Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audits

We have performed audits of the accompanying financial statements of InfiniSource 401(k) Plan, an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) [ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit]. The financial statements comprise the statements of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and the related statements of changes in net assets available for benefits for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management, having determined it is permissible in the circumstances, has elected to have the audits of InfiniSource 401(k) Plan's financial statements performed in accordance with ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) pursuant to 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. As permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C), our audits need not extend to any statements or information related to assets held for investment of the plan (investment information) by a bank or similar institution or insurance carrier that is regulated, supervised, and subject to periodic examination by a state or Federal agency, provided that the statements or information regarding assets so held are prepared and certified to by the bank or similar institution or insurance carrier in accordance with 29 CFR 2520.103-5 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA (qualified institution).

Management has obtained certifications from a qualified institution as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, and for the years then ended, stating that the certified investment information, as described in Note 3 to the financial statements, is complete and accurate.

Opinion

In our opinion, based on our audits and on the procedures performed as described in the Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audits of the Financial Statements section:

- The amounts and disclosures in the financial statements referred to above, other than those agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.
- The information in the financial statements referred to above related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audits of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of InfiniSource 401(k) Plan and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. Management's election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit does not affect management's responsibility for the financial statements.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about InfiniSource 401(k) Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for one year after the date the financial statements are available to be issued.

1. DESCRIPTION OF PLAN

The following description of the InfiniSource 401(k) Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

InfiniSource Consulting Solutions, Inc. (the Company) established the Plan on June 1, 2016. The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all eligible employees of InfiniSource Consulting Solutions, Inc. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

The Company has the responsibility for remittance of participant and employer contributions, appointing an administrator to administer the Plan, and determining funds available for investment under the Plan. The Company pays for a portion of the administrative expenses for the Plan.

Eligibility Requirements

All employees are eligible to participate in the Plan except for nonresident aliens receiving no earned income, employees covered by a collective bargaining agreement, leased employees, and interns. Employees become eligible to participate in the Plan on the first day of the payroll period coinciding with or next following 30 days from date of hire and their attainment of the age of 18.

Contributions

Each year, participants may elect to contribute a percentage or amount of pre-tax or post-tax (Roth) annual compensation, as defined in the Plan. The Plan automatically enrolls eligible employees for a 3 percent pre-tax salary deferral under its automatic enrollment feature. Participants may elect a different rate of elective deferral contributions or elect not to make elective deferral contributions. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Eligible employees may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans (rollover). Participants direct the investment of their contributions and employer contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan. The Plan currently offers mutual funds and a common/collective trust as investment options for participants.

The Company may make matching contributions determined annually by the employer. The Company may also elect to make an additional discretionary profit sharing contribution. There were no matching contributions for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023. There was no discretionary profit sharing contribution for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023. Contributions are subject to certain statutory limitations.

The employer will also make a prevailing wage contribution on behalf of each participant who performs services subject to the Service Contract Act (SCA), Davis-Bacon Act, or similar Federal, state or municipal prevailing wage statutes. The prevailing wage contributions shall be an amount equal to the balance of the fringe benefit payment for health and welfare for each participant based on the hourly contribution rate for the participant's employment classification. The prevailing wage contribution is not subject to any age or service requirements and is immediately vested. The Company made prevailing wage contributions of approximately \$132,000 and \$156,000 in 2024 and 2023, respectively.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution and allocations of the Company's contribution and Plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings or individual account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined in the Plan. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS DECEMBER 31, 2024 AND 2023

1. DESCRIPTION OF PLAN (continued)

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Participants are 100 percent vested in the Company's matching and profit sharing contributions after a 2- to 6-year graded vesting schedule.

A participant is also 100 percent vested if termination is due to disability or death.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow up to the lesser of \$50,000 minus the difference between the highest outstanding balance of loans during the prior 12-month period and the outstanding balance of loans from the Plan on the date the loan is made, or 50 percent of the participant's vested account balance.

Loans must be repaid within 5 years unless such loan is for the purchase of a primary residence. The loans are secured by the vested balance in the participant's account and bear reasonable rate of interest as determined by the Plan administrator based on prevailing interest rates. Principal and interest is paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Payment of Benefits

On termination of service due to death, disability or retirement, a participant will receive the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account as a lump sum amount. An account must be fully vested for a participant to receive an in-service withdrawal. Upon attainment of normal retirement age of 65, distributions may be made from all accounts.

Hardship Distributions

Hardship distributions are permitted from pre-tax and Roth elective deferrals.

Forfeited Accounts

Forfeited balances resulting from the termination of nonvested participants may be used to reduce the Company's future non-safe harbor contributions. There was a balance in the forfeiture account of \$61,436 and \$47,106 at December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively.

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared using the accrual method of accounting.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Investments held by a defined contribution plan are required to be reported at fair value, except for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts. Contract value is the relevant measure for that portion of the net assets available for benefits of a defined contribution plan attributable to fully benefit-responsive investment contracts because contract value is the amount participants normally would receive if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the plan.

Financial Statement Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value except for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts, which are reported at contract value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Plan's management determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisers and custodians. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

As permitted by U.S. generally accepted accounting principles, the Plan uses net asset value (NAV) as a practical expedient to determine the fair value of certain investments, and these investments have not been classified in the fair value hierarchy.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 and 2023. If a participant does not make loan repayments and the Plan administrator considers the loan to be in default, the loan balance is reduced, and the delinquent participant's note receivable is recorded as a benefit payment based on terms in the Plan document.

Excess Contributions Payable

Amounts payable to participants for contributions in excess of amounts permitted by the IRS are recorded as a liability with a corresponding decrease to employer contributions. There were no material excess contributions payable at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Income Taxes

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the Department of Labor (DOL) or Internal Revenue Service. The Plan administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan and has concluded that as of December 31, 2024, there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Administrative Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid directly by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Company. Expenses that are paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment-related expenses are included in net appreciation in fair value of investments.

Subsequent Events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through November 21, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

3. CERTIFIED INFORMATION

Certain information related to investments and notes receivable from participants disclosed in the accompanying financial statements as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, the ERISA-required supplemental schedule of Form 5500 - Schedule H, Line 4i - Schedule of Assets (Held at End of Year) as of December 31, 2024, and net appreciation in fair value of investments, interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company, the custodian and trustee of the Plan.

4. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) Topic 820, *Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures*, provides a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. Fair value focuses on the price that would be received to sell the asset or paid to transfer the liability regardless of whether an observable liquid market price existed (an exit price). The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described below:

Level 1 – inputs to the valuation methodology are based upon unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 – inputs to the valuation methodology include: quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets, quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in markets that are not active, inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability, and market-corroborated inputs. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 – inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement. Level 3 assets and liabilities measured at fair value are based on one or more of three valuation techniques (market, cost, or income approach). The market approach evaluates prices and other relevant information generated by market transactions involving identical or comparable assets or liabilities. The cost approach evaluates the amount that would be required to replace the service capacity of an asset (i.e., replacement cost). The income approach uses techniques that convert future amounts to a single present amount based on market expectations (including present value techniques, option-pricing models, and lattice models).

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for the Plan's assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-ended mutual funds that pool the capital of many investors and invest it in stocks, bonds, short-term money market instruments, and other securities. Mutual funds are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily NAV and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Common/Collective trust: The investments in the common/collective trust may hold investments in units of other funds within the Trust or similar funds for which other unrelated entities are trustee. The trustee or unrelated trustee estimates the fair value of investments in collective funds that have calculated NAV per unit in accordance with the specialized accounting guidance for investment companies. Accordingly, as a practical expedient, investments in other such funds are valued at their NAV as reported by investee funds. The funds have the ability to redeem their investments in the collective funds at NAV without restrictions.

The methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

6. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

Plan assets include investments in mutual funds and a common/collective trust, which are managed by Fidelity Management Trust Company. As Fidelity Management Trust Company is the Plan's custodian and third-party administrator, transactions with the custodian qualify as party-in-interest transactions under ERISA.

Fees incurred by the Plan for the investment management services are included in net appreciation in fair value of investments, as they are paid through revenue sharing rather than direct payment. The Plan made a direct payment to the third-party administrator which was not covered by revenue sharing, and which is shown as administrative expenses on the statements of changes in net assets available for benefits for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023. The Plan Sponsor pays directly any other fees related to the Plan's operations.

7. PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100 percent vested in their employer contributions.

8. TAX STATUS

The Plan has adopted a non-standardized pre-approved plan document. The pre-approved plan received an opinion letter dated June 30, 2020, in which the Internal Revenue Service stated that the form of plan stated in that letter is acceptable for use by employers for the benefit of their employees under Internal Revenue Code (IRC) Section 401. The Plan has been amended since receiving the opinion letter. However, the Plan administrator believes that the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and continues to be tax-exempt.

9. RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan invests in a combination of investment securities that are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market and credit. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities and the level of uncertainty related to changes in the value of investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in risks in the near term would materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits and the statements of changes in net assets available for benefits.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS). We are required to be independent of InfiniSource 401(k) Plan and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. Management's election of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit does not affect management's responsibility for the financial statements.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about InfiniSource 401(k) Plan's ability to continue as a going concern for one year after the date the financial statements are available to be issued.

Management is also responsible for maintaining a current plan instrument, including all plan amendments; administering the plan; and determining that the plan's transactions that are presented and disclosed in the financial statements are in conformity with the plan's provisions, including maintaining sufficient records with respect to each of the participants, to determine the benefits due or which may become due to such participants.

Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audits of the Financial Statements

Except as described in the Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audits section of our report, our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditors' report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with GAAS, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Our audits did not extend to the certified investment information, except for obtaining and reading the certification, comparing the certified investment information with the related information presented and disclosed in the financial statements, and reading the disclosures relating to the certified investment information to assess whether they are in accordance with the presentation and disclosure requirements of accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Accordingly, the objective of an ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit is not to express an opinion about whether the financial statements as a whole are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audits, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audits.

Supplemental Schedule Required by ERISA

The supplemental schedule of Form 5500 - Schedule H, Line 4i - Schedule of Assets (Held at End of Year) as of December 31, 2024 is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements but is supplementary information required by the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information included in the supplemental schedule, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audits of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with GAAS. For information included in the supplemental schedule that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, we compared such information to the related certified investment information.

In forming our opinion on the supplemental schedule, we evaluated whether the supplemental schedule, other than the information agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, including its form and content, is presented in conformity with the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA.

1. DESCRIPTION OF PLAN

The following description of the InfiniSource 401(k) Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

InfiniSource Consulting Solutions, Inc. (the Company) established the Plan on June 1, 2016. The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering all eligible employees of InfiniSource Consulting Solutions, Inc. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

The Company has the responsibility for remittance of participant and employer contributions, appointing an administrator to administer the Plan, and determining funds available for investment under the Plan. The Company pays for a portion of the administrative expenses for the Plan.

Eligibility Requirements

All employees are eligible to participate in the Plan except for nonresident aliens receiving no earned income, employees covered by a collective bargaining agreement, leased employees, and interns. Employees become eligible to participate in the Plan on the first day of the payroll period coinciding with or next following 30 days from date of hire and their attainment of the age of 18.

Contributions

Each year, participants may elect to contribute a percentage or amount of pre-tax or post-tax (Roth) annual compensation, as defined in the Plan. The Plan automatically enrolls eligible employees for a 3 percent pre-tax salary deferral under its automatic enrollment feature. Participants may elect a different rate of elective deferral contributions or elect not to make elective deferral contributions. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Eligible employees may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans (rollover). Participants direct the investment of their contributions and employer contributions into various investment options offered by the Plan. The Plan currently offers mutual funds and a common/collective trust as investment options for participants.

The Company may make matching contributions determined annually by the employer. The Company may also elect to make an additional discretionary profit sharing contribution. There were no matching contributions for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023. There was no discretionary profit sharing contribution for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023. Contributions are subject to certain statutory limitations.

The employer will also make a prevailing wage contribution on behalf of each participant who performs services subject to the Service Contract Act (SCA), Davis-Bacon Act, or similar Federal, state or municipal prevailing wage statutes. The prevailing wage contributions shall be an amount equal to the balance of the fringe benefit payment for health and welfare for each participant based on the hourly contribution rate for the participant's employment classification. The prevailing wage contribution is not subject to any age or service requirements and is immediately vested. The Company made prevailing wage contributions of approximately \$132,000 and \$156,000 in 2024 and 2023, respectively.

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution and allocations of the Company's contribution and Plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings or individual account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined in the Plan. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

1. DESCRIPTION OF PLAN (continued)

Vesting

Participants are immediately vested in their contributions plus actual earnings thereon. Participants are 100 percent vested in the Company's matching and profit sharing contributions after a 2- to 6-year graded vesting schedule.

A participant is also 100 percent vested if termination is due to disability or death.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow up to the lesser of \$50,000 minus the difference between the highest outstanding balance of loans during the prior 12-month period and the outstanding balance of loans from the Plan on the date the loan is made, or 50 percent of the participant's vested account balance.

Loans must be repaid within 5 years unless such loan is for the purchase of a primary residence. The loans are secured by the vested balance in the participant's account and bear reasonable rate of interest as determined by the Plan administrator based on prevailing interest rates. Principal and interest is paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Payment of Benefits

On termination of service due to death, disability or retirement, a participant will receive the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account as a lump sum amount. An account must be fully vested for a participant to receive an in-service withdrawal. Upon attainment of normal retirement age of 65, distributions may be made from all accounts.

Hardship Distributions

Hardship distributions are permitted from pre-tax and Roth elective deferrals.

Forfeited Accounts

Forfeited balances resulting from the termination of nonvested participants may be used to reduce the Company's future non-safe harbor contributions. There was a balance in the forfeiture account of \$61,436 and \$47,106 at December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively.

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared using the accrual method of accounting.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Investments held by a defined contribution plan are required to be reported at fair value, except for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts. Contract value is the relevant measure for that portion of the net assets available for benefits of a defined contribution plan attributable to fully benefit-responsive investment contracts because contract value is the amount participants normally would receive if they were to initiate permitted transactions under the terms of the plan.

Financial Statement Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value except for fully benefit-responsive investment contracts, which are reported at contract value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Plan's management determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisers and custodians. See Note 4 for discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

As permitted by U.S. generally accepted accounting principles, the Plan uses net asset value (NAV) as a practical expedient to determine the fair value of certain investments, and these investments have not been classified in the fair value hierarchy.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. No allowance for credit losses has been recorded as of December 31, 2024 and 2023. If a participant does not make loan repayments and the Plan administrator considers the loan to be in default, the loan balance is reduced, and the delinquent participant's note receivable is recorded as a benefit payment based on terms in the Plan document.

Excess Contributions Payable

Amounts payable to participants for contributions in excess of amounts permitted by the IRS are recorded as a liability with a corresponding decrease to employer contributions. There were no material excess contributions payable at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Income Taxes

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the Department of Labor (DOL) or Internal Revenue Service. The Plan administrator has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Plan and has concluded that as of December 31, 2024, there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the financial statements. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Administrative Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid directly by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Company. Expenses that are paid by the Company are excluded from these financial statements. Fees related to the administration of notes receivable from participants are charged directly to the participant's account and are included in administrative expenses. Investment-related expenses are included in net appreciation in fair value of investments.

Subsequent Events

The Plan has evaluated subsequent events through November 21, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

3. CERTIFIED INFORMATION

Certain information related to investments and notes receivable from participants disclosed in the accompanying financial statements as of December 31, 2024 and 2023, the ERISA-required supplemental schedule of Form 5500 - Schedule H, Line 4i - Schedule of Assets (Held at End of Year) as of December 31, 2024, and net appreciation in fair value of investments, interest and dividends, and interest income on notes receivable from participants for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, was obtained by management and agreed to or derived from information certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company, the custodian and trustee of the Plan.

4. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) Topic 820, *Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures*, provides a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. Fair value focuses on the price that would be received to sell the asset or paid to transfer the liability regardless of whether an observable liquid market price existed (an exit price). The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described below:

Level 1 – inputs to the valuation methodology are based upon unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 – inputs to the valuation methodology include: quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets, quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in markets that are not active, inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability, and market-corroborated inputs. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 – inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement. Level 3 assets and liabilities measured at fair value are based on one or more of three valuation techniques (market, cost, or income approach). The market approach evaluates prices and other relevant information generated by market transactions involving identical or comparable assets or liabilities. The cost approach evaluates the amount that would be required to replace the service capacity of an asset (i.e., replacement cost). The income approach uses techniques that convert future amounts to a single present amount based on market expectations (including present value techniques, option-pricing models, and lattice models).

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for the Plan's assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Mutual funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-ended mutual funds that pool the capital of many investors and invest it in stocks, bonds, short-term money market instruments, and other securities. Mutual funds are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily NAV and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Common/Collective trust: The investments in the common/collective trust may hold investments in units of other funds within the Trust or similar funds for which other unrelated entities are trustee. The trustee or unrelated trustee estimates the fair value of investments in collective funds that have calculated NAV per unit in accordance with the specialized accounting guidance for investment companies. Accordingly, as a practical expedient, investments in other such funds are valued at their NAV as reported by investee funds. The funds have the ability to redeem their investments in the collective funds at NAV without restrictions.

The methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

6. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

Plan assets include investments in mutual funds and a common/collective trust, which are managed by Fidelity Management Trust Company. As Fidelity Management Trust Company is the Plan's custodian and third-party administrator, transactions with the custodian qualify as party-in-interest transactions under ERISA.

Fees incurred by the Plan for the investment management services are included in net appreciation in fair value of investments, as they are paid through revenue sharing rather than direct payment. The Plan made a direct payment to the third-party administrator which was not covered by revenue sharing, and which is shown as administrative expenses on the statements of changes in net assets available for benefits for the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023. The Plan Sponsor pays directly any other fees related to the Plan's operations.

7. PLAN TERMINATION

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100 percent vested in their employer contributions.

8. TAX STATUS

The Plan has adopted a non-standardized pre-approved plan document. The pre-approved plan received an opinion letter dated June 30, 2020, in which the Internal Revenue Service stated that the form of plan stated in that letter is acceptable for use by employers for the benefit of their employees under Internal Revenue Code (IRC) Section 401. The Plan has been amended since receiving the opinion letter. However, the Plan administrator believes that the Plan is currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC and continues to be tax-exempt.

9. RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan invests in a combination of investment securities that are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market and credit. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities and the level of uncertainty related to changes in the value of investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in risks in the near term would materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits and the statements of changes in net assets available for benefits.
