exempt. Therefore, no provision for income tax has been included in the Plan’s financial statements.

GAAP requires the Plan’s management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan’s management has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and has concluded that as of December 31, 2024, there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements.

NOTE 6 – RELATED PARTY AND PARTIES IN INTEREST

The Company has absorbed substantially all costs of the Plan such as accounting and administrative fees. Certain employees and officers of the Company, who are also participants in the Plan, perform administrative services to the Plan at no cost to the Plan. Certain plan investments are shares of mutual funds managed by parties related to Matrix Trust Company (“Matrix”).

Matrix is the trustee as defined by the Plan and, therefore, these transactions may qualify as party-in-interest. Party-in-interest transactions also include notes receivable from participants.

NOTE 7 – FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENT

Investments are stated at fair value. FASB ASC 820, *Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures*, provides the framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value.

The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements).

The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described as follows:

Level 1 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are other than quoted prices in active markets, which are either directly or indirectly observable as of the reporting date, and fair value can be determined through the use of models or other valuation methodologies; and

Level 3 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability’s fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value, including the general classification of such instruments pursuant to the valuation hierarchy. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024.

Mutual Funds - These investments are public investment vehicles valued using the Net Asset Value (“NAV”) provided by the administrator of the fund. The NAV is based on the value of the underlying assets owned by the fund, minus its liabilities, and then divided by the number of units outstanding. These funds are quoted prices in active markets and are classified within Level of the valuation hierarchy.
