Opinion

Note 1. Description of the Plan

General

The following brief description of the Union Holding Corp. Employee Stock Ownership Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan Document and Summary Plan Description for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions, which are available from the plan administrator.

Union Holding Corp. (the Company) established the Plan effective as of December 1, 2014. The Plan operates, in relevant part, as a leveraged employee stock ownership plan (ESOP), and is designed to comply with Section 4975(e)(7) and the regulations thereunder of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the Code) and is subject to the applicable provisions of the *Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974* (ERISA), as amended. The Plan is administered by the Committee, which is comprised of four persons appointed by the Board of Directors of the Company. An individual serves as the Plan's Trustee.

On December 22, 2014, the Plan obtained a \$4,882,366 loan from a subsidiary of the Company and purchased approximately 5,744 shares of the Company's common stock and holds the common stock in a trust established under the Plan. The stock was purchased at a price of approximately \$850 per share for an aggregate purchase price of \$4,882,366. During 2015, the Plan purchased an additional approximate nine shares of the Company's common stock with cash available without any additional borrowings.

Unallocated and Allocated Shares

The borrowing is collateralized by the unallocated shares of common stock. The lender has no rights against shares once they are allocated to participants in accordance with the terms of the ESOP. Accordingly, the financial statements of the Plan as of December 31, 2024 and 2023 and for the years then ended, present separately the assets and liabilities and changes therein pertaining to:

- a) The accounts of employees with vested rights in allocated common stock (Allocated), and
- b) Common stock not yet allocated to employees (Unallocated)

Eligibility

Employees whose benefits are covered under a collective bargaining agreement, intern employees, seasonal employees, and temporary workers are excluded from participating in the Plan. All other employees of the Company are eligible to participate in the Plan upon reaching age 21 and after completing one year of service, as long as such employee's regular terms of employment would result in 1,000 hours of service within a 12-month calendar period or within the Plan year. Enrollment begins the first quarter after the employee's one-year anniversary. Participants must complete at least 1,000 hours of service during the plan year and be employed as of the last day of the plan year, to be eligible to receive Company common stock allocations and discretionary profit sharing contribution allocations for that year, unless the participant meets the requirements due to normal retirement, death, or disability during the plan year.

Employer Contributions

The Company is obligated to make contributions in cash to the Plan that, when aggregated with the Plan's distributions and interest earnings, equal the amount necessary to enable the Plan to make its regularly scheduled payments of principal and interest due on its note payable. The Company may make discretionary profit sharing contributions to the Plan as determined by the Company. For the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, the Company made profit sharing contributions in cash equal to 4.00% for each of the respective years of employee compensation.

Participant Accounts

The Plan is a defined contribution plan under which a separate individual account is established for each participant. Each participant's account is credited as of the last day of each plan year with an allocation of Company contributions and forfeitures of terminated participants' nonvested accounts. Only those participants who are eligible employees of the Company as of the last day of the plan year will receive an allocation. Allocations are based on a participant's eligible compensation, relative to total eligible compensation. Plan earnings are allocated to each participant's account based on the ratio of the participant's beginning of the year account balance to all participants' beginning of the year account balances.

Vesting

Participants vest in the Company's contributions and earnings thereon at a rate of 20%, starting the second year, for each year of service, becoming fully vested upon completing six years of service. Participants terminating due to normal retirement, death, or disability will be 100% vested.

Put Option

Under federal income tax regulations, the employer stock that is held by the Plan and its participants and is not readily tradable on an established market or is subject to trading limitations includes a put option. The put option is a right to demand that the Company buy any shares of its stock distributed to participants for which there is no market. The put price is representative of the current appraised value of the stock. The Company can pay for the purchase with interest over a period of five years. The purpose of the put option is to ensure the participant has the ability to ultimately obtain cash.

Payment of Benefits

No distribution from the Plan will be made until a participant retires, dies (in which case, payment shall be made to the participant's beneficiary or, if none, his or her legal representatives), becomes permanently disabled, or otherwise terminates employment with the Company after being vested. A participant's account shall be distributed in cash through liquidation of shares to remaining participants at a price representative of the fair market value of the stock.

The Plan is able to force out terminated participants with vested account balances below \$5,000. Participants have the opportunity to elect to rollover these distributions. Participants that don't make a timely election receive distributions based on the value of their vested account balance – account balances less than \$1,000 are distributed in a lump-sum directly to the participant and account balances between \$1,000 and \$5,000 are distributed in the form of a direct rollover to an IRA for the benefit of the participant.

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, there were no plan assets allocated to accounts of terminated or retired participants who have elected to withdraw from the Plan but have not yet been paid.

Under the provisions of the Plan, the Company is obligated to repurchase participant shares, which have been distributed under the terms of the Plan if the shares are not publicly traded or if the shares are subject to trading limitations. During 2024 and 2023, the Plan did not distribute, and the Company did not repurchase from participants, any shares.

Voting Rights

Each participant is entitled to exercise voting rights attributable to the shares allocated to his or her account and is notified by the Trustee prior to the time that such rights are to be exercised. The Trustee is not permitted to vote any allocated shares unless a participant has provided specific instruction as to how to vote his/her shares, or a proxy has been granted to the Trustee. The Trustee is required, however, to vote any unallocated shares on behalf of the collective best interest of plan participants and beneficiaries.

Diversification

Diversification is offered to participants close to retirement so that they may have the opportunity to move part of the value of their investment in Company common stock into investments which are more diversified. Participants who are at least age 55 with at least 10 years of participation in the Plan may elect to diversify a portion of their account. Diversification is offered to each eligible participant over a six-year period. In each of the first five years, a participant may diversify up to 25% of the number of post-1986 shares allocated to his or her account, less any shares previously diversified. In the sixth year, the percentage changes to 50%. Participants who elect to diversify receive a cash distribution, unless eligible for floor price protection, in which case, shares are distributed.

Forfeitures

Plan forfeitures are allocated to each participant's account based upon the relation of the participant's compensation to total compensation for the plan year. Forfeitures of terminated nonvested account balances allocated to remaining participants at December 31, 2024 and 2023 totaled \$25,510 and \$19,691 in cash forfeitures, respectively. All forfeited amounts had been allocated to remaining participants as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Plan Termination

The Company reserves the right to terminate the Plan at any time, subject to plan provisions. Upon such termination of the Plan, the interest of each participant in the trust fund will be distributed to such participant or the participant's beneficiary at the time prescribed by the Plan terms and the Code. In the event of termination of the Plan, the entire accrued benefit of a participant is fully vested and nonforfeitable. Upon termination of the Plan, the Employee Benefits Administration Committee shall direct the Trustee to pay all liabilities and expenses of the trust funds and to sell shares of financed stock held as collateral to the extent it determines such sale to be necessary in order to repay the loan.

Note 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of net assets, changes in net assets and the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

The financial statements include Union Holding Corp. common stock valued at approximately \$7,521,710 and \$10,630,937 at December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively, whose value has been determined by an independent appraisal in the absence of readily available market values. Because of the inherent subjectivity in any valuation, those estimated values may differ from values that would have been used had a ready market for the securities existed, and the difference could be material in the near term.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

The common shares of the Company are valued at estimated fair value. Fair value is determined by annual independent appraisals. Certificates of deposit are valued at fair value by discounting the related cash flows based on current yields of similar instruments with comparable durations considering the credit-worthiness of the issuer.

Dividend income is accrued on the ex-dividend date. Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Realized gains and losses from security transactions are reported on the average cost method. Net appreciation (depreciation) includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Payment of Benefits

Benefit payments to participants are recorded upon distribution.

Allocations

The financial statements of the Plan present separately the assets and liabilities and changes therein pertaining to: (a) the accounts of employees with rights in allocated stock (Allocated) and (b) stock not yet allocated to employees (Unallocated), including shares that are committed to be released. Shares are released from collateral and become allocated generally in the period in which debt service is actually paid.

Administrative Expenses

Administrative expenses may be paid by the Company or the Plan, at the Company's discretion. The Company has historically paid the majority of the operating expenses of the Plan.

Note 3. Administration of Plan Assets

The Trustee of the Plan holds the Plan's assets, which principally consist of Company common shares.

Company contributions are held and managed by the Trustee, which invests cash received, interest and dividend income and makes distributions to participants. The Trustee also administers the payment of interest and principal on the loan, which is reimbursed to the Trustee through contributions as determined by the Company.

Note 4. Dividends

To the extent dividends are not used by the Plan for debt service, participants are given the right to take a distribution of such dividends in cash or leave the funds in the Plan to be invested in Company stock or other applicable other investments, as provided by the Plan. For the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, there were no dividends paid by the Company, nor received by the Plan.

Note 6. Disclosures About Fair Value of Plan Assets and Liabilities

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Fair value measurements must maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. There is a hierarchy of three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair value:

- Level 1** Quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities
- Level 2** Observable inputs other than Level 1 prices, such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities; quoted prices in markets that are not active; or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data for substantially the full term of the assets or liabilities
- Level 3** Unobservable inputs supported by little or no market activity and are significant to the fair value of the assets or liabilities

The valuation process involves plan management's selection of an independent appraiser under contract for a term of three years with the right to cancel such contract at any time. Plan management accumulates the data for the appraiser from the internal financial statements of the Company. The appraiser prepares a preliminary report which plan management, along with the ESOP Trustee, reviews in detail, discusses and approves. The results of this process are documented in minutes of the plan fiduciary.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Note 7. Note Payable

In 2014, the Plan entered into a \$4,882,366 term loan agreement with a subsidiary of the Company. The proceeds of the loan were used to purchase the Company’s outstanding common stock. Unallocated shares are collateral for the loan. Shares are released from collateral and allocated to participants as payments of principal and interest are made. The number of shares released in any year is the number of shares held as collateral at the beginning of the plan year times the ratio of the current plan year principal and interest payments divided by the total of this year’s payments, plus all future years’ principal and interest payments. This resulted in approximately 274 and 274 shares being released and allocated for the plan years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively.

The agreement provides for the loan to be repaid over 20 years. The principal balance of the note payable at December 31, 2024 and 2023 was \$2,850,762 and \$3,026,096, respectively. The note payable bears interest at the 12-month SOFR plus 3.00%, not to exceed 7% (adjusted annually on the due date), which was an effective rate of 7.00% as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Note 8. Related-party and Party-in-Interest Transactions

Party-in-interest transactions include those with fiduciaries or employees of the Plan, any person who provides services to the Plan, an employer whose employees are covered by the Plan, an employee organization whose members are covered by the Plan, a person who owns 50% or more of such an employer or employee association or relatives of such persons.

The Plan invests in Company common stock. The Plan also has a number of service providers. Such providers are parties in interest under ERISA. Individually nonmaterial expenses paid to parties in interest aggregated \$40 and \$40 for 2024 and 2023, respectively. Additionally, the Plan incurs expenses related to certain appraisal, accounting, and auditing fees. The Company pays these expenses and provides certain administrative services at no cost to the Plan.

Note 9. Tax Status

The Plan has received a determination letter from the Internal Revenue Service dated March 9, 2016 stating that the Plan and related trust, as then designed, were in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code and therefore not subject to tax. The Plan has been amended since receiving the determination letter. However, the plan administrator believes that the Plan and related trust are currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the Internal Revenue Service. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Opinion

Note 1. Description of the Plan

General

The following brief description of the Union Holding Corp. Employee Stock Ownership Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan Document and Summary Plan Description for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions, which are available from the plan administrator.

Union Holding Corp. (the Company) established the Plan effective as of December 1, 2014. The Plan operates, in relevant part, as a leveraged employee stock ownership plan (ESOP), and is designed to comply with Section 4975(e)(7) and the regulations thereunder of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the Code) and is subject to the applicable provisions of the *Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974* (ERISA), as amended. The Plan is administered by the Committee, which is comprised of four persons appointed by the Board of Directors of the Company. An individual serves as the Plan's Trustee.

On December 22, 2014, the Plan obtained a \$4,882,366 loan from a subsidiary of the Company and purchased approximately 5,744 shares of the Company's common stock and holds the common stock in a trust established under the Plan. The stock was purchased at a price of approximately \$850 per share for an aggregate purchase price of \$4,882,366. During 2015, the Plan purchased an additional approximate nine shares of the Company's common stock with cash available without any additional borrowings.

Unallocated and Allocated Shares

The borrowing is collateralized by the unallocated shares of common stock. The lender has no rights against shares once they are allocated to participants in accordance with the terms of the ESOP. Accordingly, the financial statements of the Plan as of December 31, 2024 and 2023 and for the years then ended, present separately the assets and liabilities and changes therein pertaining to:

- a) The accounts of employees with vested rights in allocated common stock (Allocated), and
- b) Common stock not yet allocated to employees (Unallocated)

Eligibility

Employees whose benefits are covered under a collective bargaining agreement, intern employees, seasonal employees, and temporary workers are excluded from participating in the Plan. All other employees of the Company are eligible to participate in the Plan upon reaching age 21 and after completing one year of service, as long as such employee's regular terms of employment would result in 1,000 hours of service within a 12-month calendar period or within the Plan year. Enrollment begins the first quarter after the employee's one-year anniversary. Participants must complete at least 1,000 hours of service during the plan year and be employed as of the last day of the plan year, to be eligible to receive Company common stock allocations and discretionary profit sharing contribution allocations for that year, unless the participant meets the requirements due to normal retirement, death, or disability during the plan year.

Employer Contributions

The Company is obligated to make contributions in cash to the Plan that, when aggregated with the Plan's distributions and interest earnings, equal the amount necessary to enable the Plan to make its regularly scheduled payments of principal and interest due on its note payable. The Company may make discretionary profit sharing contributions to the Plan as determined by the Company. For the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, the Company made profit sharing contributions in cash equal to 4.00% for each of the respective years of employee compensation.

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Participant Accounts

The Plan is a defined contribution plan under which a separate individual account is established for each participant. Each participant's account is credited as of the last day of each plan year with an allocation of Company contributions and forfeitures of terminated participants' nonvested accounts. Only those participants who are eligible employees of the Company as of the last day of the plan year will receive an allocation. Allocations are based on a participant's eligible compensation, relative to total eligible compensation. Plan earnings are allocated to each participant's account based on the ratio of the participant's beginning of the year account balance to all participants' beginning of the year account balances.

Vesting

Participants vest in the Company's contributions and earnings thereon at a rate of 20%, starting the second year, for each year of service, becoming fully vested upon completing six years of service. Participants terminating due to normal retirement, death, or disability will be 100% vested.

Put Option

Under federal income tax regulations, the employer stock that is held by the Plan and its participants and is not readily tradable on an established market or is subject to trading limitations includes a put option. The put option is a right to demand that the Company buy any shares of its stock distributed to participants for which there is no market. The put price is representative of the current appraised value of the stock. The Company can pay for the purchase with interest over a period of five years. The purpose of the put option is to ensure the participant has the ability to ultimately obtain cash.

Payment of Benefits

No distribution from the Plan will be made until a participant retires, dies (in which case, payment shall be made to the participant's beneficiary or, if none, his or her legal representatives), becomes permanently disabled, or otherwise terminates employment with the Company after being vested. A participant's account shall be distributed in cash through liquidation of shares to remaining participants at a price representative of the fair market value of the stock.

The Plan is able to force out terminated participants with vested account balances below \$5,000. Participants have the opportunity to elect to rollover these distributions. Participants that don't make a timely election receive distributions based on the value of their vested account balance – account balances less than \$1,000 are distributed in a lump-sum directly to the participant and account balances between \$1,000 and \$5,000 are distributed in the form of a direct rollover to an IRA for the benefit of the participant.

At December 31, 2024 and 2023, there were no plan assets allocated to accounts of terminated or retired participants who have elected to withdraw from the Plan but have not yet been paid.

Under the provisions of the Plan, the Company is obligated to repurchase participant shares, which have been distributed under the terms of the Plan if the shares are not publicly traded or if the shares are subject to trading limitations. During 2024 and 2023, the Plan did not distribute, and the Company did not repurchase from participants, any shares.

Voting Rights

Each participant is entitled to exercise voting rights attributable to the shares allocated to his or her account and is notified by the Trustee prior to the time that such rights are to be exercised. The Trustee is not permitted to vote any allocated shares unless a participant has provided specific instruction as to how to vote his/her shares, or a proxy has been granted to the Trustee. The Trustee is required, however, to vote any unallocated shares on behalf of the collective best interest of plan participants and beneficiaries.

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Diversification

Diversification is offered to participants close to retirement so that they may have the opportunity to move part of the value of their investment in Company common stock into investments which are more diversified. Participants who are at least age 55 with at least 10 years of participation in the Plan may elect to diversify a portion of their account. Diversification is offered to each eligible participant over a six-year period. In each of the first five years, a participant may diversify up to 25% of the number of post-1986 shares allocated to his or her account, less any shares previously diversified. In the sixth year, the percentage changes to 50%. Participants who elect to diversify receive a cash distribution, unless eligible for floor price protection, in which case, shares are distributed.

Forfeitures

Plan forfeitures are allocated to each participant's account based upon the relation of the participant's compensation to total compensation for the plan year. Forfeitures of terminated nonvested account balances allocated to remaining participants at December 31, 2024 and 2023 totaled \$25,510 and \$19,691 in cash forfeitures, respectively. All forfeited amounts had been allocated to remaining participants as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Plan Termination

The Company reserves the right to terminate the Plan at any time, subject to plan provisions. Upon such termination of the Plan, the interest of each participant in the trust fund will be distributed to such participant or the participant's beneficiary at the time prescribed by the Plan terms and the Code. In the event of termination of the Plan, the entire accrued benefit of a participant is fully vested and nonforfeitable. Upon termination of the Plan, the Employee Benefits Administration Committee shall direct the Trustee to pay all liabilities and expenses of the trust funds and to sell shares of financed stock held as collateral to the extent it determines such sale to be necessary in order to repay the loan.

Note 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of net assets, changes in net assets and the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

The financial statements include Union Holding Corp. common stock valued at approximately \$7,521,710 and \$10,630,937 at December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively, whose value has been determined by an independent appraisal in the absence of readily available market values. Because of the inherent subjectivity in any valuation, those estimated values may differ from values that would have been used had a ready market for the securities existed, and the difference could be material in the near term.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

The common shares of the Company are valued at estimated fair value. Fair value is determined by annual independent appraisals. Certificates of deposit are valued at fair value by discounting the related cash flows based on current yields of similar instruments with comparable durations considering the credit-worthiness of the issuer.

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Dividend income is accrued on the ex-dividend date. Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Realized gains and losses from security transactions are reported on the average cost method. Net appreciation (depreciation) includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

Payment of Benefits

Benefit payments to participants are recorded upon distribution.

Allocations

The financial statements of the Plan present separately the assets and liabilities and changes therein pertaining to: (a) the accounts of employees with rights in allocated stock (Allocated) and (b) stock not yet allocated to employees (Unallocated), including shares that are committed to be released. Shares are released from collateral and become allocated generally in the period in which debt service is actually paid.

Administrative Expenses

Administrative expenses may be paid by the Company or the Plan, at the Company's discretion. The Company has historically paid the majority of the operating expenses of the Plan.

Note 3. Administration of Plan Assets

The Trustee of the Plan holds the Plan's assets, which principally consist of Company common shares.

Company contributions are held and managed by the Trustee, which invests cash received, interest and dividend income and makes distributions to participants. The Trustee also administers the payment of interest and principal on the loan, which is reimbursed to the Trustee through contributions as determined by the Company.

Note 4. Dividends

To the extent dividends are not used by the Plan for debt service, participants are given the right to take a distribution of such dividends in cash or leave the funds in the Plan to be invested in Company stock or other applicable other investments, as provided by the Plan. For the years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, there were no dividends paid by the Company, nor received by the Plan.

Note 6. Disclosures About Fair Value of Plan Assets and Liabilities

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Fair value measurements must maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. There is a hierarchy of three levels of inputs that may be used to measure fair value:

- Level 1** Quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities
- Level 2** Observable inputs other than Level 1 prices, such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities; quoted prices in markets that are not active; or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data for substantially the full term of the assets or liabilities
- Level 3** Unobservable inputs supported by little or no market activity and are significant to the fair value of the assets or liabilities

If quoted market prices are not available, then fair values are estimated by using quoted prices of securities with similar characteristics or independent asset pricing services and pricing models, the inputs of which are market-based or independently sourced market parameters, including, but not limited to, yield curves, interest rates, volatilities, prepayments, defaults, cumulative loss projections, and cash flows. Such securities are classified in Level 2 of the valuation hierarchy. In certain cases where Level 1 or Level 2 inputs are not available, securities are classified within Level 3 of the hierarchy. The valuation process involves plan management's selection of an independent appraiser under contract for a term of three years with the right to cancel such contract at any time. Plan management accumulates the data for the appraiser from the internal financial statements of the Company. The appraiser prepares a preliminary report which plan management, along with the ESOP Trustee, reviews in detail, discusses and approves. The results of this process are documented in minutes of the plan fiduciary.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

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Note 7. Note Payable

In 2014, the Plan entered into a \$4,882,366 term loan agreement with a subsidiary of the Company. The proceeds of the loan were used to purchase the Company's outstanding common stock. Unallocated shares are collateral for the loan. Shares are released from collateral and allocated to participants as payments of principal and interest are made. The number of shares released in any year is the number of shares held as collateral at the beginning of the plan year times the ratio of the current plan year principal and interest payments divided by the total of this year's payments, plus all future years' principal and interest payments. This resulted in approximately 274 and 274 shares being released and allocated for the plan years ended December 31, 2024 and 2023, respectively.

The agreement provides for the loan to be repaid over 20 years. The principal balance of the note payable at December 31, 2024 and 2023 was \$2,850,762 and \$3,026,096, respectively. The note payable bears interest at the 12-month SOFR plus 3.00%, not to exceed 7% (adjusted annually on the due date), which was an effective rate of 7.00% as of December 31, 2024 and 2023.

Note 8. Related-party and Party-in-Interest Transactions

Party-in-interest transactions include those with fiduciaries or employees of the Plan, any person who provides services to the Plan, an employer whose employees are covered by the Plan, an employee organization whose members are covered by the Plan, a person who owns 50% or more of such an employer or employee association or relatives of such persons.

The Plan invests in Company common stock. The Plan also has a number of service providers. Such providers are parties in interest under ERISA. Individually nonmaterial expenses paid to parties in interest aggregated \$40 and \$40 for 2024 and 2023, respectively. Additionally, the Plan incurs expenses related to certain appraisal, accounting, and auditing fees. The Company pays these expenses and provides certain administrative services at no cost to the Plan.

Note 9. Tax Status

The Plan has received a determination letter from the Internal Revenue Service dated March 9, 2016 stating that the Plan and related trust, as then designed, were in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code and therefore not subject to tax. The Plan has been amended since receiving the determination letter. However, the plan administrator believes that the Plan and related trust are currently designed and being operated in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code.

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Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require Plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the Internal Revenue Service. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

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Note 11. Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan primarily invests in Company common stock, which is exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market, and credit risks as well as valuation assumptions based on earnings, cash flows, and/or other such techniques. Due to the level of risk associated with such investment securities and the level of uncertainty related to changes in the value of such investments, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in risk in the near term could materially affect the participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits and the statements of changes in net assets available for benefits.

Note 12. Subsequent Events
