The information included in the supplemental schedule, other than that agreed to or derived from the certified investment information, has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with GAAS. For information included in the supplemental schedule that agreed to or is derived from the certified investment information, we compared such information to the related certified investment information.

Their report also indicated that the form and content of the 2024 supplemental schedules, other than the information in the 2024 supplemental schedules that agrees to or is derived from the certified investment information, were presented, in all material respects, in conformity with the Department of Labor’s Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA, and the information in the 2024 supplemental schedules related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

1. DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN:

The following brief description of the Florida College, Inc. Retirement Plan & Trust (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the summary plan description for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

GENERAL

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering substantially all eligible employees of Florida College (the Organization) who are age 21 or older and not considered a collective bargaining employee, nonresident alien, adjunct faculty member, falcon assistant, or camp worker. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA). The board of directors has overall responsibility for the Plan. This includes the power to interpret the provisions of the Plan and to determine questions concerning eligibility, participation, and benefits, and such other powers and duties as are necessary to the operation and administration of the Plan. The board of directors also determines the appropriateness of the Plan's investment offerings and monitors investment performance.

CONTRIBUTIONS

Participants are eligible for both employee salary deferral contributions and employer Safe Harbor matching contributions upon hire. Effective June 1, 2024, after participants become eligible, they are automatically enrolled to contribute 3% of compensation unless they make a separate contribution election or elect to opt out of Plan participation.

Participants may contribute up to 100% of compensation, as defined by the Plan. Participants are permitted to designate a portion or all of their deferral contributions as Roth contributions. Participants who have attained age 50 prior to the end of the plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans (i.e. rollover). All participant contributions are voluntary.

The Organization makes a Safe Harbor matching contribution equal to 100% of the first 3% and 50% of the next 2%, for a total maximum of 4%, of compensation deferred by the participant. Additionally, the Organization may choose to make a discretionary profit sharing contribution for participants with a least 12 months of service and who were employed on the last day of the Plan year. During the year ended May 31, 2025, there were no discretionary profit sharing contributions made by the Organization.

1. DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN, continued:

PARTICIPANT ACCOUNTS

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution and allocations of (a) the Organization's contribution and (b) Plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account balance.

Contributions are subject to certain limitations prescribed by law. Participants may direct all their contributions among one or more funds subject to the allocation limitations set forth in the Plan. Changes in allocation of future contributions and transfers among funds of presently invested contributions are permitted pursuant to the Plan's provision.

VESTING

Participants are immediately vested in their employee contribution and related earnings thereon. The Organization's contributions and related investment income become 100% vested after three years of service, as defined.

FORFEITURES

As allowed by the Plan, forfeitures from terminated non-vested participant accounts are utilized to fund the Organization's contributions. At May 31, 2025 and 2024, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$0 and \$3,677, respectively. During the year ended May 31, 2025, no forfeitures were used to reduce employer contributions and \$12,145 of forfeitures were used to offset administrative expenses.

PAYMENT OF BENEFITS

The Plan allows for in-service distributions from the one hundred percent vested portions of participant accounts if the participant has attained age 59 1/2 or has incurred a qualifying hardship as defined in the plan documents. On termination of service due to death, disability, or retirement, a participant, or the participant's beneficiaries, may elect to receive either a lump-sum amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account, or annual installments subject to certain limitations as outlined in the plan documents. For termination of service or other reasons, a participant may elect to receive the value of the vested interest in his or her account as a lump-sum distribution. This distribution may be forced for participants whose vested balance is below \$1,000.

1. DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN, continued:

ADMINISTRATIVE EXPENSES

Custodial and investment fees, along with other maintenance expenses, are paid from Plan assets. For the year ended May 31, 2025, \$44,990 was paid from Plan assets for administrative expenses. Any other administrative expenses are paid by the Organization.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

USE OF ESTIMATES

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires the management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

INVESTMENT VALUATION AND INCOME RECOGNITION

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 4 for a discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

CONTRIBUTIONS

Contributions from Plan participants are recorded in the year in which the employee contributions are withheld from compensation. Contributions from the employer are recorded in the year in which the related compensation is paid.

PAYMENT OF BENEFITS

Benefits are recorded when paid.

ADMINISTRATIVE EXPENSES

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Organization. Expenses that are paid by the Organization are excluded from these financial statements. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation of fair value of investments.

RECLASSIFICATION

Certain balances from the prior year have been reclassified to conform to the current year presentation.

3. INFORMATION CERTIFIED BY THE QUALIFIED INSTITUTION:

The Plan administrator has elected the method of compliance as permitted by 29 CRF 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Accordingly, Ascensus, LLC (Ascensus), a qualified institution, as an authorized agent of Ascensus Trust Company and Newport Trust Company, LLC, has certified the completeness and accuracy of all investments reflected on the accompanying statements of net assets available for benefits as of May 31, 2025 and 2024; the related investment income reflected in the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended May 31, 2025; and the supplemental Schedule H, Line 4i-Schedule of Assets (Held at End of Year) as of May 31, 2025.

4. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS:

Fair value is the exchange price that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measured date.

The *Fair Value Measurements and Disclosure* topic of the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. This hierarchy consists of three broad levels: Level 1 inputs consist of unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets and have the highest priority, Level 2 inputs consist of observable inputs other than quoted prices for identical assets, and Level 3 inputs have the lowest priority. The Plan uses appropriate valuation techniques based on the available inputs to measure the fair value of its investments. When available, the Plan measures fair value using Level 1 inputs because they generally provide the most reliable evidence of fair value. Level 3 inputs are only used when Level 1 or Level 2 inputs are not available.

Mutual funds are valued using Level 1 inputs, and are valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Collective investment trusts are made up of an underlying portfolio of traditional guaranteed investment contracts, security-backed investment contracts, and money market funds. The units of these trusts are valued at net asset value (NAV). The NAV is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. This practical expedient would not be used if it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different from the reported NAV.

There were no changes to valuation methodologies during the year.

5. PLAN TERMINATION:

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Organization has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. Any unallocated assets of the Plan shall be allocated to participant accounts and distributed in such a manner as the Organization may determine. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in all contributions and earnings.

6. TAX STATUS:

The Plan has adopted a prototype plan document sponsored by Ascensus, LLC. The prototype plan document has obtained an opinion letter from the Internal Revenue Service dated June 30, 2020, in which it states that the prototype plan document, as then designed, was in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code. The Plan has been amended since receiving the opinion letter. Certain matters were identified that, if not corrected, could impact the tax-exempt status of the Plan. Management will investigate the matter and corrections, if any, will be made in accordance with regulations. Except for the matters identified above, the Plan administrator and the Plan's tax counsel believe that the Plan is designed and is operating in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code.

7. RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES:

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

8. PARTIES IN INTEREST:

During the Plan year, the Plan investments were held by Ascensus; therefore, certain transactions with these parties qualify as party-in-interest transactions. During the year ended May 31, 2025, the Plan paid \$44,990 in fees to Ascensus.

9. SUBSEQUENT EVENTS:

Subsequent events have been evaluated through March 9, 2026, which represents the date the financial statements were available to be issued. Subsequent events after that date have not been evaluated.

Their report also indicated that the form and content of the 2024 supplemental schedules, other than the information in the 2024 supplemental schedules that agrees to or is derived from the certified investment information, were presented, in all material respects, in conformity with the Department of Labor’s Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA, and the information in the 2024 supplemental schedules related to assets held by and certified to by a qualified institution agrees to, or is derived from, in all material respects, the information prepared and certified by an institution that management determined meets the requirements of ERISA Section 103(a)(3)(C).

1. DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN:

The following brief description of the Florida College, Inc. Retirement Plan & Trust (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the summary plan description for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

GENERAL

The Plan is a defined contribution plan covering substantially all eligible employees of Florida College (the Organization) who are age 21 or older and not considered a collective bargaining employee, nonresident alien, adjunct faculty member, falcon assistant, or camp worker. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA). The board of directors has overall responsibility for the Plan. This includes the power to interpret the provisions of the Plan and to determine questions concerning eligibility, participation, and benefits, and such other powers and duties as are necessary to the operation and administration of the Plan. The board of directors also determines the appropriateness of the Plan's investment offerings and monitors investment performance.

CONTRIBUTIONS

Participants are eligible for both employee salary deferral contributions and employer Safe Harbor matching contributions upon hire. Effective June 1, 2024, after participants become eligible, they are automatically enrolled to contribute 3% of compensation unless they make a separate contribution election or elect to opt out of Plan participation.

Participants may contribute up to 100% of compensation, as defined by the Plan. Participants are permitted to designate a portion or all of their deferral contributions as Roth contributions. Participants who have attained age 50 prior to the end of the plan year are eligible to make catch-up contributions. Participants may also contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or defined contribution plans (i.e. rollover). All participant contributions are voluntary.

The Organization makes a Safe Harbor matching contribution equal to 100% of the first 3% and 50% of the next 2%, for a total maximum of 4%, of compensation deferred by the participant. Additionally, the Organization may choose to make a discretionary profit sharing contribution for participants with a least 12 months of service and who were employed on the last day of the Plan year. During the year ended May 31, 2025, there were no discretionary profit sharing contributions made by the Organization.

1. DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN, continued:

PARTICIPANT ACCOUNTS

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contribution and allocations of (a) the Organization's contribution and (b) Plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account balance.

Contributions are subject to certain limitations prescribed by law. Participants may direct all their contributions among one or more funds subject to the allocation limitations set forth in the Plan. Changes in allocation of future contributions and transfers among funds of presently invested contributions are permitted pursuant to the Plan's provision.

VESTING

Participants are immediately vested in their employee contribution and related earnings thereon. The Organization's contributions and related investment income become 100% vested after three years of service, as defined.

FORFEITURES

As allowed by the Plan, forfeitures from terminated non-vested participant accounts are utilized to fund the Organization's contributions. At May 31, 2025 and 2024, forfeited nonvested accounts totaled \$0 and \$3,677, respectively. During the year ended May 31, 2025, no forfeitures were used to reduce employer contributions and \$12,145 of forfeitures were used to offset administrative expenses.

PAYMENT OF BENEFITS

The Plan allows for in-service distributions from the one hundred percent vested portions of participant accounts if the participant has attained age 59 1/2 or has incurred a qualifying hardship as defined in the plan documents. On termination of service due to death, disability, or retirement, a participant, or the participant's beneficiaries, may elect to receive either a lump-sum amount equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account, or annual installments subject to certain limitations as outlined in the plan documents. For termination of service or other reasons, a participant may elect to receive the value of the vested interest in his or her account as a lump-sum distribution. This distribution may be forced for participants whose vested balance is below \$1,000.

1. DESCRIPTION OF THE PLAN, continued:

ADMINISTRATIVE EXPENSES

Custodial and investment fees, along with other maintenance expenses, are paid from Plan assets. For the year ended May 31, 2025, \$44,990 was paid from Plan assets for administrative expenses. Any other administrative expenses are paid by the Organization.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The financial statements of the Plan are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

USE OF ESTIMATES

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires the management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and changes therein, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

INVESTMENT VALUATION AND INCOME RECOGNITION

Investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 4 for a discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation includes the Plan's gains on investments bought and sold as well as held during the year.

CONTRIBUTIONS

Contributions from Plan participants are recorded in the year in which the employee contributions are withheld from compensation. Contributions from the employer are recorded in the year in which the related compensation is paid.

PAYMENT OF BENEFITS

Benefits are recorded when paid.

ADMINISTRATIVE EXPENSES

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid by the Plan, unless otherwise paid by the Organization. Expenses that are paid by the Organization are excluded from these financial statements. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation of fair value of investments.

RECLASSIFICATION

Certain balances from the prior year have been reclassified to conform to the current year presentation.

3. INFORMATION CERTIFIED BY THE QUALIFIED INSTITUTION:

The Plan administrator has elected the method of compliance as permitted by 29 CRF 2520.103-8 of the Department of Labor's Rules and Regulations for Reporting and Disclosure under ERISA. Accordingly, Ascensus, LLC (Ascensus), a qualified institution, as an authorized agent of Ascensus Trust Company and Newport Trust Company, LLC, has certified the completeness and accuracy of all investments reflected on the accompanying statements of net assets available for benefits as of May 31, 2025 and 2024; the related investment income reflected in the statement of changes in net assets available for benefits for the year ended May 31, 2025; and the supplemental Schedule H, Line 4i-Schedule of Assets (Held at End of Year) as of May 31, 2025.

4. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS:

Fair value is the exchange price that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measured date.

The *Fair Value Measurements and Disclosure* topic of the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. This hierarchy consists of three broad levels: Level 1 inputs consist of unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets and have the highest priority, Level 2 inputs consist of observable inputs other than quoted prices for identical assets, and Level 3 inputs have the lowest priority. The Plan uses appropriate valuation techniques based on the available inputs to measure the fair value of its investments. When available, the Plan measures fair value using Level 1 inputs because they generally provide the most reliable evidence of fair value. Level 3 inputs are only used when Level 1 or Level 2 inputs are not available.

Mutual funds are valued using Level 1 inputs, and are valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Collective investment trusts are made up of an underlying portfolio of traditional guaranteed investment contracts, security-backed investment contracts, and money market funds. The units of these trusts are valued at net asset value (NAV). The NAV is used as a practical expedient to estimate fair value. This practical expedient would not be used if it is determined to be probable that the fund will sell the investment for an amount different from the reported NAV.

There were no changes to valuation methodologies during the year.

5. PLAN TERMINATION:

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Organization has the right under the Plan to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. Any unallocated assets of the Plan shall be allocated to participant accounts and distributed in such a manner as the Organization may determine. In the event of Plan termination, participants would become 100% vested in all contributions and earnings.

6. TAX STATUS:

The Plan has adopted a prototype plan document sponsored by Ascensus, LLC. The prototype plan document has obtained an opinion letter from the Internal Revenue Service dated June 30, 2020, in which it states that the prototype plan document, as then designed, was in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code. The Plan has been amended since receiving the opinion letter. Certain matters were identified that, if not corrected, could impact the tax-exempt status of the Plan. Management will investigate the matter and corrections, if any, will be made in accordance with regulations. Except for the matters identified above, the Plan administrator and the Plan's tax counsel believe that the Plan is designed and is operating in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code.

7. RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES:

The Plan invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances and the amounts reported in the statements of net assets available for benefits.

8. PARTIES IN INTEREST:

During the Plan year, the Plan investments were held by Ascensus; therefore, certain transactions with these parties qualify as party-in-interest transactions. During the year ended May 31, 2025, the Plan paid \$44,990 in fees to Ascensus.

9. SUBSEQUENT EVENTS:

Subsequent events have been evaluated through March 9, 2026, which represents the date the financial statements were available to be issued. Subsequent events after that date have not been evaluated.
