1. Description of The Plan

The following description of the Schumacher Homes, Inc. 401(k) Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement and the summary plan description for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan that covers substantially all employees of Schumacher Homes, Inc. (the Company and Plan Sponsor) and participating employers whose employees have completed six months of service, excluding union employees, certain nonresident aliens and leased employees. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

Contributions

The Plan's provisions provide for contributions to be made by the participants and the Company. An employee must complete six months of service to be eligible for elective deferral, discretionary matching contributions and discretionary profit-sharing contributions. Employees must be employed on the last day of the Plan year or complete 500 hours of service in order to participate in any discretionary profit-sharing contributions.

The Plan includes an auto-enrollment provision whereby all newly eligible employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan unless they affirmatively elect not to participate in the Plan. Automatically enrolled participants have their deferral rate set at the amount designated by which group of eligible employees, and their contributions are invested in a designated balanced fund until changed by the participant.

Employee Deferral Contributions

Each participant is permitted to make elective deferrals up to 100% of their compensation, up to the maximum amount permitted by law, as defined by the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). The Company also offers a Roth 401(k) option. Participants who are at least 50 years of age before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make "catch-up" contributions not to exceed the maximum amount allowable per IRC.

Employee Rollover Contributions

Participants may contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or contribution plans.

Discretionary Matching Contributions

The Company may make discretionary matching contributions. For the year ended December 31, 2025, the Company elected to match 50% of the participants' voluntary contributions to the Plan up to the first 6% of compensation, which resulted in matching contributions of \$844,801, net of forfeitures.

Discretionary Profit-Sharing Contributions

The Company has the option to make a discretionary contribution equal to a certain percentage of each eligible participant's compensation. No discretionary contributions were made for the year ended December 31, 2025.

Vesting

A participant is fully vested immediately in elective wage deferrals and amounts rolled over from other plans. Vesting for discretionary matching and profit-sharing contributions is as follows:

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and discretionary matching contributions, as well as allocations of the Company's discretionary profit-sharing contribution and Plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account. All investments of the Plan are fully participant directed.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. Loan terms generally range from one to five years, or longer for the purchase of a primary residence. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account. The loan interest rate, determined quarterly, is set at 1.00% above the prime rate, as defined. Interest rates for participant loans are from 4.25% to 9.50%. Principal and interest is paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Payment of Benefits

Upon termination of service, a participant having a balance of more than \$5,000 may elect to receive either a lump-sum distribution or a direct rollover distribution equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account. A participant having less than a \$1,000 balance must take a lump-sum distribution. If a participant's vested account balance exceeds \$1,000 but does not exceed \$5,000, the plan administrator may make a direct rollover to an individual retirement account, if the participant does not make an election within a designated time period. Non-terminated employees may make withdrawals from their elective deferral account balance as a hardship withdrawal prior to reaching normal retirement age. Hardship withdrawals are subject to additional rules and conditions as outlined in the Plan agreement.

Non-terminated employees who have reached age 59 ½ may make withdrawals of up to 100% of their elective deferral, qualified non-elective contribution, and qualified matching contribution account balances as an in-service distribution.

Forfeitures

Forfeitures which occur pursuant to the provisions of the Plan agreement may be used to pay Plan expenses and reduce discretionary matching and/or profit-sharing contributions. No forfeitures were used to pay Plan expenses for the year ended December 31, 2025. Forfeitures of \$139,462 were used to reduce discretionary matching contributions for the year ended December 31, 2025. As of December 31, 2025 and 2024, the Plan had \$288 and \$1,009, respectively, of unallocated forfeitures available to offset future employer contributions or pay Plan expenses.

Subsequent Events

Plan management has evaluated subsequent events through July 20, 2026, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The Plan's financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires the plan administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results may differ from these estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are stated at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The plan administrator determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisors, custodian, trustee, and insurance company. See Note 4 for a discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on an accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation (depreciation) includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments purchased and sold, as well as held, during the year.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on an accrual basis. Related fees are charged directly to the borrowing participant's account and are included in administrative expenses when incurred. As of December 31, 2025 and 2024, no allowance for credit losses has been recorded. If a participant does not make loan repayments and the plan administrator considers the participant loan to be in default, the note balance is reduced, and the delinquent participant note receivable is recorded as a benefit payment based on the terms of the Plan agreement.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Administrative Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid directly by the Company and are excluded from these financial statements. Certain investment management and other administrative fees are paid directly by the Plan. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation (depreciation) of fair value of investments.

3. Information Prepared and Certified by the Custodian and Trustee

Certain information related to investments and notes receivable from participants disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and supplemental schedule including investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2025 and 2024, and investment income (loss), net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of investments and interest from participants for the year ended December 31, 2025, was obtained or derived from information supplied to the plan administrator and certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company, the custodian and trustee of the Plan.

4. Fair Value Measurements

The authoritative accounting guidance establishes a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under the authoritative accounting guidance are described as follows:

Level 1 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 – Inputs include quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability and inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2025 or 2024.

Mutual funds – Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily Net Asset Value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Money market fund – Money market accounts are stated at cost, which approximates fair value.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

5. Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right in accordance with the Plan agreement to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of plan termination, participants will become 100% vested in the employer contributions portion of their accounts.

6. Tax Status

The Plan has adopted a volume submitter plan document. The volume submitter practitioner obtained an opinion letter dated June 30, 2020, in which the IRS stated that the volume submitter plan, as then designed, was in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. The Plan has been amended since receiving the opinion letter; however the plan administrator believes that the Plan is designed and currently operating in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. Therefore, no provision for income taxes has been included in the Plan's financial statements.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the plan and recognize a tax liability if the plan has taken an uncertain tax position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

7. Transactions with Parties in Interest

Fidelity Management Trust Company is the custodian and trustee of the Plan and holds all of the Plan's investments. Fidelity Management Trust Company is a party in interest of the Plan as defined by ERISA Section 3(14), and accordingly investment transactions in the funds are parties in interest transactions.

Certain legal and accounting fees and certain administrative expenses relating to the maintenance of participant eligibility records are absorbed by the Plan Sponsor. Additionally, the Plan pays another provider for investment advisory services which qualify as a party in interest transactions. Other than as described above or pursuant to a trust agreement, the Plan has no agreements or transactions with any parties in interest.

8. Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities which are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances, and the amounts reported in the statement of net assets available for benefits.

1. Description of The Plan

The following description of the Schumacher Homes, Inc. 401(k) Plan (the Plan) provides only general information. Participants should refer to the Plan agreement and the summary plan description for a more complete description of the Plan's provisions.

General

The Plan is a defined contribution plan that covers substantially all employees of Schumacher Homes, Inc. (the Company and Plan Sponsor) and participating employers whose employees have completed six months of service, excluding union employees, certain nonresident aliens and leased employees. The Plan is subject to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA).

Contributions

The Plan's provisions provide for contributions to be made by the participants and the Company. An employee must complete six months of service to be eligible for elective deferral, discretionary matching contributions and discretionary profit-sharing contributions. Employees must be employed on the last day of the Plan year or complete 500 hours of service in order to participate in any discretionary profit-sharing contributions.

The Plan includes an auto-enrollment provision whereby all newly eligible employees are automatically enrolled in the Plan unless they affirmatively elect not to participate in the Plan. Automatically enrolled participants have their deferral rate set at the amount designated by which group of eligible employees, and their contributions are invested in a designated balanced fund until changed by the participant.

Employee Deferral Contributions

Each participant is permitted to make elective deferrals up to 100% of their compensation, up to the maximum amount permitted by law, as defined by the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). The Company also offers a Roth 401(k) option. Participants who are at least 50 years of age before the end of the Plan year are eligible to make "catch-up" contributions not to exceed the maximum amount allowable per IRC.

Employee Rollover Contributions

Participants may contribute amounts representing distributions from other qualified defined benefit or contribution plans.

Discretionary Matching Contributions

The Company may make discretionary matching contributions. For the year ended December 31, 2025, the Company elected to match 50% of the participants' voluntary contributions to the Plan up to the first 6% of compensation, which resulted in matching contributions of \$844,801, net of forfeitures.

Discretionary Profit-Sharing Contributions

The Company has the option to make a discretionary contribution equal to a certain percentage of each eligible participant's compensation. No discretionary contributions were made for the year ended December 31, 2025.

Vesting

A participant is fully vested immediately in elective wage deferrals and amounts rolled over from other plans. Vesting for discretionary matching and profit-sharing contributions is as follows:

Participant Accounts

Each participant's account is credited with the participant's contributions and discretionary matching contributions, as well as allocations of the Company's discretionary profit-sharing contribution and Plan earnings. Participant accounts are charged with an allocation of administrative expenses that are paid by the Plan. Allocations are based on participant earnings, account balances, or specific participant transactions, as defined. The benefit to which a participant is entitled is the benefit that can be provided from the participant's vested account. All investments of the Plan are fully participant directed.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Participants may borrow from their fund accounts a minimum of \$1,000 up to a maximum of \$50,000 or 50% of their vested account balance. Loan terms generally range from one to five years, or longer for the purchase of a primary residence. The loans are secured by the balance in the participant's account. The loan interest rate, determined quarterly, is set at 1.00% above the prime rate, as defined. Interest rates for participant loans are from 4.25% to 9.50%. Principal and interest is paid ratably through payroll deductions.

Payment of Benefits

Upon termination of service, a participant having a balance of more than \$5,000 may elect to receive either a lump-sum distribution or a direct rollover distribution equal to the value of the participant's vested interest in his or her account. A participant having less than a \$1,000 balance must take a lump-sum distribution. If a participant's vested account balance exceeds \$1,000 but does not exceed \$5,000, the plan administrator may make a direct rollover to an individual retirement account, if the participant does not make an election within a designated time period. Non-terminated employees may make withdrawals from their elective deferral account balance as a hardship withdrawal prior to reaching normal retirement age. Hardship withdrawals are subject to additional rules and conditions as outlined in the Plan agreement.

Non-terminated employees who have reached age 59 ½ may make withdrawals of up to 100% of their elective deferral, qualified non-elective contribution, and qualified matching contribution account balances as an in-service distribution.

Forfeitures

Forfeitures which occur pursuant to the provisions of the Plan agreement may be used to pay Plan expenses and reduce discretionary matching and/or profit-sharing contributions. No forfeitures were used to pay Plan expenses for the year ended December 31, 2025. Forfeitures of \$139,462 were used to reduce discretionary matching contributions for the year ended December 31, 2025. As of December 31, 2025 and 2024, the Plan had \$288 and \$1,009, respectively, of unallocated forfeitures available to offset future employer contributions or pay Plan expenses.

Subsequent Events

Plan management has evaluated subsequent events through July 20, 2026, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The Plan's financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires the plan administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results may differ from these estimates.

Investment Valuation and Income Recognition

Investments are stated at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The plan administrator determines the Plan's valuation policies utilizing information provided by the investment advisors, custodian, trustee, and insurance company. See Note 4 for a discussion of fair value measurements.

Purchases and sales of securities are recorded on a trade-date basis. Interest income is recorded on an accrual basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Net appreciation (depreciation) includes the Plan's gains and losses on investments purchased and sold, as well as held, during the year.

Notes Receivable from Participants

Notes receivable from participants are measured at their unpaid principal balance plus any accrued but unpaid interest. Interest income is recorded on an accrual basis. Related fees are charged directly to the borrowing participant's account and are included in administrative expenses when incurred. As of December 31, 2025 and 2024, no allowance for credit losses has been recorded. If a participant does not make loan repayments and the plan administrator considers the participant loan to be in default, the note balance is reduced, and the delinquent participant note receivable is recorded as a benefit payment based on the terms of the Plan agreement.

Payment of Benefits

Benefits are recorded when paid.

Administrative Expenses

Certain expenses of maintaining the Plan are paid directly by the Company and are excluded from these financial statements. Certain investment management and other administrative fees are paid directly by the Plan. Investment related expenses are included in net appreciation (depreciation) of fair value of investments.

3. Information Prepared and Certified by the Custodian and Trustee

Certain information related to investments and notes receivable from participants disclosed in the accompanying financial statements and supplemental schedule including investments and notes receivable from participants held at December 31, 2025 and 2024, and investment income (loss), net appreciation (depreciation) in fair value of investments and interest from participants for the year ended December 31, 2025, was obtained or derived from information supplied to the plan administrator and certified as complete and accurate by Fidelity Management Trust Company, the custodian and trustee of the Plan.

4. Fair Value Measurements

The authoritative accounting guidance establishes a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under the authoritative accounting guidance are described as follows:

Level 1 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Plan has the ability to access.

Level 2 – Inputs include quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability and inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 – Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2025 or 2024.

Mutual funds – Valued at the daily closing price as reported by the fund. Mutual funds held by the Plan are open-end mutual funds that are registered with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. These funds are required to publish their daily Net Asset Value (NAV) and to transact at that price. The mutual funds held by the Plan are deemed to be actively traded.

Money market fund – Money market accounts are stated at cost, which approximates fair value.

The preceding methods described may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Plan believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

5. Plan Termination

Although it has not expressed any intent to do so, the Company has the right in accordance with the Plan agreement to discontinue its contributions at any time and to terminate the Plan subject to the provisions of ERISA. In the event of plan termination, participants will become 100% vested in the employer contributions portion of their accounts.

6. Tax Status

The Plan has adopted a volume submitter plan document. The volume submitter practitioner obtained an opinion letter dated June 30, 2020, in which the IRS stated that the volume submitter plan, as then designed, was in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. The Plan has been amended since receiving the opinion letter; however the plan administrator believes that the Plan is designed and currently operating in compliance with the applicable requirements of the IRC. Therefore, no provision for income taxes has been included in the Plan's financial statements.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require plan management to evaluate tax positions taken by the plan and recognize a tax liability if the plan has taken an uncertain tax position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the IRS. The Plan is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

7. Transactions with Parties in Interest

Fidelity Management Trust Company is the custodian and trustee of the Plan and holds all of the Plan's investments. Fidelity Management Trust Company is a party in interest of the Plan as defined by ERISA Section 3(14), and accordingly investment transactions in the funds are parties in interest transactions.

Certain legal and accounting fees and certain administrative expenses relating to the maintenance of participant eligibility records are absorbed by the Plan Sponsor. Additionally, the Plan pays another provider for investment advisory services which qualify as a party in interest transactions. Other than as described above or pursuant to a trust agreement, the Plan has no agreements or transactions with any parties in interest.

8. Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in various investment securities which are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect participants' account balances, and the amounts reported in the statement of net assets available for benefits.
