Scope and Nature of the ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) Audit of the 2023 Financial Statements

We have performed an audit of the financial statements of San Pedro Fish Markets 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan and Trust (the "Plan"), an employee benefit plan subject to the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), as permitted by ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) (ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C) audit). The financial statements comprise the statement of net assets available for benefits as of December 31, 2023, and the related statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year then ended December 31, 2023, and the related notes to the financial statements.

NOTE A - DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN

The following description of the San Pedro Fish Markets 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan and Trust (the "Plan") provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

1. General

Effective January 1, 2011, the Plan was established for employees of San Pedro Fish Markets (the "Employer"). The Plan is a contributory 401(k) and profit sharing plan under Sections 401(a) and 401(k) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) and is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

2. Eligibility

An employee is eligible for participation in the Plan upon completion of one year of service in which at least 1,000 hours are worked and attainment of age 18 or older prior to or on monthly entry dates. Employees covered under a collective bargaining agreement and non-resident aliens are excluded from participation in the Plan.

3. Contributions

Participants may elect to contribute on a tax-deferred basis and/or make Roth contributions, up to 92% of compensation, as defined, up to the maximum deferral limit per Section 402(g)(1) of the IRC. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined contribution plans.

For the year ended December 31, 2023, the Employer made safe harbor matching contributions equal to 100% of the first 3% of the participants' deferred compensation plus 50% of the next 2% of the participants' deferred compensation.

The Employer may also make a discretionary profit sharing contribution in amounts determined by the Employer. Participants must be employed on the last day of the plan year to be entitled to receive an allocation of the discretionary profit sharing contribution. No additional profit sharing contributions were made for the year ended December 31, 2023.

4. Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions, Employer matching contributions and allocations of Employer profit sharing contributions and plan earnings. Participant accounts are also charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

5. Investment Options

Participants may direct employee and Employer contributions, as desired, in any of a variety of investment options held by Mid Atlantic Trust Company dba American Trust Custody (MATC) Custodian. Participants may change their investment options daily.

6. Vesting

Participants are immediately vested with respect to their individual contributions and Employer safe harbor matching contributions plus earnings thereon. Vesting of Employer profit sharing contributions is based upon the participant's years of service with the Employer as follows:

7. Forfeitures

Forfeitures of terminated participants' nonvested accounts may be used to pay administrative expenses of the Plan, applied against future Employer contributions or, allocated to participants on a pro rata basis based on compensation. The unallocated forfeiture balances at December 31, 2023 and 2022 were not material.

8. Benefit Payments

Upon termination of service, a participant is entitled to receive their vested account balance. Upon reaching normal retirement age, permanent disability or upon death while employed by the employer, a participant or participant's beneficiary is entitled to receive installment payments, an annuity or a lump-sum amount equal to the value of the participant's account or to receive designated sums from time to time as elected by the participant. In-service withdrawals are permitted if certain criteria are met.

9. Notes Receivable from Participants

The Plan permits participants to borrow from their account a minimum of \$1,000 up to 50% of their vested account balance not to exceed \$50,000 reduced by the highest outstanding loan balance during the one-year period ending on the day before the date the loan is made. Participants may have only one loan outstanding at any time. Loans must be repaid within 4.5 years and within 10 years if the loan is for the purchase of a principal residence, and bear interest at the prime rate plus 1%.

10. Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed such intent, the Employer has the right to discontinue its contributions at any time and terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. Upon termination of the Plan, participants would become 100% vested in their Employer contributions and the assets of the Plan would be distributed to the participants based on each individual participant's interest in the Plan.

NOTE B - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1. Basis of Presentation

The accompanying financial statements of the Plan have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

2. Plan Administration

San Pedro Fish Markets is the plan sponsor and the plan administrator. The plan administrator is responsible for carrying out the duties imposed under ERISA.

3. Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Plan management determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisers and custodian. See Note D for discussions of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of investments are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded as earned on the accrual basis. Dividend income is recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation/depreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

4. Administrative Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Employer. Expenses that are paid by the Employer are excluded from these financial statements. Investment related expenses are included in the net appreciation/depreciation in fair value of investments.

5. Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

6. Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires plan management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

7. Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. If a participant ceases to make loan repayments and the plan administrator deems the participant loan to be in default, the participant loan balance is reduced and a benefit payment is recorded.

8. Contributions

Contributions from Plan participants and the matching contributions from the Employer are recorded in the year in which the employee contributions are withheld from compensation.

9. Reclassifications

Certain reclassifications have been made to the December 31, 2022, financial statement and disclosures to conform to the current year presentation.

NOTE C - CERTIFIED INVESTMENTS

The plan administrator has elected the method of compliance as permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Accordingly, as permitted under such election, the plan administrator instructed the Plan's independent auditors not to perform any auditing procedures with respect to the following information certified by MATC, the custodian, as complete and accurate, except for comparing such information certified by the custodian to information included in the Plan's financial statements and supplemental schedule:

- Investments reflected in the accompanying Statement of Net Assets Available for Benefits as of December 31, 2023
- Net investment income reflected in the accompanying Statement of Changes in Net Assets Available for Benefits for the year ended December 31, 2023
- Investments reflected in the Schedule of Assets (Held at End of Year)

NOTE D - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

FASB ASC 820, *Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures*, provides the framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described as follows:

Level 1 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2023 and 2022.

Money market fund: Valued at cost plus interest.

Mutual funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

NOTE E - RELATED PARTY AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Plan investments are managed and held by MATC. MATC is the custodian and Paychex Retirement Services is the recordkeeper for the Plan and, therefore transactions with these entities qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Notes receivable from participants and the related interest income are also considered party-in-interest transactions.

NOTE F - TAX STATUS

The Employer adopted a non-standardized pre-approved profit sharing plan with a cash or deferred arrangement (non-standardized plan) which received a favorable opinion letter from the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) dated August 31, 2020. The IRS stated that the non-standardized plan, as then designed was in accordance with applicable sections of the IRC. Administration errors, if any, which are insignificant or operational in nature, are handled by the plan administrator in accordance with applicable IRS correction policies. Therefore, the plan administrator believes that the Plan was qualified and the related trust was tax-exempt as of the financial statement date.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

NOTE G - RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the Statement of Net Assets Available for Benefits.

The following description of the San Pedro Fish Markets 401(k) Profit Sharing Plan and Trust (the "Plan") provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan agreement for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

1. General

Effective January 1, 2011, the Plan was established for employees of San Pedro Fish Markets (the "Employer"). The Plan is a contributory 401(k) and profit sharing plan under Sections 401(a) and 401(k) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) and is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

2. Eligibility

An employee is eligible for participation in the Plan upon completion of one year of service in which at least 1,000 hours are worked and attainment of age 18 or older prior to or on monthly entry dates. Employees covered under a collective bargaining agreement and non-resident aliens are excluded from participation in the Plan.

3. Contributions

Participants may elect to contribute on a tax-deferred basis and/or make Roth contributions, up to 92% of compensation, as defined, up to the maximum deferral limit per Section 402(g)(1) of the IRC. Participants who have attained age 50 before the end of the plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined contribution plans.

For the year ended December 31, 2023, the Employer made safe harbor matching contributions equal to 100% of the first 3% of the participants' deferred compensation plus 50% of the next 2% of the participants' deferred compensation.

The Employer may also make a discretionary profit sharing contribution in amounts determined by the Employer. Participants must be employed on the last day of the plan year to be entitled to receive an allocation of the discretionary profit sharing contribution. No additional profit sharing contributions were made for the year ended December 31, 2023.

4. Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions, Employer matching contributions and allocations of Employer profit sharing contributions and plan earnings. Participant accounts are also charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account.

5. Investment Options

Participants may direct employee and Employer contributions, as desired, in any of a variety of investment options held by Mid Atlantic Trust Company dba American Trust Custody (MATC) Custodian. Participants may change their investment options daily.

6. Vesting

Participants are immediately vested with respect to their individual contributions and Employer safe harbor matching contributions plus earnings thereon. Vesting of Employer profit sharing contributions is based upon the participant's years of service with the Employer as follows:

7. Forfeitures

Forfeitures of terminated participants' nonvested accounts may be used to pay administrative expenses of the Plan, applied against future Employer contributions or, allocated to participants on a pro rata basis based on compensation. The unallocated forfeiture balances at December 31, 2023 and 2022 were not material.

8. Benefit Payments

Upon termination of service, a participant is entitled to receive their vested account balance. Upon reaching normal retirement age, permanent disability or upon death while employed by the employer, a participant or participant's beneficiary is entitled to receive installment payments, an annuity or a lump-sum amount equal to the value of the participant's account or to receive designated sums from time to time as elected by the participant. In-service withdrawals are permitted if certain criteria are met.

9. Notes Receivable from Participants

The Plan permits participants to borrow from their account a minimum of \$1,000 up to 50% of their vested account balance not to exceed \$50,000 reduced by the highest outstanding loan balance during the one-year period ending on the day before the date the loan is made. Participants may have only one loan outstanding at any time. Loans must be repaid within 4.5 years and within 10 years if the loan is for the purchase of a principal residence, and bear interest at the prime rate plus 1%.

10. Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed such intent, the Employer has the right to discontinue its contributions at any time and terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. Upon termination of the Plan, participants would become 100% vested in their Employer contributions and the assets of the Plan would be distributed to the participants based on each individual participant's interest in the Plan.

NOTE B - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1. Basis of Presentation

The accompanying financial statements of the Plan have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

2. Plan Administration

San Pedro Fish Markets is the plan sponsor and the plan administrator. The plan administrator is responsible for carrying out the duties imposed under ERISA.

3. Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Plan management determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisers and custodian. See Note D for discussions of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of investments are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded as earned on the accrual basis. Dividend income is recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation/depreciation includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

4. Administrative Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Employer. Expenses that are paid by the Employer are excluded from these financial statements. Investment related expenses are included in the net appreciation/depreciation in fair value of investments.

5. Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

6. Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires plan management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

7. Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Related fees are recorded as administrative expenses and are expensed when they are incurred. If a participant ceases to make loan repayments and the plan administrator deems the participant loan to be in default, the participant loan balance is reduced and a benefit payment is recorded.

8. Contributions

Contributions from Plan participants and the matching contributions from the Employer are recorded in the year in which the employee contributions are withheld from compensation.

9. Reclassifications

Certain reclassifications have been made to the December 31, 2022, financial statement and disclosures to conform to the current year presentation.

NOTE C - CERTIFIED INVESTMENTS

The plan administrator has elected the method of compliance as permitted by 29 CFR 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Accordingly, as permitted under such election, the plan administrator instructed the Plan's independent auditors not to perform any auditing procedures with respect to the following information certified by MATC, the custodian, as complete and accurate, except for comparing such information certified by the custodian to information included in the Plan's financial statements and supplemental schedule:

- Investments reflected in the accompanying Statement of Net Assets Available for Benefits as of December 31, 2023
- Net investment income reflected in the accompanying Statement of Changes in Net Assets Available for Benefits for the year ended December 31, 2023
- Investments reflected in the Schedule of Assets (Held at End of Year)

NOTE D - FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

FASB ASC 820, *Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures*, provides the framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described as follows:

Level 1 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2023 and 2022.

Money market fund: Valued at cost plus interest.

Mutual funds: Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily net asset value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

NOTE E - RELATED PARTY AND PARTY-IN-INTEREST TRANSACTIONS

Plan investments are managed and held by MATC. MATC is the custodian and Paychex Retirement Services is the recordkeeper for the Plan and, therefore transactions with these entities qualify as party-in-interest transactions. Notes receivable from participants and the related interest income are also considered party-in-interest transactions.

NOTE F - TAX STATUS

The Employer adopted a non-standardized pre-approved profit sharing plan with a cash or deferred arrangement (non-standardized plan) which received a favorable opinion letter from the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) dated August 31, 2020. The IRS stated that the non-standardized plan, as then designed was in accordance with applicable sections of the IRC. Administration errors, if any, which are insignificant or operational in nature, are handled by the plan administrator in accordance with applicable IRS correction policies. Therefore, the plan administrator believes that the Plan was qualified and the related trust was tax-exempt as of the financial statement date.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the Plan and recognize a tax liability if the Plan has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

NOTE G - RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the Statement of Net Assets Available for Benefits.
