Notes to Financial Statements

1. Description of the Plan

The following description of the Itineris NA, Inc. 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan (the “Plan”) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan document for a more complete description of the Plan’s provisions.

General– The Plan, established effective January 1, 2010, is a defined contribution plan covering substantially all employees of Itineris NA, Inc. (the “Plan Sponsor” or “Plan Administrator”). Employees must be over the age of 21 and have completed 6 months of service in order to become a participant in the Plan, begin making elective deferrals and receive Plan Sponsor safe harbor contributions. In accordance with the Plan agreement, the following classes of employees are excluded from eligibility:

- Union employees covered by a collective bargaining agreement; and
- Non-resident aliens.

The Plan was amended and restated effective January 1, 2017 to bring the Plan into compliance with legislative and regulatory changes set forth in IRS Notice 2017-37 (“Cycle 3 Restatement”). Effective January 1, 2022, the Plan was restated to implement the CARES Act provisions, and to change the safe harbor match contribution percentages. In addition, effective January 1, 2024, the Plan was amended to specify a maximum force-out amount not to exceed \$7,000, and to increase the months of service to be an eligible employee.

The Plan most recently transitioned trustee’s from Ameritas Mutual Holding Company (“Ameritas” or “Former Trustee”) to John Hancock Trust Company LLC (“John Hancock, or “Current Trustee”). The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (“ERISA”). The transition took place on April 9, 2024. This is the first year the Plan Sponsor required an audit, and therefore, no comparative financial statements are presented.

Contributions– Participants may elect to contribute a specific percentage or dollar amount of their annual compensation as a pre-tax contribution, limited by the amount imposed by law. Additionally, participants age 50 or older may elect to make a catch-up contribution limited to the amount imposed by law. The Plan also allows for Roth deferrals. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or contribution plans (i.e., rollovers).

The Plan Sponsor safe harbor matching contribution is equal to 100% of salary deferrals up to 3% of employee compensation, plus 50% of salary deferrals between 3% and 5% of employee compensation.

1. Description of the Plan (continued)

Additional matching profit sharing contributions may also be made at the discretion of the Company's Board of Directors. There were no additional matching profit sharing contributions for the year ended December 31, 2024.

Vesting – Participants are immediately vested in their salary deferral, rollover contributions, Plan Sponsor contributions and actual earnings thereon.

Participant Accounts – Individual accounts are maintained for each Plan participant. Participant accounts are increased by participant contributions, Plan Sponsor contributions and the participant's share of Plan earnings. Participant accounts are decreased by participant distributions and each participant's share of Plan expenses and losses. The allocation of earnings and losses to participant accounts is based upon the value of an individual account in relation to the total assets of the Plan. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

Payment of Benefits – Plan assets allocated to a participant's account may be distributed upon termination of employment, after reaching age 65, or upon death. Participants may withdraw funds from their rollover account at any time. Participants may receive their accumulated vested benefits held by the Plan's custodian upon termination of employment or elect to keep their vested balance in the Plan until the earlier of normal retirement age or death, if their account balance is in excess of \$7,000. Participants may elect to receive payments either in a lump sum or installments. Hardship withdrawals as defined by the Internal Revenue Code (the "Code") are available to participants only from money sources that the participant is 100% vested.

Participant Loans – Participants may take loans greater than \$1,000 from the Plan, limited to up to 50% of their vested account balance, not to exceed \$50,000, for the year ended December 31, 2024.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Income Taxes – The Plan obtained its latest determination letter from the Internal Revenue Service ("IRS") dated June 30, 2020 stating that the Plan is qualified under Section 401(a) of the Code. Therefore, the Plan is qualified and the related trust is tax exempt. Accordingly, no provision for income taxes has been included in the accompanying financial statements. The Plan has been amended since the effective date of the IRS letter. However, the Plan Administrator believes that the Plan is operating in compliance with the requirements of the Code and, therefore, believes that the Plan is qualified and the related trust is tax exempt.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Plan Termination – Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Plan Sponsor has the right under the Plan agreement to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate its participation in the Plan, subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of partial or complete Plan termination, participants will remain fully vested in their accounts.

Basis of Accounting – The accompanying financial statements are prepared using the accrual method of accounting in accordance with GAAP.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition – The Plan’s investments in registered investment companies are stated at fair value, as determined by John Hancock. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 4 for additional information on fair value measurements.

The Plan presents in the accompanying statement of changes in net assets available for benefits the net appreciation (depreciation) in the fair value of its investments which consists of the realized gains and losses and the unrealized net appreciation or depreciation of those investments. Realized gains and losses on disposition of investments are based upon actual costs and selling prices.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date.

Contributions Receivable – Contributions receivable represent amounts due to the Plan for participant and employer contributions related to compensation earned prior to year-end that were remitted to the Plan subsequent to year-end. Such amounts are recorded on an accrual basis when they are determined and due to the Plan.

Payment of Benefits – Benefits are recorded when paid.

Administrative Expenses – Certain accounting and administrative expenses of the Plan are paid by the Plan Sponsor. Expenses relating to investment activity are paid by the Plan. Loan maintenance and setup fees are paid directly from participant accounts.

Transfer of Plan Assets – In April 2024, total assets of \$9,053,634 were transferred from the former Trustee into the current Trustee’s Plan. The transferred assets consisted of participant-directed investment holdings of \$8,978,079 and participant loan balances receivable of \$75,555. The transfers were recorded by the Plan at the carrying value of the assets received, which approximated fair value. No gain or loss was recognized by the Plan in connection with the transaction.

Party-in-Interest Transactions – Certain Plan investments are managed by the Trustee as defined by the Plan and, therefore, these transactions qualify as party-in-interest transactions, that are exempt from the prohibited transaction rules. Fees paid to the former Trustee and current Trustee for custodial and investment management services for the year ended December 31, 2024 totaled \$10,262 and \$6,827, respectively.

Risks and Uncertainties – Investments are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investments and the level of uncertainty related to changes in the value of investments, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in risks in the near term would materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits and the statements of changes in net assets available for benefits.

Use of Estimates – The preparation of financial statements in accordance with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of net assets available for benefits and changes therein. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Subsequent Events – The Plan Administrator has evaluated subsequent events, for recognition or disclosure, through October 22, 2025, the date the accompanying financial statements were available to be issued, and determined that no additional recognition or disclosure was necessary.

3. Information Certified by the Current and Former Trustees (Unaudited)

The Plan Administrator has elected the method of annual reporting compliance permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Accordingly, the current Trustee has certified that the investments and participant loans included in the accompanying financial statements and supplementary information is complete and accurate. The current Trustee certified the fair value of investments of \$10,399,631 at December 31, 2024. The current Trustee also certified interest and dividend income totaling \$20,649, and net appreciation in fair value of investments of \$1,328,458 for the year ended December 31, 2024.

4. Fair Value Measurements

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described as follows:

- **Level 1** – Unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical, unrestricted assets or liabilities that are accessible at the measurement date.
- **Level 2** – Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets or quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in markets that are not active. This level also includes inputs other than quoted prices that are observable, either directly or indirectly, for substantially the full term through corroboration with observable, independent market data. This includes investments valued at quoted prices adjusted for legal or contractual restrictions specific to the security. There were no assets of the Plan that utilized Level 2 inputs as its primary basis for calculating fair value as of December 31, 2024.
- **Level 3** – Pricing inputs are unobservable for the asset or liability. That is, inputs that reflect the reporting entity's own assumptions about the assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability. There were no assets of the Plan that utilized Level 3 inputs as its primary measure of fair value as of December 31, 2024.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value.

Money Market Funds – Shares of money market funds are valued at amortized cost, which approximates fair value. The amortized cost of an instrument is determined by valuing it at its original cost and thereafter amortizing any discount or premium from its face value at a constant rate until maturity.

5. Reconciliation with Form 5500

The accompanying financial statements, which are prepared in accordance with U.S. GAAP, calculate realized gains and losses on sales of securities and unrealized gains and losses (change in market value on securities held at year end) using historical cost. However, Form 5500, Annual Return/Report of Employee Benefit Plan, requires the calculation of such gains and losses to be measured on the basis of revalued cost on Schedule H. Revalued cost is calculated based on the market value of a security on the first day of the fiscal year plus the cost of any current year purchases, less the beginning market value of any current year sales. The financial statement calculation of beginning net assets differed \$217,453 from the prior year Form 5500. This is due to participant contribution receivable from 2023 of \$8,336 and employer contribution receivable of \$209,117, which were not recognized on the prior year Form 5500. Other than the beginning net assets balance, however, the financial statement calculation of gains and losses and the calculation for Form 5500 are the same.
