To the Plan Administrator and Participants of the

Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit

We have performed audits of the financial statements of DePauw University Retiree Welfare Benefit Plan (the Plan), an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) (ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of the Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audits need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the plan (investment information) by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA (qualified institution).

Management has obtained certifications from a qualified institution as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the year ended December 31, 2024, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note 3 to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Management's election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit does not affect management's responsibility for the financial statements.

NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

The following description of the DePauw University Retiree Welfare Benefit Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General: Through December 31, 2013 the Plan consisted of the DePauw University Retiree Health Plan and Trust and included only the provisions and health reimbursement benefits offered under that arrangement. Effective January 1, 2014, DePauw University (the University or the Employer) amended the DePauw University Retiree Health Plan and Trust, The DePauw Fully-Insured Retiree Health Plan and Trust and certain other benefits offered separately through other University-sponsored welfare plans to be offered as a single wrapped health and welfare benefit plan, renamed the DePauw University Retiree Welfare Benefit Plan. Effective January 1, 2014, the Plan offers various benefit features and includes both defined contribution and defined benefit components, as further discussed below. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

The DePauw University Retiree Health Plan and Trust and the DePauw University Fully-Insured Retiree Health Plan and Trust were both established effective July 1, 2005 by the University as defined contribution plans established for the purposes of reimbursing eligible medical expenses for eligible former employees of the University hired prior to January 1, 2013 and their dependents. These plans are intended to be "health reimbursement arrangements", as defined under Internal Revenue Notice 2002-45. The University established the University-Contribution VEBA Trust for the Emeriti Retiree Health Model Plan for DePauw University and the Employee After-Tax Contribution VEBA Trust Agreement for the Emeriti Retiree Health Model Plan for DePauw University (collectively, the VEBA Trusts) to hold the University and Participant contributions, respectively, made to the Plan. The University also established the Grantor Trust for the Emeriti Fully-Insured Health Plan for DePauw University (the Grantor Trust) to provide a funding vehicle for certain insured health benefits under the Plan. The assets of the Grantor Trust are not intended to be Plan assets under ERISA and, as such, the assets and related investment income of the Grantor Trust are excluded from the Plan's financial statements.

Defined benefit components of the Plan consist of fully-insured supplemental medical, prescription and dental benefits for post-65 Eligible Retirees.

The cost of benefits provided under the Plan may be funded through Plan assets, University contributions and/or participant contributions, as stipulated within the provisions of the particular benefit features offered under the Plan.

Contributions: For those participants who are eligible for health reimbursement arrangements, contributions to the Plan are accumulated in notional individual accounts for each plan participant ("HRA account") while participants are active employees of the University. Each participant's HRA Account benefits are limited to the accumulated balance in his or her HRA account, which is subject to forfeiture of unused amounts.

The University's contributions to HRA accounts established under the DePauw University Retiree Health Plan and Trust are a fixed annual amount for each eligible participant credited to participants' HRA Accounts. The University will cease these contributions to a participant's account as of the earlier of the date the University has made contributions to the participant's account for 25 years or the participant is no longer an eligible employee of the University. Certain participants who are active employees working over 29.5 hours per week may contribute a portion of their after-tax compensation each payroll period.

The University's contributions to HRA accounts established under the DePauw University Fully-Insured Retiree Health Plan and Trust include only those amounts determined through a contractual agreement between the participant and the University entered into prior to January 1, 2013.

Under the fully-insured retiree benefit arrangements, in addition to deductibles and copayments, retirees contribute specified amounts based on applicable monthly premiums for their respective benefit elections. Premiums not covered by retiree contributions are funded by the University.

Eligibility for Benefits: Eligibility for benefits under the Plan generally occurs upon becoming an Eligible Retiree or upon permanent disability. An Eligible Retiree (a) is age 55 or older (b) has completed at least 15 years of continuous full-time employment (c) has a combination of age and years of continuous full-time employment that totals at least 80 and (c) was hired prior to January 1, 2013. Participants hired prior to July 1, 1996 become Eligible Retirees upon reaching age 62 and 15 years of continuous full-time employment. Fully-insured benefits are offered under the Plan to post-65 Eligible Retirees who were hired prior to July 1, 2005.

Reimbursement Benefits: Eligible Retirees may request a reimbursement from the accumulated balances in their individual HRA Accounts for eligible health expenses for themselves and their dependents upon meeting certain eligibility requirements. Eligible Retirees may also use their account balances to pay participant premiums for fully-insured benefits under the Plan. A participant who is not an Eligible Retiree may, upon termination, use participant account balances attributable to their after-tax contributions to pay for reimbursement benefits under the Plan, provided that the participant has attained age 55 or is permanently disabled.

Upon the death of a participant, the participant's dependents may use any remaining balance in the participant's account to pay for reimbursement benefits and, if the participant was an Eligible Retiree, to pay for health plan premiums (to the extent eligible for health plan coverage) for the lives of the participant's dependents or, if earlier, the age of majority of the participant's dependents.

Forfeitures: Unused HRA Account balances remaining after a participant and any eligible dependents are deceased or ineligible for future benefits are forfeited to the Plan. Forfeited amounts are used to reduce the University's future contributions to the Plan or to pay administrative expenses of the Plan.

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited accounts were \$831,310 and \$40,723, respectively. During 2024, forfeitures of \$26,873 were used to pay Plan administrative expenses and University contributions were reduced by \$216,378 through the use of forfeitures.

Plan Termination: While there is no current intention to do so, the University reserves the right to discontinue University contributions, eliminate any form of benefit, or terminate the Plan at any time subject to the provisions of ERISA. Should the Plan terminate at some future time, assets remaining in the VEBA Trusts after all liabilities under the Plan are satisfied shall be used, as the University determines, to provide benefits to employees or former employees of the University in a nondiscriminatory manner in accordance with Section 501(c)(9) of the Internal Revenue Code (the "Code") and applicable provisions of ERISA.

Administrative and Investment Management Expenses: The Plan's record keeping and custodial fees are paid by the Plan and are reflected in the financial statements as administrative expenses of the Plan. Investment management fees are charged to the Plan as a reduction of investment return and included in the investment income (loss) reported by the Plan. All other expenses of the Plan are paid by the University.

Notional Health Reimbursement Accounts: A participant's HRA Account is credited with the participant's and University's contributions, and an allocation of Plan earnings, and is charged with his or her withdrawals and an allocation of administrative expenses. Allocations are based on account balances or specific participant transactions, as defined. Each participant directs the investment of the portion of the assets held in the VEBA Trusts equivalent to his or her account to any of the investment options available under the Plan.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting: The accompanying financial statements of the Plan have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Estimates: The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the certain reported amounts and disclosures, and actual results may differ from these estimates.

Payment of Benefits: Reimbursements to participants and insurance premiums paid for benefits are recorded when paid.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition: The Plan's investments are reported at fair value as further described in Note 4. Purchases and sales are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation (depreciation) includes the Plan's gains and losses on investment bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Risks and Uncertainties: The Plan holds various investments which are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market and credit risks as well as the risks associated with the ongoing Coronavirus pandemic. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investments, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in their values will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

The actuarial present value of postretirement benefit obligations is reported based on certain assumptions pertaining to interest rates, health care inflation rates and employee demographics, all of which are subject to change. Due to uncertainties inherent in the estimation and assumptions processes, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in these estimates and assumptions in the near term could materially affect the amounts reported and disclosed in the financial statements.

NOTE 3 - CERTIFIED INVESTMENTS

Certain information related to investments disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedule, including investments held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of investments and interest and dividends for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Charles Schwab Trust Bank (the trustee of the Plan).

NOTE 4 - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Fair value is the price that would be received by the Plan for an asset or paid by the Plan to transfer a liability (an exit price) in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date in the Plan's principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability. Fair value measurements are determined by maximizing the use of observable inputs and minimizing the use of unobservable inputs. The hierarchy places the highest priority on unadjusted quoted market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and gives the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of inputs within the fair value hierarchy are defined as follows:

Level 1: Quoted prices (unadjusted) for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access as of the measurement date.

Level 2: Significant other observable inputs other than Level 1 prices such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities; quoted prices in markets that are not active; or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data.

Level 3: Significant unobservable inputs that reflect the Plan's own assumptions about the assumptions that market participants would use in pricing an asset or liability.

In some cases, a valuation technique used to measure fair value may include inputs from multiple levels of the fair value hierarchy. The lowest level of significant input determines the placement of the entire fair value measurement in the hierarchy.

The following presents the valuation methods and assumptions used by the Plan to estimate the fair values of investments.

Mutual Funds: The fair values of mutual fund investments are determined by obtaining quoted prices on nationally recognized securities exchanges (Level 1 inputs).

Money Market Deposit Account: Fair value is estimated to approximate the cost basis of the deposit account balance, based upon the liquidity of the account and the credit quality of the issuer. The Plan's investment in the money market deposit account may occasionally exceed the federally insured balance. (Level 1 inputs).

The methods described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

NOTE 5 - POSTRETIREMENT BENEFIT OBLIGATIONS

The fully-insured retiree health insurance benefits comprise the defined benefit components of the Plan.

The postretirement benefit obligations relative to the Plan represents the total actuarial present value of those estimated future benefits that were attributed to employee service rendered through the date of the financial statements, reduced by the actuarial present value of contributions expected to be received in the future from current Plan participants. The obligations represent the amounts that are expected to be funded by contributions from the University and from existing assets of the Plan. Postretirement benefits include future insurance premiums expected to be paid to or for (1) currently retired employees and (2) active employees after retirement from service with the University. Prior to an active employee's full eligibility date, the postretirement benefit obligation is the portion of the expected postretirement benefit obligation that is attributed to that employee's service rendered to the valuation date.

The actuarial present value of the postretirement benefit obligation is determined by the Plan's actuary, and is the amount that results from applying actuarial assumptions to the expected benefit payment amount, adjusted for the time value of money (through discounts for interest) and for the probability of payment (by means of decrements such as those for death, disability, withdrawal or retirement) between the valuation date and the expected date of payment.

The \$201,729 decrease in accumulated benefit obligations related to change in actuarial assumptions is due to a change in the discount rate assumptions used by the Plan.

Significant assumptions used by the actuary to estimate the present value of the Plan's postretirement benefit obligations include:

Retirement rate: Ranges from 5% at age 55 to 100% at age 70 as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Discount rate: 5.45% as of December 31, 2024 and 4.80% as of December 31, 2023.

Post-Medicare eligible premiums for which DePauw will pay: Ranges from \$1,258 to \$3,617 for the years December 31, 2024 and 2023, depending on age of retiree and prescription drug coverage level.

Mortality table: Pri-2012 mortality table set forward 1 year with generational mortality improvement Scale MP-2021 from the 2006 base year as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.

These actuarial assumptions are based on the presumption that the Plan will continue. If the Plan were to terminate, different actuarial assumptions and other factors might be applicable in determining the actuarial present value of the postretirement benefit obligation.

As of January 1, 2013, the Plan entered an agreement with a provider that specifies the post 65 medical trend rates to increase by approximately 3% per year.

The health care cost trend rate has a significant effect on the amounts reported in the accompanying financial statements. If the assumed health care cost trend rate was increased by one percentage point, the postretirement benefit obligations as of December 31, 2024 and 2023 would increase by approximately \$310,078 and \$429,254, respectively. If the assumed health care cost trend rate was decreased by one percentage point, the postretirement benefit obligations as of December 31, 2024 and 2023 would decrease by approximately \$289,605 and \$391,198, respectively.

NOTE 6 - NOTIONAL HEALTH REIMBURSEMENT ACCOUNTS

HRA Accounts are offered within the defined contribution benefit features under the Plan, formerly the DePauw University Retiree Health Plan and Trust and the DePauw University Fully-Insured Retiree Health Plan and Trust. The following presents a summary of balances in participants' notional HRA Accounts as of December 31, 2024 and 2023 and the activity in those accounts for the year ended December 31, 2024.

NOTE 7 - TAX STATUS

The Internal Revenue Service has determined and informed the University by letters dated August 11, 2006 that the VEBA Trusts qualify under Section 501(c)(9) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) and are therefore exempt from federal income taxes. The University is not aware of any courses of action or series of events that have occurred that might adversely affect the Trusts' qualified status.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan. The plan administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and has concluded that as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. The plan administrator believes it is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to 2021.

NOTE 8 - PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Parties in interest are defined under DOL regulations as any fiduciary of the Plan, any party rendering service to the Plan, the employer, and certain others. Certain administrative functions are performed by officers or employees of the University. No such officer or employee receives compensation from the Plan. Some administrative expenses of the Plan are paid directly by the University.

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, the Plan held a money market fund managed by Charles Schwab. Charles Schwab is an affiliate of the Plan's custodian and therefore, this investment and the Plan's payment of custodial fees and investment management fees to Charles Schwab qualify as party-in-interest transactions.

Plan management has evaluated subsequent events for recognition and disclosure through October 15, 2025, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

We have performed audits of the financial statements of DePauw University Retiree Welfare Benefit Plan (the Plan), an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) (ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit). The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended December 31, 2024, and the related notes to the financial statements.

NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

The following description of the DePauw University Retiree Welfare Benefit Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General: Through December 31, 2013 the Plan consisted of the DePauw University Retiree Health Plan and Trust and included only the provisions and health reimbursement benefits offered under that arrangement. Effective January 1, 2014, DePauw University (the University or the Employer) amended the DePauw University Retiree Health Plan and Trust, The DePauw Fully-Insured Retiree Health Plan and Trust and certain other benefits offered separately through other University-sponsored welfare plans to be offered as a single wrapped health and welfare benefit plan, renamed the DePauw University Retiree Welfare Benefit Plan. Effective January 1, 2014, the Plan offers various benefit features and includes both defined contribution and defined benefit components, as further discussed below. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

The DePauw University Retiree Health Plan and Trust and the DePauw University Fully-Insured Retiree Health Plan and Trust were both established effective July 1, 2005 by the University as defined contribution plans established for the purposes of reimbursing eligible medical expenses for eligible former employees of the University hired prior to January 1, 2013 and their dependents. These plans are intended to be "health reimbursement arrangements", as defined under Internal Revenue Notice 2002-45. The University established the University-Contribution VEBA Trust for the Emeriti Retiree Health Model Plan for DePauw University and the Employee After-Tax Contribution VEBA Trust Agreement for the Emeriti Retiree Health Model Plan for DePauw University (collectively, the VEBA Trusts) to hold the University and Participant contributions, respectively, made to the Plan. The University also established the Grantor Trust for the Emeriti Fully-Insured Health Plan for DePauw University (the Grantor Trust) to provide a funding vehicle for certain insured health benefits under the Plan. The assets of the Grantor Trust are not intended to be Plan assets under ERISA and, as such, the assets and related investment income of the Grantor Trust are excluded from the Plan's financial statements.

Defined benefit components of the Plan consist of fully-insured supplemental medical, prescription and dental benefits for post-65 Eligible Retirees.

The cost of benefits provided under the Plan may be funded through Plan assets, University contributions and/or participant contributions, as stipulated within the provisions of the particular benefit features offered under the Plan.

Contributions: For those participants who are eligible for health reimbursement arrangements, contributions to the Plan are accumulated in notional individual accounts for each plan participant ("HRA account") while participants are active employees of the University. Each participant's HRA Account benefits are limited to the accumulated balance in his or her HRA account, which is subject to forfeiture of unused amounts.

The University's contributions to HRA accounts established under the DePauw University Retiree Health Plan and Trust are a fixed annual amount for each eligible participant credited to participants' HRA Accounts. The University will cease these contributions to a participant's account as of the earlier of the date the University has made contributions to the participant's account for 25 years or the participant is no longer an eligible employee of the University. Certain participants who are active employees working over 29.5 hours per week may contribute a portion of their after-tax compensation each payroll period.

The University's contributions to HRA accounts established under the DePauw University Fully-Insured Retiree Health Plan and Trust include only those amounts determined through a contractual agreement between the participant and the University entered into prior to January 1, 2013.

Under the fully-insured retiree benefit arrangements, in addition to deductibles and copayments, retirees contribute specified amounts based on applicable monthly premiums for their respective benefit elections. Premiums not covered by retiree contributions are funded by the University.

Eligibility for Benefits: Eligibility for benefits under the Plan generally occurs upon becoming an Eligible Retiree or upon permanent disability. An Eligible Retiree (a) is age 55 or older (b) has completed at least 15 years of continuous full-time employment (c) has a combination of age and years of continuous full-time employment that totals at least 80 and (c) was hired prior to January 1, 2013. Participants hired prior to July 1, 1996 become Eligible Retirees upon reaching age 62 and 15 years of continuous full-time employment. Fully-insured benefits are offered under the Plan to post-65 Eligible Retirees who were hired prior to July 1, 2005.

Reimbursement Benefits: Eligible Retirees may request a reimbursement from the accumulated balances in their individual HRA Accounts for eligible health expenses for themselves and their dependents upon meeting certain eligibility requirements. Eligible Retirees may also use their account balances to pay participant premiums for fully-insured benefits under the Plan. A participant who is not an Eligible Retiree may, upon termination, use participant account balances attributable to their after-tax contributions to pay for reimbursement benefits under the Plan, provided that the participant has attained age 55 or is permanently disabled.

Upon the death of a participant, the participant's dependents may use any remaining balance in the participant's account to pay for reimbursement benefits and, if the participant was an Eligible Retiree, to pay for health plan premiums (to the extent eligible for health plan coverage) for the lives of the participant's dependents or, if earlier, the age of majority of the participant's dependents.

Forfeitures: Unused HRA Account balances remaining after a participant and any eligible dependents are deceased or ineligible for future benefits are forfeited to the Plan. Forfeited amounts are used to reduce the University's future contributions to the Plan or to pay administrative expenses of the Plan.

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, forfeited accounts were \$831,310 and \$40,723, respectively. During 2024, forfeitures of \$26,873 were used to pay Plan administrative expenses and University contributions were reduced by \$216,378 through the use of forfeitures.

Plan Termination: While there is no current intention to do so, the University reserves the right to discontinue University contributions, eliminate any form of benefit, or terminate the Plan at any time subject to the provisions of ERISA. Should the Plan terminate at some future time, assets remaining in the VEBA Trusts after all liabilities under the Plan are satisfied shall be used, as the University determines, to provide benefits to employees or former employees of the University in a nondiscriminatory manner in accordance with Section 501(c)(9) of the Internal Revenue Code (the "Code") and applicable provisions of ERISA.

Administrative and Investment Management Expenses: The Plan's record keeping and custodial fees are paid by the Plan and are reflected in the financial statements as administrative expenses of the Plan. Investment management fees are charged to the Plan as a reduction of investment return and included in the investment income (loss) reported by the Plan. All other expenses of the Plan are paid by the University.

NOTE 1 - DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN (Continued)

Notional Health Reimbursement Accounts: A participant's HRA Account is credited with the participant's and University's contributions, and an allocation of Plan earnings, and is charged with his or her withdrawals and an allocation of administrative expenses. Allocations are based on account balances or specific participant transactions, as defined. Each participant directs the investment of the portion of the assets held in the VEBA Trusts equivalent to his or her account to any of the investment options available under the Plan.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting: The accompanying financial statements of the Plan have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Estimates: The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the certain reported amounts and disclosures, and actual results may differ from these estimates.

Payment of Benefits: Reimbursements to participants and insurance premiums paid for benefits are recorded when paid.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition: The Plan's investments are reported at fair value as further described in Note 4. Purchases and sales are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation (depreciation) includes the Plan's gains and losses on investment bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Risks and Uncertainties: The Plan holds various investments which are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market and credit risks as well as the risks associated with the ongoing Coronavirus pandemic. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investments, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in their values will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

The actuarial present value of postretirement benefit obligations is reported based on certain assumptions pertaining to interest rates, health care inflation rates and employee demographics, all of which are subject to change. Due to uncertainties inherent in the estimation and assumptions processes, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in these estimates and assumptions in the near term could materially affect the amounts reported and disclosed in the financial statements.

NOTE 3 - CERTIFIED INVESTMENTS

Certain information related to investments disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and ERISA-required supplemental schedule, including investments held at December 31, 2024 and 2023, and net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of investments and interest and dividends for the year ended December 31, 2024, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Charles Schwab Trust Bank (the trustee of the Plan).

NOTE 4 - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Fair value is the price that would be received by the Plan for an asset or paid by the Plan to transfer a liability (an exit price) in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date in the Plan's principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability. Fair value measurements are determined by maximizing the use of observable inputs and minimizing the use of unobservable inputs. The hierarchy places the highest priority on unadjusted quoted market prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and gives the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of inputs within the fair value hierarchy are defined as follows:

Level 1: Quoted prices (unadjusted) for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access as of the measurement date.

Level 2: Significant other observable inputs other than Level 1 prices such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities; quoted prices in markets that are not active; or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data.

Level 3: Significant unobservable inputs that reflect the Plan's own assumptions about the assumptions that market participants would use in pricing an asset or liability.

In some cases, a valuation technique used to measure fair value may include inputs from multiple levels of the fair value hierarchy. The lowest level of significant input determines the placement of the entire fair value measurement in the hierarchy.

The following presents the valuation methods and assumptions used by the Plan to estimate the fair values of investments.

Mutual Funds: The fair values of mutual fund investments are determined by obtaining quoted prices on nationally recognized securities exchanges (Level 1 inputs).

Money Market Deposit Account: Fair value is estimated to approximate the cost basis of the deposit account balance, based upon the liquidity of the account and the credit quality of the issuer. The Plan's investment in the money market deposit account may occasionally exceed the federally insured balance. (Level 1 inputs).

The methods described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

NOTE 5 - POSTRETIREMENT BENEFIT OBLIGATIONS

The fully-insured retiree health insurance benefits comprise the defined benefit components of the Plan.

The postretirement benefit obligations relative to the Plan represents the total actuarial present value of those estimated future benefits that were attributed to employee service rendered through the date of the financial statements, reduced by the actuarial present value of contributions expected to be received in the future from current Plan participants. The obligations represent the amounts that are expected to be funded by contributions from the University and from existing assets of the Plan. Postretirement benefits include future insurance premiums expected to be paid to or for (1) currently retired employees and (2) active employees after retirement from service with the University. Prior to an active employee's full eligibility date, the postretirement benefit obligation is the portion of the expected postretirement benefit obligation that is attributed to that employee's service rendered to the valuation date.

The actuarial present value of the postretirement benefit obligation is determined by the Plan's actuary, and is the amount that results from applying actuarial assumptions to the expected benefit payment amount, adjusted for the time value of money (through discounts for interest) and for the probability of payment (by means of decrements such as those for death, disability, withdrawal or retirement) between the valuation date and the expected date of payment.

The \$201,729 decrease in accumulated benefit obligations related to change in actuarial assumptions is due to a change in the discount rate assumptions used by the Plan.

Significant assumptions used by the actuary to estimate the present value of the Plan's postretirement benefit obligations include:

Retirement rate: Ranges from 5% at age 55 to 100% at age 70 as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Discount rate: 5.45% as of December 31, 2024 and 4.80% as of December 31, 2023.

Post-Medicare eligible premiums for which DePauw will pay: Ranges from \$1,258 to \$3,617 for the years December 31, 2024 and 2023, depending on age of retiree and prescription drug coverage level.

Mortality table: Pri-2012 mortality table set forward 1 year with generational mortality improvement Scale MP-2021 from the 2006 base year as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.

These actuarial assumptions are based on the presumption that the Plan will continue. If the Plan were to terminate, different actuarial assumptions and other factors might be applicable in determining the actuarial present value of the postretirement benefit obligation.

As of January 1, 2013, the Plan entered an agreement with a provider that specifies the post 65 medical trend rates to increase by approximately 3% per year.

The health care cost trend rate has a significant effect on the amounts reported in the accompanying financial statements. If the assumed health care cost trend rate was increased by one percentage point, the postretirement benefit obligations as of December 31, 2024 and 2023 would increase by approximately \$310,078 and \$429,254, respectively. If the assumed health care cost trend rate was decreased by one percentage point, the postretirement benefit obligations as of December 31, 2024 and 2023 would decrease by approximately \$289,605 and \$391,198, respectively.

NOTE 6 - NOTIONAL HEALTH REIMBURSEMENT ACCOUNTS

HRA Accounts are offered within the defined contribution benefit features under the Plan, formerly the DePauw University Retiree Health Plan and Trust and the DePauw University Fully-Insured Retiree Health Plan and Trust. The following presents a summary of balances in participants' notional HRA Accounts as of December 31, 2024 and 2023 and the activity in those accounts for the year ended December 31, 2024.

NOTE 7 - TAX STATUS

The Internal Revenue Service has determined and informed the University by letters dated August 11, 2006 that the VEBA Trusts qualify under Section 501(c)(9) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) and are therefore exempt from federal income taxes. The University is not aware of any courses of action or series of events that have occurred that might adversely affect the Trusts' qualified status.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan. The plan administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan, and has concluded that as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. The plan administrator believes it is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to 2021.

NOTE 8 - PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Parties in interest are defined under DOL regulations as any fiduciary of the Plan, any party rendering service to the Plan, the employer, and certain others. Certain administrative functions are performed by officers or employees of the University. No such officer or employee receives compensation from the Plan. Some administrative expenses of the Plan are paid directly by the University.

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, the Plan held a money market fund managed by Charles Schwab. Charles Schwab is an affiliate of the Plan's custodian and therefore, this investment and the Plan's payment of custodial fees and investment management fees to Charles Schwab qualify as party-in-interest transactions.

NOTE 9 - SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Plan management has evaluated subsequent events for recognition and disclosure through October 15, 2025, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.
